### LMT's 'Rainmaker' Warm and Appealing

June B. Tompkins, assistant executive secretary of the State Department on Aging, Mrs. Edward Trux of Wethersfield, state senator and chairman of the Connecticut Delegation to the White House Conference on Aging, Mrs. Laurabelle McCoy of New Haven, member of the planning board of the White House Conference, Mrs. Robert Grail of Waterbury, president of the state's Association of Homemakers-Home Health Aid Services, and Benjamin Rosenbluh, president of the Connecticut Society of Gerontology.

CPTV's S. Anders Voccom will moderate the program. The Little Theatre of Manchester (LTM) will present another plus on its growing roster of successful performances. It isn't a flashy vehicle. It doesn't hold your rapt attention. There's no strong tension buildup in the plot. But the true savor of the story comes through when the whole play has been digested. The situation, a homely one, is set on a western ranch during a drought. A father, his two

sons and a plain-Jane daughter make up the ranch family. A wayfarer, stranger, with an almost magical something about him, drops in out of nowhere and fast talks himself into a convincing rainmaker. He cons the elderly ranchman, H.C. Curry, into forking over \$100 for what the rainmaker promises to make it rain. No one really believes it, but, as H.C. Curry says, "enter it in the books under gambling."

You begin to observe mutual awareness growing between the rainmaker, a young man with dash, and Lizzie Curry, the plain-Jane daughter destined for spinsterhood by her two brothers. During a poignant scene in the tack barn, when the rainmaker tells Lizzie to take the pins out of her hair letting it fall around her shoulders, and has her repeat, "I am pretty, I am beautiful," only then do you realize that in Lizzie's life there is no more drought. And the rainmaker, whose desire it is to accomplish one miracle in his life, and has sought it in unfulfilled ecstasies, rain and impossible dreams, has quite unknowingly performed a marvelous miracle. Lizzie says it so well. She tells the rainmaker, Starbuck by name, that all the time he has been looking up to the stars for something to happen, but when he took the time to look down at her, there it was - the miracle - right in his hands.

A cast of several new faces appears again on the LTM scene. A favorite, however, Philip L. Burgess Sr. is always an attraction to an LTM bill. As H.C. Curry, he is the weathered ranch master, father, and sometimes cook who, being the consistently fine performer that he is, is a catalyst to the entire cast.

New to LTM, Edward Stivender plays Noah Curry, the son who manages the ranch business and has yet to learn to be as flexible as his father. Stivender, regularly a leader of religion at North West Catholic High School, was properly severe in contrast to Jim Curry, his younger brother, played by John Michalak. Michalak, in his second appearance on LTM, lends a distinct personality to Jim Curry sometimes petulant, more often good natured, incorrigible. He reminds one of Bonanza's "Hoss."

Reggie Stivender makes a sensitive Lizzie Curry who experiences the transformation to a "pretty girl" at the hands of the rainmaker with a tender pathos.

Jim Pendergast, LTM's president, and R. Douglas Ross, new to the group, round out a talented cast as the sheriff and his deputy. Staff members in charge of stage design and construction have created an intricate setting combining sheriff's office, ranch kitchen and tack room which is adapted readily to scene changes with expert spot lighting.

Robert Donnelly, actor-director, has again exhibited his artistry in directing the fine character portrayals. "The Rainmaker," classified as a romantic comedy, plays tonight, and again next Friday and Saturday in East Catholic High School Auditorium. The footlights go up at 8:30 p.m. Tickets are available at the door.

The trio accounted for 23 of the Eagle baskets.

### Capt. Wanat Feels He's Been Reborn

**VALLEY FORGE, Pa. (AP)**—Army Capt. George Wanat Jr. says he feels "like I've been reborn" after his release this week by the Vietcong after 10 months as a prisoner of war in the jungles of South Vietnam.

Wanat, 27, from Foxboro, Mass., is under treatment for malaria and malnutrition at the Army's Valley Forge General Hospital.

He had a private reunion with his wife, Gretchen, his parents and his six sisters and one brother in a post-midnight homecoming in his hospital ward room early Friday.

"It's nice to be back near my wife and family again," the captain said in a handwritten statement. Wanat insisted in

the statement he was "unharmful by our captors, fed and given medical attention."

This assertion appeared in conflict with statements disclosed by his father who quoted his son as saying in a telephone call from the Philippines that he had been imprisoned at times in a snake-and-ant infested bamboo cage and not given immediate treatment for his malaria.

"I'd kill those bastards (the Vietcong captors) if I ever saw them again," his father, George Wanat Sr. of Waterford, Conn., quoted his son as saying.

Through a hospital spokesman, Wanat declined to read his statement to newsmen who had asked for either an interview or an expression of his feelings since his reunion with his family.

"The lonely days and nights are over—God help us all to make it through the night," Wanat's statement said. "I'm sure you can imagine how I feel to be free again."

The statement also said: "Although detained for approximately a year, far apart from the life style that I am accustomed to, I find myself now happily repatriated in good health and good nature."

"Please pray for those still detained and that they will be sent home soon. My heart goes out to those still waiting."

## Dooley Would Withdraw From Transit District

Vernon's representative (56th District) Thomas Dooley, an opponent of the proposed gas tax increase to subsidize bus transportation, is in favor of Vernon's withdrawal from the Greater Hartford Transit District if the tax is imposed.

Rep. Dooley, in a letter to Mayor Frank McCoy, labeled the proposal as "the most discriminatory I have witnessed in the General

Assembly." He said he has received many calls from Vernon residents expressing their strong opposition to the proposed one cent per gallon gasoline tax in the district towns.

Dooley said when the original proposal was made that the 29 towns in the Capitol Planning Region were to pay the added tax, he viewed the proposal as highly discriminatory. He added, "The most recent proposal that only the nine members of the Greater Hartford Transit District carry the burden is totally ludicrous."

Referring to the subsidizing of the Fairfield County transportation, by the entire state, Dooley said he sees no reason why Vernon should be treated differently. "Why

motorists who buy gasoline and do not use the buses should be called upon to subsidize the bus lines' operation defies comprehension," Dooley said.

Former State Senator Robert Houley, now a member of Vernon's Town Council also expressed his opposition to the gas tax proposal. Dooley and Houley are Democrats and McCoy is a Republican.

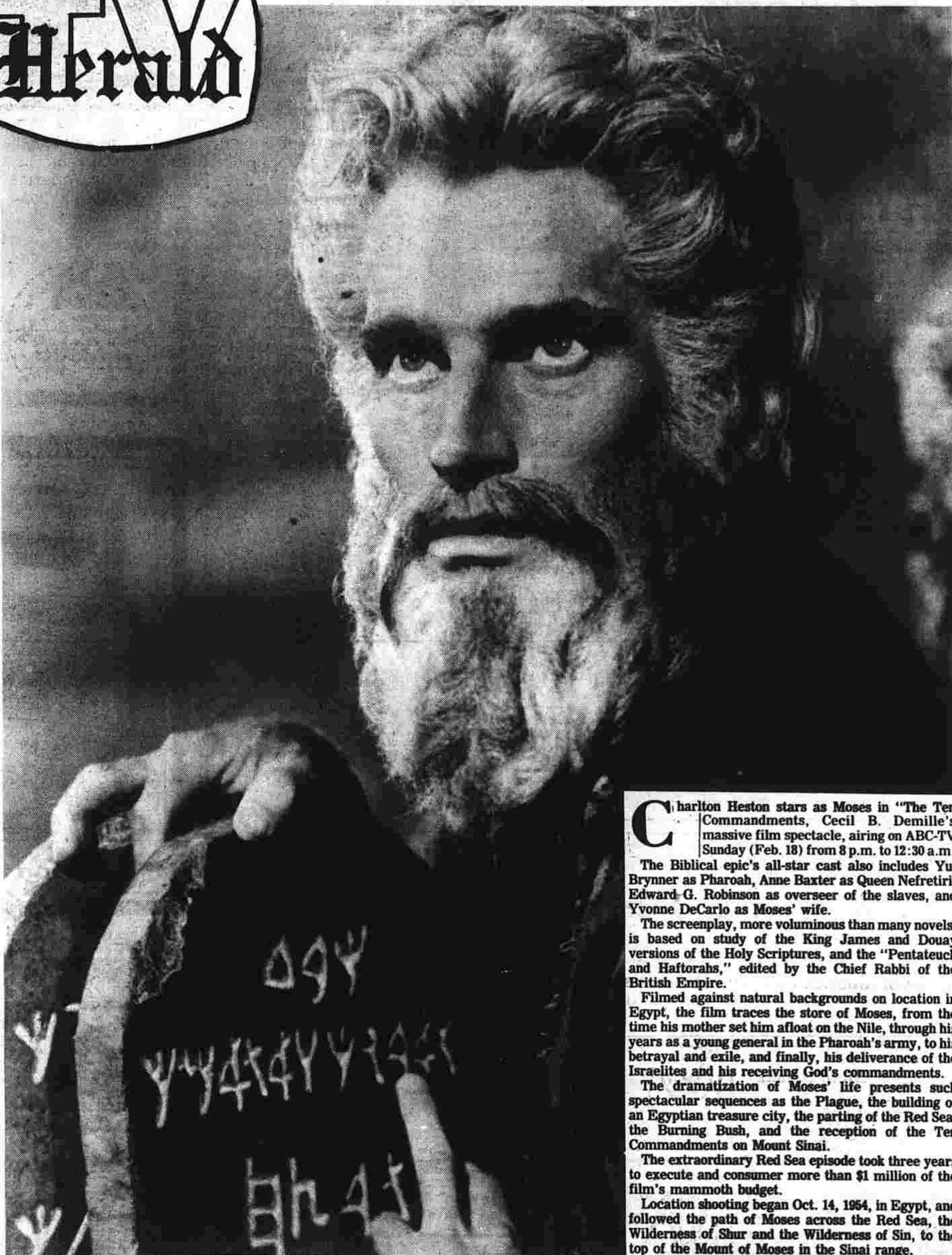

# 'The Ten Commandments'



**C**harlton Heston stars as Moses in "The Ten Commandments, Cecil B. DeMille's massive film spectacle, airing on ABC-TV Sunday (Feb. 18) from 8 p.m. to 12:30 a.m.

The Biblical epic's all-star cast also includes Yul Brynner as Pharaoh, Anne Baxter as Queen Nefretiri, Edward G. Robinson as overseer of the slaves, and Yvonne DeCarlo as Moses' wife.

The screenplay, more voluminous than many novels, is based on study of the King James and Douay versions of the Holy Scriptures, and the "Pentateuch and Haftorahs," edited by the Chief Rabbi of the British Empire.

Filmed against natural backgrounds on location in Egypt, the film traces the story of Moses, from the time his mother set him afloat on the Nile, through his years as a young general in the Pharaoh's army, to his betrayal and exile, and finally, his deliverance of the Israelites and his receiving God's commandments.

The dramatization of Moses' life presents such spectacular sequences as the Plague, the building of an Egyptian treasure city, the parting of the Red Sea, the Burning Bush, and the reception of the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai.

The extraordinary Red Sea episode took three years to execute and consumer more than \$1 million of the film's mammoth budget.

Location shooting began Oct. 14, 1954, in Egypt, and followed the path of Moses across the Red Sea, the Wilderness of Shur and the Wilderness of Sin, to the top of the Mount of Moses in the Sinai range.

After its original showings in 1957, "The Ten Commandments" was re-released to theatres in 1966, several years after the death of producer-director Cecil B. DeMille.

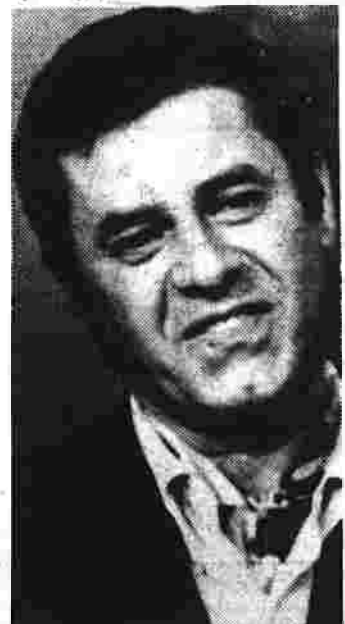

## Scouting Today's a Lot More Than You Think

The 1973 National Scout Jamboree will be held in August at two sites, Moraine State Park, Pennsylvania and Farragut State Park in Idaho. Boys from all over the country will spend several days camping together. National Jamborees are held every four years.



Explorer scouting is for boys and girls. With the help of the leader, the group above plans a skiing trip.

The month of February marks the 63rd anniversary celebration of the Boy Scouts of America. The country's largest youth organization was founded in Washington, D.C. February 8, 1910.

Though scouting is still interested in camping and outdoor living, the main emphasis is on citizenship. The scouts are also concerned about change and making the program important to today's boys (and girls!).

While scouts still learn to tie knots and make camp fires, they also study American history and government and learn how to be good citizens.

Cub scouting is still a family and home-centered program for boys who have completed the second grade and are 8, 9 and 10 years old.

Scouting has character, citizenship and physical fitness as its aims. Boys may become members if they have finished the fifth grade or are 11 through 17 years of age. The members have dropped the word "boy" and now prefer to call themselves just plain "scouts."

Girls are now welcomed members of the Explorer Scouts. This group's membership is open to boys and girls from the ages of 15 to 21. These co-educational groups meet in special or career interest groups or "posts." For example, there might be a banking, cycling or medical post offered in a city. These groups give young people a chance to explore their interests and career choices.

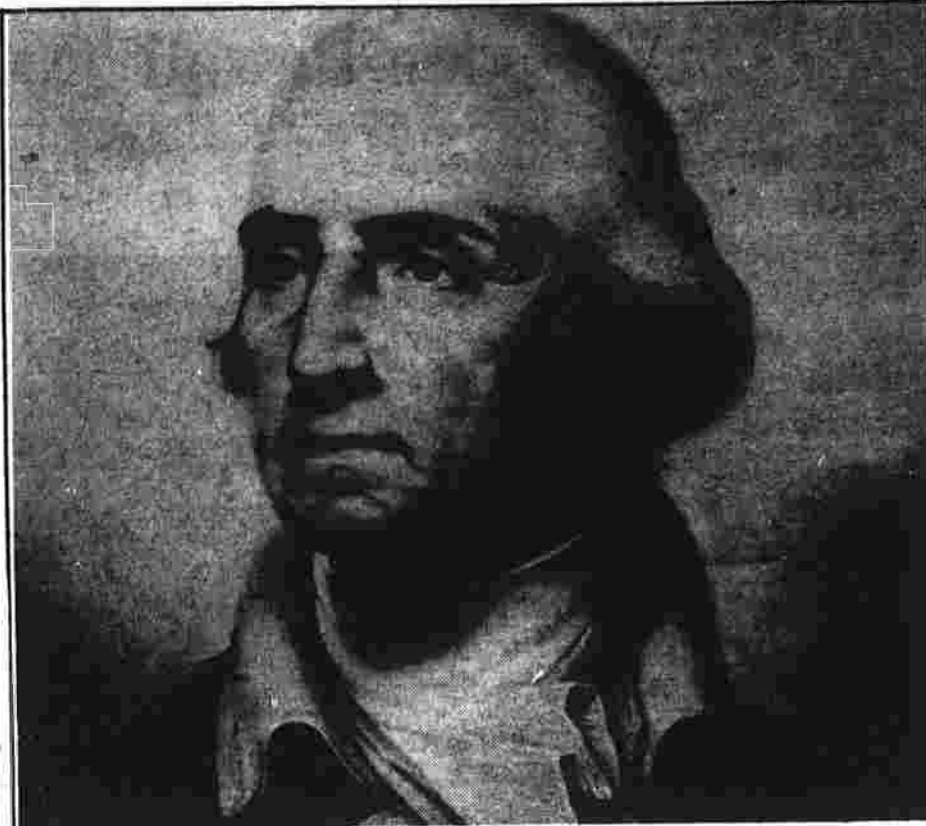

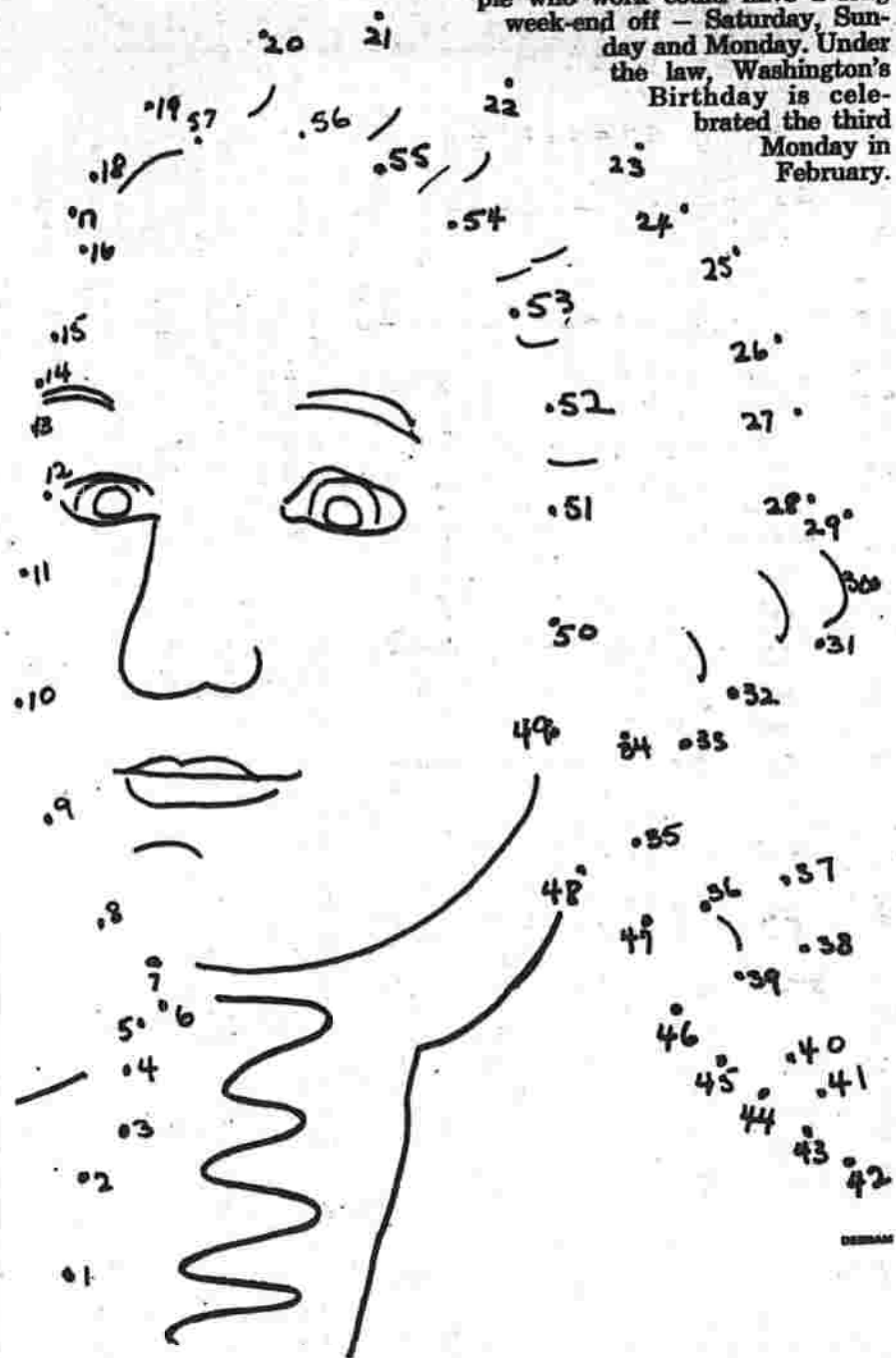
He became a surveyor and made maps of Virginia. He then became a soldier and was a lieutenant colonel in the Virginia Citizens Army.

When he was 26 years old, Washington decided to become a farmer and settled down at his plantation, Mount Vernon. He married Martha Custis, a very rich widow with two children. Washington was a loving step-father.

He was chosen to lead the American army in the fight for independence from England. The war lasted eight long years.

Washington returned to Virginia and became a gentleman planter. He helped write the Constitution and was elected our country's first president in 1789. He served as president until 1797. He died of a throat infection on December 14, 1799.

A law was passed to celebrate certain holidays on Monday so that the people who work could have a long week-end off - Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Under the law, Washington's Birthday is celebrated the third Monday in February.



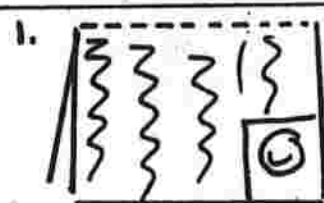
Q. Did Washington really chop down the cherry tree?
