

PZC Reviews Proposal For Apartments

The Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) reviewed Stage II plans for a 374-unit apartment complex on about 23 acres of land on the south side of Spencer St.

The PZC took no action on the plans last night. The development, known as Squire Village, is being planned by the Capitol Region Development Corp., the land acquisition arm of the Greater Hartford Housing Development Fund.

The 18-acre parcel, formerly the Bunce property, will support 35 apartments containing 265 bedrooms. This part of the project received Stage I approval in May 1971.

The apartments will range from one-bedroom units for the elderly to two- and three-bedroom townhouse units, according to William Hirschon, executive director of the housing corporation.

The corporation, which is privately endowed, will receive federal subsidies to allow rentals to low-income families, Hirschon said.

The apartment complex is being designed by Lawrence Associates of Manchester, which had been architect for the project since it was proposed as two separate projects several years ago. The Capitol Region Development Corp. bought the property after planning had started.

The corporation is seeking to make modifications in Stage II plans for the west side, which were approved by the PZC prior to the corporation's purchase of the parcel. The firm intends to extend a road from the west side to the east side, and to eliminate a planned swimming pool and tennis court.

The PZC last night decided to take action either on the west side modifications or the east side Stage II plans.

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Commuter Service 95 Ride Bus Today

This morning's count of passengers on the Manchester-Hartford express commuter bus totaled 95, according to the Connecticut Department of Transportation (DOT).

One of the buses leaving the Burr Corners shopping center was ten minutes late into downtown Hartford, DOT officials said, because of a traffic tie-up on I-84 in East Hartford.

Several of the commuter buses took alternate routes to avoid the I-84 tie-up, which was caused by a three-car accident near Sunset Hills.

The buses exited the highway before the accident scene and got back on the expressway, bypassing the hundreds of commuter cars held up by the accident.

The return buses leave from the same stops every ten minutes between 4 and 6 p.m. The one-way fare is 50 cents.

Designed to relieve traffic congestion and help commuters avoid parking problems in the city, the Manchester bus service is similar to a successful program in Hartford.

The Connecticut Co., which runs the buses for the state, will receive state subsidies for the Manchester service not to exceed \$15,000.

To break even, the DOT must attract 230 round-trip passengers per day.

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Insurance Benefits Extended

The Town Council, Monday night, voted to extend health insurance benefits to all town employees, including town employees who equalize town benefits to those of the state.

The new plan will require the town to pay for the cost of the health insurance program for the 20 employees who are currently covered by the state.

How Spassky Gained Edge

Each of the players has been preparing for the other for years. They knew that some day they would meet in a set match, and that the stakes would be high.
Each one knows every prepared game of his opponent.
Each has undoubtedly prepared many innovations specifically for this match. Would one of them be sprung in the opening game?
Fischer played a defense popular in the 1920s by Aron Nimzovich of Denmark.
For the first nine moves, the game was identical to one played in 1961 between Petro-

This Is A Test

This is announcing a test watch of the news. One day this week, in a nameless American city, robbers after some petty cash met with some feeble resistance.

In punishment for this, they inflicted a certain particular and unusual act of violence on their two victims.

We do not wish to lend these columns any additional publication of the details of their act of violence.

All we are going to do, here, is try to keep score, to see whether this is going to become another instance in which a city, and have made the news, then proceeds to happen elsewhere.

It has happened before, that one special kind of violence, once it gets into the news, repeats itself as other diseased minds decide it must be the latest fashion in cruelty.

We hope you never read another instance of this particular new-old cruelty which happened this week. But if it is with this as it had been with other such grisly novelties, the same kind of act will be committed again and perhaps again in the weeks ahead. It there is a score, we'll keep track.

The Big Blunder

There is one good point in the seemingly wasteful struggle of convention politics — the point deriving from the revelation of what tactics and weapons various politicians are willing, or foolish enough, to use.

Sometimes national figures measure themselves, unwittingly.

And if, by their own choice or acceptance of tactics, they blunder into a result which is the exact opposite of their intention, then, perhaps, it is fair to judge that the country didn't desperately need their service in any higher responsibility.

One of the great political blunders of our time has just met its poetic reward — a resounding defeat — at the Democratic National Convention as decided by 50-4 decisions, perhaps one of the great harm is done.

When an issue as serious and as emotionally wrenching as capital punishment is decided by a 50-4 decision, it is less than satisfactory.

Not even the five justices in the Supreme Court are decided by 5-4. The fact that the justices themselves are divided 5-4 on the issue is itself a measure of the uncertainty of the decision.

Three of them found that capital punishment as such violated the Eighth Amendment prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment. The other two argued that the present system of dispensing justice makes capital punishment "cruel and unusual" because it makes it uncertain and capricious, but with certain limits and conditions, capital punishment might be constitutional.

Constitution was not confined to the majority; all four of the dissenters filed separate opinions.

The fact that the justices themselves are divided on the question is indicated by the extraordinary length of their combined opinions — 243 pages in all. Some of the greatest and most far-reaching opinions in the history of the court have been reached in a very few pages.

When nine men need 243 pages to explain themselves as men we didn't particularly need in the Presidency, but had given Senator McGovern a bigger boost toward the nomination than he might ever have been able to create for himself in the opening phase of the convention.

The deficiencies of Senators Humphrey and Muskie in reaching for the California maneuver, do not translate themselves into pure McGovern virtues. It was indeed temptingly true that the California law which, in this instance, was working to Senator McGovern's benefit was the kind of law he could be depended upon to oppose in every other instance.

And Senator McGovern himself was obviously drooling for a deal with the notorious Mayor Daley, no matter how wicked the system by which the Chicago delegates had been selected.

But the more one acknowledges that politicians are politicians and candidates are candidates, the more one magnifies the blunder of Senator McGovern and Muskie in reaching for the California maneuver, do not translate themselves into pure McGovern virtues.

"In my hour of need, I am comforted knowing this letter won't go unheeded. Realizing fully the inadequacy of words to convey my feelings, I give you simply a warm thank you with best wishes toward the future for you and yours."

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DR. LAWRENCE E. LAMB More Likely in Adults Surgery, Behavior Are Linked

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

Dear Dr. Lamb—I would like to ask you about your statement that a frankly psychotic behavior often occurs after open heart surgery. My daughter is scheduled to have surgery at age 5 or 6 to correct tetralogy of Fallot and I would like to know if we should watch for behavior other than normal at this time. I am a nurse and we are rather strict with her and I am afraid that if we are unaware of possible changes, we would think it was a sickly child syndrome and become even more severe.

Dear Reader—The psychological problems that have accumulated after heart surgery are commonly noted immediately after surgery before they leave the hospital.

For the operation your daughter will have, I should think that if she were going to have any problems of this nature they would be recognized by the hospital staff. It has been my general impression that these problems are more apt to occur in adults than they are in children. Perhaps this is because adults often have a number of other medical problems that have accumulated over the years and as a nurse you probably realize that young children often tolerate even major surgery far better than adults do.

For the benefit of our other readers, a tetralogy of Fallot is a birth defect of the heart which is associated with a hole between the lower pumping chambers of the heart, the right and left ventricle and a displacement of the artery that carries blood to the body and the artery to the lungs. The combination of defects often causes a child to be cyanotic or blue. Many of these, as with other birth defects of the heart, can be corrected with heart surgery.

Heart surgery has been an absolute miracle for children born with defects that would otherwise pose a handicap for them. Of all the marvelous things that have been done to eradicate the birth defects of the heart, it is one of the brightest chapters in the history of medicine. I am inclined to believe that what has been done to eradicate the birth defects of the heart is one of the greatest achievements of our time. I had a high fever for a couple of days and it left me with a heart murmur. I have to take penicillin until I am 21-years old. I am 19 and planning on getting married soon. I would like to know if I will be able to have a baby. My heart murmur is much better and I can do anything in the line of sports as long as I don't overdo it and get tired.

Dear Reader—If you are able to be active in sports, without difficulties, you shouldn't have any trouble having a baby. Many women who have rheumatic heart disease have had several pregnancies. The decision is, of course, dependent entirely on how severely the heart is damaged. Women who have trouble with their pregnancy because of rheumatic heart disease usually have enough damage to it that they will also have clear-cut limitations in their ability to exercise or engage in sports.

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Stamps in the News

ROYAL JERSEY MILITIA



JERSEY 219

By SYD KRONISH AP Newfeatures The address of the Jersey Royal Militia during the 19th century is the basis of a four-stamp commemorative issue by the Jersey Postal Authority.

The 2 1/2 pence shows the artillery shako of the late Regency period. The badge carried the reverse cypher "GR" and the words "Jersey Royal Artillery."

The 3 pence features the 2nd North Regiment of the Militia, a unit created from the parishes of Trinity and St. Martin. This type of shako was designed by Prince Albert and worn by British infantry at the beginning of the Crimean War.

"Only One Earth," the official theme of the United Nations Conference on Human Environment, is the subject of a new 60 millimeter stamp of Tunisia. The U.N. meeting which called attention to ecology problems received added publicity by means of postage stamps issued by several member countries.

The Tunisian stamp, according to the World Wide Philatelic Agency, consists of a series of circular forms which provide a background of a female figure carrying the fruits of the earth above her. Also seen are symbols of growing items, all enclosed in a circle. In the lower right corner is another insignia wrapped in the laurel wreath symbolizing the United Nations.

Tunisia issued a similar world participation event stamp last month to honor World Health Day. It showed two highly stylized figures emphasizing the functioning of the heart and incorporating the message: "The Heart is the Heart of Health."

The U.S. Postal Service has published a book with wide appeal to both novice and veteran stamp collectors. The book, "Stamps & Stories," is an exciting saga of U.S. History told in "Stamps," was prepared by the editors of Scott Publishing Co. It is being sold at selected Midwest post offices and other post offices elsewhere and by mail order from the Philatelic Sales Unit in Washington, D.C.

It contains illustrated stories covering many highlights in history that have been portrayed on stamps. The 224-page book comes in pocket size (4 1/2 by 7 1/2 inches). The cost for the paperback edition is \$2 and can be ordered directly for this amount plus handling charge of 50 cents from the Philatelic Sales Unit, Washington, D.C. 20038.

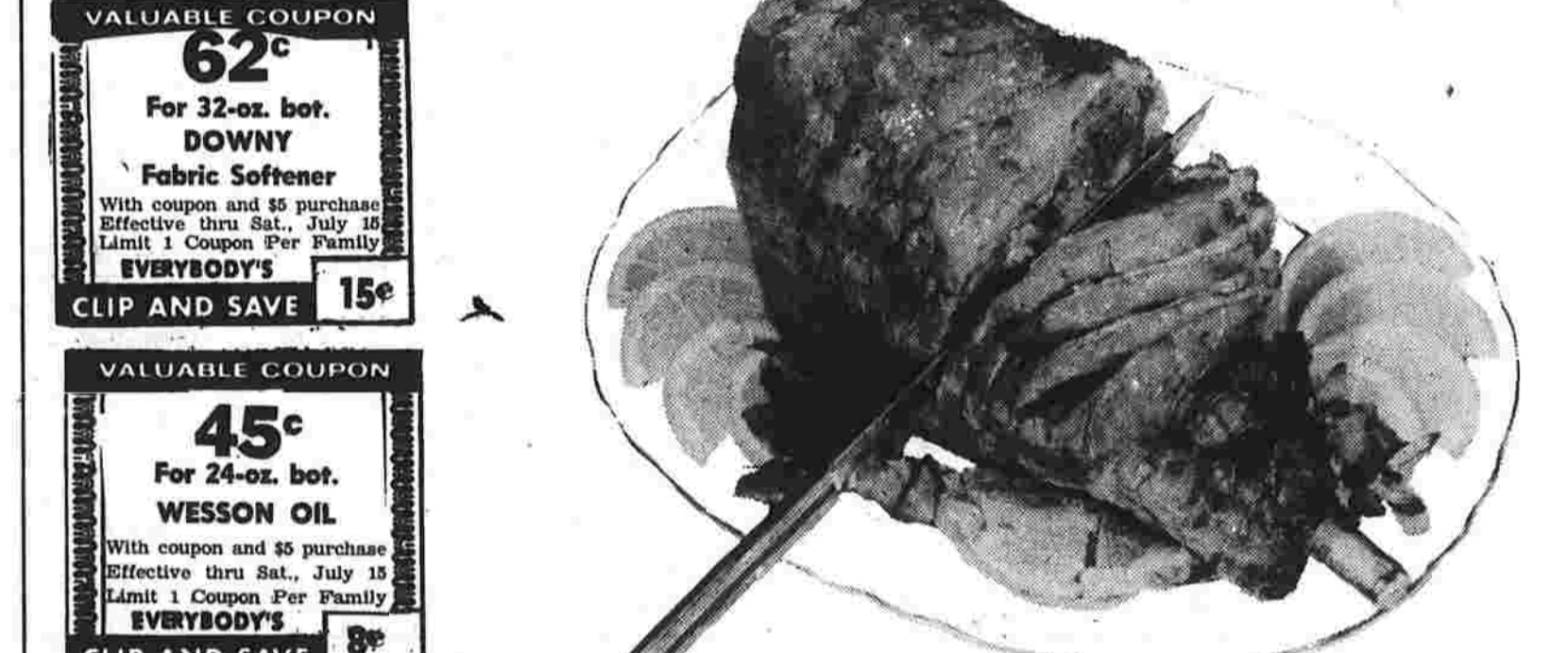

Social Security Q. & A.

Q. Someone told me that if I continue working after I'm 65 I don't have to file for Medicare. Is this true?

A. The chances are that your company's health insurance plan will only supplement Medicare coverage once you reach 65. Therefore, it is very important that you file for Medicare protection within the three-month period just before the month you reach 65.

Q. I work from 8 to 5 daily for a company that has a Social Security office to file a claim for Medicare? I will be 65 next month and I can't afford to take time off from work. What can I do?

A. You can telephone the Social Security office during your lunch hour and request to file your claim over the phone. You can write to us and we will mail you the necessary forms for completion.

Q. I have an old Medicare handbook, how can I obtain a new one?

A. The newest handbook is dated February 1972. You may write, phone or visit the East Hartford Social Security office, 607 Main St., 06108, and request a hand book and we will mail it to you.

Q. I have a question about Social Security and its retirement, disability or Medical Insurance benefits? Write to Questions & Answers, Social Security office, 607 Main St., East Hartford, 06108.

Social Security Benefits To Increase Automatically

Social Security beneficiaries need not apply for the 20 per cent benefit increase signed into law by President Nixon on July 1, according to Joseph Muciaro, manager of the East Hartford Social Security office. He said that all Social Security beneficiaries who are on the curative benefit rolls in September will receive the increase automatically in their Oct. 3 check.

Muciaro said the average monthly benefit for a retired worker will go up from \$124 to \$152; for a retired couple from \$224 to about \$271. A widowed mother with two children will receive an average Social Security benefit of about \$38, up from \$32.

For a disabled worker or with a wife and one or more children, the new average monthly payment will be about \$110. This amount will be adjusted automatically to keep pace with rising wages. This means that as earnings rise, workers whose earnings are at or above the level of the maximum earnings will pay contributions on higher earnings, but they also will have those additional earnings counted toward the benefits that will be payable to them and their families in the future.

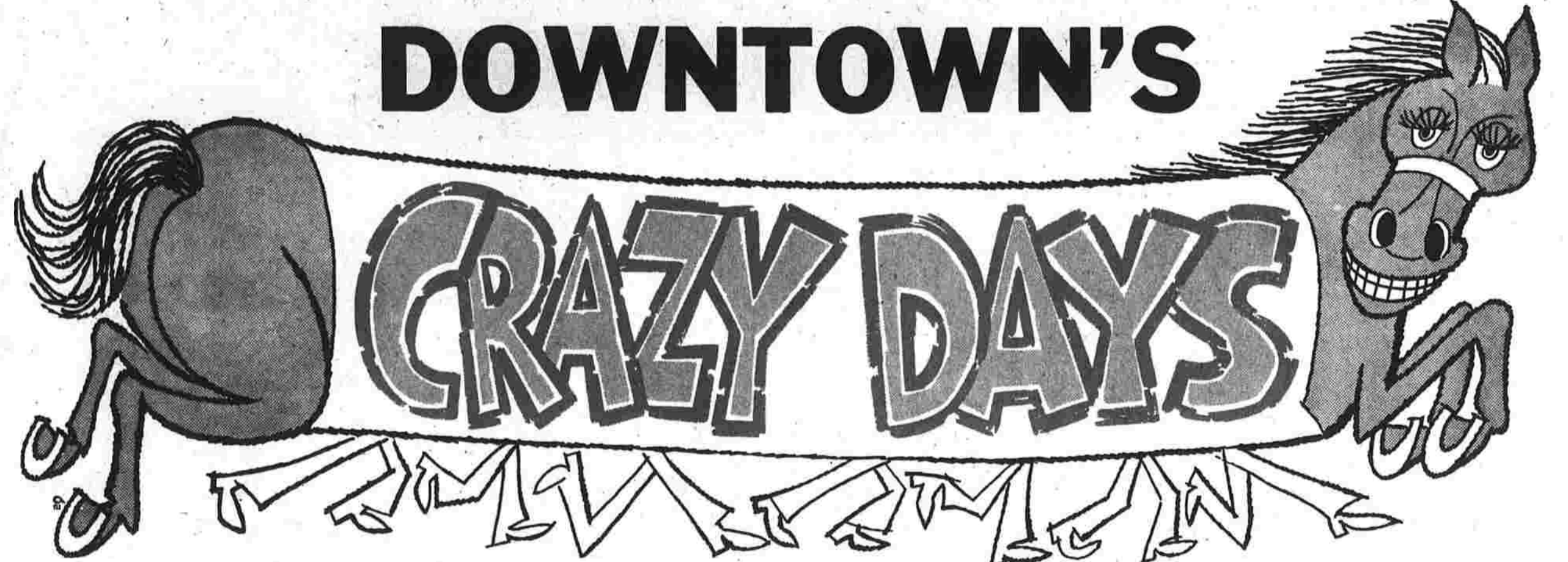

Austria Finds Rural Kids Unhealthy

VIENNA (AP) — Despite daily confrontation with air pollution and other health hazards, children of city dwellers are healthier than those from Austria's rural districts.

The legend of the healthy, red-cheeked country kids was contradicted by examinations conducted by the state-run Lower Austrian Health Insurance Co.

In 1970, 79 per cent of young women also are often too far from rural districts where they would be able to receive advice on child care and had to be sent to physical city youths.

Doctors offered an explanation for this, saying that the rural population has to do less hard work, and once the baby is born they are entitled to a maternity leave, something unheard of in a farmer's household.

Women in urban districts besides doing their chores around the farm house, the men are often too far away from medical centers and gynecology in the city.

The figures in Lower Austria Province were matched in other Austrian rural districts, conducted by the state-run Lower Austrian Health Insurance Co.

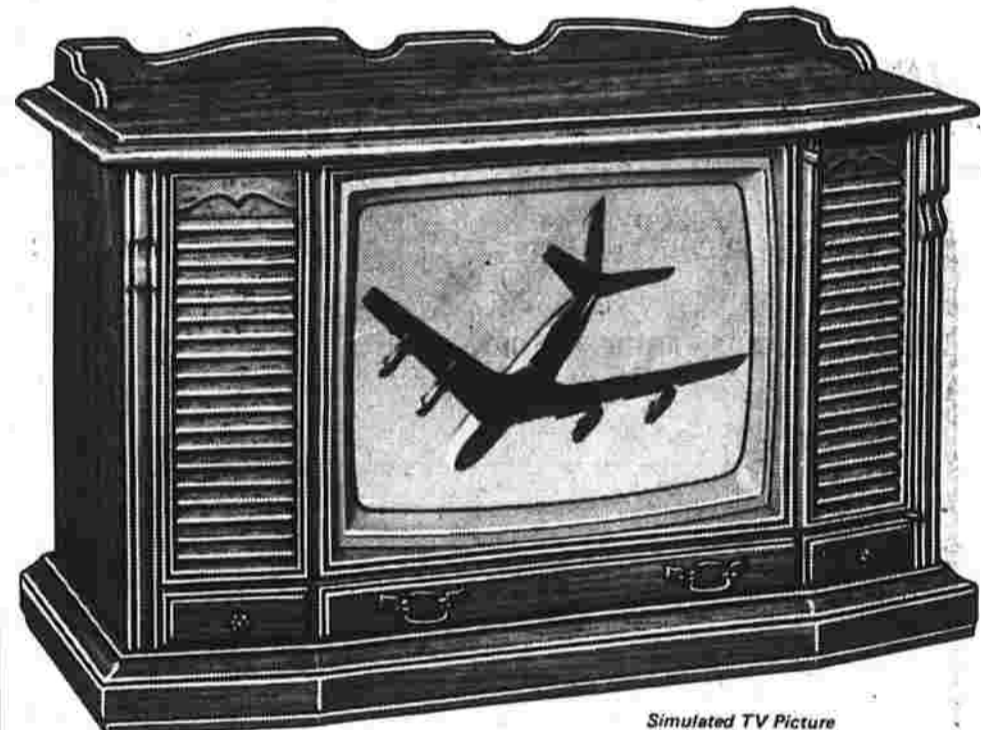

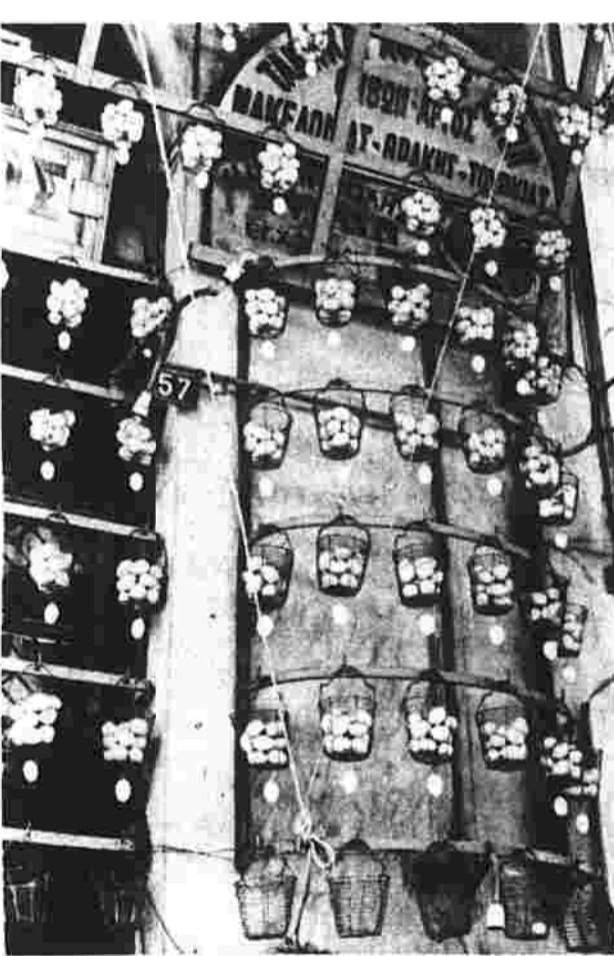

Alaskans Work for Their Right to Work



JOB TRAINING BEGINS with the basics for undereducated, underskilled Alaskan natives—with school.

JUNEAU—(NEA)—Tom Ambrose is an Athapascan Indian. He lives with his wife, Linda, and their two children in a one-room wood house in the wilderness of west-central Alaska, 200 miles east of Nome.

His neighbors are few and far apart. Besides his family there are only about 200 people in his little village scattered across the nation's largest state. Many more names will be added as members of a division mobile survey team extend their efforts to additional villages.

Work on the applicant bank began in the summer of 1969. The project is being funded by the Manpower Administration through its Smaller Communities Program, designed to improve employment opportunities in rural areas and small towns. Each of the natives already in the Alaska bank has been interviewed personally. The information gathered in the interviews in the remote villages is stored on computerized cards.

Ambrose's card, for example, shows that he has only a sixth-grade education, but possesses considerable potential in the type of work he seeks. It indicates his willingness to move elsewhere for either training or employment.

Most of them are alike in that the inhabitants must rely upon nature and not upon income from jobs as a basis for their existence.

No longer content with their subsistence existence, native families like the Ambroses find life becoming increasingly complex and frustrating.

Ambrose says all the talk about oil in Alaska has even gotten Linda thinking about such things as hot water and an oil heater. The Ambrose home is heated by a wood stove and water for cooking and bathing is melted from ice and brought to a boil in pans and kettles. Tom, who doesn't even have a dog team, would like a snowmobile and his wife talks longingly of washing machines like those she has heard people have in Nome.

So it is with most of the others now listed in the Applicant Characteristic Bank, as well as with the estimated 50,000 Alaska natives still to be reached by interviewers. Communication with most villages is limited to letter or radio; only 23 native settlements have telephone service linking them to other places.

Fewer than a dozen of the villages are on Alaska's limited road network. Access to others is only by air or, depending on the season, by boat, snowmobile or dog team.

Like the Ambroses, many of the natives have annual incomes of less than \$2,000, a figure that understates their poverty because basic commodities in Alaska cost about 25 per cent more than in the "lower 48." In many areas more people are unemployed or have seasonal jobs than have permanent employment, and more than half of the potential work force is jobless most of the year.

Wynschek Gets College Post

Donald Wynschek, formerly a teacher in the Manchester public school system, has been elected chairman of the faculty and chairman of the faculty senate of the University of New Haven.

"Back at the farm, we found that the cows had begun coming home for the second time that day, so we set to milking by hand — and then began cleaning out the trees from South Rd."

"The water in Bolton Lake — two feet deep. At first the upper dam had given way, then water drained from the first lake, over the top of the dam."

"This dam gave way, washing into the first lake, putting all the pressure onto Quarrville dam near (near Rt. 8)."

"In 1941 the dam was rebuilt with dirt under federal finance. 4A through the farm on its way to Rt. 8."

"The whole lake washed right down."

"Farmers got together and used the state and were awarded \$120,000 for all properties, with the bulk going to Andover. In 1942 the dam was rebuilt using metal pike and the dam has held since."

Better Mousetrap

"Build a better mousetrap," said Ralph Waldo Emerson, "and the world will beat a path to your door."

That the United States Patent Office is not so easily impressed. If your mousetrap is better merely because it is made of better materials, you probably could not get a patent. It must also work in a new and better way.

For example: A man came up with the idea of making towel holders out of plastic rather than metal. The plastic holders did have certain advantages. They were cheaper, for one thing. They were also more colorful.

But these advantages of plastic were already well known. Simply applying them to another product was held not original enough to qualify for a patent.

Even if the change of material means added convenience, that usually won't do. Another would-be inventor put together a map case of lightweight metal, making it easier to carry. But again, a court found no basis for a patent.

"(The lightweight map) proved beneficial," said the court, "but it is no invention. There must be original thought or inventive skill, not mere mechanical change of what was old."

On the other hand, a change of material might actually change the way the product functions. Take the matter of garter buttons. Originally made out of metal, garter buttons had two major drawbacks. If the clasp was tight, the stocking had a tendency to tear. If the clasp was loose, the stocking had a tendency to slip.

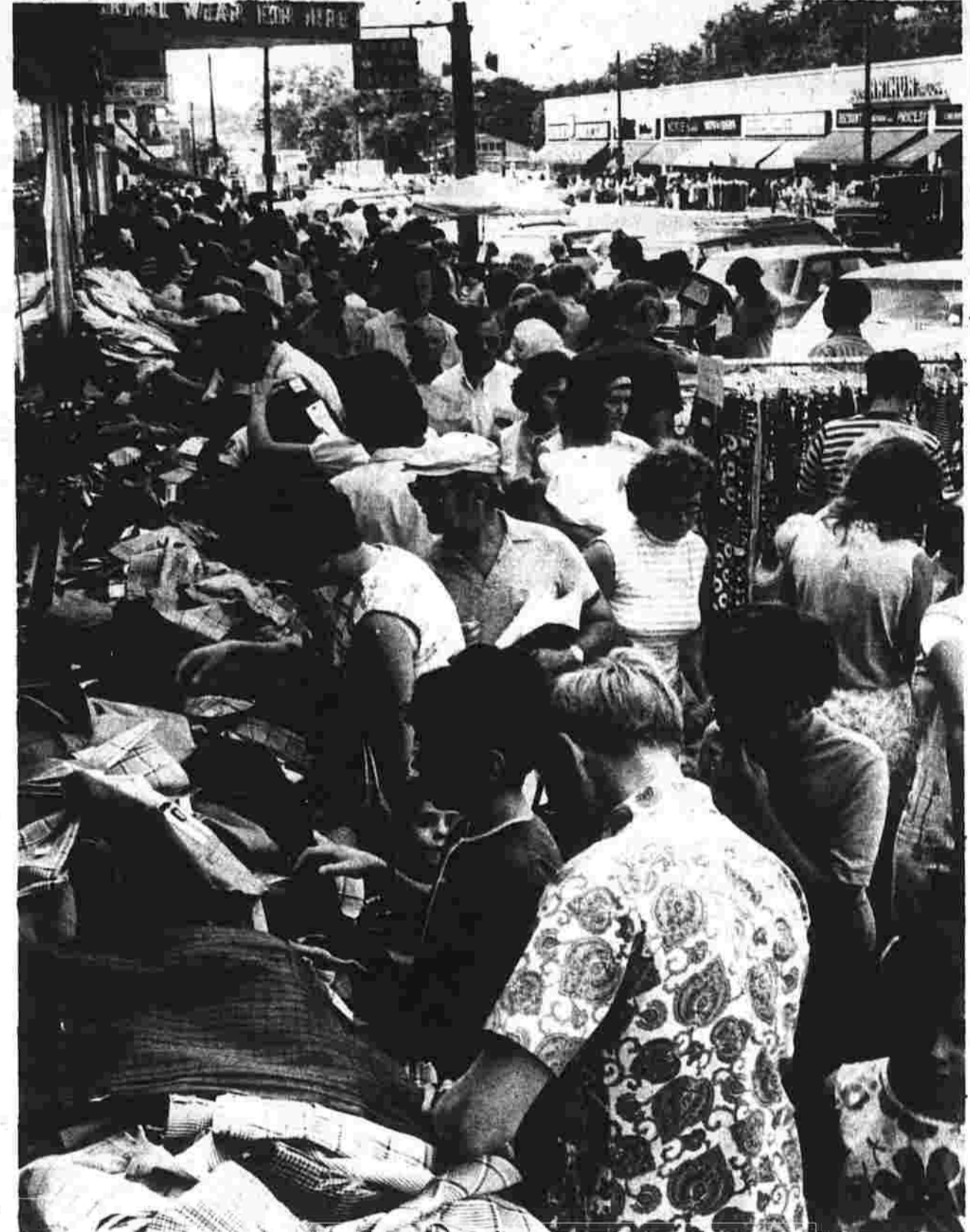
Someone finally hit upon the idea of making the button out of rubber. This solved both problems at once. Stockings neither tore nor slipped, because the rubber button gripped the fabric in a new and better way.

Did this change of material entitle the man to a patent? A court said yes.

"It is this capacity for accomplishing results," said the court, "which has always distinguished success from failure and the inventor from the mechanic."

Seaman's Collection Made Into Museum

ROCKLAND, Maine (AP) — CWO Kenneth Black began collecting Coast Guard memorabilia "for something to do" between rescue missions, search efforts and running the Rockland base he commanded since 1968.

In three years, the collection has become so extensive that it was designated last Jan. 3 the 1st Coast Guard District Maritime Museum. And Black was named its official curator.

"There are at least 400 items here now and we're getting more every day," says Black, who extended his 30 years service for another year to head the project.

The collection, spilling from three rooms at the Rockland base, includes bell buoys that still flash and honking fog horns that once warned mariners of fog-shrouded ledges.

"This is a living exhibit," he says. "Just about everything still works. I've given special permission to extend an extra still works, partly because of the exhibit."

"Now I plan to submit another request for a second one-year extension," he says. "Specifically, because of the exhibit and spend off duty hours cleaning and restoring the nearly ancient artifacts."

"Most of these items are priceless," says Black pointing to four sections of an intricately cut glass lens from some long forgotten lighthouse.

Another item is an eight-day oil lamp from the Cape Prince of Wales light at Wales, Alaska. "On that one, we used to say 'Eekimos to go out to the light once a week in winter and refill the oil reservoirs,'" Black explained.

Black has gotten many of his items from junk piles and dark corners of Coast Guard warehouses he has combed.

"Just listen to this," he says, slamming a hammer against an old multi-tier bellbuoy. "Would you believe someone was going to throw that away?"

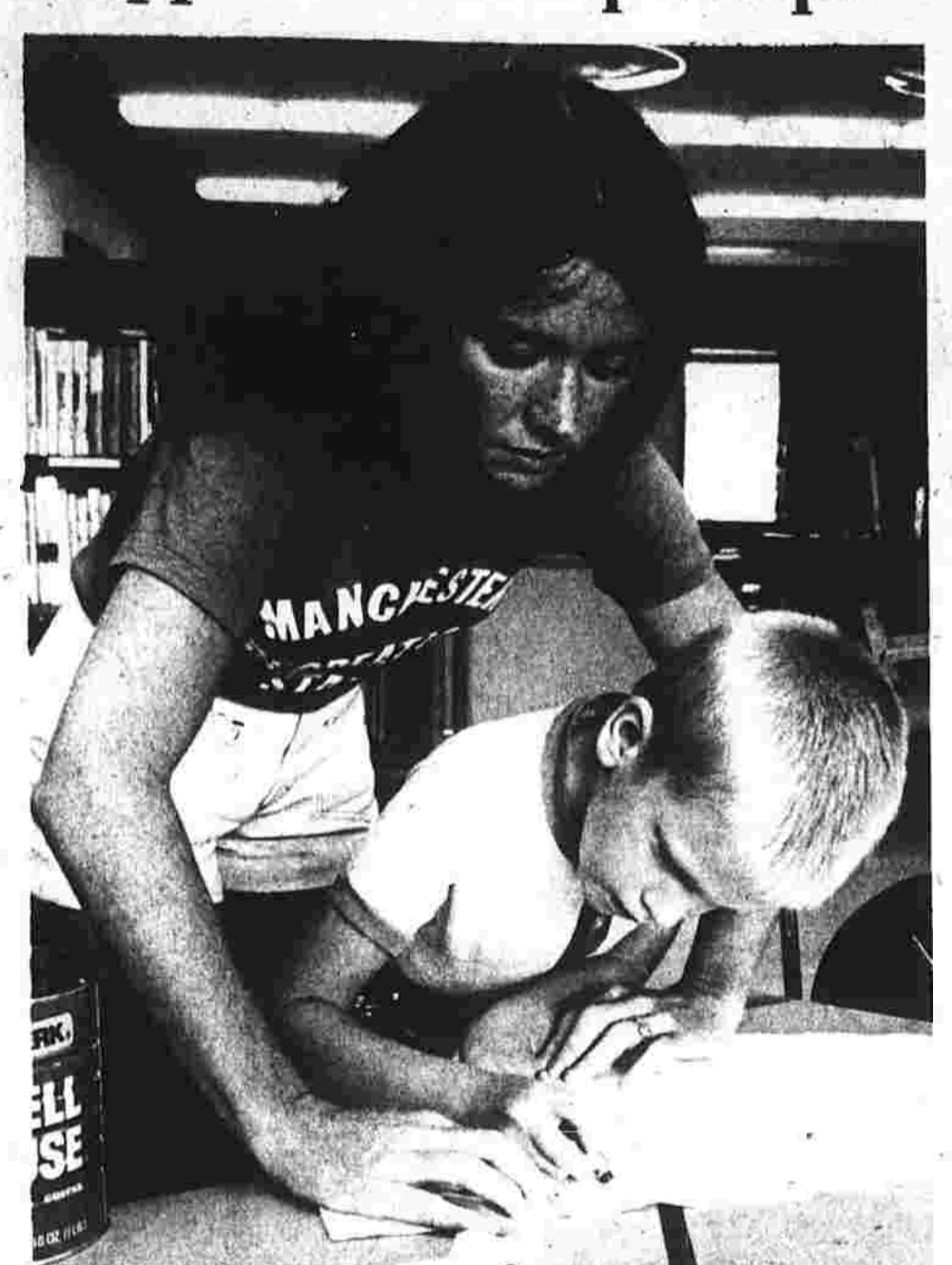
Black, 48, a native of Ridgefield Park, N.J., has been in the Coast Guard since Dec. 1, 1941, and is now beyond the 30-year mandatory retirement for commissioned warrant officers.

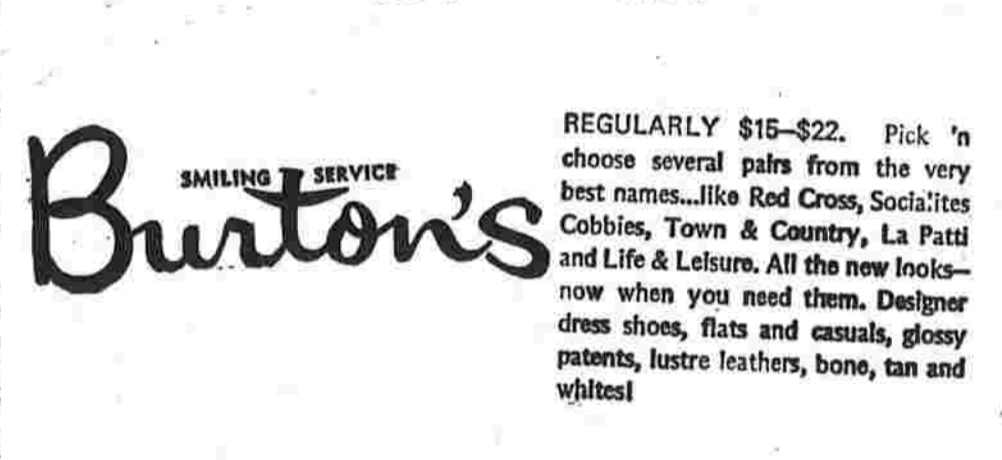

NEW YORK (AP) — Budd Schulberg is a writer who likes to keep busy, or, as he laconically puts it, "dig in and keep at it."

To prove the point, Schulberg, best known perhaps for his searing, first novel, "What Makes Sammy Run?", has just published one book, has another ready to come out this fall, and currently is working on a film script and the book for a stage musical. Then he plans to write two more novels.

"My writing routine doesn't vary much," Schulberg, a bearded 58-year-old, says. "I try to get up early and get at it. If I haven't started working by 9 a.m., I know I'm in trouble."

"I try to do most of my work in the morning, using the above room for answering letters and that sort of thing. But if I feel I haven't written enough by lunchtime, then I push myself on. Actually, when I get near the end of a work I write morning, noon and night—all of the above."

Schulberg says he began writing at eight, adding that "in some ways I've been writing ever since I can remember. When I was in high school I considered myself a full-fledged writer."

His career didn't really begin to move forward, however, until "I won a prize in a college short story contest and a publishing house offered me a contract to write a novel. But I didn't think I was ready for that yet so I began to write short stories for the commercial magazines and the time I was 24 I was earning my entire living from writing. I've never done anything else. I've been fortunate."
