



He explained if the person is an hourly wage earner he will "pay" for naving received the ticket even though the charges are dismissed. 'This cannot be permitted to

continue," Dooley said.

Dooley further explained that the solution lies not merely in establishing more frequent and more efficient sessions but in the elimination of part-time prosecutorial and defense services. "There is no reason why the Circuit Court, which affects more of our citizens than any other tribunal, cannot follow the example of our Superior Court and phase out these part-time court officials, he added.

Dooley further said, "It is impossible for those who do not devote full time to these duties to keep abreast of recent developments in these fields." He further added that one cannot efficiently and properly serve both extensive and critical Circuit Court duties as well as a deman-ding private law practice. "What we should be seeking is better without it we cannot attain better justice," Dooley cautioned.

Noting that private organizations such as the League of Women Voters and the Council of Churches, have long advocated reform in these areas, Dooley said, "The time for the legislature to act is long overdue." "I intend to introduce legislation which will meet these needs and shall also follow through to see to it that these measures are enacted into law during the, next legislative session," he concluded.

BRIDGEPORT (AP) - The Bridgeport Transit District has told its bus commuters to leave the bus service up to the

The Bridgeport area, along with Waterbury and New Britain, has been without regular bus service since the Connecticut Railway and Lighting Co. suspended service Oct.

Now the Bridgeport Transit District says it will provide interim bus service on the major routes normally served by CR&L beginning Tuesday.

District Chairman Salvatore B. Curiale said Friday that the plan, effective at 6 a.m. Tuesday, will make maximum use of the four other Bridgeport area bus companies the Gray Line, the Chieppo and Stratford bus companies, and Bridgeport Auto Transit.


