

Coastal Blazes Calmed

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Fire fighters aided by cooler emperatures and lessening winds worked today to stem the searing march of four fires that have blackened more than 21,000 acres of brush and timber lands About 371 fire fighters

Thursday night checked a 1,760acre blaze which flared Thursday n Northern California's Sonoma County and destroyed eight homes, 18 other structures and 10 A spokesman for the state Division of Forestry said winds which

had gusted to 30 miles an hour died down long enough Thursday night to allow a quickly cut fire line to deter the flames from spreading to other structures in the Healdsburg area. While the fire had consumed mostly brush land, a few groves of California's famed redwood trees fell victim to the blaze. A stubborn four-day-old fire on inaccessible terrain in Ventura County north of Los Angeles con-

tinued to burn out of control. despite the efforts of nearly 2,000 men from several Western states. helicopters and a fleet of ground tankers and bulldozers were being used to fight the fire. The U.S. Forest Service said it could not estimate how long it would take to contain the 16,000acre fire. "We're a long way from containment," a spokesman said. Residents of the small community of Ojai were endangered for a time Thursday as the wind-

whipped flames forged to within seven miles of the town's perimeter. However, a Forest Service spokesman said today that Ojai no longer was considered in a danger zone. He said crews worked through the night to build a fire line but by daybreak had completed only five of the 24 miles necessary to harness the fire. The Case For The Nominee

One does not need to submit to the oratory at Miami Beach, with its well-planned and well-coordinated emphasis of the virtues of the Republican party and its nominee, to construct the case which seems quite likely to persuade the nation to the reelection of President Richard Nixon.

Nor does one need to subscribe to the idea that Mr. Nixon himself is some kind of beaven-sent superman, here to deliver us from all of our inadequacies. He himself is a difficult, complicated figure, with some prominent inadequacies of his own.

Finally, there is not the slightest need to try to base the case for the reelection of the President on any savage downgrading of the candidate who stands against him. Senator McGovern, in his perhaps confused, perhaps inept way, may stand for certain American thirsts which have a right to stand legitimate in a free society. He has a right to exist and to run; the main point, however, is that the case for the President does not have to be built on tearing anybody else down.

The case for the President has a rather unique distinction in the history of Presidential politics: there is a definite record for it to stand upon. The things President Nixon has done and the things he has in progres are visible, for people to accept or reject, reward or condemn.

He has been to Peking and to Moscow, and into all the explorations of policy such travels suggest. These were the kind of journey with the kind of exploration only a Republican President might ever have been able to dare to undertake. But many Republicans themselves are still not recovering from their surprise over the fact that it was this Republican President, Richard M. Nixon, who chose to do it.

He has, for good or ill, remade the

Supreme Court into something closer to his

own image, and sometimes this issue seems one which produces only liberal anguish on one side or continued conservative vindictiveness on the other. But many ordinary Americans, who have more historical sweep in their appraisal of issues than the politicians give them credit for, are willing to accept the fact that the pendulum, after having swung rather far out in one direction, has now been given a strong push in the Mr. Nixon, like every post-war President and one could almost say pre-war President

too, before him, has struggled with the economy, trying to show that it can be made to respond to policy and to leadership. One is never sure whether the economy does not keep on leading itself, following its own laws and instincts, no matter what anybody in the White House may do. But the one charge that cannot be made against President Nixon is that he has remained fixed, obstinate and unpliable in his reactions to those twin terrors of inflation and unemployment. And the statistics-the economic facts-are getting better, not worse, as election day ap-

On the greatest domestic issue this country faces, the question of its ability to keep its own citizens of varying heritage living peacefully together, President Nixon suffers from a fear that one trouble with him is that his heart is not really in the right place. This fear is buttressed when he seems deliberately to select a Southern strategy and so lends himself to dramatic and over-simplified positions on such symbolic issues as that of busing. This cannot quite be excused by the fact that those on the other side of the issue are equally wrong in acting as if they thought busing could prove to be any kind of pan-

But when we go back to the record of what has actually been happening in this country, as contrasted with the political maneuvering, we find that the basic trend in this country, which is toward more integration, more justice toward minorities, has not been halted or slowed down during the Nixon Administration, but has been accelerated, toward more and more living together and more and more equality of treatment and opportunity, and that, somehow, this has taken place without the violence which once seemed almost an inevitable part of what has to amount to a domestic revolution, if we are to survive as a society.

No one has to say the right words for him. He himself does not have to prove he can show a face on television which is without shadows, or show a stand on all issues which has been constantly perfect. It does not make great difference who his opponent happens to be. The record, what the people of this country can see and know has happened, ought to be able to win on its

Right-Facing The "Y"

The first portion of the \$77,000 which is being returned to the town as a sort of dividend from the North End Renewal project is being devoted, properly, to the town's fulfilment of one of the responsibilities it assumed in the course of the redevelopment program. This will be for the restoration of tennis and basketball court facilities for Robertson Park.

What remains in this very modest remainder from the main redevelopment project should be used obviously, to enable the town to fulfil another agreement it made in the course of the launching of the project. This was the town's pledge to assume responsibility for giving the Community Y a new facing, and suitable parking, for the north side of its building, which should now properly become its front entrance side.

Everything else involved in the North End project now looks the way it should, the way it was intended. But the proper appearance of the project will never be complete until the old backyard of the Community Y stops looking as if it were still the backyard.

The Wrecker Ordinance

Because people have a built-in disposition to sign petitions, especially if it merely calls for a democratic vote, it probably was not too difficult for those seeking to have a wrecker referendum to garner a goodly number of signatures. There have been charges that the issue presented was inadequately or even misleadingly described and there were unauthorized names on th petitions, but it seems likely that the legal equirements have been met and that herefore a referendum will have to be held The problem is with the law. It doesn't require that people understand what they are signing, it doesn't require very many signatures to get a vote, and there seems to e inadequate provision to have signatures validated. But it all goes back to the idea that the people should be able to petition redress their grievances, and we would not urge that this whole process be made too

It should be assumed that the Common Council will allow the people to vote on the issue, despite the fact that some \$3000 in city money will go down the drain as a result That's the approximate cost of holding an

It's therefore time to get the facts straight The issue is whether or not all operators o wreckers in Middletown should be rotated in order. The present law calls for each individual with a wrecker to be called in accord with the number of wreckers he ha in operation. The theory is a peculiar one, which if extended to taxis, funeral directors, ambulance companies, etc., exposes the disad vantages of the present law. As it is now written, those who have large businesse tend to stay large, and small firms with jus one wrecker don't get called very often. Thus, a city monopoly, or near monopoly i granted on the basis of size, and not service, cost, speed of arrival, or any other criteria that would reward performance. This is not to say that Gilletti's is not a good service, just the contrary is probably true. But it is a matter of one operator being granted a preference that seems hard to justify on logical grounds.

It may be silly that individuals have to run

out and vote to settle this rather picayunish issue, but as the law is now written it is a duty of citizenship. - MIDDLETOWN
