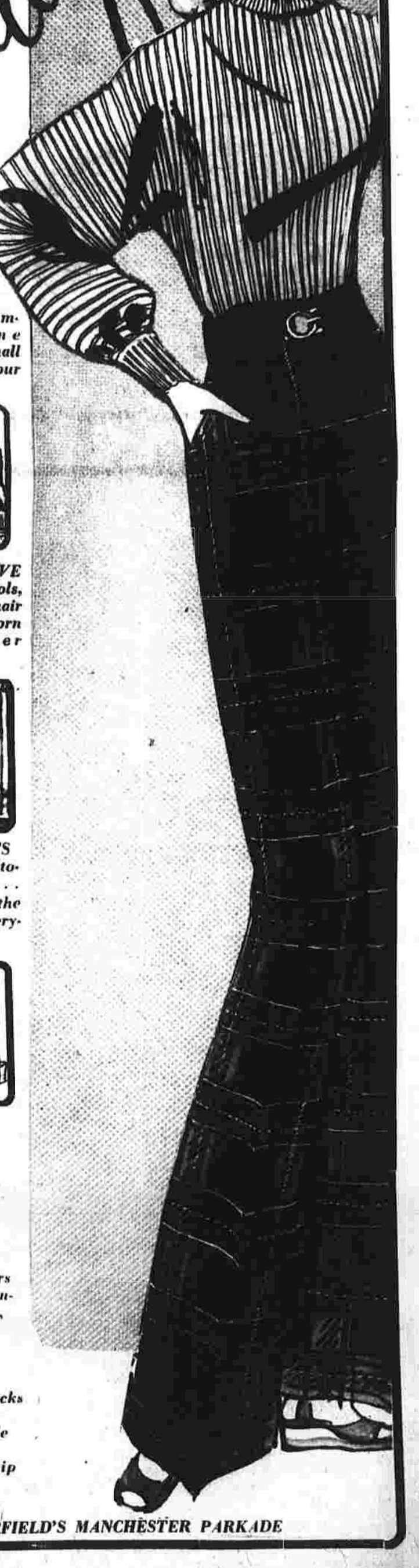

Do you feel this could be healed without surgery after such a length of time? What do you think of surgery? I am 25 years old and after seven months of this it is starting to affect me psychologically.

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Insurance, public or private, governmental or commercial, is a system by which the many unite small contributions in order to give adequate compensation to those relatively few who become victims of accidents.

What happens to us? The very point where we find our credibility in the news media growing thin—is the way all these fake professional men succeed at their chosen masquerades.

There was never, on the record at least, one of those fake doctors who lost a patient. To the contrary, the talented amateur always has a long list of impressive cures to his credit.

Now we have a glamorous example of a bogus lawyer, who has just been exposed down in New York. His mistake had nothing to do with the services he was performing for his clients.

He could be practicing yet, with such unbroken success, and such good services, at modest fees, to his clients, if it hadn't been that he gave a judge, one day, a telephone number for the judge's clerk to call in case the judge wanted to hear a case out of normal schedule.

What is it that kills and wounds people, burns and mangle, natural resources, pollutes the air, and strangles the transportation systems of so many nations? By now this riddle is no longer a riddle as people have come to more and more consider alternatives to the automobile.

Our sympathy for the slightest mechanics is total. Considering his case as if it were in a vacuum, with no ties to anything else, no amount of money is too much for him.

But the real situation is that he recovers this money, or his eventual share of it, under a system in which the money does not come out of a vacuum, or even out of the accounts of an insurance company, but out of the pockets of all the Americans who finance our system of accident insurance.

This is, of course, the circumstance which, in the case of auto accident insurance, has now led to the adoption of "no fault" plans of one kind or another in ten states, including Connecticut. It has seemed necessary to impose some regularity and balance on the distribution of damages in order to keep the question into large circles because that in turn will support the development of mass transit, and prepare the way for change.

The Moral Lesson

The disclosure that Democratic vice-presidential candidate Thomas F. Eagleton had undergone intensive psychiatric care on three occasions during the past decade raised a difficult question for millions of people.

The office of president has been a crucible and the man or woman in serious mental or physical condition will be severely tried when arising in that high position.

But every pastor, psychiatrist and clinical psychologist knows that his client must learn to live with himself and the pace and burden of life. New and trying tasks coupled with constant pressure and demand are not the best guarantee of mental balance for those who have worked out of earlier crises.

The second and more glaring difficulty in this election year was the negligence of the senator's part in not revealing to the voters his medical history. There are those who have said it is a private affair, the nervous breakdown over and the discussion is without merit.

"I'm not embarrassed to be George McGovern's seventh choice for vice president. We Democrats may be short of money. We're not short of talent. Think of the comparison and then you can pity poor Mr. Nixon — his first and only choice was Spiro Agnew."

"This is a real blow at the American consumer. It affects every American home — Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., after the Senate sent back to committee a bill to establish a national system of no-fault automobile insurance, apparently with any chance of congressional action on the proposal this year."

"We lost everything that makes up memories. That's what hurts, what's hard to forgive, what makes you sad — and mad."

For that reason it is time to start orienting national policy in a serious way in the direction of alternate forms of transportation. Even if the electric car is developed, it still will require energy to run it, and that too may be in short supply. It is an optimistic view that technology has always found a way, and certainly it would be injudicious to claim that such events may not again occur in the rescue. But a start should be made.

If cars are ultimately to be banned in large cities, as has been suggested as a manner of meeting the clean air standards, this transition should go forward in an organized fashion as possible. Certainly, the nation can't in one day move from a society that goes to the city car, to a society that does not. The only way to make this gradual transfer is to start increasing the cost of driving cars into large cities because that in turn will support the development of mass transit, and prepare the way for change.

**Tolland Mobil Sign Case Put Off to Aug. 22**

The hearing on a writ of mandamus being sought by two local residents calling for the removal of the controversial high rise Mobil Oil Co. sign, has been postponed until Aug. 22. The hearing was held in Tolland County Superior Court yesterday, the continuance was granted on behalf of the plaintiffs. **Grant Ruling Wins Praise Of Ratchford**

HARTFORD (AP) — The state Supreme Court ruling against cuts made by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill in state grants to Connecticut towns and cities was hailed Tuesday by House Speaker William Ratchford.

Ratchford said the Republican governor had "clearly violated" his legal constitutional authority when he ordered some \$22 million in cuts last year in a variety of state grants, including grants for education.

"I felt there, as I do now, that it was a flagrant violation," said Ratchford, "and the taxpayers at the local level have paid for it."

Meskill, who restored almost all of the money by the end of the fiscal year, said Tuesday morning that the issue is now academic.

"I question sincerely whether the court would have reached that conclusion if we hadn't already paid the money back," said Meskill.

The court ruled unanimously Monday the governor had no authority to cut grants which had been approved by the legislature.

**Allies Recover from Battle**

SAGON (AP) — Hundreds of South Vietnamese rangers have replaced government militiamen badly mauled in a series of ambushes only 17 miles east of Saigon. Officers in the field said 88 of the militiamen were killed and 35 wounded in the fighting Monday and Tuesday.

The rangers, moving on foot and by helicopters, were maneuvering to get behind the estimated 250 North Vietnamese units which are now in the Binh song rubber plantation east of Highway 15, the main route, to the Yang Tau resort center. The highway was open.

The enemy forces ambushed a platoon of South Vietnamese militiamen on a patrol Monday along a dirt road between the rubber plantation and a village. The North Vietnamese, armed with mines, mortars and rocket grenades, then cut into the militiamen who were poured in to reinforce the patrol.

The fighting tapered off Tuesday night, but the enemy forces held its position despite U.S. and South Vietnamese bombing, officers said.

Only three enemy bodies were found, but rubber plantations were destroyed by the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong said the enemy evacuated many wounded and dead. Field officers said the enemy battalion moved into the plantations quietly about a week ago and set up strong positions.

Officers said it was the biggest action in Long Thanh district in two years, and the first time during that period that the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong had stayed and fought. Previous enemy attacks were platoon-size forays on a hit-and-run basis, the officers said.

U.S. advisers were puzzled about the objective of the enemy force. They said Long Thanh itself did not appear to be an immediate goal, and if the enemy intended to cut Highway 15, there were more strategic locations from which to do so.

In Cambodia, Communist forces still holding part of the town of Kompong Trabek, 85 miles west of Saigon, drove back a North Vietnamese tank and infantry assault after three days of heavy fighting.

The Cambodian command also reported that one of its helicopters loaded with reinforcements landed Tuesday near Kompong Trabek by a Strela missile, a hand-fired, heat-seeking missile that the North Vietnamese are using for the first time in their current offensive.

South Windsor School Board Votes to Ask For \$1.9 Million Bonding

By a vote of five to two, the Board of Education last night accepted a proposal to submit to the Town Council a request to place the question of \$1.9 million bond issue instead of a \$2.1 million plan for a high school expansion program.

### Coventry \$31,000 Sought for Study Of Repair on Five Bridges

The Town Council has set Aug. 16 as the date for a special town meeting to consider an appropriation of \$31,000 for engineering studies in connection with future reconstruction of five "structurally unsound" bridges in the town.

Gravel and Puss, town engineers, in a report to the council recommended that five of ten town bridges be improved. The report was made at the request of the council.

The \$31,000 study will be carried out separately, but would eventually be tied into any reconstruction of bridges in that area.

The five bridges to be improved are the Brewster St. bridge over the Ash Brook, mainly in terms of its width and approach; the South St. bridge over the Hop River; the S. and N. River Rd. bridges over the Skungamug River; and the Polly Lane bridge, which is in a state of virtual collapse following winter snow.

The \$31,000 appropriation would not cover any reconstruction, but would include design of improved bridges, hydraulic computations, schematic studies and specifications.

Fuas, who presented the report to the council this week, said there is no estimate yet on what reconstruction would cost, but this estimate would be included in the preliminary work covered by the \$31,000.

The preliminary study, to be done in two phases would take a total of 165 calendar days.

If funds for the studies are approved, the council would return to the townpeople immediately after completion of that work to call for bonding authorization for the actual reconstruction work.

In his report to the council, Fuas noted that the council had asked for a report on ten bridges, but that while all ten are in need of some repair, three are in critical need. Two others are also in critical need.

The council immediately authorized \$2,000 for studies on the reconstruction of Merrow Rd. and Goose Lane, where rapid housing growth continues to create problems because of poor road conditions coupled with added traffic.

The \$2,000 study will be carried out separately, but would eventually be tied into any reconstruction of bridges in that area.





THE PETER PRINCIPLE... By Laurence J. Jargan... Peter, Morrow, 221 Pages, \$5.95.

Remember "The Peter Principle"? It was a very popular book telling why things go wrong.

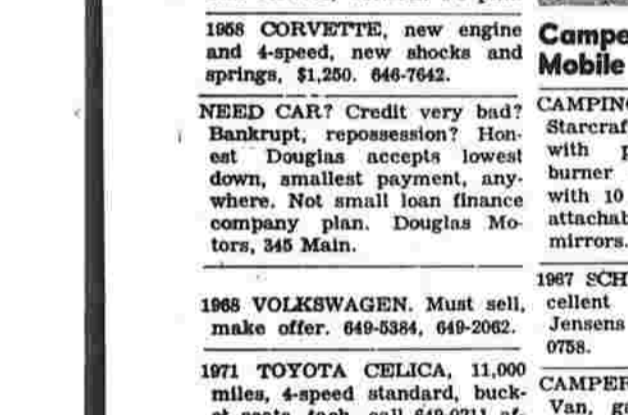

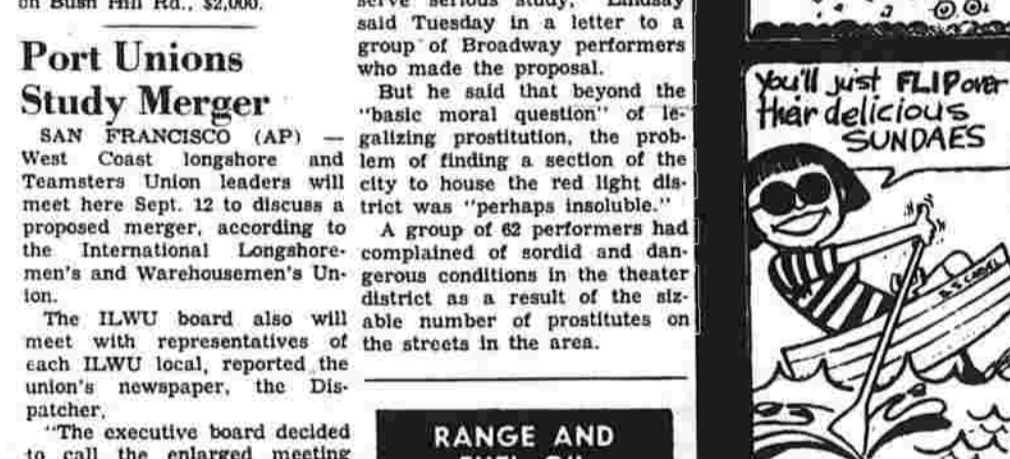
