

Having sold about 100 without any promotion, just think what will happen when souvenir hungry Americans decide they want a piece of used plank dressed up with a little



CONCORD, N.H. (AP) - The Executive Council Tuesday approved establishing an "instant sweeps" lottery program in which a buyer of a ticket

would know immediately if he won a cash prize. The council voted to pay \$75,000 a year to Mathematica, Inc., of Trenton, N.J., for

developing the system. An alternate proposal to pay \$60,000 plus .2 per cent of gross ticket sales was turned down when Gov. Meldrim Thomson Jr. said he didn't want the state to get into partnership with a private firm.

Sweepstakes Director Edward Powers said his agency noped to institute the program in time for the summer tourist season. He said the new plan would expand lottery ticket outlets and offer competition to illegal numbers games. The new plan, he said, might

increase the state's lottery gross by 50 per cent and boost net revenue to school districts ov about \$1 million a year. The Sweepstakes

Commission, he said, asked the state legislature for a supplemental appropriation o \$252,000 to get the program started and more than \$502,000 to carry it out through the upcoming fiscal biennium.

One out of 12 of the 50-cent "instant" tickets would pay prizes ranging from \$1 to \$100. A person buying a ticket would peel back a cover and know nstantly what, if anything he had won.

Some tickets would qualify for a chance at \$3,000, \$1,000 and \$500 in special drawings.

Five citizen-volunteers participated in a five-hour oundary walk around the proposed Case Mt. land purchase Saturday. Led by Igor Vecheskoff, land

surveyor, and joined by Mrs. Leonard A. Parla, conservation ommission chairman; Dr. Frederick W. Spaulding, com-mission member; and Walter J. Senko, town engineer, the group started from the proposed Birch Mt. road access.

According to Dr. Spaulding, they proceeded south to the eservation's southern boundary, then northerly to the town water tank, a location of possible public access on its western boundary. The group next proceeded easterly to check the line as related to the mountain road. This boundary was checked as it came out on the eastern segment of the same mountain road as the latter loops back from the summit. It was here that one boundary post placed by the surveyor could not be located. due to either being hidden or removed by vandals.

Vecheskoff said he would consider relocating or replacing it at no cost to the town, but that several of his markers had been carried off previously, adding to his work. Spaulding noted it is a criminal offense to remove or tamper with, in any way,

prisoner go free "on condition" —is a common method of dealing with lesser, lawbreakers. Judges do have a right to put reasonable limits on the person's activities, such as not leaving the countywithout the permission of his probation officer.

But, as the above case shows, the judge cannot use probation to take away basic constitutional rights. In another case, a requirement that the probationer would have to donate a pint of blood to the Red Cross was also held unconstitutional as a "cruel and unusual" penalty.

Nevertheless, special restrictions may make sense in the context of a particular situation. Another case involved a woman who had twice been convicted of unlawful conduct during anti-wa demonstrations.

The judge granted probation or condition that she not take an activist part in any more such demonstrations. And this restriction was duly upheld on appeal. "The conduct it forbids," said the appellate court, "even if law-ful in itself, is conducive to future criminal activity of the same kind of which (she) was convicted. The court added:

"The granting of probation is within the sound discretion of the trial court. A defendant has the right, if he feels that the terms of probation are more harsh that e sentence, to refuse probation and undergo such sentence.

Q. How does Medicare pay benefits for doctor bills? A There are two differen ways that benefits can be paid First, your doctor can be paid directly, but only if you and your doctor agree to it. Second, fedicare can pay you either before or after you pay the doctor's bill.

Q. If my doctor does no accept assignment how do I submit my doctor bills for payment

A. You should obtain a tequest for Medicare Payment form from the Social Security office or from your doctor. Complete part r of the form, sign it, attach your doctor's itemized bills to the form and mail it all to the carrier listed in your Medicare Handbook. Q. If I have more than one doctor bill, must I prepare separate Medicare form for

each bill? A. No. You can send all of them with the Request for Medicare Payment form. O. Should I send in my doctor bills before or after I have

accumulated enough bills to meet the \$60 deductible? A. Since payments can't be made until you have met the \$60 annual deductible, we recommend that you hold bills until they total at least \$60 and

send them in all together. Once you have met the \$60 deductible we suggest you send in iditional bills as you get them. Q. If my doctor's bill is more than the reasonable charge determined by the Medicare carrier, does that mean my doctor's charge for that service

is not reasonable? A. No. It could mean, for example, that your doctor has recently increased his charges, and the increased rates have not been in effect long enough for Medicare records to show that the new higher charges are eing made to all his patients, Or, it could also mean that your doctor's charge is in the upper bracket of doctors' charges in your area, and for that reason the charge is not considered to be reasonable charge.
