Sheinwold on Bridge
AVOID SAFETY PLAY IF BETTY TERRELL'S BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD
Confession is said to be good for the soul, and today's hand will probably improve mine. I have often written about safety plays, but have very seldom pointed out the danger of making a safety play at the wrong time. So maybe I am partly responsible for the mistake that Windmiers Sobiecki made during the match between Poland and China in the recent World Bridge Olympiad.
Neither side vulnerable
Opening lead - Seven of Diamonds
First let's see how M. F. Tai, of the Chinese team, played the hand of the selfsame contract of six spades. Tai won the first trick in dummy with the ten of diamonds and led out the ace and king of spades.
When the trump broke normally, Tai showed his hand and claimed the slam. This was a sound decision, of course, that he was going to take the top club and then ruff his remaining clubs with dummy's two remaining trumps.
Sobiecki got to the same contract at the other table of the match and received the same opening lead. When the ten of diamonds won the first trick, Sobiecki thought this might be a good time to take out insurance against a bad trump break.
The Polish expert cashed the ace of spades, noting the fall of the nine, and then led the six of spades from his hand. This play would be necessary if East had started with Q-7-4 of spades. In that case East would capture the ten of spades with the jack, but declarer would later lead a spade from dummy to finesse with the eight of spades.
You can see what happened, of course. West won the second trump trick with the jack of spades and immediately led a second diamond. East ruffed.

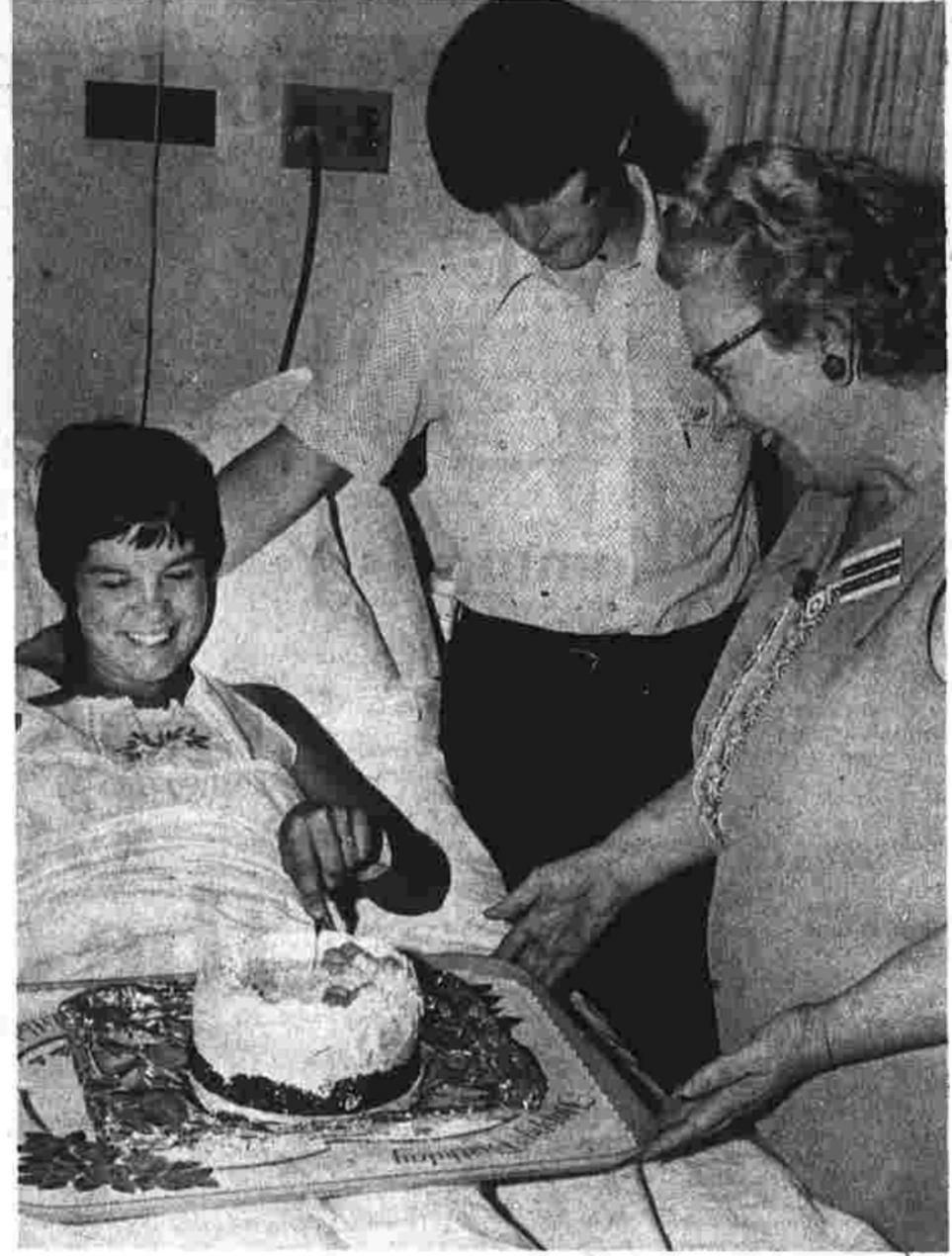

Two Cases Of Whooping Cough Noted in July
Director of Health Dr. Nicholas A. Marlatto reports there were only two cases of communicable disease in Manchester last month - both whooping cough. In June there were 31 cases, comprising several diseases and a year ago in July there were 12.
The health department last month inspected 2 restaurants and 2 septic tanks, investigated 10 complaints and issued permits for 3 septic tanks.

Chief Reports 27 Fire Calls Last Month
Fire Chief John C. Rivosa reports that the Town of Manchester Fire Department was called to 27 fires last month, answered 17 rescue and emergency calls, and participated in 18 miscellaneous occupations. Of the 27 fires, Rivosa reports, 6 were out before the fire trucks arrived, 1 was controlled by a sprinkler system, and 20 were put out by firemen.
The 27 fire alarms involved 5 residential, 2 mercantile, 5 manufacturing, 4 church, 10 vehicular and equipment, and 3 miscellaneous fires. No injuries were reported.
In June, the department was called out to 23 fires, and in July of last year, to 32.

Computer Expansion Links Police to FBI

A computer terminal linking the Manchester Police Department with the state's Motor Vehicle Department records will be expanded to make available all types of criminal information, according to Manchester Police Sgt. Richard Sartor.
The computer terminal now provides instantaneous information on driver's licenses, registrations, and stolen cars. Manchester is participating in a pilot program funded by state and federal grants; the Manchester terminal also served Vernon, Coventry, Glastonbury, and South Windsor.
Expansion of the system, announced today by Gov. Thomas Meskell, will provide links to the FBI's National Crime Information Center. The governor, making the announcement at State Police headquarters at Hartford, said the system will serve 75 local police departments throughout the state, as well as the State Police.
The pilot program, which has served Manchester since the start of the year, involved 22 other cities in northern Italy.

Boggini Questions Impact of 365 More Apartments

State Rep. N. Charles Boggini of the 20th Assembly District says that he will seek answers from town officials relative to the impact on the town of the proposed 365-unit Square Village apartment complex on Spencer St.

The following are the questions that he proposes to submit and for which, he claims, answers have not previously appeared in print:

How will the project affect space at Verplanck and Kenney St. Schools?

Will it be necessary to build new schools?

If so, who will pay for the schools?

Will the project provide housing for Manchester people who are eligible for subsidized housing?

Boggini said that these are the inquiries that his constituents have put to him.

On July 24, the Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission approved revisions in the Stage II plans for the east section and approved Stage II plans for the east section.

The development, on 33 acres off Spencer St., is being planned by the Capitol Region Development Corp., the land acquisition arm of the Greater Hartford Housing Development Fund.

In a letter to Boggini, William Hirsch, executive director of the housing corporation, said that present forecasts are for 90 one-bedroom units, renting monthly for \$143; 200 two-bedroom units, renting monthly for \$163; and 75 three-bedroom units, renting monthly for \$183.

These rents, Hirsch further stated, will be available to a person or family whose income at admission time, does not exceed the following schedule: One-person family, \$8,075; two-person family, \$8,685; three-person family, \$8,100; five-person family, \$9,640; six-person family, \$9,945.

Any family whose income was above these levels, Hirsch said, would be required to pay a higher rent, approximately \$70 per month more. Also, he said, 20 per cent of the units may be

rented to lower income families at rents equivalent to 25 per cent of their income. He added that it is the corporation's present intention to try to preserve the bulk of the rent supplement for elderly families.

Hirsch said that a rental office will be located on the Spencer St. site next summer as the project nears completion. Applications at that time will be open to any person or family on a first come, first served basis, subject to the applicant's qualifications.

Better Use of Electricity Could Reduce Energy Usage

By JOHN CUNIFFE

NEW YORK (AP)—Simple other considerations. Under the modern "10-cycle ceiling" efficiencies in the use of electricity, mainly in lighting, could significantly reduce energy use, thus increasing costs and lessening power shortages that exist in some regions and threaten elsewhere.

This is the considered judgment of many electrical engineers, who also claim that not only energy but many millions of dollars could be saved in operating costs.

At the recent annual meeting of the Illuminating Engineering Society, newly elected president Richard Dorsey of General Electric stated that 60 per cent of lighting systems produce only half as much light as possible for the energy consumed.

Other engineers claim that even those systems that deliver light efficiently still waste energy by generating so much heat that air conditioning systems are forced to overwork.

The possible savings in energy and money have yet to be worked out, but it is estimated that the buildings account for 20 per cent of energy consumption and 10 per cent of that is for lighting.

George Clark, IES senior vice president and engineering manager for special projects of Sylvania Electric, estimates that better usage in these structures could reduce their energy consumption by 10 to 20 per cent.

The critical nature of such savings is made clear in the perspective of rising energy costs and increasing power shortages—even blackouts of increasing frequency and also in some regions of the country.

The possible efficiencies about which Dorsey and Clark speak are possible not only through correction of wasteful practices of the past but through the use of relatively new or advanced in producing more lumens from the same wattage.

An incandescent lamp, most widely recognized of all, produces only 10 lumens—a measure of light quantity—per watt. But more recently developed lamps produce 10 times as many lumens without color distortion.

In fact, where light coloration is not a critical factor, such as in park areas and highways, the production of lumens may be as much as 120 or 130 to the watt, Clark said. And more improvements are anticipated.

Other efficiencies are possible, he said, through more frequent cleaning of lenses and a regular program of lamp replacement. Many lamps remain in use beyond their effective life, producing less light but using no less energy.

Additional savings in money and energy are possible through the utilization of shades of the heat from lights and through the use of available systems for drawing off that heat in summer, he said.

Few buildings are so equipped today, but Clark and others believe that as energy costs develop—as builders realize that riding energy costs and availability is critical—waste will decrease.

In the past, they note, energy efficiency often was traded off for the sake of appearance, lower installation charges and

Legalizing Pot Out for Canada

OTTAWA (AP)—Canada's Health Minister says the government won't legalize possession of marijuana and hashish for personal use but it is taking steps to reduce the penalties.

There is "no intention to legalize possession of cannabis (marijuana) or hashish in any form," Health Minister John Munro said in a statement Monday.

Munro said the government is attempting to separate marijuana cases from cases involving hard drugs such as heroin.

The government has instructed prosecutors to urge the courts to give "absolute conditional discharges" to persons found guilty of possessing soft drugs if they are not charged with other offenses and has no criminal record, the statement says.

Laws that took effect July 15 allow judges to grant such discharges and thus spare the offender a criminal record.

Munro added that the government "wants to remove all offenses and controls relating to marijuana from the Narcotics Act and place them in the Drug Act or other legislation with less severe penalties."

Munro's statement in effect rejected the recommendation in the report of the government's Law Commission that marijuana be legalized. The commission, headed by Dean Goss and led by the York University law school, said the present legal penalties for use of the drug were more damaging to young people than the short-term effects of marijuana.

Under Leadership Of Good Men

Paul-Henri Spaak was one of those statesmen intelligent enough and big enough to begin life after World War II with the belief that humanity has to try something new and serious in its management of its affairs if it were to survive.

But like many other sincere seekers of some objective, he soon drifted into the fatal compromise of means which has since foreclosed, or at least postponed, the one route to safety which exists for people and for nations.

He began, with the United Nations, as a believer in the necessity of one world. But he soon degenerated to also become the champion of two causes which promoted cleavage in the world.

First, of his own continent, he became the advocate and zealous, talented servant of an ideal of European unity which, when it came down to earth, actually divided Europe instead of uniting it.

Second, in the world, he became the forceful, able leader of an alliance between his half of Europe and the United States, this being the alliance which divided the world. The United Nations treaty was designed to make one world.

Many of the statesmen who originally pioneered the United Nations, but who also insisted on keeping their own nations and their own lesser alliances outside the sovereignty of the United Nations, have since taken to complaining of the lack of authority of the United Nations, sometimes quite unconsciously of the fact that they themselves helped sabotage whatever possibilities the world organization once had.

The obtuse account said that Paul-Henri Spaak had been an early supporter of the United Nations, and then a prime believer in the necessity for NATO, and later still a doubter with regard to the value of the United Nations. That has been the story of the lives of many of the great statesmen of our time. The tragedy is that it leaves us back where we were when they began, but with even less realization of our one ultimate need than they had then.

Right now, for instance, the substitute media says that we can cut up and abandon all alliances and arrangements except those of direct pragmatic summitry between the two super powers. And, although we know it changes the meaning of these two powers to agree forever on how the world is to be run, or even for them to impose their united will on everybody else permanently, we are reduced to hoping that, for as long as we ourselves keep breathing, they will not fail. We have no right to complain. We are in a world we have made.

The next morning, Tuesday, Cushman Anderson appeared at Senator Eagleton's office and performed a full apology, and a full retraction of his story.

Then, of course, it was a whole world too late.

We recite this sequence of events, and account its importance not to accuse Cushman Anderson of wanton destruction of anybody's public career, or to allege that he is involved in some political plot to destroy the Democratic chances in 1972, but merely to preach, once again, the most important sermon the press has to preach to itself, and over.

It is that sermon which says that, if freedom of the press is the first essential for the life of the press, then the second, no less essential is the requirement that this freedom be exercised with responsibility.

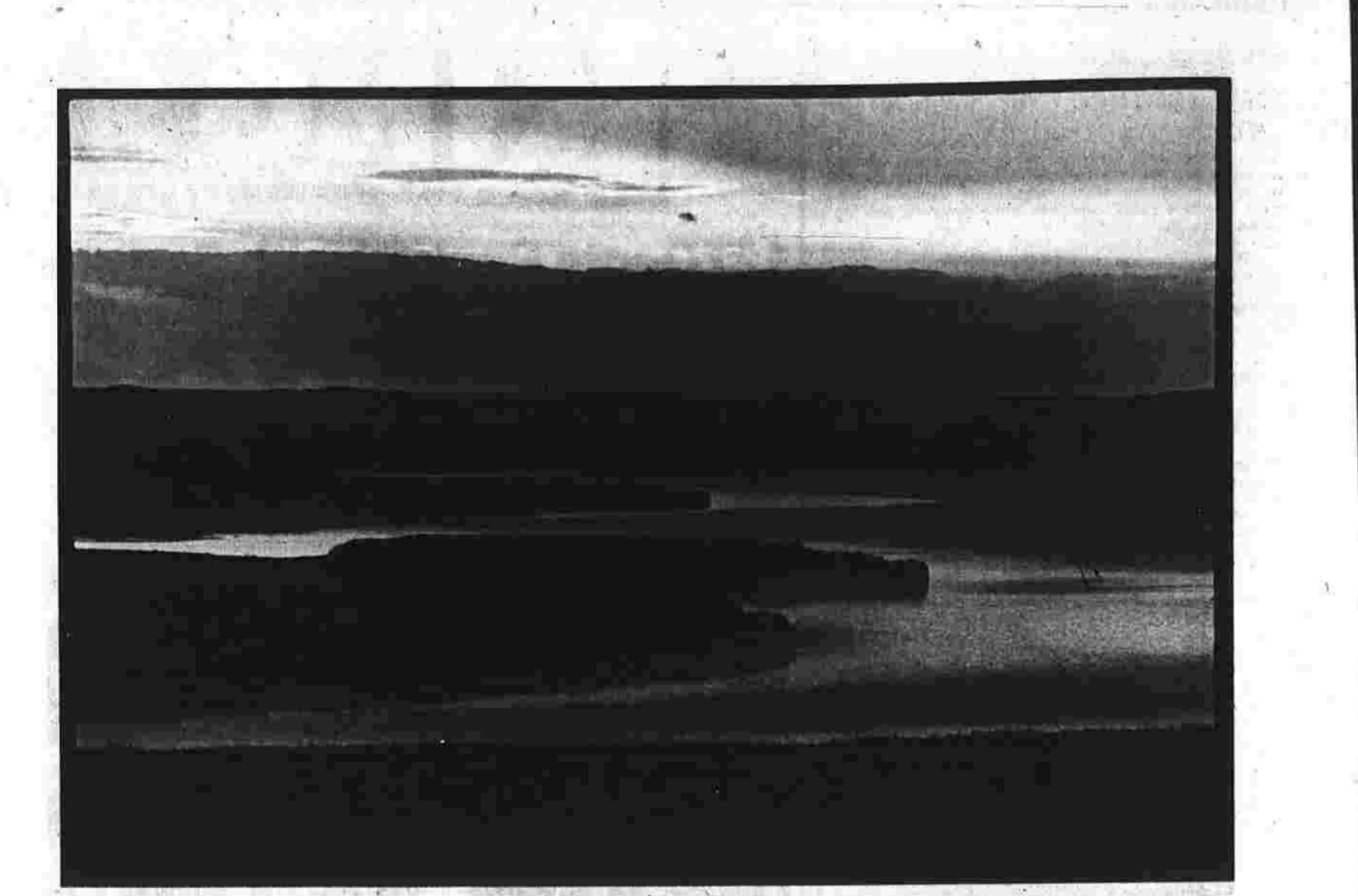
Cushman Anderson, in his apology, confessed that he was afraid. If he didn't use it promptly, without verification, someone else would get his story first.

That is a worthy and an impulse not strange to newspapermen.

Other Washington news sources had the same kind of tips Anderson had. They did not choose to be first, and when their investigation failed to turn up certification they just didn't use the story at all. But he was first — with the story he later, too late, after it had done its terrible damage, retracted totally.

If this seems to make Cushman Anderson a chief culprit in the disaster of Senator Eagleton, and thus leaves the rest of the American press backing in its own comparative virtue, there is a limit to the complacency to which the full profession is entitled. There were moments of unconscious seditious avagery in the way the gentlemen of the press — particularly those with microphones — performed their great mission of enlightening on the truth.

If Senator Eagleton, during and after this ordeal, had a few private and explosive epithets on his tongue, we forgive him, because publicly, he was a miraculous marvel of good temper, tolerance in circumstances when the instinct of any of the rest of us would have been to fly at the throat of the questioner. We gentlemen of the press are authorized fact-finders, sleuths, and servants of the public interest. We are not God.

Despite Lin Biao's death, however, high officials here believe that several of them right out of existence. As a result, some of his most radical onetime sympathizers are starting to suggest that there is a difference between him and Richard Nixon.

As a recent article in this newspaper noted, radicals of the People's Party, the Peace and Freedom Party and the Human Rights Party are complaining that Mr. McGovern is moving to the right and co-opting the left, and that's not the Maoist line. The Maoist line, as outlined by General Motors and IBM.

Miss Fonda, who according to the North Vietnamese press agency has been broadcasting anti-bombing pleas aimed at American pilots during her visit to Hanoi, said she intended to vote for Senator McGovern but not campaign for him. (Mayor Daley seems to have something similar in mind.) She had been a long-time supporter of the Senator, but now says, "He's a good corporation head who would wage war with a heavy heart."

Radical journalist J.P. Stone, who suggests the Korean war started because South Korea invaded the North, still sees George McGovern "as our best and only hope for a re-orientation of national priorities," but laments the narrow doctrinal difference between Messrs. McGovern and Nixon over the Vietnam question.

The presidential candidate of the Socialist Workers Party is bitter that the candidate "did not succeed" by refusing to fight for a liberal abortion plank in the Democratic platform.

And People's Party provisional presidential candidate Benjamin Spock warns that Senator McGovern's proposals "are just too modest and timid for me to ever support."

Purists may ask, paraphrasing Matthew, what is a man profited if he shall gain the support of Mayor Daley yet lose the support of the People's Party? Yet Senator McGovern is quite sensible on other issues. Indeed one of his problems is to separate himself from the far left.

For like so many politicians before him, Mr. McGovern has discovered that ideological purity may be a nice place to visit, but you can't win elections there. —WALL STREET JOURNAL.

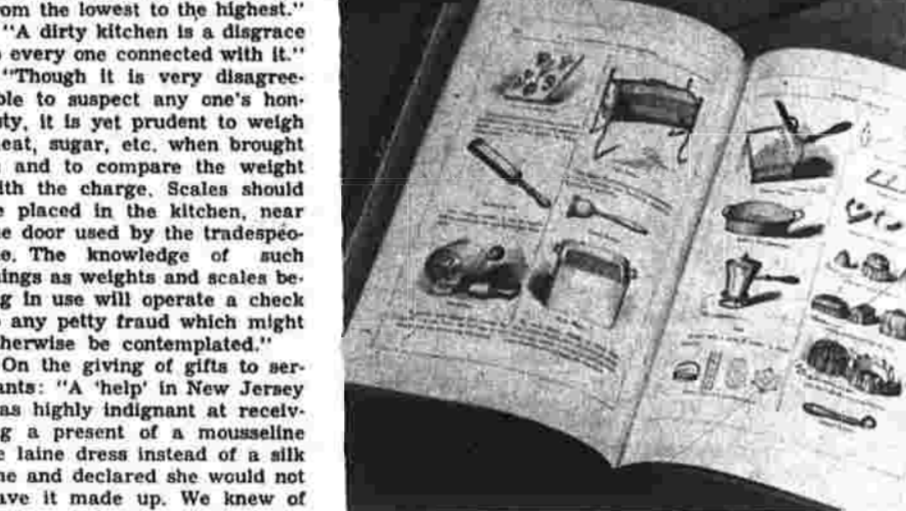

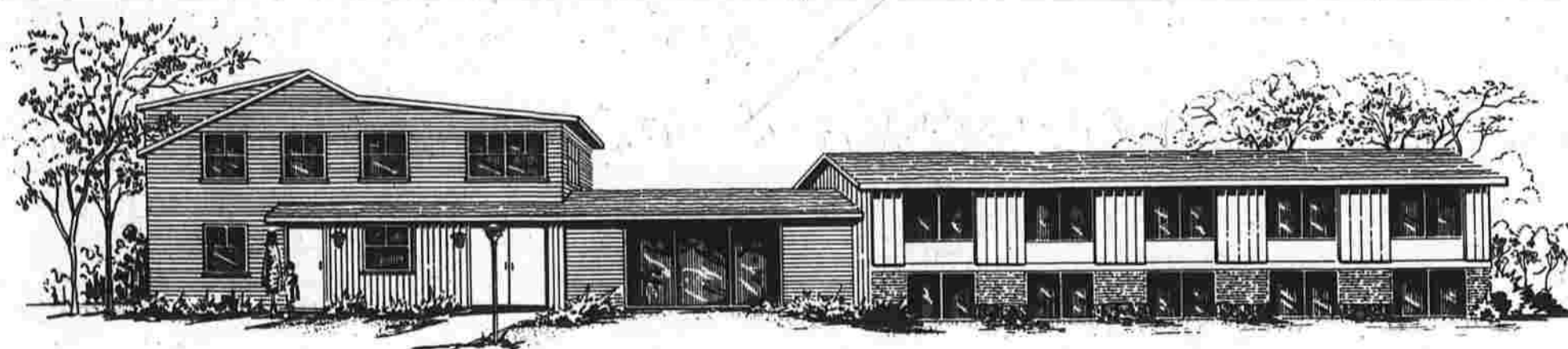

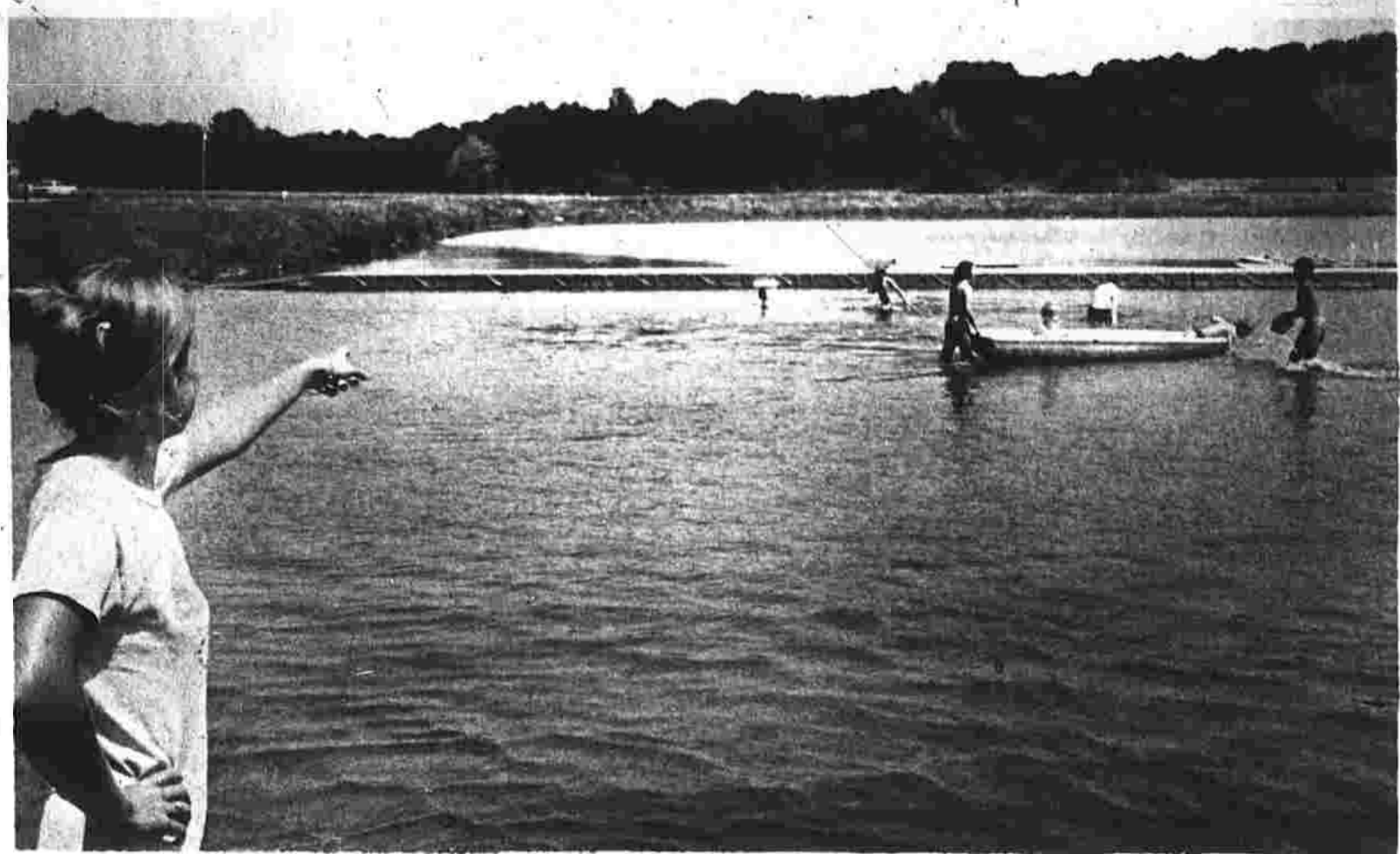

This Is a Very Special Day Camp

In the cool, shady grove of Camp Coventry, happy youngsters munch their watermelon, pop the seeds out of their mouths at imaginary targets, and reach out an eager hand for a second slice.

Little sandal-clad girls in colorful bikinis, and sun-banned "Huckleberry Finns" in camp shorts and open shirts, gaze at the swimming pond with a wistful eye.

One curly-haired young Black boy tries his skill at tether ball, till a little blonde guide approaches him, stamps her feet in anger and insists that it's her turn.

A couple of patient fishermen walk the banks of the Skunkamaug River, which winds its way around the mangroves, looking for the ideal spot to drop their line.

A paddleboat with a crew of two takes to the water in a separate area of the swimming pond.

High atop the Higuard's shield the water safety instructor shades her eyes from the sun as she scans the pond for youthful swimmers.

Out in the fields that surround the camp can be seen the bobbing heads of children as they stoop to pick up flowers and stones during their nature walk.

Alert staff members keep a constant vigil on the actions of their young wards repeatedly.

glancing over the area and making note of their whereabouts at all times.

A serious-minded, dedicated young camp director, well aware of the tremendous responsibility every day presents, puts it all together.

For this is a special camp, with very special campers. Camp Coventry is the day camp for retarded children, 80 per cent of whom cannot speak, 10 per cent who cannot understand, and 10 per cent who are not toilet trained. Campers range in age from kindergartners to young adults.

This 200-acre wooded wonderland nestled in what used to be pasture land on South River Rd. is supported by the state and sponsored by Mansfield Training School.

According to James H. Bracken, camp director, the whole concept at Camp Coventry differs from most day camps.

"The philosophy here allows a retarded child to make decisions. If he chooses to remain working on a project or if he'd rather play ball, or take a nature walk, a counselor or volunteer will accompany him," he said.

With physical education teacher and sponsor at Mansfield Training School since 1967, Bracken attended the University of South Carolina and Connecticut receiving a BS degree in education and an M.A. in physical education from the University of Connecticut. He has directed

camp for two seasons and is also advisor to the IOH (Instructors of the Handicapped), a teenage organization which specializes in swimming instruction for handicapped.

In explaining the camp's concept Bracken said, "There are no programs scheduled at specific times. The sound of a whistle doesn't summon everyone out of the pond or indicate that they must stop what they are doing on and move to another project."

"There are many of our campers who at their first camp sessions refused to join in, due to shyness, lack of interest, or just inability to understand.

"It is in this area that our staff tries to broaden their interest span by motivating the youngsters, expose him to new activities and give him the desire to explore," he said.

Assisting Bracken at the camp are five counselors and he admits "as many volunteers as we can get."

"We have from 60 to 70 children here a day and with just the paid staff of six including myself, we couldn't possibly handle the campers who, because of their handicaps, must be under close supervision at all times," Bracken said.

"Seventy-five per cent of our help are volunteers. We are fortunate to have some wonderful young teenagers who are really dedicated workers. It takes a

great deal of compassion and understanding on their part to work with retarded. It's not an easy job," he commented.

One Manchester volunteer, Shirley Cavallini, who is serving her first summer at camp, strums her guitar after lunch-time to the tune of "Old McDonald" and the youngsters try to join in to the best of their ability.

One little fellow put a stone in a milk carton and shook it up and down trying to keep beat to the rhythm.

Special manual language classes are held in a cabin set away back in the woods. One of the cabins the state has proposed for the camp site.

Patience instructors teach the campers how to "speak" by using their hands.

Other staff members include Patricia Watson, a special education teacher at Longley School in Mansfield Depot; and Paul Single, a graduate of E.D. Smith, who is spending his third year at camp.

"Ed Washlett, a guidance counselor from Glastonbury, volunteers his help every morning during the summer. Even during his vacation he helps out this time to help us. He tutors students in the afternoon," Bracken added.

Among the volunteers from the greater Manchester area are: Jerry Kemp, Joel Krutt, Karl Clark, Ellen Gray, Michael Stefano, Donna Wells, Kevin Cameron, Kim Clemens, Marilyn Taylor, Norma Carlson, Tim Carpenter and Dave Carpenter.

Also, Bruce Clark, Linda Horvath, Susan Brown, Heidi Foster, Bruce Luckman, Pam Malloy, Mark Obermeyer, Alice Garry, Joan Hirsch, Jean Pastel, Diane Kelsey, Marion Klusane and Todd Elmors.

Bracken, an enthusiastic young man constantly searching for ways to help these children to reach their fullest learning potential, fosters camping during the winter months with sledging and snow mobiling among the activities.

"The youngsters would love it, and if the state comes through with the money, we eventually hope to have an administration building and a cafeteria," he said.

The camp currently is using make-shift shelters for arts and craft projects. With the exception of the one cabin in the woods, it has very little else in the way of shelter. A small trailer is used to store supplies and medical equipment.

Among the many items needed at the camp are kites and bows and arrows, target stand and target, balls, crayons, paints and construction paper. "We could use another paddleboat and a rubber raft," Bracken said.

"We had two paddleboats, and we had them paddocked to the dock, but during the winter someone broke the lock and took one of the boats," he added.

Camp Coventry, only four years old, has a long way to go, and though it's poor in material things — it's rich in love and safety instruction and is corresponding secretary for IOH.

Here, in a beautiful setting with the birds and other animals, the youngsters know through are epileptic, and when they have a seizure while swimming, smile, that somebody cares.

'Be a Better Shopper'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government, still worried over rising food prices, plans to announce "Be a Better Shopper" campaign soon, industry sources say.

"The idea will be to tell consumers what food items are in greatest supply—and therefore most economical. There will be no attempt to urge shoppers to boycott a particular item or to substitute one for another."
