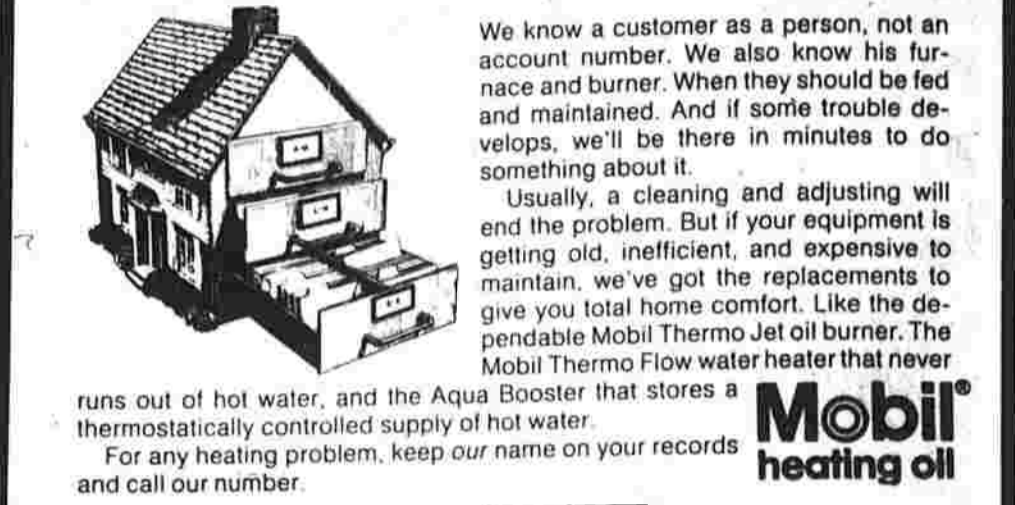
Thieu Condemns Peace Proposals

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## United Nations Day

To some it is a hoax. To others a disillusionment. And to many a propaganda springboard. But to others it is the last faint hope that man perhaps someday in some way can learn to live and work together.

The United Nations, it is true, has fallen short of the idealistic high, and perhaps unrealistic, goals its creators conceived for it in the waning days of World War II.

Perhaps it can be criticized for many acts of commission and omission over the years as men through this international organization have tried to promote the cause of peace.

And there is no doubt the UN has been abused and misused by its members when national interests and national prejudices came into conflict with UN solutions to international problems.

Today, the world is marking United Nations Day and pointing out once again the goals of the organization which are

to promote peace and harmony on this planet. We may not be any closer to achieving these goals today than we were a year ago or 20 years ago; but one thing must be recognized.

While the peoples and nations of the world may not be embracing the United Nations concept without qualification; there are few, if any, that would abandon the UN and return to a world without it.

However fragile and remote the hope for world peace may seem, the continued existence of the United Nations indicates that hope is still nourished deep in the hearts of most men and given time, patience and understanding; mankind may yet mature enough to translate this nagging and gnawing desire in each man for peace into a just and lasting peace among nations and peoples. If and when this state of civilization can be achieved, then and only then can the full and true value of the United Nations be assessed.

## Capital Fare

Citizens Crusade

WASHINGTON—When a new effort called the Citizens Crusade Against Crime urged last August

in relative privacy—that the Selective Service System draft young men to serve as policemen in our crime-ravaged cities, the reaction here was come ON, Citizens Crusade, who needs dreamers.

But now, I mean, if Richard Nixon and George McGovern can have 42nd thoughts about their positions on everything from Communism to abortion, a plain citizen should be permitted a second mental go-round in the

problem of having to hire a bodyguard every time he steps out for a breath of alleged air. To wit, if possible the Citizens Crusade is out on something?

First off, the Crusade cannot be dismissed as a collection of kooks. Its policy committee includes the hard-bitten strategist, Cleveland Amory. Fr. Thomas McDonald, professor of sociology at Fordham University, Vincent Baker, coordinator of anticrime activities for the NAACP, and Herbert Schenker of the Legal Aid Society's Criminal Branch Section. No nuts in that bunch.

Besides, it's time to acknowledge that nothing else has worked. President Nixon has taken a tougher line and has put four law-and-order types on the Supreme Court. He has spent more than a billion dollars to implement some of the 200 recommendations of his Commission on Law Enforcement and What Have We Got? We've still got crime—enough for two countries this size.

This, one of the crying needs for more cops. Whatever the basic causes of crime, one must agree with the Crusade's argument that more policemen on the streets will decrease street crimes, while the psychologists, sociologists and politicians are studying the problem. Drafting cops might not be a long-range solution, but most of us would settle for a touch of short-range stuff.

So our cities should hire more men in blue? Most of the city are bankrupt, or on the verge thereof. Take New York City, with a force of 30,000. Its police commissioner says it's impossible to provide a foot patrolman for every patrol post because it would require a police force of 100,000. The cost would be \$20-million for each additional 1,000 patrolmen in a town that can barely afford to turn on its lights at night.

In depressing fact, only the federal government has the resources and the machinery for filling this national manpower gap. The Citizens Crusade Against Crime suggests that if young men can be drafted to fight in a foreign war they can be drafted "to fight in a war that is experienced with him, he is a sincere and honest person with good common sense who will faithfully represent the citizens in the district.

Nixon's Tough Terms

WASHINGTON—The most important single fact now discernible in the swirling mystery of the Vietnam peace talks is President Nixon's confidence that, contrary to much speculation, the Vietnam peace talks in Paris will emerge from any settlement with his power virtually intact.

The conviction on this point held by the Nixon administration tells much about Mr. Nixon's own view of the American bargaining chip. That view is that, while South Vietnam will emerge from any settlement with its power virtually intact, it will emerge with its power virtually intact.

What Thieu wants has long been obvious: open-ended use of American bombs to carry the full cards, including the priceless card of time. Hanoi may have decided that a cease-fire or an interim settlement is essential, and essential now, on whatever terms it can get.

Thus Hanoi, not Washington, has been primarily responsible for the extreme urgency of the present negotiations which have kept Henry Kissinger shuttling from Washington to Paris to Saigon in history's longest floating peace talk.

Accordingly, Kissinger's problem with Thieu is not to force him to share power in Vietcong's National Liberation Front in a coalition government and certainly not to entice him into any tripartite government of national concord, as Hanoi wants.

The problem with Thieu, to the contrary, is to convince him that a settlement will not destroy his credibility as South Vietnam's leader either before, during or after the elections which Mr. Nixon has promised as part of his peace proposals.

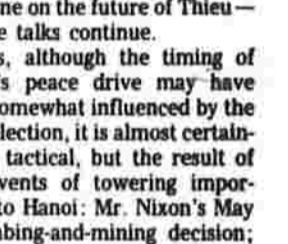
Even though that problem is infinitely less difficult than persuading him to share power in a "coalition" government imposed by Washington, it is not soft touch, as the Saigon negotiations between Kissinger and Thieu have proved.

For what the U.S. must accomplish, if the Nixon plan is to succeed, is to convince all the

competing and disparate political forces in South Vietnam—including Communists and third-party neutralists—that U.S. withdrawal from the war does not mean U.S. withdrawal from Thieu, either at the time of withdrawal or in the future.

It is fearful that his power and authority will start to disintegrate the moment it becomes clear that the U.S. is on the way out of the war.

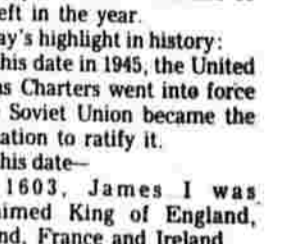

## South Windsor Sklenar Hits at Democrats for Barring Fitts from Post

Robert Sklenar, Republican Town Committee chairman, has taken issue with the majority Democratic Town Council's denial of a seat on the Charter Revision Commission (CRC) for councilman Howard Fitts (R).

Last week, at the council meeting, Councilman Leonard Soriatask asked for consideration to abandon the previously approved resolution for a seven-member commission and allow a nine-member panel.

According to the state statutes, only one third of the selected commission can be appointed or elected town officials.

The Democrats named Deputy Mayor Robert Smith; Atty. Edwin Lassman, a member of the Personnel Policy Commission; Mrs. Doreen Wood and William Young.

The Republicans named Allen Coffey and Atty. Daniel Cavanaugh, and asked for special consideration of Howard Fitts, an elected councilman.

After a motion to change the resolution was denied, a five-minute recess was called and the councilman returned to select each individual by a hand ballot. The four Democrats were named and approved and the name of Peter Nicholas was substituted for Fitts.

Sklenar called this action a "blatant display of unfair, unreasonable, and irresponsible behavior on the majority here in South Windsor."

He said the bid of Soriatask to compromise by increasing the size of the commission, followed by the rejection by the majority council, was a "viable confirmation that the Democrats have no intention of cooperating with minority Republican representation for the good of South Windsor."

Sklenar said that Republicans made it a point to live within the state statutes by restricting Republican membership to only one elected or appointed official,

and the recent Democratic action has deprived the people of the representation from the Republican side of the aisle.

"Fitts was the logical choice for the commission due to his many years of public service," Sklenar said. He further stated it was not a question of having just another councilman "but rather of having the best councilman for the job."

"Although the Democrats would have people believe they are wearing white hats, it is now widely known those 'hats' got soiled Monday night."

the problem, "but will increase the cost of the solution."

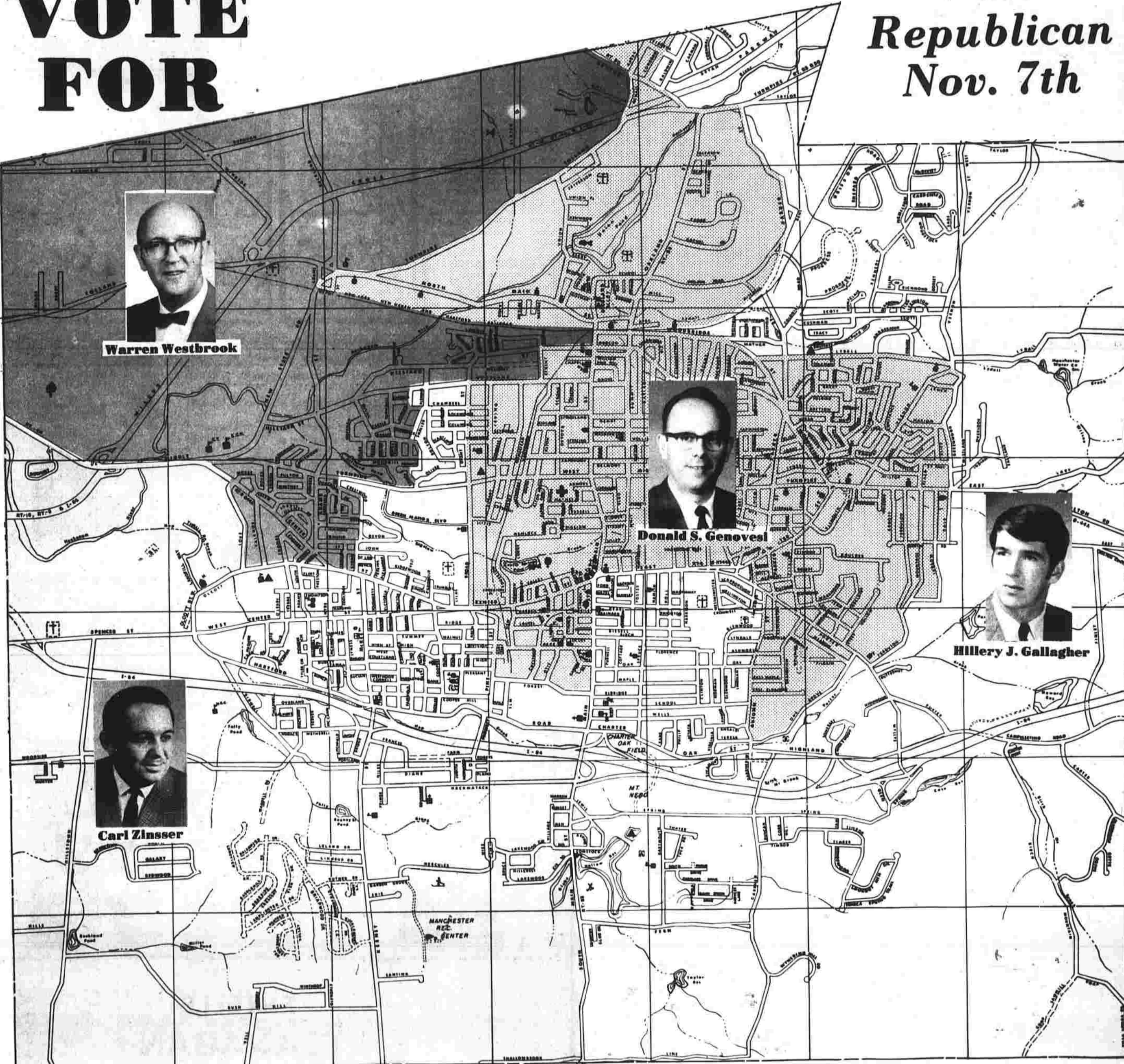

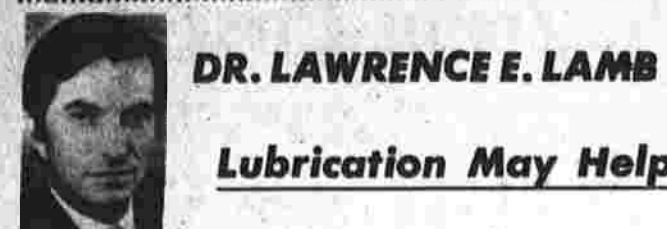

### DR. LAWRENCE F. LAMB Lubrication May Help More Advice on Nose Bleeds

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.  
Dear Dr. Lamb—Your comments about nose bleeds remind me of a similar experience I had about a year ago. I had intermittent but persistent nose bleeds for about a week. The difference was I am an adult. Two specialists handled my case. They checked my blood pressure and suggested that the air in my home was too warm and dry. They cauterized twice, but still had nose bleeds. Finally the doctor gave me a prescription for medicine which he told me was for my blood, and also told me to get a tube of surgical lubricant. I used the small finger to rub this into each nostril at night before retiring. The doctor thought the medicine solved the problem. Packing also was always effective.

Dear Reader—My faith in the fundamental goodness of people and their desire to help others is always restored by the many letters I get from readers making helpful suggestions about other people's problems. I received a lot of suggestions about nose bleeds. It is true, particularly in older people, that the lining of the nose may dry out. The scaly scabs inside are irritating and may bleed. They also stimulate people to pick their noses, causing bleeding. Any good lubricant in the tip of the nose will help solve the drying out problem. A petroleum base jelly or Vaseline is useful or any of the surgical lubricants. The idea is to keep the lining soft and retain the natural moisture in the cells below the surface of the lining. The lining of the nose is most apt to dry out during the winter months when the humidity is sharply decreased in many heated houses. The air tends to dry out the nasal passages.

The University's Senate Committee on the Budget said Monday in its annual report to the state that limited enrollment is urged "to protect the quality of teaching and research and to encourage a sharing of the burden of financial stringency by the public at large."  
However, the committee said the university's administration has not been receptive to an enrollment limitation.

Manchester and West Hartford Police are investigating the alleged abduction and beating of a 21-year-old Manchester man Monday afternoon.

### South Windsor Mrs. Rossi Favors Plan Of May 16

Board of Education member Mrs. Margaret Rossi has looked at the "flaws" in the \$1.9 million high school addition proposal and said she is not about to accept a "bargain basement plan."  
In a prepared statement she said she "certainly recognizes the need to increase core facilities, special areas, staff and classrooms, student traffic flow, storage, parking and driveway areas at the South Windsor High School," but added that on May 16 the board reviewed three proposals and chose the one she believes would have incorporated all the necessities. This plan, she said, contained a split-level library with 23 large classrooms, ample ramp and corridor space within a 36,241 square foot structure.

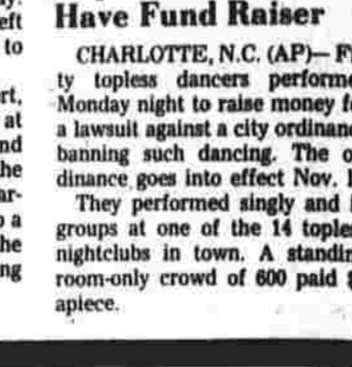
According to Mrs. Rossi, the proposed plan houses a two-level library, 23 minimum size classrooms, and narrow ramps and corridors in only 33,932 square ft.

She says that in the compromise to save on required square footage, the school system will be hung with duplication of staff and aides in the library—and asked, "Where then is the savings when you cut 2,309 square feet of space?"

In comparing the proposed addition to the May 16 plan, she adds that the accepted plan includes a two-station teaching gymnasium and an adaptive teaching station, while the original plan included a three-station gymnasium with a 2,000 seating-capacity bleacher and adequate storage and shower facilities in 21,800 square feet of space — a plan she says was favored by the person closest to the situation, High School Principal Ralph Conlon.  
With the \$1.9 million plan, she said, the present adaptive teaching area will have to have a shower and storage facilities linked to the gymnasium by a "miserable long corridor" and no additional bleachers.  
Mrs. Rossi said that the May 16 plan was certainly more expensive, but the proposed plan, "will, in the long run, be educationally and financially more expensive to the residents."

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### Pakistanis Find Fasting Expensive During Ramadan

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistanis are finding that fasting is expensive.  
This is the holy month of Ramadan for Muslims. During daylight the pious abstain from food. Yet prices have shot up.  
The Morning News, owned by a government trust, accuses shopkeepers of "matching the mood of piety with one of profiteering."  
The newspaper points to a paradox: the more Muslims fast, the more they eat — at night. It says a typical family at Ramadan may increase its consumption 25-30 per cent, "and this puts the normal supply and demand situation out of gear."  
But the paper says blame for rising prices rests on exploitation by merchants who create the fear of artificial scarcity.  
Eating that is commonplace the rest of the year becomes a ritual in Ramadan.  
According to the traditional obligation, no Muslim takes food or water from the time it becomes possible to distinguish between a white thread and black thread at dawn until one cannot see the difference at sundown.

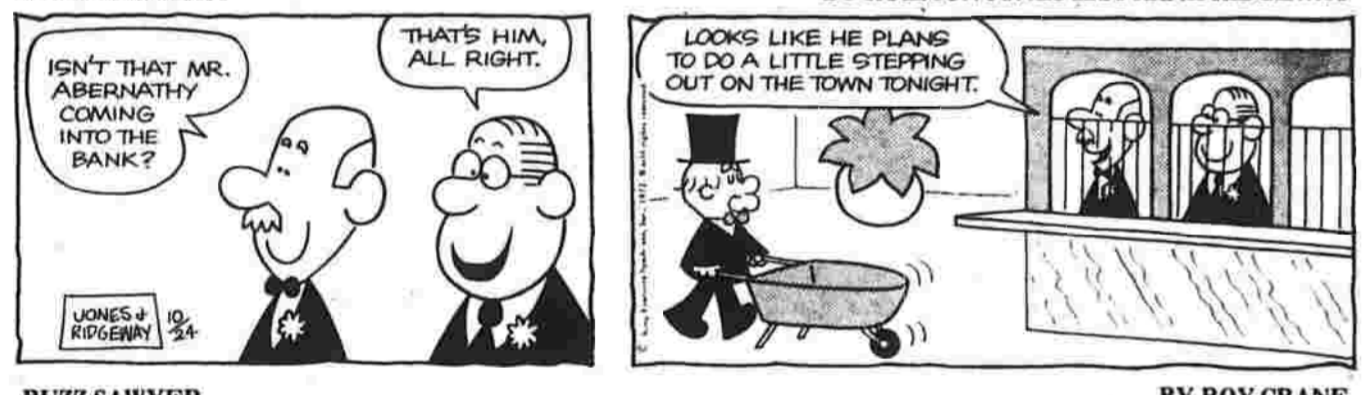
