Aetna Express Bus Negotiated Settlement, Rogers Aim

The special express bus from Burr Corners Shopping Plaza, Manchester, to the Aetna Insurance Co. in Hartford attracted 35 passengers this morning, according to the Connecticut Department of Transportation (DOT).

The special Aetna bus is part of the overall bus commuter service that operates weekdays between Burr Corners and downtown Hartford. The total number of bus riders this morning was 171, the DOT said.

The Aetna bus leaves Burr Corners at 7:20 a.m., and returns at 4:15 p.m. The other buses, which make several stops in downtown Hartford, leave every ten minutes from 7:09 a.m. and return every ten minutes from 4 to 6 p.m.

Free parking, a bicycle rack, and bus shelter are provided at Burr Corners. The one-way fare is 50 cents.

State Transportation Commissioner A. Earl Wood, is announcing the Aetna bus service last week said, "We are constantly reviewing our commuter bus operations to determine how we can increase patronage on them as well as to provide the most efficient and convenient service for the riders."

The commuter express buses from Burr Corners and a similar project from Gubins Corner at West Hartford, were designed by the DOT to help relieve traffic congestion on Capitol route highways.

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command said Navy jets attacked seven targets in the Thanh Hoa area of North Vietnam Monday, but it denied charges by Hanoi that a business center and the cathedral area were bombed.

Asked about a North Vietnamese claim that 100 civilians were killed or wounded in the raid, a spokesman said: "I have nothing to say."

The command denied any strikes inside the city limits of Hanoi. Thanh Hoa, a port 80 miles south of Hanoi. It said the targets attacked were a highway bridge, a fuel storage depot and two aircraft sites a mile north of Thanh Hoa, a gun site a mile to the northeast and an army magazine and another fuel storage depot a mile and a half southwest of the city.

But Hanoi's Vietnam News Agency claimed that the U.S. planes did "very heavy damage to many streets and outlying areas." It said the city's pharmaceutical workshop, the bakery, and the noodle factory were completely ruined.

The U.S. command reported more than 190 strikes against North Vietnam and said in South Vietnam more than a score of U.S. planes and other aircraft were downed against North Vietnam and Viet Cong troop concentrations to the northwest and southwest of Saigon for the second successive night. At least 600 tons of bombs were dropped at points 24 to 35 miles from the capital.

The South Vietnamese command claimed 97 enemy troops were killed with no South Vietnamese losses in fighting near the Cambodian town of Kompong Rau, just across the border 50 miles west of Saigon. The Saigon command said its forces captured 19 weapons, including three Soviet Strela antiaircraft missiles.

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GOP Takes Turn At Conventions

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Preliminaries for next week's Republican National Convention are rolling along on schedule as top Nixon administration officials proclaim a 20 million dollar achievement in the full Platform Committee and potential dissen-

Three members of President Nixon's Cabinet and his Council of Economic Advisors were scheduled for two 15-minute sessions before the full Platform Committee in the afternoon. A leading GOP critic of the Vietnam war, Rep. Paul "Pete" McCloskey of California, was scheduled for 15 minutes before one of seven subcommittees.

As the convention neared, the local City Council took a step considered important in heading off trouble by voting 4 to 3 to permit protesters to camp out in palm-fringed Flamingo Park six blocks from the site of the GOP gathering.

City officials had requested the action. Demonstration leaders, declaring next week's protesters would be more serious than those of the last month's Democratic convention, promised a "less carnival-like atmosphere" in the

Formal selection of President Nixon and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew as the Republican ticket still was a week away, but Democratic nominees George McGovern and Sargent Shriver already were out campaigning.

McGovern began his first visit to the politically crucial midwestern states of Ohio and Illinois. Shriver, who charged Monday in West Virginia that the Nixon administration had ignored the nation's workers, vowed in California to make that state the scene of Richard Nixon's greatest defeat.

This week's GOP sessions on platform and rules, like next week's convention, are being held in a hotel in Miami. It is a week ago today that Nixon, after a television conference at Camp David with top economic advisers, told a nationwide television audience that he had decided to impose a wage-price freeze, to slip a 10-per-cent surcharge on imports and to freeze the dollar from its links to gold.

Disagreement exists in the Rules Committees of both the convention and the GOP National Committee, but it deals with proposals to follow the Democrats' lead and require increased representation of women, young people and minority groups at the 1976 Republican National Convention.

The national committee's program panel scheduled an afternoon session today to consider the proposals which are being pressed by GOP moderates.

As for the platform, the GOP managers have confined virtually all estimates of inflation to the full committee to administration officials and heads of national organizations.

Almost everyone else appears before afternoon meetings of seven widely scattered subcommittees.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers, Monday's top witness at the full Platform Committee session, declared that "never before has the prestige of the United States been greater" and said the President's policies may pave the way for a full generation of world peace.

He took another slap at criticism by McGovern and Shriver of administration Vietnam policies, declaring that the Democratic contenders have an "Alice in Wonderland" view of the war.

He pledged, too, to cut the rate of inflation by half—and his advisers are practicing success. Secretary of the Treasury George Shultz, in an anniversary briefing, noted that the rate of inflation over the past four months has been less than 2 per cent. This compares, he said, to the 6.5 per cent increase in 1969 and to the 5.5-per-cent increase in 1970.

At the same briefing, Budget Director Caspar Weinberger voiced concern that Congress "is on a rather dangerous spending path."

Weinberger said he was referring specifically to a \$30.5-billion health-education-labor appropriation bill passed by Congress and now before the President. The bill is \$1 billion more than the President requested, and, said Weinberger, is "a highly inflationary increase to an already generous budget."

The measure was passed by Congress in the face of a threatened presidential veto. And, while aides refused to say what action Nixon would take, they indicated he would strike down the bill—as he implied he would when he asked Congress recently to fund a \$250-billion ceiling on federal spending this year.

This year, I decided to let my boy scout "be prepared" by himself. For years I've supervised the packing of his trunk only to have it come back practically untouched.

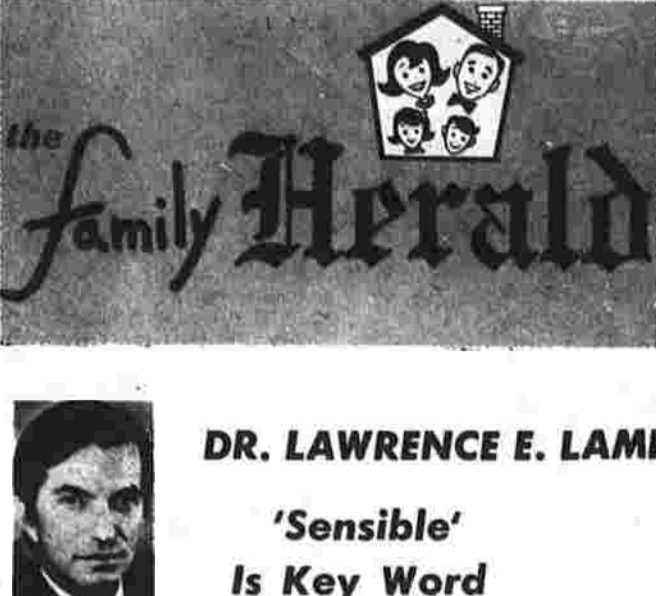
In years past when the list of requirements came from the scout leader, I read it and followed it like the gospel. If the list called for 10 pairs of socks, I should list 10 pairs.

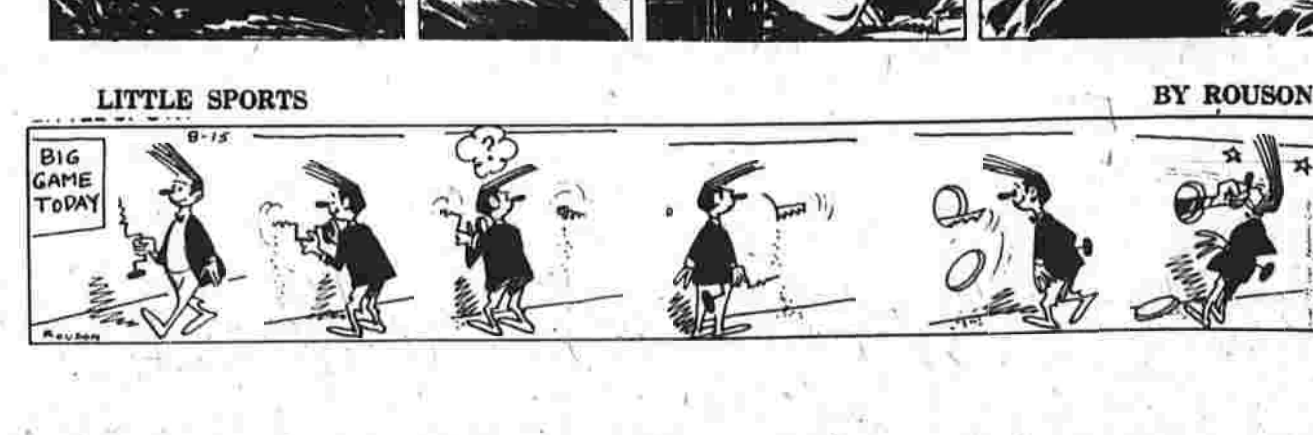
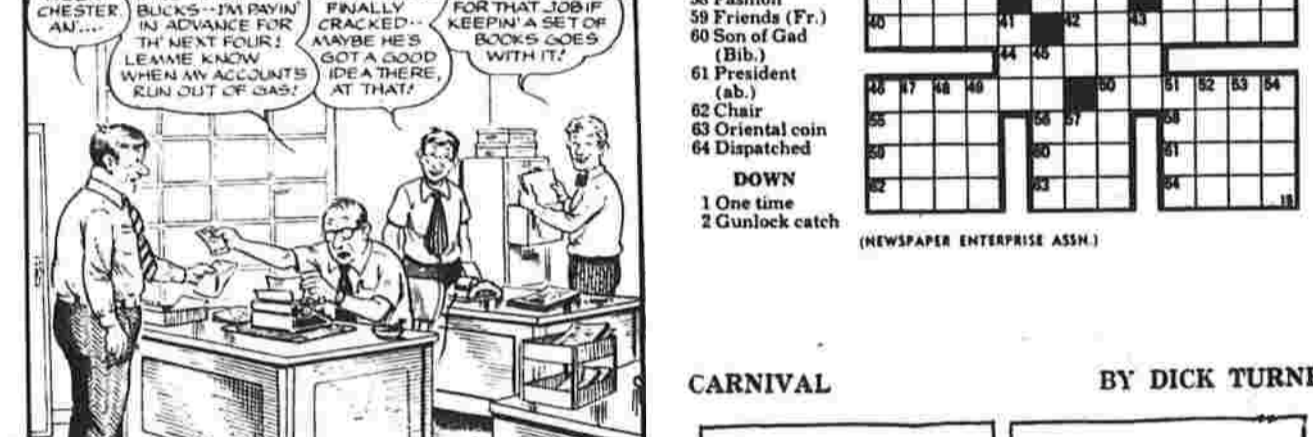

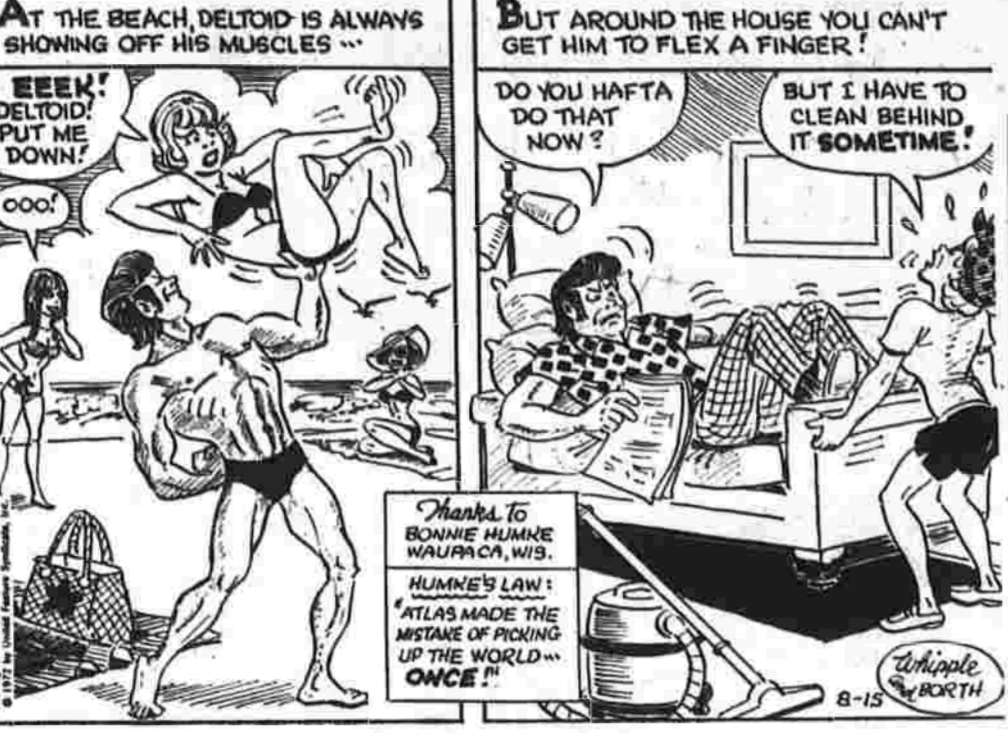

Then he might insult his audience, another performer or the television sponsor. "I'll show you how unbreakable it is!" he shouted once as he smashed the sponsor's "unbreakable" radio against a wall.

That was Oscar Levant, pianist, with, composer, author, eccentric, actor and television host who is dead at 65.
