The University of Connecticut will offer two 12-session real estate courses, starting next month, at Manchester High School. Classes will meet once a week from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

"Real Estate Principles and Practices, which will meet Thursdays, starting Sept. 14, is the first in a series of 16 courses in the UConn Continuing Education Services major certificate program in real estate. Successful completion of eight courses is required for the certificate.

The introductory course is designed to help students meet the educational requirements necessary for those who wish to take the state's real estate broker's license examination. Topics to be covered include physical, legal, and economic characteristics of real estate; law and ethics; and real estate contracts, financing of real estate, and governmental and social implications for real estate practitioners.

Gerard T. Wholey of West Hartford will be the instructor. "Real Estate Appraisal I" will be taught by Richard H. Barry of Manchester, will meet Wednesdays, starting Sept. 12. It is an introduction to residential property appraisal and will cover basic principles of real property value, the appraisal process, and appraising as a profession.

Bakers say wheat has gone up from \$1.17 a bushel in mid-July to \$1.80 per bushel last weekend, at Kansas City, and flour from \$8.40 to \$9.70 per hundredweight in the past year.

Industry spokesmen also claim that federal export subsidies are another factor.

Creed urged that bakers be permitted to disregard profit margin restrictions "where they could preclude a price adjustment to reflect flour increases." He said it will be necessary for all bakers in an area to increase prices in order to prevent unfair price competition. Small and regional companies could increase prices without government approval.

Creed, meanwhile, is considering a bill to establish a Wheat Industry Council to promote demand for wheat products through a research and advertising campaign.

# Planes Brush Border

SAIGON (AP)—American jets swept to within 35 miles of the Chinese border Friday and snuffed four bridges on the northeast railroad supplying North Vietnam from China, the U.S. Air Force announced today.

North Vietnamese antiaircraft guns downed an F4 Phantom flying fighter escort for the bomb attack but its two crewmen—two of the leading U.S. combat pilots in Vietnam—bailed out over the sea and were rescued in minutes.

Capt. Jess S. Feinstein, 27, East Troy, Wis., and Lt. Col. Carl G. Bally, 41, Denver, Colo., managed to hide their crippled plane north and east over the sea before bailing out, the Air Force said. A helicopter from Da Nang Air Base picked them up 20 minutes later.

Feinstein has been credited with four MIG kills, his first of becoming the Air Force's short Vietnam ace. Bally has been credited with downing two MIGs.

The pilots fly protective escort missions for the fighter bombers attacking targets on the ground.

The bridges that were knocked out had been attacked several times previously but had been rebuilt, the Air Force said. In the latest raid, three were reported destroyed while a fourth had its approach cratered.

Spokesmen said F4 Phantoms dropped 2,000-pound laser guided bombs onto the 180-foot-long Cao Nung railroad bridge, 50 miles northeast of Hanoi, destroying two of the five spans and a pier. It was the fifth time this bridge has been knocked out.

F4 Phantom pilots also reported wrecking one span and a pier of the Cao Nung railroad bypass bridge over the Hoa river, about a half mile northwest of the main bridge.

Seven miles farther northeast, pilots beamed laser bombs into the southern span of the 98-foot Lang Dang railroad bypass bridge, destroying the section, the Air Force said.

The Air Force also reported that the approach in the main bridge was damaged.

# Blue Cross Wins Hike

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut Blue Cross Friday was granted a 2.28 per cent rate hike for its 91,000 policy holders who are not members of group plans.

In handing down the decision, state Insurance Commissioner Paul Altermatt said the new rate will become effective Oct. 1.

Blue Cross had sought a rate hike of 8.5 per cent, but Altermatt said this was "excessive."

During hearings on the rate hike request, Blue Cross' bid argued it was at the mercy of spiraling hospital costs. Opponents said the nonprofit hospital insurer was doing too little to stem costs.

John S. Marha, Blue Cross spokesman, said that by the time the new rates would go into effect, the company would have losses exceeding \$250,000 in 15 months, the duration of the present rates.

He told the hearing in July that the rate hike "is designed to keep the company on a self-sustained basis for 12 months."

Taking weekend respites from the campaign trail, President Nixon and Democratic nominee George McGovern relaxed at opposite ends of the country.

Before going to his home in Maryland's Eastern Shore, McGovern named five women to his male-dominated campaign staff and took the opportunity to accuse Nixon of "laughing at the rights of women."

President Nixon, relaxing at his San Clemente, Calif., home, was preparing for future stamping and a Hawaii summit meeting next week with Japan's new prime minister.

The Democratic presidential candidate Friday named Ann Martindell, who had been a chairman of the New Jersey convention delegation, as deputy campaign director, and Texas liberal Frances "Sissy" Farentholt as co-chairwoman of the largely non-party National Citizens Committee for McGovern-Shriver.

Rep. Bella S. Abzug of New York City, actress Shirley Maclaine were named co-chairwomen of the committee to advise McGovern on women's issue and Anne Wesley, who had been McGovern's convention floor leader, was named head of voter registration efforts, a job McGovern called "the most important single task" of his campaign.

"Do we want another four years of war under Nixon?" McGovern asked. "Another four years of unemployment under Nixon? Another four years of voting school bills under Nixon? Another four years of laughing at the rights of women and women's

# Olympic Games Open

MUNICH (AP)—More than 10,000 athletes from 123 countries will participate in the 20th Summer Olympic Games opening here today. The games continue through Sept. 10.

Some 60,000 spectators, including 35,000 students, are expected to be on hand as German runner Guenther Zahn lights the Olympic torch and the athletes parade into the stadium to the tune of a 60-man military band.

Forty-three athletes from Rhodesia, however, will not be competing. They were ousted from the Olympics last week by a vote of the International Olympic Committee, responding to pressure from black African nations.

The vote came despite the protestations of IOC president Avery Brundage, who had criticized a threatened walkout by black African nations as power politics unbecoming to Olympic ideals.

Greece, the Olympics' traditional home, will lead the parade, while Germany, the host, will bring up the rear. Between them, the nations will parade in alphabetical order.

West German President Gustav Heinemann will formally open the Games. The Olympic flag will then be raised, and the torch will be lit.

Finally, Heidi Schuler, a 22-year-old medical student and track star, will take the Olympic oath.

"In the name of all competitors, I promise that we will take part in these Olympic Games, respecting and abiding by the rules which govern them, in the true spirit of sportsmanship, for the glory of sport and the honor of our teams."

# New Storms Prowl Seas

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Thanks to a sharp-eyed satellite, hurricane forecasters have identified a breed of sea-going storm, half hurricane and half-tornado, they've dubbed it a "neutercane."

The National Hurricane Center in Miami issued the first warning on the mermaid of marine storms Thursday. It said Neutercane Bermuda was located over the North Atlantic 600 miles northeast of Bermuda.

Packing winds of only 40 miles per hour and moving along at 10 m.p.h., Bravo seemed an unlikely candidate for landfall, however.

"There is no potential for rapid development," said forecaster Joe Pellissier. "There is a chance, however, that it could evolve into a hurricane or tropical storm."

Before the advent of weather satellites, neutercanes were lumped in with cyclones and tropical storms. The ATSS satellite changed all that when weathermen got a chance to see detailed pictures of the ocean.

Neutercanes are smaller than hurricanes, have a different energy source and travel different areas of the ocean, according to center director Dr. Robert Simpson.

"Its identity as a circular storm often less than 100 miles in diameter ordinarily would go undetected except for satellite pictures," he said. "As a marine storm, it generally remains at sea, a threat only to shipping in its path."

Alpha, the first in the June-to-November neutercane season, carried gale force winds into Georgia May 27 but went largely ignored because it struck an unpopulated area.

Simpson said one neutercane last year mounted 100 m.p.h. winds as it passed off the Grand Banks.

In the pleasant after taste left by Channel 24's recent presentation of "The Spoils of Poynton" we have, after due credit to the controlled skills of Henry James and those of the British actors, decided that both the production and our enjoyment of it owed a great deal to two somewhat dated aids to the action of the plot.

There were trains, running spanking shiny out of London, stopping at all manner of minor and insignificant Poyntons, and on such schedule that a station master could tell when the next one was coming just by looking at the clock.

**1964 At The Farm; 1972 The Ranch**

Eight years ago, in the post-convention summer of 1964, the late Dwight D. Eisenhower contacted to receive at his Gettysburg farm, the Republican Presidential nominee he himself had not favored as his party's choice.

The visit was made into a campaign documentary, in which Senator Barry Goldwater and the former President strolled and talked, stiff and strange with one another, through the lawns of Gettysburg, and the thing was generally considered to be an Eisenhower blessing upon the Goldwater campaign.

The other day, down at the ranch in Texas, another former President, Lyndon Johnson, entertained a 1972 Presidential nominee he himself would obviously never have chosen. The concessions former President Johnson made to the occasion would seem less than those Eisenhower made to Goldwater eight years ago. The press was excluded from the visit; apparently no ambitious campaign film of the visit was made. And most of the talking about how wonderful the three hour meeting had been came from Senator McGovern himself, not from the gentleman who had been seeking to entice out into something more than the routine endorsement he related to the local press in Texas the other day.

**Inside Report**

Still, there was one thing, in the news picture which showed the two men sitting together, which might be interpreted as something of a Johnsonian concession.

The former President appeared in long, over-the-collar length white trousers, a handsome looking elderly hippie if there ever was one.

We would be surprised if Mr. Johnson soon summoned himself a barber and had himself have a hair cut and went back to a coiffure a little less flowing. But whether or not it was a special concession to the spirit of the occasion, he did have himself looking, on the day of the meeting with the Senator, real groovy.

**Fooling The Commentators**

One of the games the political parties play at their national conventions is rather hearty approval from some of us rough members of the general public who like to see our letters get their companions, is that of trying to fool those suave, all-knowing network commentators.

Each convention had the satisfaction of scoring one notable triumph.

The McGovern strategists at Miami Beach left the commentators high and bewildered when, in one of the opening skirmishes of the Democratic convention, they indulged in a sly strategy of trying to hold down their own vote. The commentators, who did really know what the vote would have been otherwise, were confused and caught helplessly by the maneuver, and by the time the strategy had been explained to them, it was another day and time for being expert on something else.

Cleveland B. 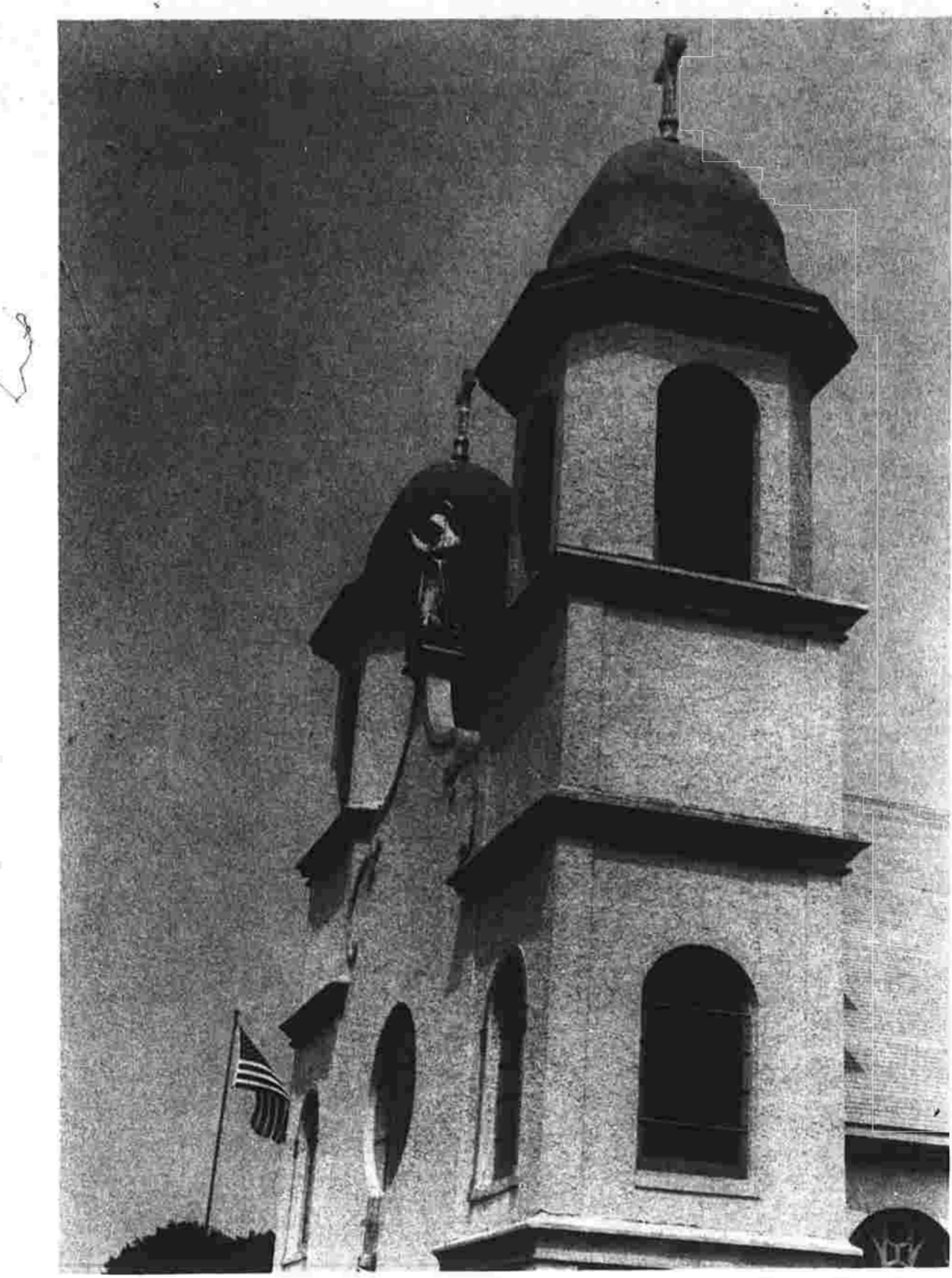

MIAMI BEACH — The bizarre choice of the politically discredited Mario Proccacio to head John B. Connally's Democratic bid for Nixon in New York explains why party leaders attending the Republican National Convention are so much less enthusiastic than President Nixon and the other moderate Democrats such as Atty. Gen. Andrew Miller might hang their hats on the Democrats for Nixon pole and ride out a Nixon landslide.

"We don't want to let the Andy Millers off the hook," one Virginia Republican leader told us, "and that's what Connally would do." The upshot: an announcement that Sidney Kellam, long-time conservative Democratic leader in their states, would be Democrats for Nixon vice chairman was quietly reversed. **Connecticut Yankee**

By A. H. O.

It may never get back to the physical action drama of the day when the late Morgan G. Bulkeley had to call for a crowsbar in order to gain entrance to the governor's office at the State Capitol, but the stand currently being taken by State Treasurer Robert I. Berdon, in his effort to stay inside the Capitol, could prove equally historic and even more important in the future development of state political life.

All Governor Bulkeley had to do, in his day, was bluff and bully his way past some Democrats who thought they had won the state election. It was a good bluff, but after it was all over, the state went back to the business of electing an occasional Democratic Governor.

In other words, no permanent change in the political custom and the political prerogatives was brought about, by the use of the crowsbar.

The battle State Treasurer Berdon is waging is, on the other hand, full of long term significance.

If he loses, things will never again be quite the same in Connecticut public life, because there will have occurred change, both symbolic and real, in the balance of power.

The order to State Treasurer Berdon to vacate his present offices in the State Capitol comes from the Legislative Management Committee and the General Assembly which is now the creature of the Legislative Management Committee.

So the power contest involved is between the specialized bureaucracy which now masters the legislative branch, and the executive branch as symbolized by the Constitutionally established office of State Treasurer.

The legislative branch and its managing bureaucracy need this kind of a check and balance to move more swiftly toward the much more significant advances the legislative bureaucracy, or the bureaucratic legislature, has in view.

This would be the construction of that grand new State Capitol complex in which there would be individual offices for every member of the legislature, along with the continually expanding personnel of the Legislative Management Bureau.

It is essential, in order to dramatize the need for that multi-million dollar expenditure, to demonstrate that just the Legislature itself has begun to bulge out of the poor old building which, until a few decades ago, somehow managed to house most of the state's business.

In order to demonstrate how it can overflow this building, the legislative bureaucracy needs more of the space for itself, which is why it has already taken over everything it could grab, and has even had eyes on the Governor's office itself.

Once the proper pressure has been created, and Connecticut taxpayers begin to obligate themselves for the untold millions it would take to build the new capitol complex, the present State Capitol would be maintained just as a sort of museum.

But first it must, at all cost, be made to demonstrate that it is much too small even for the staff of the Legislature.

Morgan Bulkeley with crowsbar at the door? Where State Treasurer Robert Berdon stands is more like the Grecks at Thermopylae, Hans Brinker at the dike, the Russians at Stalingrad, the French at Verdun. The odds are terribly uneven, but that's the stuff of which heroes are made.

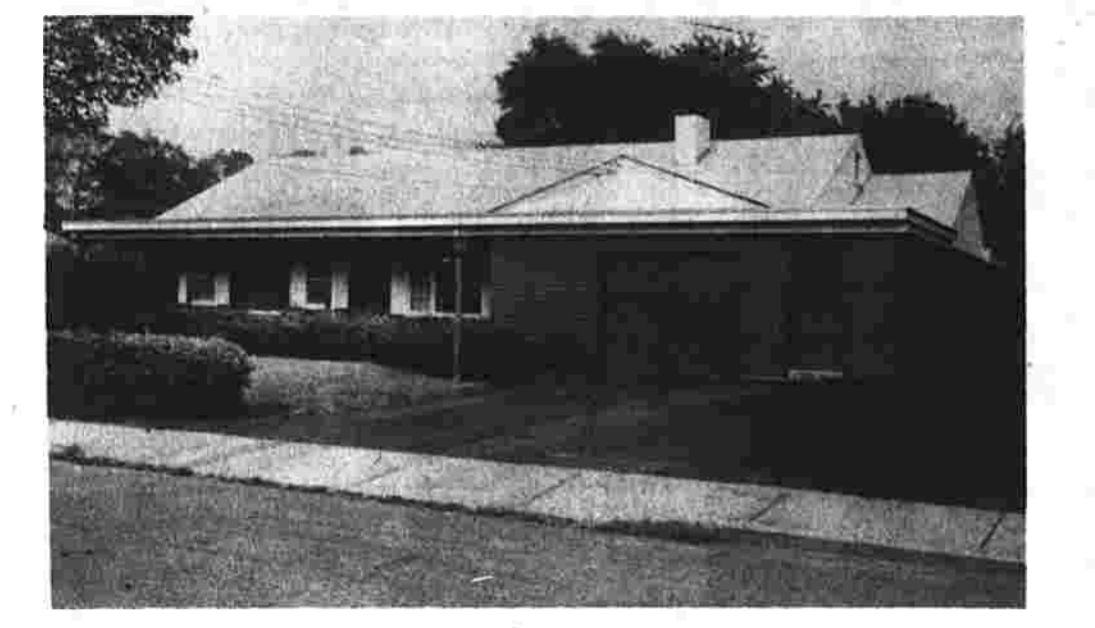

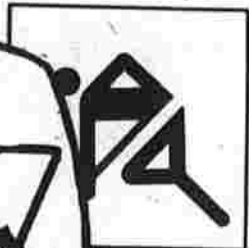
