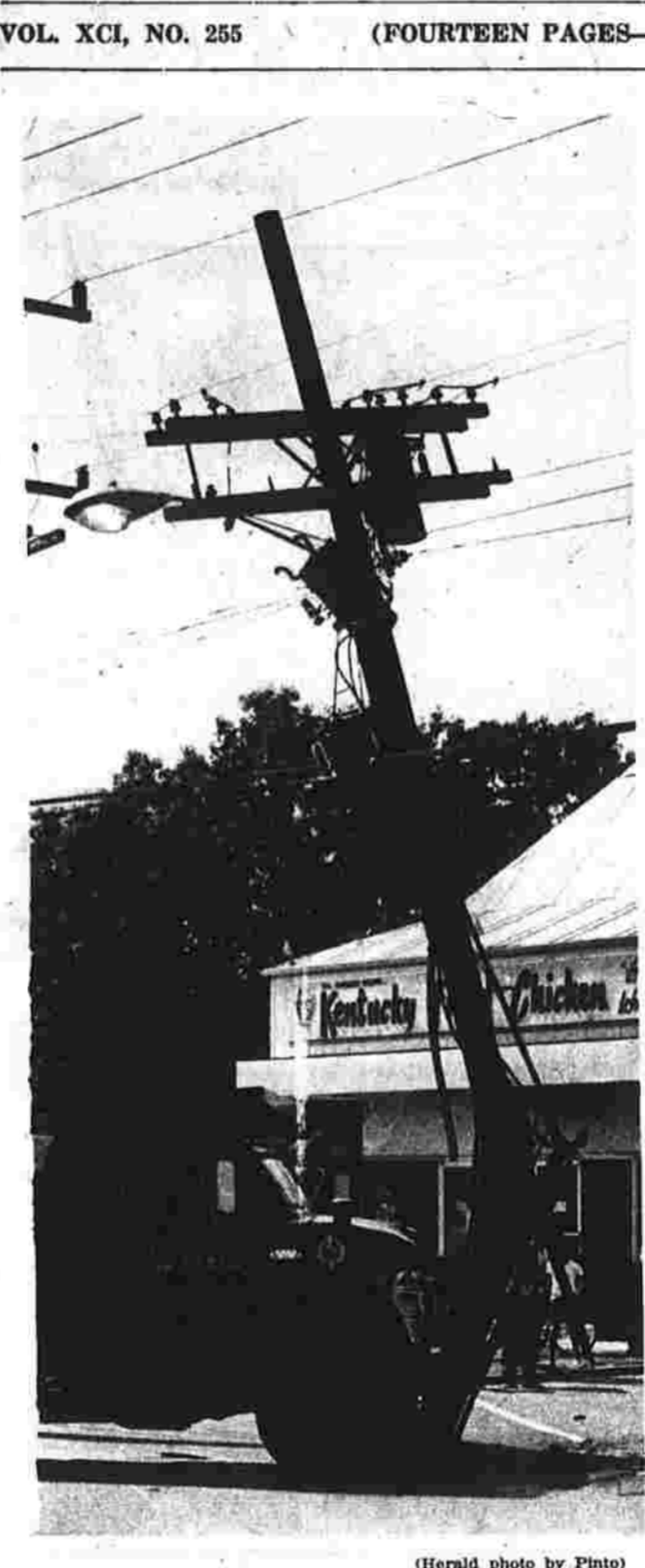

U.S. Says Dike Damage Is Minor

WASHINGTON (AP) — A U.S. intelligence report says bombs have hit 12 places in North Vietnam's widespread dike network, "but the damage is minor."
The State Department released the eight-page intelligence report Friday in follow-up to President Nixon's denial of Hanoi's charges that the United States is deliberately trying to knock out the vital water control system in the Red River.
"The damage can be easily repaired—in a matter of a few days—and has not been sufficient to cause any flooding."
"No damage has been observed in the area of the dike system against the primary dike system protecting that city."
State Department officials said the U.S. intelligence operations and pictures were shown to United Nations Secretary General Waldheim Monday by Ambassador George Bush when the U.S. envoy sought to refute Hanoi's criticism of the U.S. air attacks on North Vietnam.

Bomb Misplaced, Reds Attack Hue

SAIGON (AP)—Forty-nine soldiers in a South Vietnamese infantry company were either killed or wounded in a heavy North Vietnamese attack on a military U.S. bombing that hit the government lines instead of the enemy near Hue, the allied commands announced today.
The U.S. command said two Navy A4 jets accidentally dropping 500-pound bombs into the South Vietnamese position Friday, killing eight government troops and wounding 49.
The Saigon command said another South Vietnamese soldier was killed and 12 were wounded when the company was hit with 1,600 North Vietnamese mortar rounds and attacked on the ground.
Eight North Vietnamese soldiers were killed, the Saigon command said.

Nixon Appeals to War Critics

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon is trying to choke off the momentum gathering behind the war proposals in Congress by asserting that passage would jeopardize his ability to carry out U.S. foreign policy.
There was no immediate indication that Nixon's appeal, carried in letters to congressional leaders, had caused any wavering among antiwar senators or congressmen.
In his letter, Nixon said various amendments "threaten to cut off the flow of money to the war effort and to divert it to other purposes."

Perkins received a verbal warning for improper turning.

Rate Hikes Granted To HELCO and CL&P

HARTFORD (AP)—In a decision allowing the state's two largest electric utilities permanent rate increases, the Public Utilities Commission sharply criticized environmental groups that opposed the rate hikes and growth policies of the two companies.
The PUC said Friday in its decision that electric utilities' demands can be met if "some environmental groups will stop their harassment and delay tactics which so often seem designed to delay needed facilities and create a breakdown in our essential service. They have succeeded in New York and elsewhere."
The PUC ruling allowed the Connecticut state comptroller, the Hartford Electric Light Co. increase of about six per cent in their rates. Their customers won't notice much of a change in their bills because most of these increases had already been granted on a temporary basis last April.
The majority ruling also said, "We believe the answer lies in the repeal of the industrial revolution."
The Connecticut Citizens Action Group, one of the groups opposing the increases, issued a reply to the PUC comments.
Martin Rogal, attorney for the OCAO during the hearings, charged that the PUC decision "reflects the attitude of political allies of the utilities management and public servants."

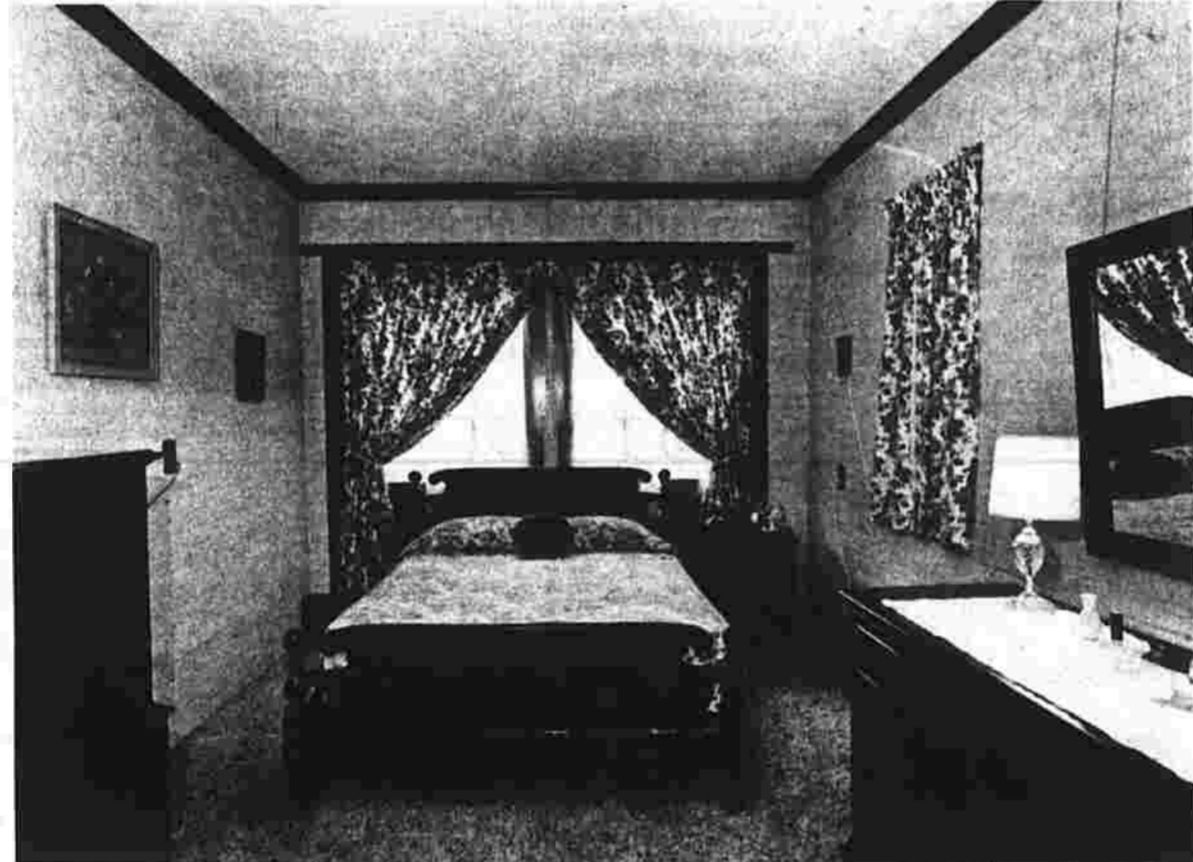

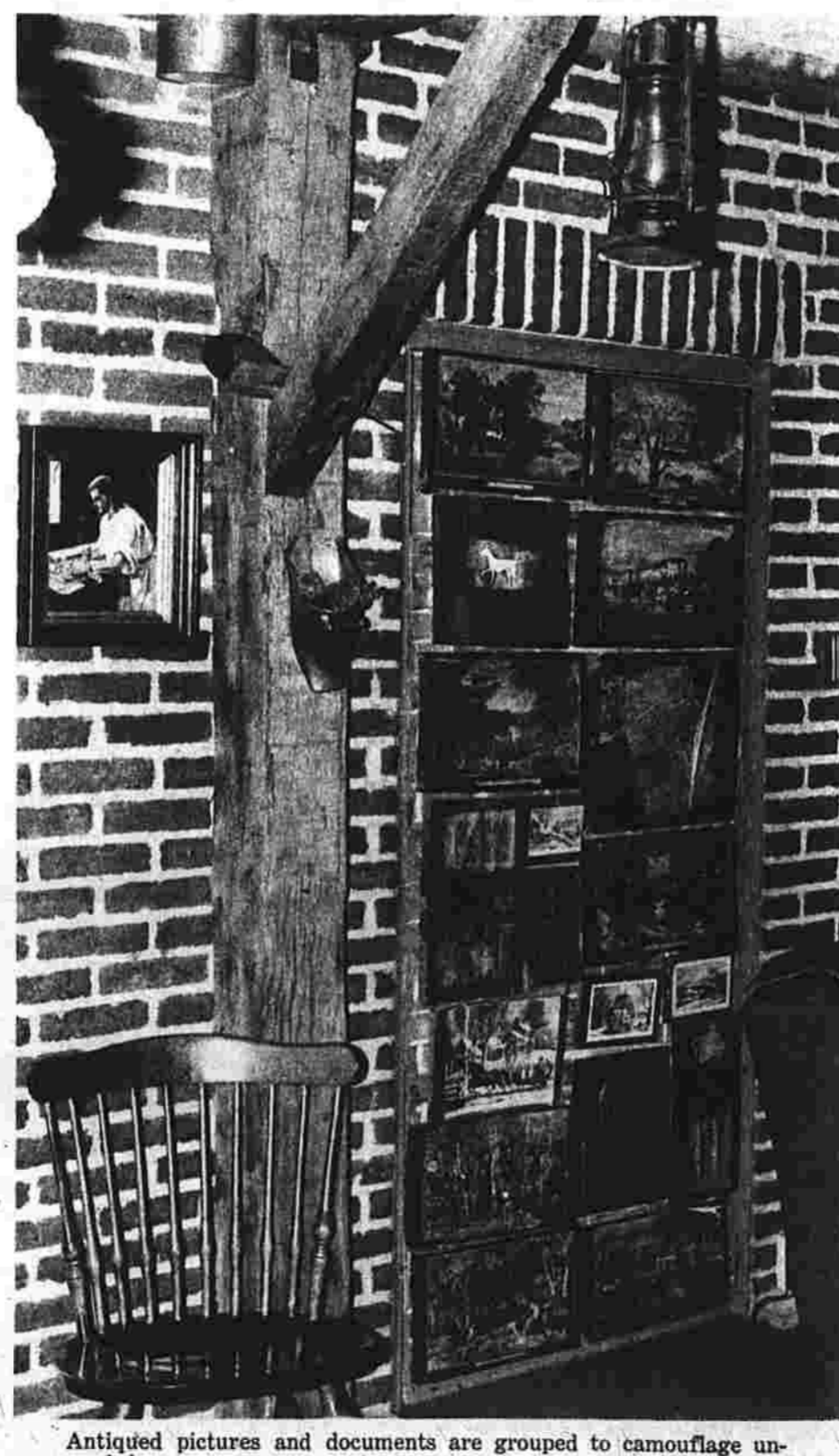

U.S. Says Damage To Dikes Is Minor

(Continued from Page One) The north began in April, the U.S. Intelligence study said. —The pictures showed bomb craters at only a dozen locations, all close to specific military targets. —The 12 damaged areas were clustered in four areas southeast of Hanoi, which is downstream from the North Vietnamese capital. Damage downstream would be less serious than upstream of Hanoi. —"There are no signs of destruction of vital dike portions stretching to a length of several kilometers—as reported by Hanoi-based newsmen." The craters are small, and no flooding or leakage has resulted. —"An occasional bomb falling on a dike" does not add significantly to the task of repairs performed as a normal annual procedure. —The craters can be easily repaired with crews of fewer than 50 men with wheelbarrows, within a day. Repairs to all of the dikes could be completed within a week. —The intelligence study suggested, as U.S. officials have previously, that North Vietnam could suffer flooding during the peak rainy season weeks ahead. Last year massive floods covered some 1.1 million acres of the northern part of the country. —However, the study contended that weather and failure of North Vietnam to fully repair its dikes from last year's flooding would be the cause of any undue flooding this summer, not U.S. bombing.

Stevenson Challenged For Registrar Post

For the first time in almost 40 years, a contest has developed for the post of Manchester Democratic registrar of voters. Walter R. Sinon of 260 Hollister St. has sent letters to each member of the Democratic Town Committee, announcing he is a candidate for the nomination and asking for their support. The incumbent Democratic registrar is Herbert J. Stevenson of 46 Kennedy Rd., who announced on Thursday he is a candidate for re-election to the post he has held since April 26, 1971. Stevenson had been deputy registrar to the late Edward F. Moriarty. When Mr. Moriarty died April 25, 1971, at the age of 81 and after 38 continuous years in the post, Stevenson automatically became registrar, as provided by state statutes. The Democratic Town Committee will meet Aug. 18 to endorse its candidates for local office. This year, for the first time in Manchester history, the town's registrars by virtue of a town ordinance adopted June 13, will be elected to four-year terms. The terms are for two years at present. Sinon, a long-time member of the Democratic Town Committee, as is Stevenson, states in his letter he is running "to fill the position left vacant by the passing of Ed Moriarty," and that "since his death, there has not been an official elected to this post." Sinon, assistant chairman in Voting District 2, was campaign manager for Atty. Dominic Squatrito, when he ran for state senator in 1970; and for Town Treasurer Roger Negro in 1971. A native of Albany, Vt., he has resided in Connecticut for 38 years and in Manchester for 22. He is married to the former Lucille Hogan. The couple has three married children, two daughters and a son, and five grandchildren. He has been a salesman for Hartley & Parker Ltd. of Stratford for the past 31 years. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus, Lodge of Elks, British American Club and Irish American Club.

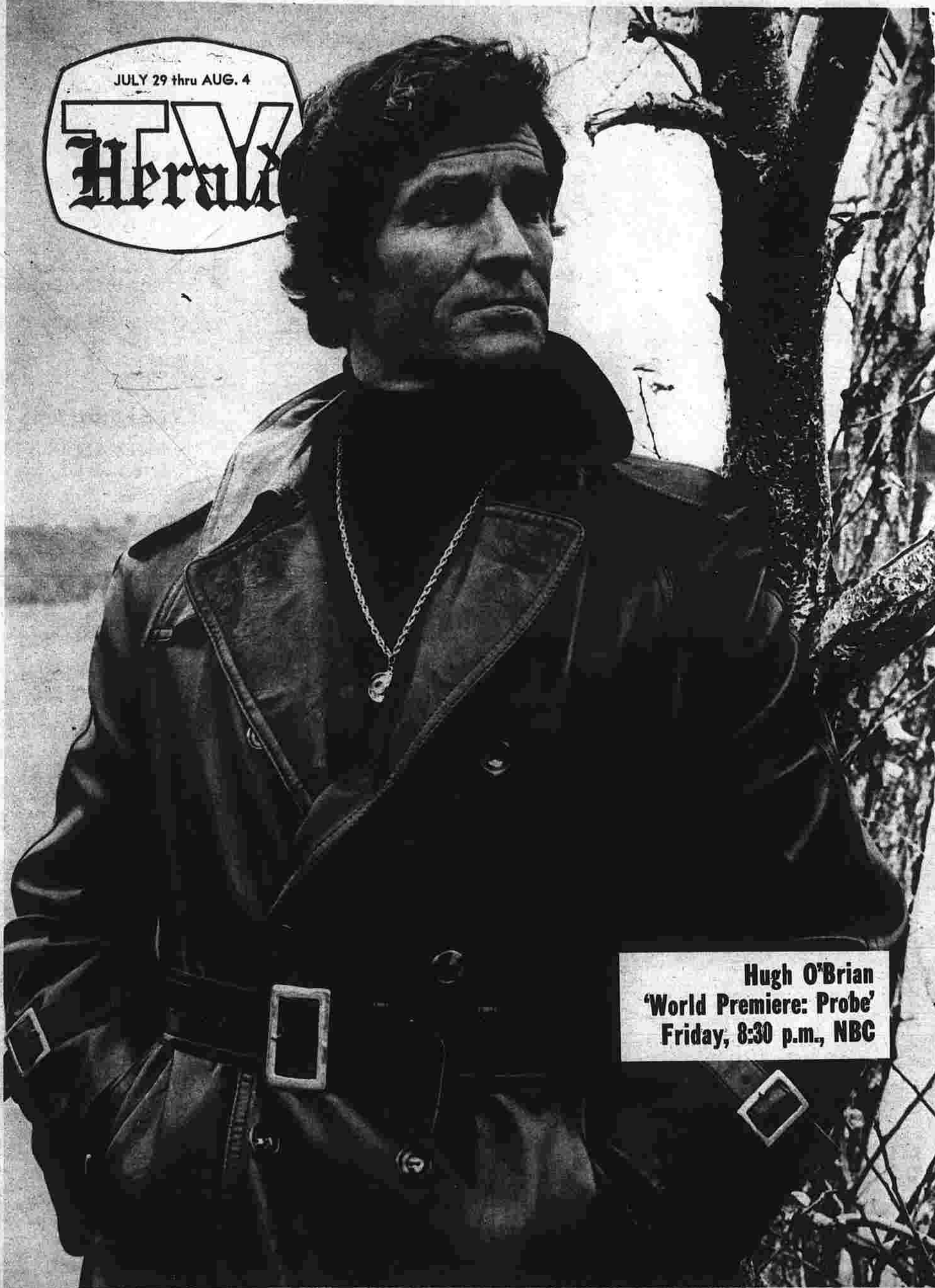
