





That would at least give all the newsmen and commentators something to speculate about in their approach to what was otherwise supposed to be a

te himself remembers what an unpleasant experience it was, in 1956, to have President Dwight D. Eisenhower perhaps doing a little more than pretend he wasn't too sure he wanted his Vice President, who sometimes hit the campaign low road, to run with him again, has chosen to be kind to Spiro Agnew. It is no fun to be a Vice President and see the head of the ticket playing public games with your name - even though he may have assured you, in private, that it is just to stimulate a little interest in the party's convention.

The only supposed handicap he wears is one which has been pinned on him by people who accuse him of unfair and exreme judgments but who base their own accusations more on what they feel about him than upon what he actually It has been Vice President Agnew's

intention to get under the skin of those who assume that the liberal cause is always perfect and incapable of irrational excess. He has intended to question the objectivity of some distinguished members of the press. He deliberately scorns the idea that there is some special Eastern intellectual establishment which has some sort of divine right to rule this

The way such elements have responded to him, with rigid classification of him and personal abuse of him, does not alter the fact that he has sometimes been even more right than he himself realiz-

It has been more and more clearly established, for instance, that the real guilt for the war in Vietnam belongs to Eastern establishment academic intellectuals who insolently theorized this nation into a war which not even political Agnews or John Wayne type generals could win, and who, the intellectuals, ought to be made effete if they already are not.

Whenever Vice President Agnew has devoted his affectionate attention to the act that some headliners in the press and the field of comment are guilty of letting their heart show not only on their sleeve, but in their handling and analysis of the news, the fact that the hackles of all the media rise in some unison does not mean that members of the media do not notice and recognize, among themselves, the degree of truth in some
