Six Fliers Missing Three U.S. Bombers Lost

SAIGON (AP)—Three American fighter-bombers were lost over North Vietnam last weekend, a fourth was downed today and six of the eight fliers are missing, the U.S. Command announced.

The weather over the North cleared somewhat Thursday and American planes flew more than 210 sorties, the largest number in a week. The Command said its fliers knocked out 25 warehouses, 15 bridges and 31 water supply craft.

Operational reports were being checked. "We have no evidence to indicate that we attacked the carrier, a deputy political commissar and three seamen were killed. It claimed that the boat was flying the Chinese flag and that American planes circled it at low altitude repeatedly."

Macaluso Quits Music Director Post at Bennet

Samuel J. Macaluso, instrumental music teacher and band director at Bennet Junior High School for 13 years, submitted his resignation, to take effect immediately.

In his letter of resignation to Allan Cone, Bennet principal, Macaluso said that he "will be a member of a seven-man music department with a student body of 1,400. The obvious opportunity for creativity that I will be faced with is that of music to good to pass up."

Macaluso's Level II grievance was denied June 13 by the superintendent of schools for personal selection of the appointee "as a bachelor's degree in music and one year experience. It is beyond my comprehension that my master's degree in music and 13 years experience could mean so little to the Manchester School."

more and more equality of treatment and opportunity, and that, somehow, this has to be done...

Right-Facing "Y"

The first portion of the \$77,000 which is being returned to the town as a sort of dividend from the North End Renewal project is being devoted, properly, to the town's fulfillment of one of the responsibilities...

This was the town's pledge to assume responsibility for giving the Community Y a new facing, and suitable parking, for the north side of its building...

Everything else involved in the North End project now looks the way it should, the way it was intended to be.

The Wrecker Ordinance: Because people have a built-in disposition to sign petitions, especially if it merely calls for a democratic vote, it probably was not too difficult for those seeking to have a wrecker referendum...

Richard M. Nixon, who chose to do it: He has, for good or ill, remained the Supreme Court into something closer to his own image, and sometimes this issue seems one which produces only liberal anguish on one side or continued conservative vindictiveness on the other.

Inside Nixon's Future Report Is Now

MIAMI BEACH—When President Nixon learned last Friday that Sen. John Tower of Texas was mobilizing to add a "right-to-work" anti-labor union plank to the platform, he cracked his whip for the first and perhaps the last time to discipline the 1972 Republican National Convention.

Mr. Nixon, at the Presidential retreat in Camp David, Md., instructed top domestic policy aide John Ehrlichman in Miami Beach to send word to the Platform Committee...

Moreover, Mr. Nixon ordered Ehrlichman to leave the definite impression, without stating it explicitly, that the President would publicly repudiate any right-to-work plank that was adopted.

What makes this Presidential intervention so remarkable is that the White House at the same time was letting the Platform Committee move rightward on housing, amnesty and other issues.

In greater contrast, the Nixon political operation was extracting itself from the tight over-shaping the 1976 convention while the President cracked the whip on the labor plank.

Historical parallels are dangerous. But the North Korean invasion of the South in 1950 and North Vietnam's Tet offensive may have something to tell us about the after-effects of Hanoi's current invasion and occupation of parts of South Vietnam.

In that 1950 occupation, the Communist occupation surfaced and became known to the citizens. With the retreat of the North Korean armies, the backbone of the Red underground also disappeared.

In these killings, the retreating North Koreans attempted to destroy all civilian leadership—teachers, farm cooperative leaders, minor officials, policemen, professional men.

"For this administration there is only one America," Vice President Spiro T. Agnew addressed the Republican National Convention.

The University of Connecticut will offer two 12-session real estate courses, starting next month, at Manchester High School. Classes will meet once a week from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

"Real Estate Principles and Practices, which will meet Thursdays, starting Sept. 14, is the first in a series of 16 courses in the UConn Continuing Education Services major certificate program in real estate. Successful completion of eight courses is required for the certificate.

The introductory course is designed to help students meet the educational requirements necessary for those who wish to take the state's real estate broker's license examination. Topics to be covered include physical, legal, and economic characteristics of real estate; law and economics; appraisal techniques; real estate contracts; financing of real estate; and governmental and social implications for real estate practitioners.

Gerard T. Wholey of West Hartford will be the instructor. "Real Estate Appraisal I" is taught by Richard H. Barry of Manchester, will meet Wednesdays, starting Sept. 12. It is an introduction to residential property appraisal and will cover basic principles of real property value, the appraisal process, and appraising as a profession.

Both courses have VA approval. Registration information may be obtained by writing to the UConn No-Credit Extension, Box US-REM Storrs 06268.

Bread Rise Kneaded?

Bakers say wheat has gone up from \$1.17 a bushel in mid-July to \$1.86 per bushel last weekend, at Kansas City, and flour from \$8.40 to \$9.70 per hundredweight in the past year.

Industry spokesmen also claim that federal export subsidies are another factor.

Creed urged that bakers be permitted to disregard profit margin restrictions "where they could preclude a price adjustment to reflect flour increases." He said it will be necessary for all bakers in an area to increase prices in order to prevent unfair price competition. Small and regional companies could increase prices without government approval.

Creed, meanwhile, is considering a bill to establish a Wheat Industry Council to promote demand for wheat products through a research and advertising campaign.

Planes Brush Border

SAIGON (AP)—American jets swept to within 35 miles of the Chinese border Friday and snuffed four bridges on the northeast railroad supplying North Vietnam from China, the U.S. Air Force announced today.

North Vietnamese antiaircraft guns downed an F4 Phantom flying fighter escort for the bomb attack but its two crewmen—two of the leading U.S. combat pilots in Vietnam—bailed out over the sea and were rescued in minutes.

Capt. Jess S. Feinstein, 27, East Troy, Wis., and Lt. Col. Carl G. Baily, 41, Denver, Colo., managed to hide their crippled plane north and east over the sea before bailing out, the Air Force said. A helicopter from Da Nang Air Base picked them up 20 minutes later.

Blue Cross Wins Hike

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut Blue Cross Friday was granted a 2.28 per cent rate hike for its 91,000 policy holders who are not members of group plans.

In handing down the decision, state Insurance Commissioner Paul Altamano said the new rate will become effective Oct. 1.

Blue Cross had sought a rate hike of 8.5 per cent, but Altamano said that was "excessive."

During hearings on the rate hike request, Blue Cross' bid argued it was at the mercy of spiraling hospital costs. Opponents said the nonprofit hospital insurer was doing too little to stem costs.

John S. Marha, Blue Cross spokesman, said that by the time the new rates would go into effect, the company would have losses exceeding \$250,000 in 15 months, the duration of the present rates.

He told the hearing in July that the rate hike "is designed to keep the company on a self-sustained basis for 12 months."

He argued that the increase request "reflects the fact that hospital costs continue to increase monthly."

Blue Cross is in the process of negotiating contracts that would allow for "prospective reimbursement"—meaning the amount of insurance payment would be agreed to in advance.

Police Arrest Suspect In 2 Hit-Run Deaths

Vincent A. Bedner, 53, of Parker Rd., Somers, was arrested by State Police yesterday on charges stemming from a hit-and-run accident in Manchester last Saturday in which two persons were killed.

Bedner was charged with two counts of misconduct with a motor vehicle and one count of evading responsibility. He was released on a \$5,000 bond, posted last night by a professional bondsman, and is scheduled to appear in Circuit Court 12 at East Hartford Monday.

The arrest ended a week-long investigation and search for the hit-and-run vehicle which struck and killed two persons on Interstate 86 at about 10:30 p.m. last Saturday.

Frank Granato, 16, of 111 Belmont St., Manchester, and Robert Palinski, 21, of Manchester, Mass., were killed by the hit-and-run vehicle as they were changing a disabled van to a pickup truck. The car which struck them, originally identified as a yellow or gold 1971 Hornet, did not stop.

State Police tracked the missing vehicle to a body shop in Stafford yesterday and obtained a search and seizure warrant from the Circuit Court. The car, a brown 1971 Hornet, was impounded and State Police later

obtained an arrest warrant for Bedner.

The search for the hit-and-run car centered on a section of headlights cowl found at the scene of the accident. A check with an auto parts firm showed that the cowl possibly came from a 1970 Hornet manufactured by American Motors.

State Police contacted American Motors in Detroit, and it was discovered that there had been 92,547 1970 Hornets sold in the U.S. American Motors was willing to provide police with a computer print-out of Hornet owners instead of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicle owners instead.

When it was discovered that the headlights cowl found at the scene was from a 1971 Hornet, the same procedure was followed to get a list of owners of the 1971 models.

The computer print-outs were distributed to police throughout the state.

The search was narrowed Thursday when State Police Sgt. Frederick Bird and Trooper Alan Wikitan of the Hartford barracks checked Hornet paint samples and found the color of the missing owners instead.

Yesterday, Trooper James McDonnell of the Stafford barracks found the car in a body shop.

Investigating officer for the case was Trooper Charles Levy.

State Checks Toll Booth Cheats

WALLINGFORD, Conn. (AP)—The state Transportation Department, hoping that all the bugs have been worked out of a new machine it has, has set out to thwart toll evaders on Connecticut highways.

The machine, which is the key to the state effort, is a toll gate that won't let a driver leave an exact change toll booth until it has received the exact change toll machine.

"We've worked all the bugs out of it now," a department spokesman said Friday, adding that the machine, which costs about \$13,000 to install, is being leased from the state's Department of Transportation.

The reason behind the experiment? Officials estimate the state loses about \$200,000 a month to people who evade and short-change the exact change toll machines.

"Installation of the gate is part of the department's overall effort to combat the problem of toll evasion," state Transportation Commissioner A. Earl Wood said. "We are acutely aware of the problem."

A 1971 study indicated that large numbers of motorists evade or short-change toll booths on the Connecticut Turnpike. Now, even after a special enforcement drive, the total loss is \$200,000 a year at the expressway's eight toll stations, according to a department spokesman.

In a highly publicized campaign last spring, state police tried to solve the problem by arresting toll evaders in Fairfield County. As a result, the spokesman said the rate of toll evasion at the Greenwich toll stations dropped from between 50,000 and 70,000 incidents a month to about 20,000.

"They've done a good job," he said.

New Storms Prowl Seas

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Thanks to a sharp-eyed satellite, hurricane forecasters have identified a breed of sea-going storm, half hurricane and half-tornado, they've dubbed it a "neutercane."

The National Hurricane Center in Miami issued the first warning on the mermaid of marine storms Thursday. It said Neutercane Bermuda was located over the North Atlantic 600 miles northeast of Bermuda.

Packing winds of only 40 miles per hour and moving along at 10 m.p.h., Bravo seemed an unlikely candidate for landfall, however.

"There is no potential for rapid development," said forecaster Joe Pellissier. "There is a chance, however, that it could evolve into a hurricane or tropical storm."

Before the advent of weather satellites, neutercanes were lumped in with cyclones and tropical storms. The ATSS satellite changed all that when weathermen got a chance to see detailed pictures of the ocean.

Neutercanes are smaller than hurricanes, have a different energy source and travel different areas of the ocean, according to center director Dr. Robert Simpson.

"Its identity as a circular storm often less than 100 miles in diameter ordinarily would go undetected except for satellite pictures," he said. "As a marine storm, it generally remains at sea, a threat only to shipping in its path."

Alpha, the first in the June-to-November neutercane season, carried gale force winds into Georgia May 27 but went largely ignored because it struck an unpopulated area.

Simpson said one neutercane last year mounted 100 m.p.h. winds as it passed off the Grand Banks.
