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From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

I am often asked how I began writing. Miss Emily Smith of 28 E. Middle Tpke. is responsible. Beginning in my late teens and for many years thereafter, I was an assistant leader of Troop One, Senior Girl Scouts, which is an international troop. Emily and I worked then at Hamilton Standard Propeller in the Spare Parts, Sales Dept. Emily was a section supervisor and I was secretary to the department head.

One day at work, Emily asked me if I would be a guest speaker for her troop. At that time, I was on the Hartford Council for "Glimmer Magazine." The girls were interested in clothing, proper makeup and manners. I wasn't too much older than the Scouts and my father thought it rather humorous. Despite some apprehensions on my own part, it all went off rather well and the next thing I found myself an assistant leader.

Emily had a way of getting the most out of everyone. It was extremely difficult to say "no" to her as well. I next found myself in a position of slight disapproval of my appointment as public relations chairman for the troop. At that time, the very first group of girls was planning and earning their own money to go away.

When I had to write my first news story, I went to my usual source of information, the Manchester Library. I took home several books on journalism, got some advice from Jerry Szepien who then was city editor of The Herald and submitted my first article.

About a year later, Mrs. Betty Jones, who was head of the Manchester Girl Scouts, asked me to help get Camp Merrimack going. I wrote a series of articles on the camp and am happy to say that enrollment increased that year.

Little did I know then that I would marry a newspaper man and eventually write obituaries, weddings, feature stories, etc. As a result of that early Girl Scout project, many things have happened. I find myself experimenting constantly with food so I can have something different for you once in a while. The study of food involves history and has added immeasurably to my travels.

I have mentioned my cookbook collection and have, just recently, decided to include old cookbooks. If you have any old ones in the cellar or attic, I'd be happy to look at them with an eye to purchase.

The few I now own have been secured through second-hand stores antique shops and book stores. Some of the books published in the 1800's probably shouldn't be called "books." They are more pamphlets or published for advertising purposes.

Manufacturers of Cottoleone, a cooking fat made of beef suet and cotton seed oil, published a little book entitled "Home Helps" in 1889. It was edited by the principal of the Philadelphia Cooking School, Mrs. Sarah Tyson Rorer. Like many other books of its day, recipes are credited to ladies using only their last names such as "Miss Parson" or "Mrs. Lincoln." The book was published by the Barnstable Village Improvement Society from which I deduce it may have been a fund-raiser. The recipes are printed in black with one-third of each page printed in columnar form in red. Here are a couple of the household helps.

Do not be guilty of such extreme unskillfulness as leaving chopped onion in two tablespoons of butter three minutes; add two tablespoons of flour and stir till smooth, add two cups of boiling water and cook till thick. Add one cup of shredded codfish, half a teaspoon of made mustard, and a little white pepper, one egg and cook for a minute, stirring constantly.

"I became involved in drug traffic. Eventually, my best friends persuaded me to try narcotics. I began smoking marijuana, sniffing cocaine, and using other drugs, and later became an addict. I was in the Far East and smuggling them into Europe and North America."

"While in jail in Beirut, he met Omar, a young Brazilian. Erbe released them from jail. 'We smuggled the first LSD into Brazil in 1968,' he said. 'In Brazil we met Antonio, the son of a well-known Baptist minister, who we later discovered was a dealer in drugs. 'He would walk around carrying the Bible in one hand and selling drugs with the other,' the Rev. Mr. Holohan said.

"He finally was arrested, and after much resistance in an attempt to get us to confess, he said.

"We were tortured, hung by ropes, beaten and subjected to an electric shock machine in an attempt to get us to confess, he said.

Egleton At Custer

To go straight to what we think is perhaps the only really questionable aspect of the matter, the fact that Senator Thomas Egleton has undergone psychiatric treatment on three occasions is in itself less significant than the fact that the senatorial pool and pleasant man makes his painful disclosure after instead of before his acceptance of the nomination for Vice President.

The harsh, but fair, verdict has to say that he owed it to the man who was asking him, and to the party which was nominating him, to let them decide, before their commitment to him had become public, whether his own medical history made any difference to them.

This failure to be totally candid with Senator McGovern is what Senator Egleton has to be forgiven, and it, rather than any symptoms which might once have been considered in need of hospitalization, poses the question mark beside his candidacy.

Neither Senator McGovern nor the Democratic Party, both of whom have troubles enough, are under any particular obligation to help Senator Egleton solve his own particular life problems. He, on the other hand, might well have taken more seriously the nature of the burden he was risking imposing on them.

That much having been said, in the way of regret and judgment, there is something to be advanced in defense of Senator Egleton and in hope for the attitude of the American public toward him in his situation. His kind of trouble is no longer as strange and frightening as it once was; it is almost a byword in the climate of the day.

His situation and experience known, Senator Egleton will receive some of the sympathy which once evolved—over the people who never vote for a cripple for President— for the more directly physical handicap of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Professional Republican campaigners, even if they experience secret anticipation of gains from the disclosure, seem likely to be intelligent enough to refrain from making that use of it which might turn the public from uneasiness toward sympathy. And Connecticut's Senator Lowell Welcker, in another demonstration of how large and decent in spirit he can be, has reached across party lines to be kind and helpful to a troubled Senate colleague.

The odds are, then, that this country may give Senator Egleton his fair chance to prove that he has solved his own problems.

The odds that the country, and even the world of politics, may be decent about it do not necessarily translate themselves into odds about the election. It is difficult to imagine how Senator Egleton's pained stand at Custer, South Dakota, on Tuesday, could add to the confidence or fortune of what had already been traced a long shot campaign. To those Democrats who are in a pessimistic mood anyway, it must have seemed like the last blow. For anybody trying to watch and judge the course of the 1972 election, it adds to the indescribable that somehow will be resolved, by the people themselves, inside themselves, without any advance notice to the pundits.

Rememberable

Years from now, in moments when we feel like a little nostalgic, we are all going to be very grateful for the summer of 1972.

"Your Help Is Needed" Dear Reader, your help is needed. In 1962, five men of the Supreme Court decided that they would bring an end to voluntary school prayers. This decision was contrary to the First Amendment and our Founding Fathers, who established our nation "In the name of God."

Voluntary school prayers are desired by over 82% of the American people based on polls by Gallup, Harris, ABC-TV and Opinion Research of Princeton. Four states are presently petitioning Congress to call a Constitutional Convention to consider the re-establishment of voluntary prayers in schools.

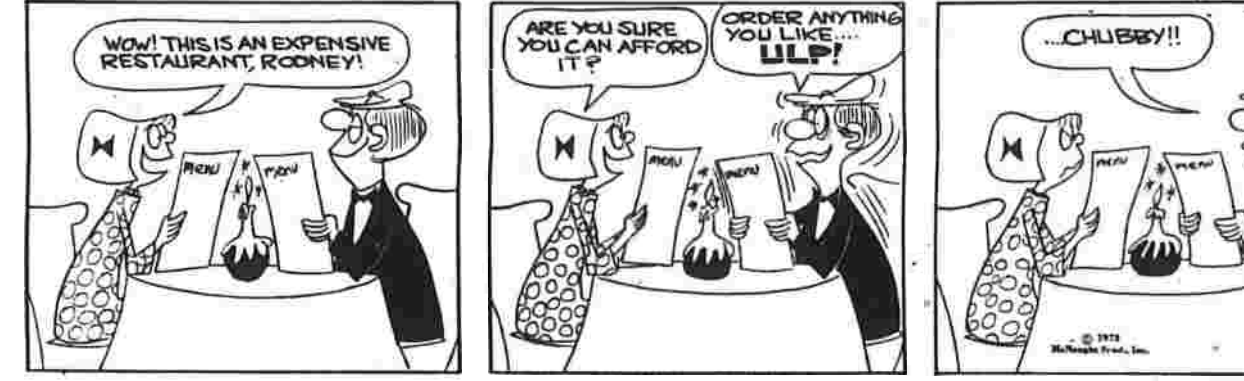

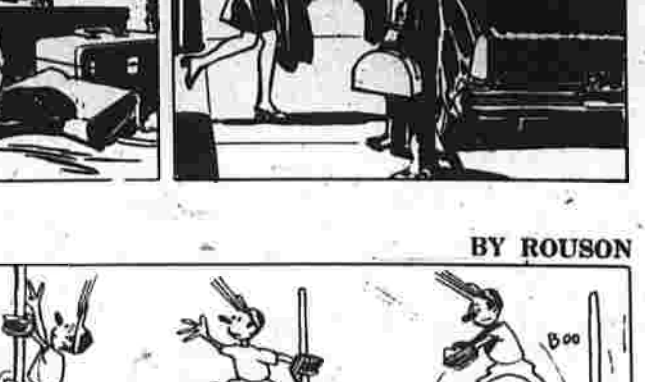
