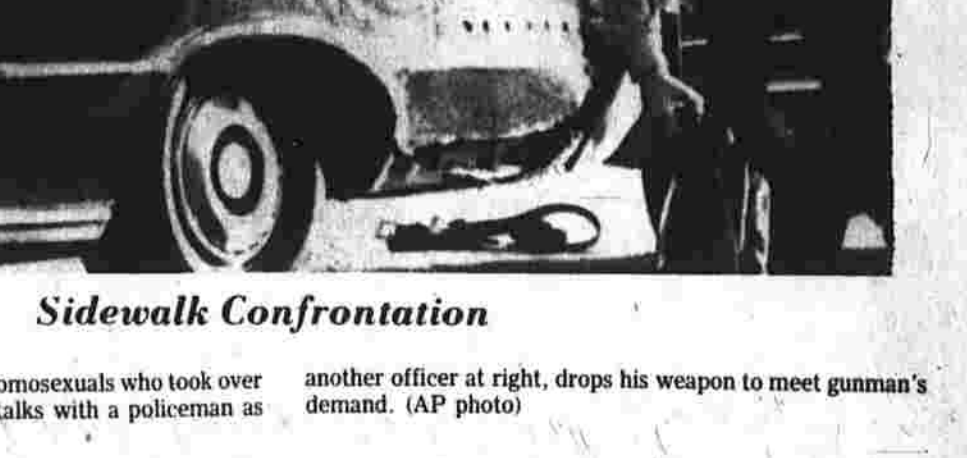

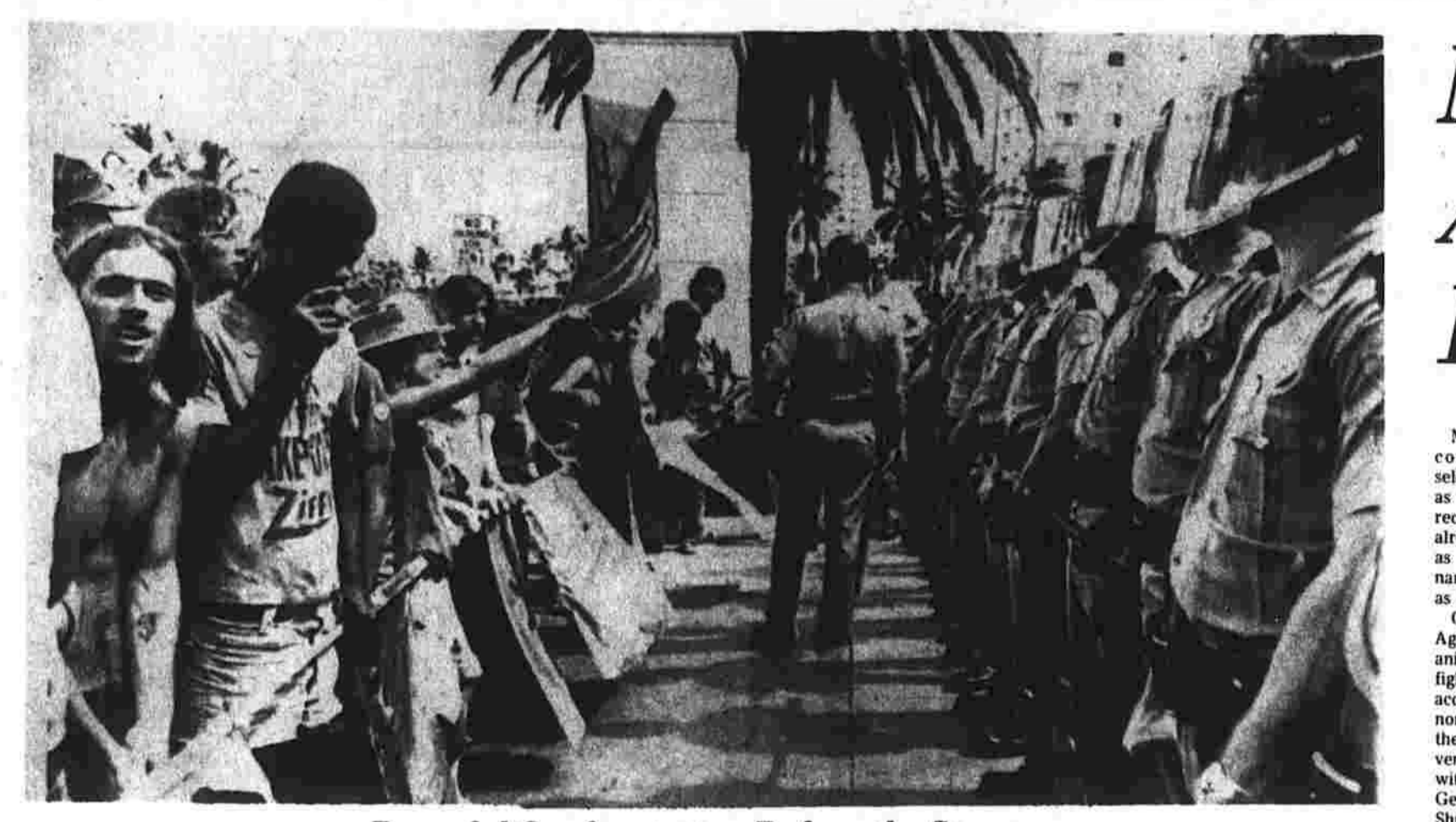

The Board of Education has decided to look into the possibility of purchasing a gasoline tank and pump since new legislation provides a "substantial tax saving" when gasoline is bought for school buses.

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Social Security

Q. I am disabled and get monthly Social Security disability benefits. Can I apply for Medicare to help me pay my doctor bills?

A. No. Only people 65 and older are eligible for Medicare. Q. I recently applied for monthly Social Security disability benefits. Do I need to have a new special medical examination before my application is processed?

A. Not usually. In most cases a disability determination is based on reports from your attending physician and hospitals where you have received treatment. However, additional medical evidence sometimes may be necessary before a decision can be made. Then, a person may be requested to have an additional medical examination, at no cost to him.

Q. I have been getting monthly Social Security disability for a little over a year. Next year I will be 65. Will my disability benefits increase then?

A. No. When you reach 65, your disability benefits are changed over to retirement benefits. But the amount you receive each month will remain the same.

Q. How old does a disabled worker have to be to receive Social Security monthly disability benefits?

A. There is no minimum age, but a minimum work period under Social Security is required to be eligible for disability insurance benefits. If a person becomes disabled before 24, he needs credit for 1 1/2 years of work during the 3 years just before his disability began. If his disability starts between 24 and 31, he needs work credits for half the time after 21 and before he became disabled. If a worker becomes disabled after 31, he needs credit for at least five years of the 10 years before the start of the disability.

Q. I was hurt recently in an automobile accident and I've been told that I'll be off work more than a year. I heard about disability payments from 50 and also something about a six-month waiting period. Should I wait six months before applying?

A. No. Although Social Security cannot pay disability insurance benefits until the seventh month after the month in which a worker became disabled, you should not wait six months to apply. Apply immediately, so your claim can be processed. Then, if you are found eligible for benefits, your first monthly check will not be delayed.

Japanese Advised U.S. Society Fades

LONDON (AP) — "That cheerfulness, kindness and eagerness character... once so typical of American society, have now faded here in Washington."

The Washington correspondent of Japan's biggest newspaper, Asahi, sent that report to his paper.

"What strikes me after several years' absence are changes in the American people's way of working," Asahi's man reported. "A sulky, elderly woman behind a drugstore counter operates in a hasty manner, saying, 'Who's next? Quickly, please.' When I pay my bill she does not even thank me." He added that without a good tip he hardly ever sees a taxi driver smile.

"The American peoples' sense of value is fading," the Japanese newsmen concluded.

Other foreign papers commented during the past week on such American topics as police in Vietnam and the travels of presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger.

Noting the departure of the last U.S. combat ground troops from Vietnam, the Montreal Star said:

"The United States still has not recognized this as a fight between Vietnam. The day after the last American ground combat mission ended, American B52 bombers carried out what the military command described as the heaviest raid of the war."

"The theory behind bombing is that it will end either an enemy's will or ability to fight. But five months after the resumption of the massive bombing, and four months after the sealing of harbors with mines, there has been little apparent effect on North Vietnam. Nor has it brought any closer the release of American prisoners, a precondition that President Nixon has set for peace."

Commenting on the U.S. bombing, London's weekly Observer said: "A small country is being subjected to the kind of aerial holocaust suffered by Germany and Japan at the end of World War II... America's allies and especially the British government... should urge the President to show restraint in the interest of humanity."

Balloon Crossing

ZERMATT, Switzerland (AP) — The first crossing of the Alps by a hot air balloon went smoothly except for one moment when upslope winds immobilized the craft over a peak "like a Ping-Pong ball on a fountain," the British-American crew reports.

Scotman Donald Cameron, who built the \$8,000 balloon, and American copilot Marc Yarry flew the 120-foot craft from Zermatt to the Italian town of Biella, near Milan, Monday evening.

The 46-mile flight, in perfect weather, lasted 2 1/2 hours. A crowd of 5,000 welcomed the balloonists when they landed shortly before dusk.

"They returned to Zermatt by car early Tuesday morning," said Martin Harris, the meteorologist who planned the flight.

"Everything went off smoothly except for one brief moment when they were caught between upslope winds over the Monte Rosa. It was like a Ping-Pong ball on a fountain. I told them to fly higher. They went up to 17,000 feet. After that, there were no more problems."

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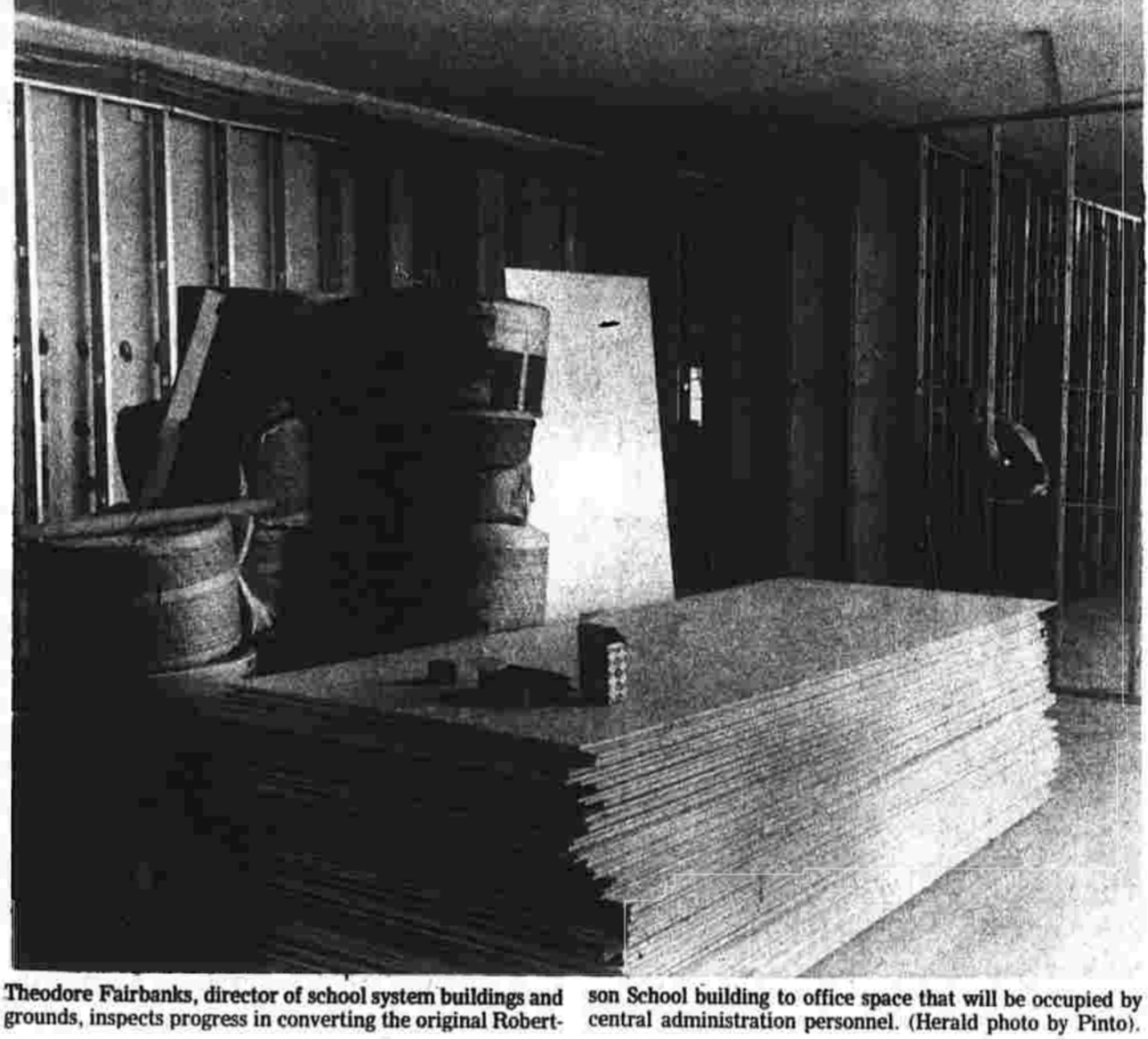

Andover PZC To Consider New Regulations

The Planning and Zoning Commission is making preparations to hold a public hearing on proposed new regulations regarding family campgrounds, commercial kennels and temporary permits.

Meeting regularly throughout the summer, the commission members have been drawing up new regulations to provide for these uses, which presently are either prohibited or vague in the current regulations.

The proposed regulations for these items were drawn after considerable discussion with townspeople, the zoning boards of other communities, and much research, officials report.

The town attorney has been asked to scrutinize the new regulations for their effectiveness and legality.

The zoning board hopes to be able to hold a public hearing on the proposed regulations sometime early in September, at which time the amendments will be presented to the people for their comments and opinions.

Following the hearing, the commission will take action on the proposed regulations, and if they are adopted as part of the town's zoning regulations, they will lift the moratorium currently in effect on both kennels and campgrounds.

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A New Concept in Driver Ed

 HARTFORD (AP) — In a few months, a beginning driver will crawl up an entrance ramp to the Connecticut Turnpike and gingerly merge left into the roaring line of vehicles—under the watchful eyes of a professional instructor with dual controls.

The state Traffic Commission voted Aug. 15 to change the regulation which bans student drivers from limited access roads. The new regulations must be published in the Connecticut Law Journal and reviewed before they take effect several months from now.

Until then, Connecticut will remain the only state officially opposed to training drivers in the kind of driving done by thousands every day.

"A 16-year-old can go down to get a license and drive home on I-91," says David R. Jacobson, driver education consultant to the state Department of Education. Jacobson says Connecticut's regulation against expressway training violates federal highway standards that must be met to receive federal highway monies.

The standards state that driver education courses must include practical driving experience in "handling emergencies" and in the "characteristics of urban and rural driving, including safe use of modern expressways."

Noncompliance with the federal standards could mean a penalty in funds, but apparently the standards are not enforced. The same standards also require compulsory motor vehicle inspections, which Connecticut does not have.

Last year, 25,011 students, or about 47 per cent of those eligible, took driver education courses in public and private high schools in Connecticut. But not one was given any practical experience on superhighways, Jacobson said. In fact, most of them only received six hours of practical experience—no slaloming practice, blowout maneuvers or other emergency procedures.

Expressway driving is "covered" in the 20 hours of classroom instruction. One chapter is devoted to expressways in the state textbook.

But parents who teach their own children to drive must rely on the state's driver's manual, which includes a three-page section on expressways—out of 69 pages of instruction.

"They have to learn by trial and error. It can be very dangerous," says State Police Commissioner Cleveland B. Puentesich, one of the three members of the Traffic Commission which changed the regulation.

"We feel that it is to everyone's advantage to have a new driver, the first few times he's on such a highway, to be aided by a driving instructor," Puentesich said.

Under the new regulations, expressway instruction would be permitted, but not required.

Even state troopers are not trained in high speed driving, although they do receive instruction in pursuit driving, Puentesich says.

After Dark Launch Due

WASHINGTON (AP) — Apollo 15 astronaut Alired M. Worden. It is about 400 miles northeast of the place where astronaut Neil A. Armstrong became the first man ever to set foot on the lunar surface.

The Saturn V rocket is scheduled to blast off from Cape Kennedy, Fla., at 9:53 p.m. EST Dec. 6. The lunar landing is scheduled for 2:55 p.m. EST, Dec. 11.

Mission commander will be Navy Capt. Eugene A. Cernan, 38, a veteran of 26½ hours in space. His two companions—civilian geologist De Harrison H. (Jack) Schmitt, 37, the lunar module pilot, and Navy Capt. Ronald E. Evans, 38, command module pilot—will be making their first space flight.

Cernan and Schmitt are scheduled to make three seven-hour ventures onto the moon's surface. They also will use the lunar rover, as did the astronauts on Apollo 16.

The first journey is scheduled to start about three hours after the two astronauts land, with the second venture scheduled for 5:13 p.m. EST Dec. 12 and the third at 4:30 p.m. Dec. 13.

Lunar liftoff is scheduled for 5:36 p.m. Dec. 14 and the astronauts are to start their return flight to earth at 6:33 p.m. Dec. 18. Splashdown in the Pacific Ocean is scheduled for 2:24 p.m. Dec. 19.

NASA said the mission will last 12 days, 11 hours and 31 minutes.

The longest previous lunar mission was Apollo 15 in July and August of 1971. It lasted 12 days and seven hours.

Tolland Elementary Schools Expand Individualized Instruction

Elementary school students attending Meadowbrook and Hicks Memorial Schools will embark on a more individualized instruction program than ever before.

The changes will be most noticeable at Hicks Memorial School where the IGE (Individually Guided Education) program will be started for the first time.

Third and fourth grade students at the school will be grouped into units together of approximately 125 children and five teachers, one of whom is a unit leader. Each unit will have one instructional aide.

The multi-age grouping is the largest step taken in the IGE program this year, which will affect staff organization as well as the teaching of word attack or phonics skills and math.

Hicks School Principal Andrew Winans added the local school will phase into the program over a period of about three years, a much longer period than was taken in Manchester.

Emphasis will be placed on what the student has learned, not what still has to be learned, Winans explained. This approach gives a student more of a sense of accomplishment.

Efforts will be made to teach each child on the level of instruction of that particular student, not just at an arbitrary grade level.

The IGE program has been thoroughly tested throughout the country and is supported by the federal government in the forms

Rham District Board Tables Action On Staff Wage Hikes

The Regional District Board of Education Monday evening voted to table action on the request of cafeteria Manager Mrs. J. Jurovy for salary increases for the staff ranging from 4.3 to 6.5 per cent.

The board wished first to ascertain from former superintendent Aram Damjanjan what the salary schedules are this year for other non-professional staff members.

Mrs. Jurovy, in her report, showed a surplus in the bank as of June 1972 of \$4,053. If the salary increases were approved they would amount to a total of \$678. This figure, along with an anticipated increase of \$2,500 in per cent in food costs, would still leave a surplus of \$874.

The board denied Mrs. Jurovy's requests to raise the price of extra milk for students from five cents to six cents and the adult price from 10 cents to eleven cents.

It did accept the bid of Knudson Bros., the only bidder, of 302 cents per 1/2 pint of milk.

Principal J. Colin Pushee reported that repair work on the fire damaged roof over the gymnasium area would begin some time next week.

He stated that delay in repairing the roof has been caused by difficulty on the part of Hunter Construction Co. in purchasing the special decking material needed for the job.

Pushee also reported that repair work will be necessary in the area of Room 33 where a stolen automobile last Thursday evening crashed into the outside door completely demolishing it and damaging the castings and the walls on either side.

Those responsible have been apprehended, he said, and, according to the insurance adjuster, the board's insurance policy will completely cover all necessary repair work.

Transportation

The board tabled action on a request from Pushee to furnish transportation for a student to Howell Cheney Technical School in Manchester in an amount not to exceed \$400 as required by state law.

Pushee was requested to investigate and make certain that the courses being taken by the student are not offered at Rham.

Bolton Schools Ready to Open

By JUDY DONOHUE (Herald Correspondent)

It's difficult to believe that the leisurely pace of summer is almost at an end and that school days are almost upon us. And thoughts of back-to-school shopping, ironing little plaid dresses and putting on "real" shoes in their eight weeks of bare feet, or at best, sneakers, are pretty remote. However, just two weeks from tomorrow it's back to the classroom for some 1,000 Bolton students in kindergarten through grade 12.

Dr. Joseph Castagna, Bolton school superintendent, notes that administrators, staff members, and building and grounds workers have been busy all summer preparing and improving the school year. McDonald's is the only new staff position added this year.

Full-Time Principal

The Center School will have a full-time principal for the first time: John Petrus, who has been serving as an acting principal of the elementary school complex.

Committee Reports

Reports of programs recommendations from two ad hoc faculty committees are expected early in the school year. Recommendations will be made for a revised report card and for introduction of a handwriting course at the elementary school level.

Out-Going Projects

Work will be continuing in several areas during the coming school year. A career orientation study committee which was formed last year, will be continuing its efforts to acquaint students with the world of work. Final recommendations are expected in the fall.

Family Life

Board members, staff, parents and clergy have been working for more than a year to develop a Family Life program for kindergarten through grade 12. A committee established last year has visited classes in other towns and is expected to make recommendations sometime during the coming school year.

Girls Interscholastic Sports

Another area which is being explored for implementation during the coming school year is the introduction of an interscholastic sports program for girls at the high school. At the present time, only intramurals are offered for girls.

Bolton's athletic director, Michael Landolph, expected to report to the board in the fall on the interscholastic possibilities for girls.

IGE

Work is continuing on the Individually Guided Education program to be implemented in September 1973. Bolton is one of several area towns sharing a \$49,000 state grant which will be used to develop programs, materials and objectives.

Several workshops are planned, including a three-day one week, which will familiarize teachers with aims of IGE, a program designed to allow each student to progress at his own speed.

Castagna noted that the program will be introduced into Bolton schools slowly, with only reading involved during the first year.

Bolton will not participate in Project Concern this year, Castagna said. The Hartford Board of Education has notified the town that the high cost of transporting children to Bolton has made continued participation impossible.

Physical Changes

Physical improvements to the school during the summer, in addition to general cleaning and painting of several classrooms, include refurbishing of the guidance office at the Center School, installation of air conditioning in the high school guidance office, and minor changes in the furnishings in the high school science rooms.

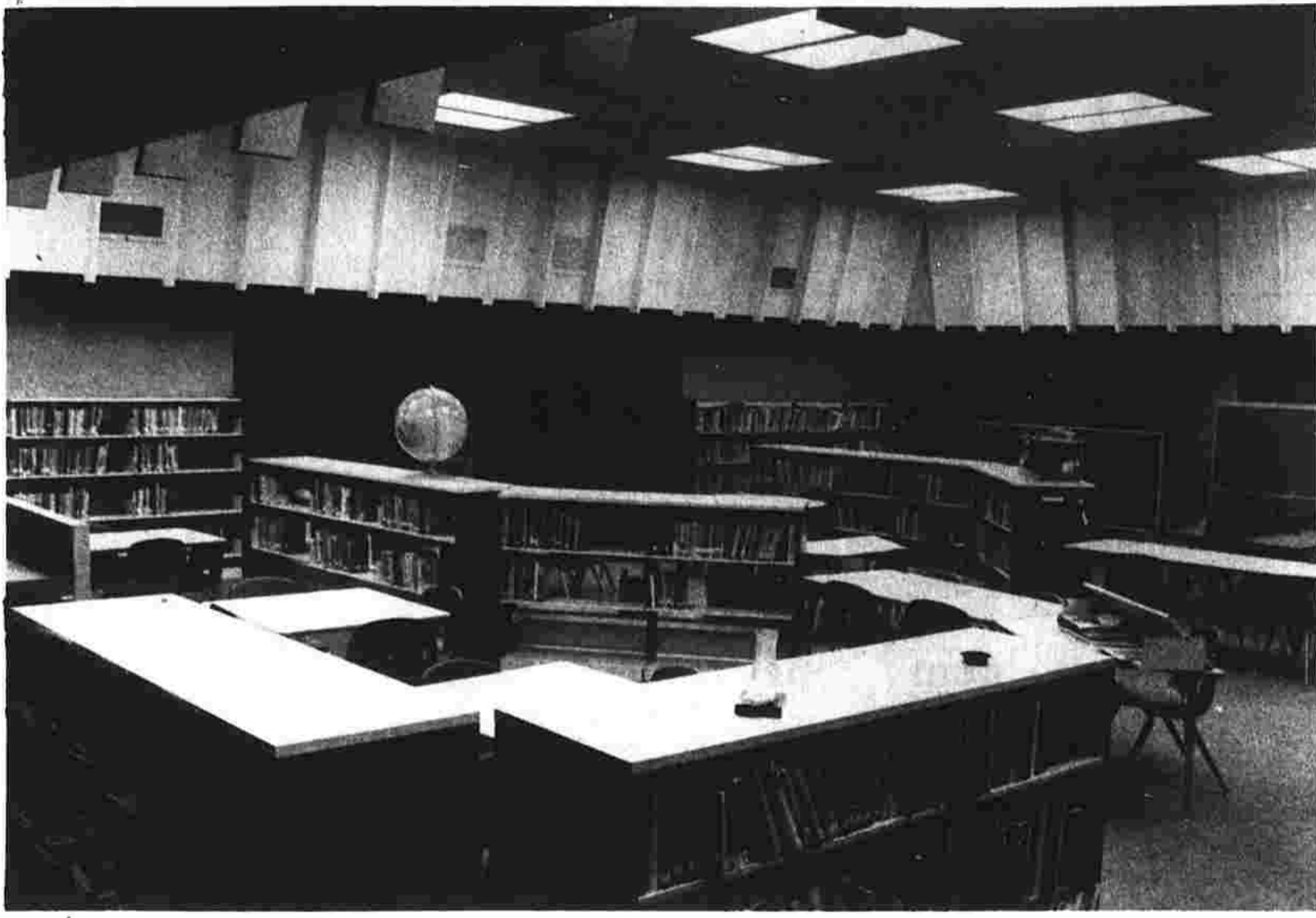

THE LINGALA CODE. By Warren Kiefer. Random House. 245 Pages. \$5.95.

This is subtitled "a novel about a murder." Well, it starts with the need for making money. Without realizing it, Tony lets people use him. He goes along, to be agreeable. Especially with his law partner Max, who has grandiose ideas.

Philly Mayor Outdistances Forecasters

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Frank L. Rizzo, the brain-talking ex-police commissioner, is halfway through his first year as mayor without the racial clashes or doom some critics predicted when he took office.

The city's first recent Italian-American mayor has pushed efforts that he says will "restore a climate for business and for all our people that will bring us jobs."

Rizzo's critics have questioned his ability to administer the city and heal the scars of a campaign that ended with voting split along racial-ethnic lines.

That question may not be answerable yet. But his first six months in office have been anything but routine.

Since January, the 51-year-old Democrat has: heaped praise on President Nixon and attacked Democratic presidential nominee George McGovern; set up a nationally disputed airport usage charge; officiated at the death of a plan for a 1978 bicentennial exposition; proposed city charter changes that would allow him to succeed himself in office; and changed the hue of police vehicles from what he called an "inflammatory red" to a less excitable baby blue.

Rizzo has also kept campaign promises to: not increase taxes; fire the city school superintendent; eliminate business nuisance taxes; and has received tentative approval of federal funds to add 800 more policemen.

The city's financial picture, however, hasn't improved much. Rizzo blames much of the trouble on former Mayor James Tate, who handpicked Rizzo as his successor.

"When we look office," Rizzo said, "we knew there were tremendous problems. This was an underestimate."

"We need a lot of money to stay afloat... but even if we should get all the money we need tomorrow," he said, "I rate as our first major accomplishment... the feeling both inside city hall and among the business leaders

and the people generally that we are turning this city around."

"White people elected Frank Rizzo because of his record of handling 'them people,'" says the Rev. Roland Jones, spokesman for a community organization in nearly all-black North Philadelphia.

Jones' group has charged Rizzo with dropping health and recreation facilities from his budget as punishment for North Philadelphia blacks who did not vote for him.

Rizzo has denied the charges.

The gap between Rizzo and blacks goes back to his days as police commissioner and was widened during the mayoral campaign.

He ignored them in his campaign. Many ignored him at the polls. The city's 23 black wards cast 131,596 votes for Longstreth and 50,580 for Rizzo.

Rizzo ran strongest in the non-black, Italian-American and blue-collar strongholds of Northeast Philadelphia.

Rizzo appointed no blacks to

his cabinet and only one to the few blacks appointed to lower offices appear to have little influence with the black community.

"It'll be a disaster if McGovern is elected," Rizzo said. He charged the South Dakotan with wearing "more hats than Sletson" in changing his positions to fit different audiences.

Rizzo's next two months may give a clearer indication of his ability to run city hall, however, as he tries to balance a record \$694 million operating budget. That budget, already needing \$113 million in state and federal funds to balance, contains no provisions for the \$22 million wage increases recently granted municipal workers.

But Rizzo is optimistic: "Federal revenue-sharing should bring us \$61.5 million this year," he said. "That's just about half our needs for outside help. But in spite of all that, I'm confident we will pull through."

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Funeral Notice Finds Brother

Over the years he tried to locate his brother, but never succeeded until last week — too late.

Henderson's wife came across the name Charles Herbert Brooks in the obituary column and began checking. She learned that the older brother moved to Ventura County eight years after Henderson and settled about 35 miles away from Ventura in the Simi Valley.

Henderson Brooks is in a hospital because of illness and wasn't able to attend his brother's funeral.

Saudi Farmers Grow Vegetables

By ALY MAHMOUD BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The days of scratching a living from small sandy plots of land near an oasis in eastern Saudi Arabia are over for Ali Maatouk and 102 farmers in the area.

A government project has reclaimed 10,000 acres of land, enabling Maatouk and others to grow a variety of vegetable crops never before available locally in the markets of Dammam or Al Khobar.

Leaky green spinach, stalks of celery, red cabbage, parsnips and squash are just a few of the 31 kinds of vegetables the farmers produce in commercial quantities.

When the project was getting started 10 years ago Maatouk worked three acres planted with alfalfa. Now he and his two sons own a comfortable farm of 20 acres that produce two or three crops of vegetables a year.

Maatouk has acquired a seeder, power sprayer, cultivating machine and a horse-drawn plow and is now thinking of producing honey for market from the 17 beehives he acquires from 20 acres that produce two or three crops of vegetables a year.

Saudi Ministry of Agriculture experts, aided by a team from the Arabian American Oil Co. (ARAMCO), conquered a common problem in Middle East farming — not drought but saline water.

Oil prospectors found well water at the same time they found oil. The farmer tries to use the water the same way he did spring water, by keeping it running.

It is considered unique for two reasons. First, it was elected by representatives of 194 Cuban refugee organizations of the most diverse stripes.

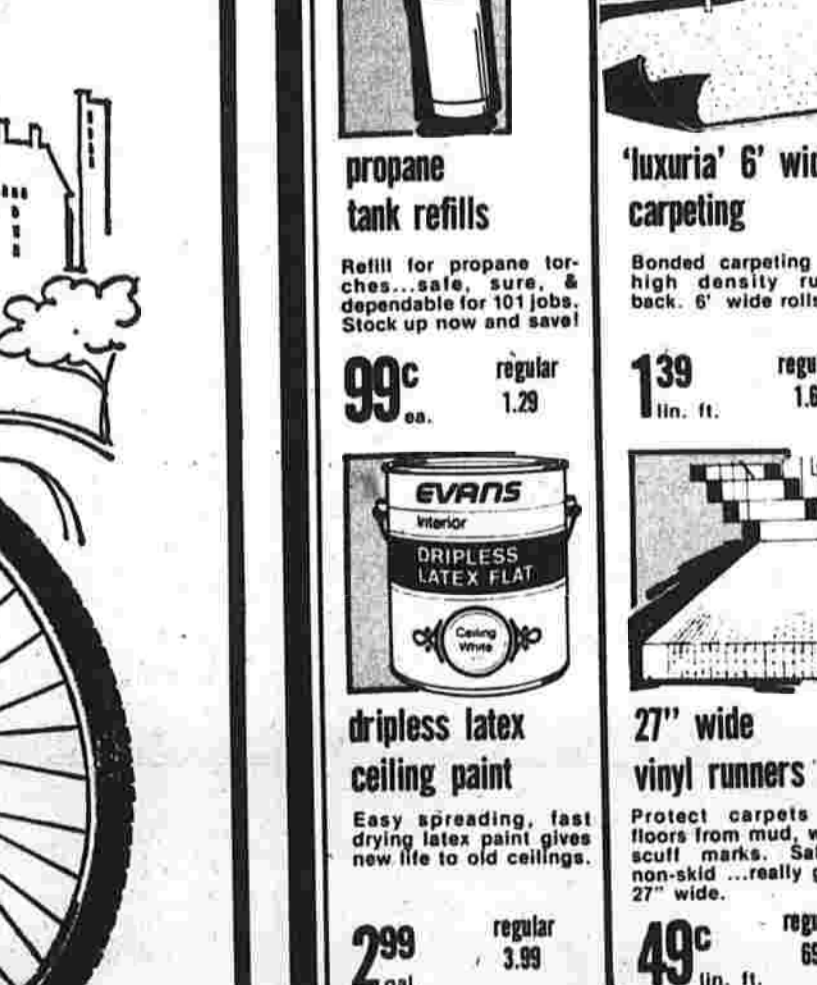
