MVD Makes Free Check Of Trailers

WETHERSFIELD, Conn. (AP) — The Department of Motor Vehicles says it will begin a free weighing service for recreational vehicles to check on overloaded campers. "One of the dangers is the tendency to load heavy camper modules on small pickup trucks. We also have determined that other types of recreational vehicles—motor homes, camp trailers, boat trailers—are routinely overloaded," Motor Vehicles Commissioner Robert C. Leuba said Saturday. Leuba said the free weighing service will begin Tuesday at the department's office in Wethersfield, and noted that campers found to be overloaded won't be ticketed. "We want campers to know whether their vehicles have an overload problem both for their own safety and so that they can take corrective action before proposed safety regulations go into effect," the commission said. Under proposed regulations scheduled to become effective next January, drivers would be prohibited from operating motor homes or truck mounted camper modules which "exceed by two per cent or more the gross vehicle weight established for the motor vehicle," a department spokesman said.

Parties Repeat Nominating Job

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut Democrats and Republicans held repeats of their congressional nominating conventions over the weekend, but wound up choosing the same candidates. The second conventions were necessitated by a federal court ruling that struck down Connecticut's old congressional district lines because of population imbalance between districts. Several towns were shifted into new districts in the new redistricting plan but the changes didn't alter the wishes of the earlier conventions. In the 1st District, Republicans tapped Richard Rittenband of South Windsor to challenge incumbent Democrat William R. Cotter of Hartford. In the 2nd District, Democrats selected Roger Bluman to oppose Republican incumbent Robert Steele. State Rep. Henry Foyell of Milford was nominated by 3rd District Republicans to challenge incumbent Democrat Robert N. Glamo of North Haven. In the 4th District, incumbent Republican Stewart McKinney of Fairfield was tapped to run again, and his Democratic challenger will be James McLoughlin of Bridgeport. U.S. Rep. John S. Moak of Waterbury was renominated by 5th District Democrats. His challenger will be State Rep. Ronald Sarasin of Beacon Falls. Sixth District Democrats renominated U.S. Rep. Ella Grasso of Windsor Locks while Republicans nominated John F. Walsh of New Britain.

Japanese To Visit Red China

TOKYO (AP) — Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka said today he will visit Communist China in September for talks on normalizing Tokyo-Peking relations. Japanese press reports have said Tanaka will go to Peking between Sept. 20 and 25 if agreement is reached within his Liberal-Democratic party. Speaking with newsmen, Tanaka said the time is ripe for his tour schedule will be subject to the convenience of the Chinese. On relations with Nationalist China, Tanaka said no nations have continued to maintain diplomatic relations with Taipei after establishing relations with Peking and Japan will be no exception. Mekong Areas In Peril

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops and tanks threatened three towns in eastern Cambodia today, raising fears of new threats across the border into the Mekong Delta and the provinces north and west of Saigon. Messages from Kompong Trabek, on the Salween-Phnom Penh highway 85 miles west of the South Vietnamese capital, indicated the Cambodians were still fighting there on the west bank of the Prek Trabe River but had abandoned that part of the city lying on the east bank. Sources in Phnom Penh said North Vietnamese tanks were sighted east of Kompong Trabe advancing toward the beleaguered provincial capital of Svay Rieng, 20 miles to the east and five miles from the Vietnamese border. Another column of North Vietnamese infantrymen and tanks was reported heading toward Prey Veng, a provincial capital 25 miles northwest of Kompong Trabe. U.S. bombers were supporting the Cambodians in the southern part of North Vietnam, aimed primarily at fuel supplies for the Quang Tri and Phu Bai battlefronts. Sales Tax Cut Killed for Year

HARTFORD (AP) — A state he taxed on 100 per cent of levies on capital gains and Supreme Court ruling against their capital gains. "The capital gains and dividends tax is an unfair tax," said the state's attorney general, Thomas J. Meskall, adding that it is impossible to cut the sales tax this year. Gov. Thomas J. Unrest in Ulster Leaves 500 Dead Over Three Years

BELFAST (AP) — The death toll in three years of religious warfare in Northern Ireland reached 500 Monday night, according to revised police figures, as Roman Catholic politicians opened secret peace talks with British officials. Police headquarters said 495 Catholics and 50 Protestants were killed in the violence that started 36 months ago. The first fatality was a Catholic priest, Rev. James Doherty, who was in uniform, was killed by a gunman hiding in the bushes 15 yards from his home at Magheraverry, close to the border with the Irish Republic. Police said the count of 500 was a revision. Earlier, before the state's death toll of 495 was being used, but all such figures are considered inexact because the guerrillas of the Irish Republican Army usually carry off their dead and bury them secretly.

Weiss To Seek U.S. Funds For Disputed Sewer Project

The town will file an application with the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development for federal funds toward a proposed sewer installation in Tolland Tpk. near the Vermont town line and to a residential area north of the West River Cross Highway.

According to Town Manager Robert Weiss, "It appears that this project would be eligible for 50 per cent funding. However, there is no indication at this time when, and if, funds will become available. If we do get approval, the town would still be able to assess normal benefit costs against shunters."

The Tolland Tpk. proposal has caused considerable controversy. At the moment it is doubtful whether plans will proceed.

The Board of Directors last month by a 6 to 3 vote turned down the proposed sewer installation. It would have cost over \$600,000 with the cost being borne by the town and abutting property owners. The town's share would have been about \$300,000.

Tolland Teacher Pay Talks Under Way Again

Negotiating sessions between the Board of Education and the Tolland Education Association have resumed, following a month's lull due to conflicting vacation schedules.

The negotiating efforts are entering their ninth month, with expectations that a settlement can be reached before the opening of school.

The long running negotiating sessions are following the history of last year's sessions, when a settlement was not reached until the day before school opened.

An arbitration guideline issued in June recommended a five per cent teacher salary increase for each of the first two years of the contract, including step increments. Salary negotiations could be reopened in the third year of the contract. The majority decision also advocates the school board's paying 75 per cent of the teachers Blue Cross and CMS insurance coverage.

A minority report recommended a 4.5 per cent salary increase, in the same period and 50 per cent payment of insurance by the board.

Teacher salaries are the largest item in the Board of Education budget, cut by over 20 per cent, by the budget referendum.

The Board of Finance last week denied a request by the school board for a transfer if anticipated per pupil ADM grants received by the town amounting to \$3,000.

The Board of Education will meet tomorrow night to review its proposed budget cuts, and is expected to finalize action to permit implementing the school program, without further delay, and to permit hiring teachers.

Business Mirror Inflation Can Be Costly For Those Who Are Saving

By JOHN GUNNIF AP Business Editor NEW YORK (AP)—Based on renewed buying activity, the growth of credit and a drop in the savings rate, Americans are somewhat more certain of the future than they were a year ago.

One of the factors involved in their outlook, it seems safe to say, is the progress being made in arresting inflation. It is now down to about 3.5 per cent on an annual basis. It had been close to 6 per cent in 1970.

An insurance policy, the premiums for which are paid in current dollars, pays off in current dollars too. But premium payments are made in today's money while face value is returned in tomorrow's cheaper money.

Savings accounts that pay 5 per cent a year are actually earning only 1.5 per cent—less after taxes—at the present inflation rate. And U.S. Savings Bonds, which pay 5.5 in real yield only 2 per cent.

Curiously, when inflation accelerated, the rate of savings rose. Savings Bonds experienced a reversal of fortune—they had been paying out more than they sold, with the help of a rate raise, this was changed.

The current inflation rate, however, is nearly double that, and prompts Martin Gainsburgh, former chief economist of the Conference Board, to remind consumers that even at a 3 per cent rate, inflation halves the dollar's value in 24 years.

He reminds those who "save in contractual form, e.g., insurance, mutual savings, savings and loan," that they are liable to find their dollars worth only half as much when they withdraw them in their declining years.

The erosion formula is easy enough for anyone to work out. To determine the number of years required to cut your money in half you divide the inflation rate into 72. The answer is disconcerting—but valuable.

Gainsburgh, in one of a series of studies for the CIT Financial Corp., calls the current rate "jogging" rather than "moderate," and warns that its economic and social implications are almost unknown.

What is clear is that the conservative financial practices of millions of Americans—the safe way, as they describe it—could be extremely wasteful, costly and distasteful.

There are now more than 30 million shareholders in American companies, about six times the number of 20 years ago. And the percentage of families that own rather than rent has risen steadily since the Great Depression.

In 1940, only 43.6 per cent of units were owned by their occupants and 56.4 per cent were rented. In 1950, the percentages were 55 and 45, in 1960 they were 61.9 and 38.1, and in 1970 they were 62.9 and 37.1.

Over in New York state, the Knapp Commission, after spending two years investigating police corruption in New York City, has come up with a recommendation for a five-year "war" against such corruption.

As one of his first strategies in such a war against corruption, it recommends the legalization of additional forms of gambling, beyond the lottery and the off-track betting already available.

The Knapp Commission's reason for recommending the legalization of more gambling is almost brutally realistic.

The Commission has figured it out that the way to have more honest cops is to lessen the amount and variety of temptation to which they may be exposed. Legalize more forms of gambling, and the police will have fewer anti-gambling laws to enforce, and will, therefore, encounter fewer efforts to bribe them out of their sworn duty.

And Gene Pokorny, who organized Wisconsin for Mr. McGovern's primary campaign, and who's trying to organize Illinois now, lays much of his success to "creative anarchy." That's the point when the campaign attains a sort of critical mass: so many storefront headquarters are springing up spontaneously that central headquarters can't keep track of them.

But how much activity, creative or otherwise, can Mr. McGovern afford if he makes it to the White House? What about a staff that's so loose it can't add up the numbers of a fax reform plan or find out that Tom Eagleton was hospitalized those three times?

In a simpler age, we could live with disorder. Can we in the nuclear age? Maybe it's the organization mentality that's to blame for the post-war arms race and cocking so much nuclearistic gears. Senator McGovern promises a more human approach to international affairs. He says he seems to say, "I'll crank down the arms race, make it so the President doesn't need a nuclear button on his right toe."

Select George McGovern and make it possible for a President to extend the hand of friendship to the Russians and get it slapped, without plunging the world into war. Select George McGovern and make the world safe for mistakes again!

The second question is whether we, conceding we may be sane and safe from turning into senseless slaughters, in ourselves or by proxies, possess any healing, positive power which can reach out into this world and heal it.

Neither question has really been answered, yet.

At public hearings last Tuesday, considerable opposition was expressed for installing pipe and renovations to the junior high. There was little comment on the other proposals.

The board will consider proposals to allocate \$132,000 from the Capital Improvements Reserve Fund for the following projects: \$29,000 for two tennis courts and two basketball courts at Robinson Park and a 17-car parking lot to service the courts; a \$2-car parking lot near the south end of Union Pond.

\$29,000 for a storm drainage system on Hilliard St., to alleviate flooding in the area of Mrs. M. G. Co. Chevrolet, and Hob and Hob Enterprises.

\$17,000 for sidewalks on the west side of Broad Street, \$14,000 for reconstructing two tennis courts at West Side Park.

\$11,000 for a conduit over a section of the brook in Center Springs Park.

\$2,000 for reinforcing the bowing alleys in the Community Y.

Action is expected on the first two proposals.
