## Union Pond

The restoration of Union Pond is a tribute to many far-sighted and dedicated Manchester citizens who recognized long ago that ponds like Union are not permanently doomed.

The successful completion of the project was rightfully marked at the dedication but the project's full value will be better assessed in the future when it will be more and more an oasis of nature in a growing community than it is today.

Two lessons are derived from Union Pond:

First, man can if he desires, reclaim and restore natural and scenic areas which has allowed to deteriorate if there are men and women in the community

willings to take the initiative and leadership to rally public support.

Second, Union Pond proves again the adage, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." While not an extremely expensive project as reclamation projects sometimes are, Union Pond's reclamation did cost approximately \$75,000. This wouldn't have been a pound of cure if it had not been allowed to become polluted in the first place.

Our thanks and appreciation to all those who over the years gave birth to the idea, nurtured it to maturity, and now have added another source of pleasure to our community while removing an eyesore. You all deserve Manchester's vote of thanks for a needed job well done.

## Anger and Frustration

We view the recent release of three Americans who were prisoners of war in North Vietnam with a mixture of anger and frustration.

It angers us to see men serving our nation used as pawns in a propaganda effort covering 12 days when they could have been home in a matter of hours after their release.

It angers us to think of this deliberate effort to exploit these men regardless of their own views in the eyes of the world; knowing that the United States, because of her POWs in North Vietnam and an unknown number of men missing in action, was relatively powerless to prevent this shameful exploitation.

We are well aware that the sentiment to end this miserable war is shared by most Americans. We cannot see or understand how the 12 days of headline hunting by the North Vietnamese and the anti-war activists who acted as the POW's chaperones has brought the end of the war one second, one minute, or one hour nearer.

It frustrates us that well-meaning Americans, high and low, can become so

obsessed with self-righteousness they violate the very same humanity in a perverted way in which they demand an end to the war.

It frustrates us that politics and political ends seem to transcend and we fear, prolong, this tragedy. The harsh reality is blatantly ignored. The President knows well that candidates find it easy to end wars but presidents do not.

It angers and frustrates us that private citizens do not seem to remember that fighting ends, reality ends, when both sides back off but rarely if one side turns his back and tries to walk away. We are certain that if there is a solution to this tragedy it will not come out of propaganda. The release of a few released POWs, political candidate promises, college lecture halls or church pulpits; but at a table and at a time when both sides must be willing to negotiate all the issues seriously. Until this occurs, it is our prayer that all wishing peace will become angry too if ever the propaganda charges to have undergone in recent days is repeated.

I do not want, need, or feel that in a democratic society I should be required to have Mr. Swank as a self-appointed guardian of my morals. 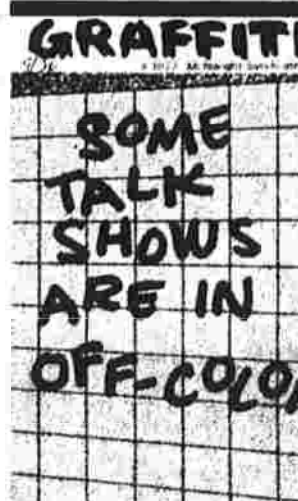

## Hebron ZBA Approves Request For Pet Fish Business

The Zoning Board of Appeals voted in executive session last week to grant a variance to allow Robert J. Mullarkey of Burrows Hill Rd. to operate a tropical fish business from his home with the following stipulations:

That there will be no outside display or storage of merchandise; that the business be conducted in the basement of the dwelling; that there be no on-street parking.

Also that there will be only one non-illuminate sign no larger than four square feet; that the business be restricted to tropical fish and associated accessories; and that the variance is not transferable.

### Vernon Town Sets Up Voting Areas

The Town Council passed a resolution last night establishing five voting precincts, in this case termed "divisions," for Vernon, with a polling place designated for each division. These are in effect only for this year's election.

The Town of Vernon is divided into three assembly districts, one complete within the town, and containing three voting divisions, with the other two being parts of assembly districts which extend outside of the town. Each of these two contains one voting division in Vernon. The assembly districts are in accordance with the apportionment plan ordered by Superior Court Judge Walter Sides.

Some councilmen expressed dissatisfaction with the court-ordered plan because it so divides the town. However, Mayor Frank McCoy stressed that last night's resolution simply provides the polling places and that the town would amount to disenfranchising the voters.

Two councilmen abstained and two voted against setting up the five voting divisions, however, the resolution was passed and five schools named as polling places.

The 55th Assembly District which extends into Vernon as well as Bolton and some surrounding towns includes Vernon's fourth voting division. The polling place is the Lake Street School.

The 56th Assembly District is all in Vernon and includes voting divisions one, two and five, with voting for division one at the Sykes School cafeteria; division two at the Maple Street School and division five at the Vernon Elementary School.

The 57th district includes the third voting division with voting to take place at the Skinner Road School. The 57th district extends into Ellington and East Windsor.

The problem is letting the voter know in what voting division he resides so he'll know where to vote, and what assembly district he's in. The problem will hopefully be solved by placing 500 maps, which have already been printed, in stores and public places and by publishing lists of streets and divisions. The news media was asked by councilmen last night to cooperate in solving what may well be a continuing problem for the many electors whose polling places have been changed.

Candidates for the 55th Assembly District are Cynthia Wilson, Democrat, of Hebron, and Dorothy R. Miller, Republican, of Bolton.

Candidates for the 56th all-Vernon district are Thomas Dooley, Democrat, and Peter Dureiko, Republican.

Candidates for the 57th district are Iris Stein, Democrat, and Daniel McKeever, Republican, both of Ellington.

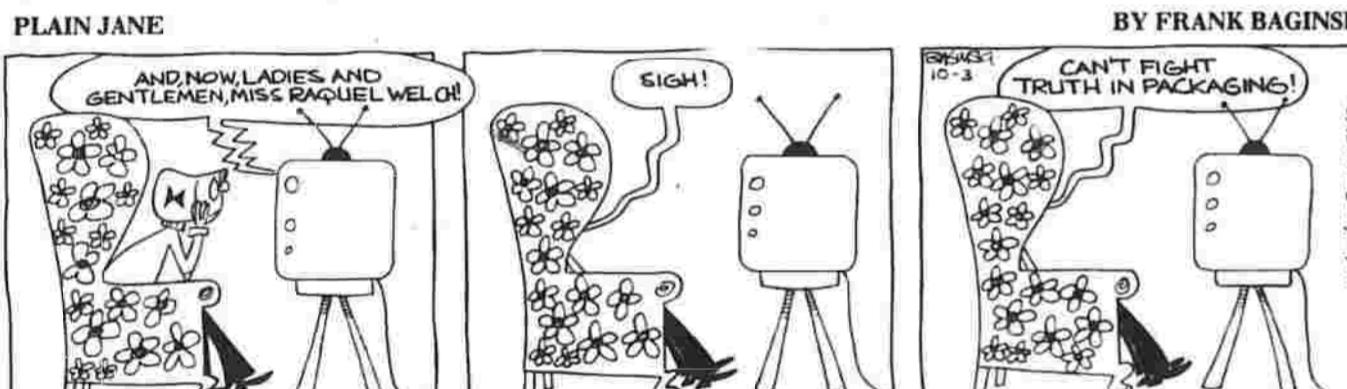

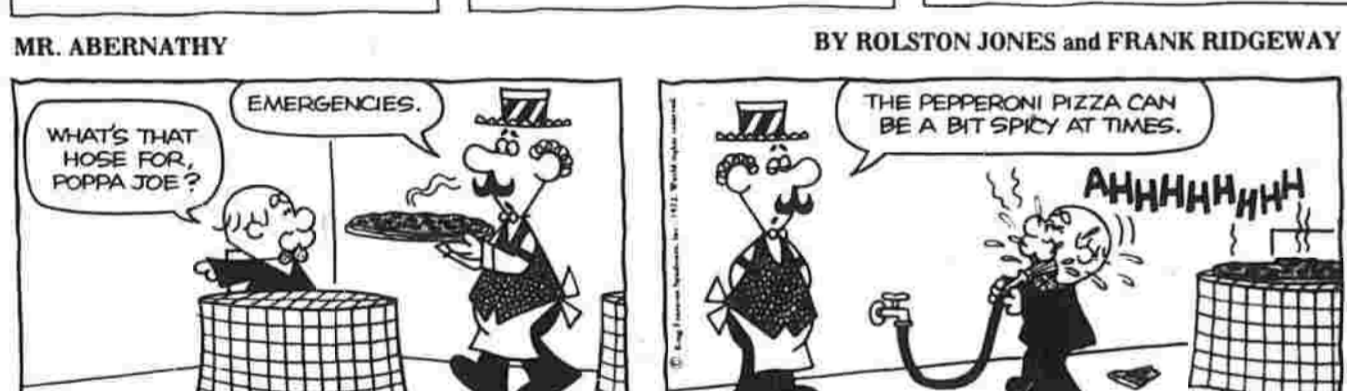

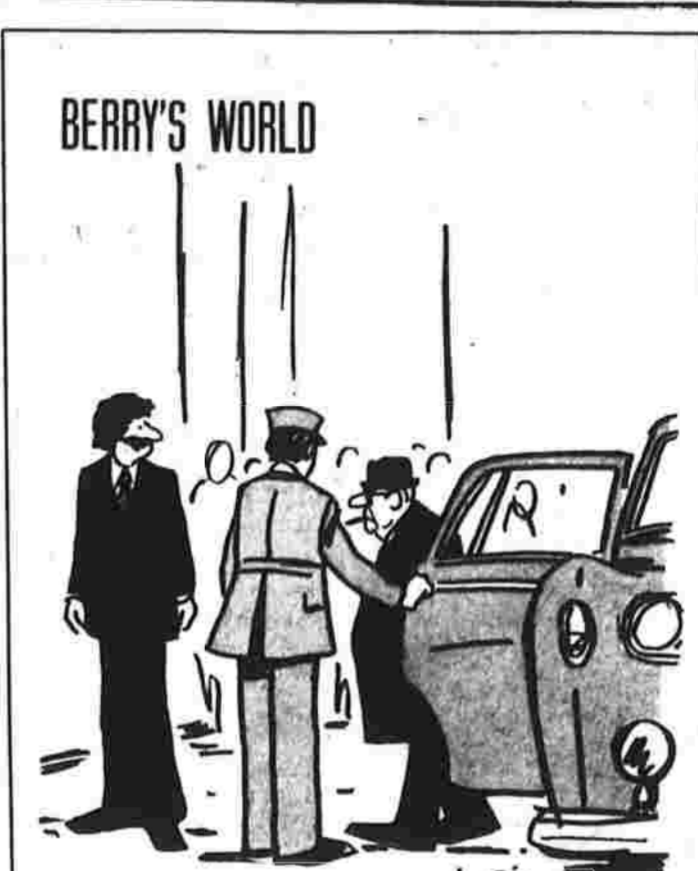
