Current Birthday Customs Stem From Ancient Times

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — In celebrating the February birthdays of George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, Americans are helping to keep alive what was once a custom reserved only for royalty.

No records were kept in ancient days of the birth dates of the common people, so that only knowledge of such events was the annual celebration of the birthdays of royal personages, according to Hallmark Cards researchers.

But today children of the poor and the rich and adults in all walks of life over the world enjoy familiar birthday times, light candles on birthday cakes, make secret wishes, give presents and send greeting cards.

One of the first birthdays ever recorded was that of Pharaoh, described in the Book of Genesis. The celebration included a large household feast to which all the servants and the family were invited. Prisoners also were released from jail on that day.

The Greeks were among the first to keep birth records for everyone, including women and children — for tax purposes and to record military service — but only important family heads celebrated their birthdays.

The crumbling of the Roman Empire led to a decline in the celebrating of birthdays and keeping of records, according to the Hallmark researchers. During the Dark Ages, few records were kept and most people had no idea of their birth date. Few even knew how they were.

The early Christian leaders associated the idea of a birth-

Just provide for their needs and African violets are the easiest flowers in the world to take care of." Diantha Buell said. Mrs. Buell and her husband, Albert H. Buell, with a staff of 15 workers, take care of 140,000 African violet plants, and she should know.

"African violets like the same temperature as people," said Mrs. Buell. "They should be watered well when they are dry and not watered again until they are dry again. The biggest mistake people make is over-watering."

"African violets should have strong light but no midday sun. When violet plants fail to blossom, it is usually because they have not had enough light."

These quick notes on the care of African violets were made during a walk through Buell's Greenhouses, Inc., located 30 miles from Manchester. One drives to Phoenixville on Rt. 44 (the Middle Turnpike) and then north a few miles on Rt. 198.

Perhaps 500,000 plants are produced in a rooming medium, produces from 2 to 20 tiny new plants, which are separated delicately from the mother and placed in small pots. From leaf cutting to plants large enough to sell with their first blossoms, takes nine months.

The bulk of the business is in small plants, sold at wholesale, and all such orders are delivered from Eastford. The Buell's vans, equipped with shelves, heated in the winter and air-conditioned in the summer. The vans go into all the New England states, and in New York State, Long Island and to the Hudson River.

The Buell's like fairs and flower shows, but they have just one flower show date this year, a combined Antiques and Flower Show at the New York Coliseum March 10 to 18. Because the dates conflict, they cannot attend the Boston Flower Show but some of their large display plants will be shown there by the Bay State African Violet Society.

Court Sidetracks Alaska Pipeline

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Alaska leaders have reacted with shock to a U.S. appeals court ruling which again has sidetracked at least temporarily construction of a pipeline to tap the oil riches of the Arctic Slope.

The 150-page opinion made public in Washington on Friday overturns a lower-court decision by ruling that an extensive federal land corridor for the proposed 78-mile oil pipeline violates provisions of the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920.

Assembly Asked To Investigate Gas Price Hike

HARTFORD (AP)—Gov. Thomas J. Meskill and the legislative Finance Committee have turned their attention to a pair of issues linked to the price of gasoline in Connecticut.

Meskill called Friday for a legislative investigation of reported hikes in state gasoline prices, while the Finance Committee drafted a bill to support mass transit subsidies through an added gasoline tax.

Meskill called in his budget message for the tax to be increased from \$1.10 to \$1.40 per gallon in some areas of Connecticut and dealers predicted more stations would raise prices this weekend.

Kissinger In Hanoi For POW Releases

SAIGON (AP) — Henry A. Kissinger opened four days of postwar talks in Hanoi today, while U.S. and Vietnamese representatives in Saigon made final plans for the release of about 142 American and 3,000 Vietnamese prisoners of war Monday.

Kissinger landed in an Air Force jet shortly before noon at Hanoi's Giam Lam Airport, which was heavily damaged last December by U.S. bombers. He was the first ranking U.S. official to set foot in Hanoi in over a decade.

Leaders Huddle For Currency Crisis Solution

BONN, Germany (AP) — The world currency crisis and the value of the beleaguered U.S. dollar dominated discussions today among government leaders and central bankers.

The Japanese government said it was not opening its foreign exchange market for the regular half-day session. A spokesman said Japan feared a flood of dollars since Europe's money markets, the other places speculators can easily sell off their dollars, were closed for the weekend.

Secrecy surrounded the current round of discussions among officials dealing with the money markets. The heads of the world's largest central banks prepared for their monthly meeting in Basel, Switzerland. But there was no word what, if anything, they might do to halt the speculation.

Britain's treasury chief, Anthony Barber, declined comment when he returned to London from Paris after meeting with his French and West German counterparts.

There also were no details released on Friday's telephone conversations between Chancellor Willy Brandt of West Germany and President Nixon and the British and French heads of government.

There were indications Nixon was getting a steady flow of reports about the dollar's troubles, but a spokesman turned aside all questions on the dollar crisis.

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Winter Storm Hits Southeastern Area

A devastating winter storm walloped the Southeast today, dumping heavy snow from Florida to the Carolinas. The rest of the nation enjoyed generally fair and cold weather.

Up to 9 inches of snow paralyzed Columbus, Ga., while 6 inches blanketed the ground at Wilmington, N.C. Mobile, Ala., reported 3 inches of snow while 2 inches covered Pensacola, Fla.

Heavy-snow warnings were in effect for portions of Georgia and the Carolinas and a band of freezing rain and sleet extended from northern Florida to the South Carolina coast.

Travelers advisories were sounded for the California mountain region as heavy snow and strong gusty winds were predicted.

Temperatures before dawn ranged from -10 at Burlington, N.C. and -12 at Miami, Fla.

Elsewhere around the nation, fair weather was the rule. Scattered snow fell across the Great Lakes region and rain and snow covered the central Pacific Coast.

Mrs. Dunn, a former state representative, disputed Moffett's statements, and her legal assistant, Robert Sils, said: "I think Mrs. Dunn has brought this department out of obscurity with a volcanic crescendo."
Moffett had complained that Mrs. Dunn's "good intentions and hopes for making the department a real ally of consumers have joined her budget request of last year in the refuse pile of broken promises."

Women's Caucus Concerned Over Nixon Policies

HOUSTON (AP) — Child care, mental health, welfare — these are not partisan issues, another said.
In her speech Friday, Ms. Abzug scored Nixon for cutbacks in school milk funds, education for the disadvantaged, neighborhood health centers, compensation for flood victims, anti-poverty programs and even rural electrification.
"Women have been in the leadership in calling for a reordering of our national priorities," she said. "We did not mean a revision upward for the rich and the military and a revision downward for the big city dweller, for the working man, for the elderly, for our children, for the poor. I call upon all women here — whether they are Democrats, Republicans or independents — not to stand aside while the social legislation that is the best part of America is destroyed."
HOUSTON (AP) — Republicans at the National Women's Political Caucus convention, irked at anti-Nixon remarks by Rep. Bella Abzug, have decided after two long meetings they shared her basic frustrations at the severe cut-back of social programs.
They not only voted down attempts to criticize the New York Democratic congresswoman but ultimately opted to shape what they called a "positive statement" expressing their concern.
"I think everyone understands that we feel strongly that respect should be shown to people of all political persuasion — be it the President or a local elected official or Abzug, so we didn't need a resolution on that either," said Bobbie Kilberg, a lawyer from Washington, D.C., who chaired the GOP session lasting until nearly 2 a.m. today.
As the late-night meeting progressed it became clear that while many delegates objected to Ms. Abzug's partisanship in criticizing Nixon at a "unity" session of all women, most of them agreed with the thrust of her criticism.
"Let's face it, Nixon's wrong," said one.
"We're not offended that these issues were raised — they would have been anyway, because these are vital issues."

Killian Jubilant Over Ruling On Gas Price Probe

HARTFORD (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert K. Killian hailed a court ruling Friday allowing him to pursue his probe of gasoline pricing, but said there are "indications that the oil companies plan another round of price increases."
"We won the first skirmish in a legal war, the outcome of which may not be determined for years and years to come," said Killian. "Meanwhile, the anti-trust division of the federal Department of Justice will fiddle while tens of millions of Americans will continue to pay through the nose to the oil barons of America."
The ruling cited by Killian was Superior Court Judge George Saden's refusal to "quash" a subpoena requiring Mobile Oil to turn over pricing information to the attorney general.
"I wish I could assure the citizens of this state that, because of our victory today, some protection has been afforded them against arbitrary gasoline price increases," said Killian, "but I can't."
"Because the oil barons are protected in their arrogance and unlimited power by the submissive federal bureaucracy," he said, "they can and probably will continue to raise prices in concert."
Killian said the new round of gasoline price increases which he predicted are possible because of "a deliberate 'non-policy' on the part of this national administration as it relates to the production, refinement, distribution and sale of petroleum products."

Strike Fund Started

HARTFORD (AP) — As Connecticut Co. buses remain stalled, even after the latest meeting Friday in Hartford, a proposal to financially assist striking bus drivers in the Hartford area comes from the International Union of Electrical Workers.
Each of the union's 3,800 members in Central Connecticut has been asked to contribute \$2 to a fund to help members of the Amalgamated Transit Union who have been on strike against ConnCo since last November, according to Martin J. Hogan, international IUE representative.
Hogan also issued an appeal to all organized labor to join in the striker support fund.

'Waltons' Cult Grips Cast, Too

HOLLYWOOD—(NEA) — It seems like every season there's a television show which becomes a cult with its fans. Generally, these shows don't succeed with the bulk of the public. They're too special.

The Waltons is 1972's cult show. It's too early to tell whether it will be renewed for next season or not but

its adherents are complete fanatics. In its way, it's like Star Trek, whose fans still circulate a magazine about it, long after its demise.

The odd thing about The Waltons cult is that it includes the cast among its members. The Star Trek crew treated their series strictly as a job. But The Waltons' cast are as fanatic about the show as the viewing cult members.

On the set of the CBS show, on the back lot at The Burbank Studio, the 11 members of the fictional Walton family were hard at work. But everything stopped when one of the staff showed up with the latest ratings.

It was up to 28 that week. And they all smiled and cheered and acted as though it was the greatest news since the end of World War II.

"I must tell Charlie," one cast member said. (Charlie is a fictional name, to protect the guilty). "He's always so pessimistic about the show. He keeps saying the scripts are awful and that we're going to be canceled. He's terrible. We have the best show in the business."

They take a tremendously personal interest in the show, all of them, from the grandparents (Will Geer and Ellen Corby) through the parents (Ralph Waite and Michael Learned) to the seven children (a group headed by Richard Thomas).

They go out of their way to answer letters from the cult members, who go out of their way to dream up questions which are very specific. In one episode, they showed the parents' bed, a genuine antique. One viewer wrote in, asking about the bed.

Richard Thomas got the letter and did some real research, consulting the show's set decorator and then going to the library. He found out all about the bed and even dug up an old Sears Roebuck catalogue page and sent it to the viewer.

People have written in to ask about the big tree in the Waltons' front yard, the tree which has a rubber tire hanging from it which the children use as a swing.

Will Geer, who has the greenest thumb in show business, always gets those letters. He explains that it's a Brazilian pepper tree.

"It's really not right for the region we're showing," he says. The show supposedly takes place in Virginia. "But it closely resembles the locust, which would be authentic. So I don't think it's bad—it would take a botanist to tell one from the other on the home screen."

The seven children on the show seem like real brothers and sisters not like actors. There is a lot of sibling-like horseplay on the set. At one point, Eric Scott, who plays Ben, was being annoyed by the incessant giggling of Kami Colter, who plays the youngest Walton, Elizabeth.

"Kami, you cut that out," Eric said, "or I'll have a birdie pick you up and fly away with you."

They all go to school (except for Thomas) in a room set aside for the two teachers, Catherine Deeney and Ruth Victor, in the farmhouse. Miss Deeney teaches the three youngest, Miss Victor the three older children.

"O.K., cut it, print it," says director Harry Harris. "Now go to school kiddies."

And the six will turn and race back to their desks.

"I've done so much junk," Ellen Corby said, "that it's nice to be with something I'm proud of."
