### Judge Ends Pentagon Papers Trial

## Ellsberg, Russo Plan Law Suits

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo, freed of charges in the Pentagon papers case because of government misconduct, say they will sue President Nixon for "conspiracy to deprive us of our civil liberties."

Ellsberg, calm and smiling, told newsmen the Watergate and White House involvement in his case reminded him of Mafia tactics. "I think of the code of the Mafia," he said. "Silence. That has been the code of the White House."

### Issues Not Resolved

Though the trial itself drew attention to the issues that precipitated the case were never resolved. "The charges against these defendants raise serious factual and legal issues that I would certainly prefer to have litigated to completion," Byrne commented in dismissing the charges.

Ellsberg and Russo, both former researchers on government projects for the Rand Corp., were charged because they allegedly copied the Pentagon papers, a top secret study of U.S. involvement in Vietnam. Ellsberg later leaked them to news media.

But the defendants can "raise these issues when they desire," he added. "While I would prefer to have them litigated, the conduct of the government has placed the case in a posture that it precludes the fair, dispassionate resolution of these issues by a jury," the judge said.

## Cambodian Issue May Test Constitution

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield has applauded House rejection of more funds for Cambodia. Mansfield said earlier in the week that rejection of the fund transfer would not stop bombing.

The House Thursday approved the administration's \$2.8 billion supplemental appropriations bill—but rejected a provision that would have provided more funds for bombing in Cambodia. The House also added a prohibition against using other funds in the bill for such bombing.

The measure comes before the Senate Appropriations Committee Tuesday, and Mansfield predicted that the committee will "line up with the House." If the measure passes the full Senate, the Montana Democrat

said, "lines will be squarely drawn on the war-making power of Congress." He noted that Defense Secretary Clifford D. Richardson said earlier in the week that rejection of the fund transfer would not stop bombing.

Presidential Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the administration will continue what it regards as the proper policy—providing requested help for the Cambodian government. He said if funds are not

available, then Congress will bear the responsibility. "They have thrown down the gauntlet," Mansfield said, "and the President must now act on this (appropriation) bill."

Mansfield noted that an amendment under Senate consideration would prohibit the use of any money previously appropriated by Congress for further U.S. military activity in Indochina. A veto, he added, could come in a pending bill to limit the President to emergency use of the armed forces for only 30 days without approval by Congress.

### News Capsules

**Astronauts** Charles Conrad Jr., Paul J. Weitz and Dr. Joseph P. Kerwin will be declared "ready to fly" after daylong physical examinations at the Johnson Space Center near Houston on Friday.

**Dr. Royce Hawkins**, deputy director for medical operations at the center, said the medical tests "went extremely well and we feel confident the crew is ready to fly. We saw no medical problems."

The medical information also will be used for in-flight and post-flight comparison of the astronauts' physical condition. A major goal of the Skylab program is to determine how well man can function physically in space for long periods.

Conrad, Weitz and Kerwin, a physician, are to inhabit the Skylab 3, a three-bedroom house, for 28 days. The Skylab 2 and 3 crews will rocket to the same station in August and November for 56-day stays.

## Steele Predicts Rise In Gasoline Prices

MIDDLETOWN (AP) — If New England's independent gasoline dealers are cut short on supplies from major oil companies, residents of the region can look forward to higher fuel prices, according to U.S. Rep. Robert Steele, R-Conn.

Preliminary investigations show that "the future welfare of many residents and thousands of small businessmen throughout New England has been severely threatened by recent actions taken by federal government and by the major oil companies," he said at a congressional hearing here Friday.

The session was held by Steele and U.S. Rep. Silvio O. Conte, R-Mass.

Steele said the northeast is in a peculiar situation in that, unlike other parts of the country, New England relies heavily on the independent marketer or distributor who supplies 80 per cent of the heating oil and one-third of the gasoline.

"If the independents are cut out of the business, the whole New England market would be affected by further price increase and disruption of supplies."

## Derailment Attributed To Heavy Rains

NEW YORK (AP) — A Penn Central Railroad spokesman says a derailment that killed one person and injured three other passengers Wednesday in Connecticut occurred because heavy rains caused loosening of the track roadbed.

The railroad's 6:52 a.m. from Danbury, Conn., to Grand Central Terminal derailed at 7:21 a.m. just before the New Haven branch train pulled into Branchville, Conn.

The Penn Central spokesman said Friday:

"Due to heavy rains in that area, the roadbed under the left rail side of the curve at Branchville was caused to sag and the front wheels of the second engine of the train were derailed, leading to the derailment of the following six coaches."

## Three Men Die From Carbon Monoxide Poison

GILEAD, Maine (AP) — Officials say three out-of-state men whose bodies were found in a vehicle parked along U.S. 2 here died of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Offroad County medical examiner Dr. Harry Brinkman reported Friday the results of autopsies on John Knibbs, 25, of Unionville, Conn., Alloway Groupen, 25, of Farmington, Conn., and Harry Brown, 38, of West Burke, Vt.

State police said the bodies of the three men were found in a small, New Hampshire border town about 9:45 a.m. Friday by 8th Bell Police Chief Robert Stearns.

Officials said the deaths are being further investigated by the Oxford County Sheriff's Department, but that a preliminary probe revealed no foul play in the incident.

"I'm always skeptical of voluntary plans," one dealer said.

## Violent Weather Hammers Midwest

Violent weather continued to pound the nation's mid-section today as thunderstorms and powerful winds curved through central Texas into Arkansas, Mississippi and Alabama.

A tornado smashed through Joplin, Mo., Friday, killing three persons, injuring 90 and doing more than \$7 million in damage, according to a city official.

The tornado affected more than 15 communities in the area, but Joplin suffered the most severe damage.

The Joplin twister followed a tornado in Willard, Ohio, Thursday night that killed three persons and injured 60.

Twenty-five of the injured remained hospitalized. A city official estimated damage at \$5 million.

In Texas, the Fort Worth area clocked winds of 65 miles per hour Friday evening, and San Antonio reported winds of 57 m.p.h. early today.

The hazards of cigarette smoking have been well documented in recent years, but area podiatrists have issued yet another warning concerning the habit: Smoking is bad for your feet.

Dr. Steven Buchbinder, president of the Hartford County Podiatry Society, said that persons who suffer from poor or borderline circulation will add to their problems if they smoke. Dr. Buchbinder, speaking for the association of foot specialists, during this year's observance of Foot Health Week, May 9-15, said that recent studies have shown tobacco-induced circulation problems, to the feet due to vasoconstriction — a narrowing of the blood vessels. "Poor circulation to the feet can lead to many problems," he said. "These include susceptibility to infection which, if left unchecked, could result in gangrene. Poor circulation also means slow healing of cuts, bruises, or other wounds on the feet."

# TV Series Got Julie Out of Rut

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — The Julie Andrews Hour wasn't renewed and this is one demerit for the American audience.

Julie's show has been a beauty all season. Granted, the time slot ABC stuck it in was downright stupid and makes one wonder about the mental capabilities of network executives. Still, the public should have found the show and supported it better than it did.

Julie says she isn't worried. Whatever happens, she figures she's come out ahead.

In the first place, she isn't playing the ratings game. She says that when the season began she decided she would ignore the ratings completely. She says she knows that they haven't been too good but she's just gone along, doing what she thought was best.

"That's all one can do," she says.

But, over and above the ratings consideration, for Julie this has been a good year.

"Doing the show got me going again," she says. "I hadn't done anything at all except for the Carol Burnett special, for three years."

"For a long time, I had thought that I had to work, since I began so young and spent my youth doing nothing but work. Then, during those three years I found that I enjoyed not working."

She might have gone along, happily not working, except that ABC offered her a small fortune to do the series.

"The offer was so generous," she says, "with all kinds of fringe benefits, that I had to say 'yes'."

So she went back to work. And she says that she was forced to do things she had forgotten she could do—sing and dance. She says doing the show got her into physical shape again, made her start singing again, "got me going again."

She's enjoyed doing it. It's been fun, she says, and she thinks she's learned a lot.

On the plus side is the fun, the experience, the learning—and the money.

But there's a big minus side, too.

"I've been sad," she says, "because I've had to be away from my family so much. This year has been about 80 per cent work, 20 per cent family—and that's too much on the work side."

"The children have been very good about it, about having their mother come home and go right to bed but I've been feeling very guilty about it."

"I've learned a few lessons," she says, "about what to do and what not to do. There's really no need for three big production numbers on every show. Two would be fine and one would be sufficient."

She is in what she calls "a lovely position."

Right now, she's off to make a movie—"The Tamarind Seed"—which she and

## Which Band Instrument Would You Like to Play?



The cornet is like a trumpet.

Brass instruments are great in bands and parades. Strong lips are important in playing them.

Most woodwind instruments have reeds or hollow, woodlike materials covering the holes near the top.

It's fun to be a part of a group that's making music. Maybe you would like to play in a band. Bands usually are made up of woodwind, brass and percussion instruments.

The secret to being a good player is practice. You also must take good care of your instrument.

All of these instruments on this page are played in elementary school bands. When you are older, you can play them in a marching band, a dance band, a concert band or a symphony orchestra — with one exception. The saxophone is hardly ever played in a symphony.

**Brasses**  
The trumpet is the most popular brass instrument. It often has the lead part and you can play it very loud. The cornet looks very much like it and looks a little shorter. It has a mellow sound. Some people feel the cornet is easier to learn to play than the trumpet.

The trombone is played by pulling the slide in and out. It does not have valves. You need long arms to play it. You can't play fast tunes on it, but you can make loud, clear sounds and you can play very low notes.

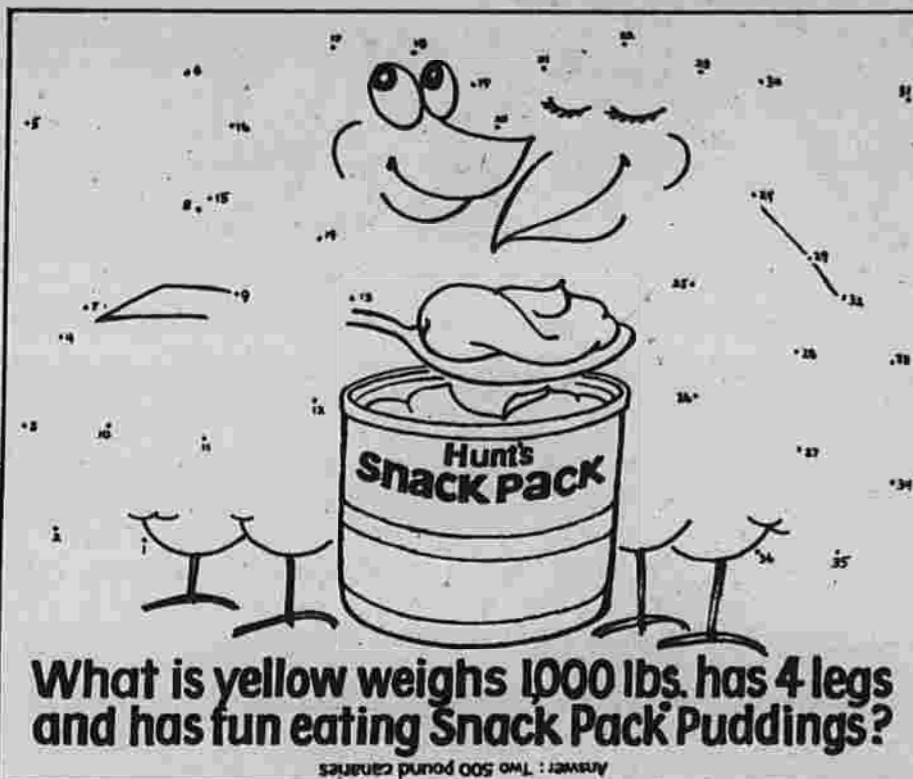
**Percussion instruments**  
The drums are important to a band because they give the rhythm or keep the time. They are used in symphony orchestras, but are not as important. If you play the drums, you will also probably learn to play the bells and cymbals.

Drums are very easy to play, but some people get tired of just playing the rhythm and would like to play a melody or tune.

**Woodwinds**  
The clarinet is the most popular of all woodwind instruments. It is used in just about every kind of music. It can be played very rapidly or very slowly.

The saxophone is a member of the woodwind family, but it is really a combination of a woodwind and a brass. It has a reed mouthpiece, but it is made of brass. It is used in the popular music of dance and rock-and-roll bands. It is played very much like the clarinet and some people switch from one to the other. It is thought to be one of the easier instruments to learn to play.

The flute has a pleasant, soft tone. Some people think it is harder to master than any other woodwind instrument. Others like an instrument that makes louder sounds. You can learn to play very fast tunes on a flute.

John Philip Sousa

John Philip Sousa was our country's most famous bandmaster. He composed many kinds of music including operettas (musical compositions with short plots, happy music and spoken words) and waltzes. He was most famous for his marches and became known as the "March King."

Sousa was born in Washington, D.C. in 1854. He studied the violin and, at the age of 17, became a professional musician. He played with dance orchestras and variety shows.

He became the leader of the U.S. Marine Band in 1880. This band became one of the best in the world. It was during this time that he wrote many of his famous marches. In 1892 he left the Marine band and formed his own band which toured this country and Europe. He was the most popular bandleader of his time. From 1917 to 1919 he served as bandmaster for the U.S. Navy. He died in 1932.

His famous marches include "The Washington Post March" and "The Stars and Stripes Forever." He also wrote books and an autobiography called "Marching Along."

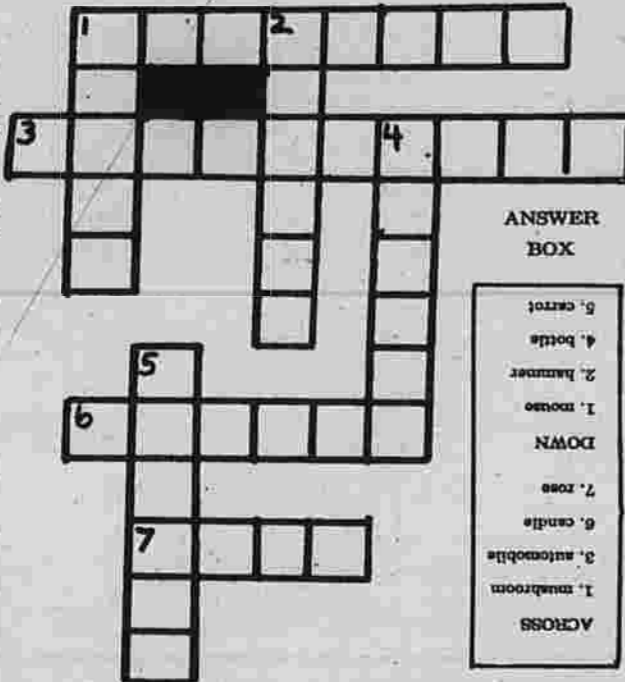

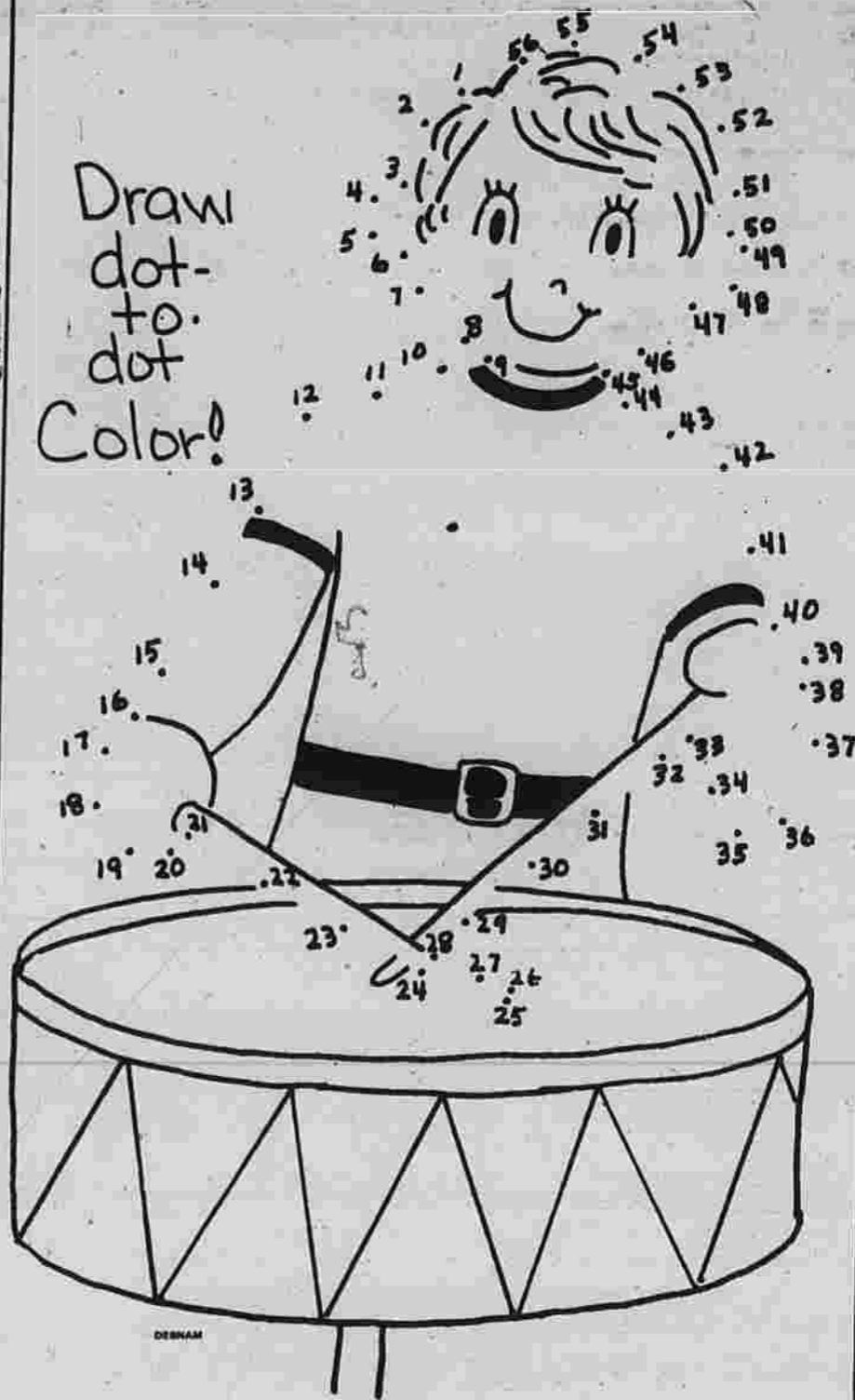
Concert bands use fewer brass and percussion instruments. The woodwinds usually sit in the front of the band. The concert band does not play as loud as other bands.

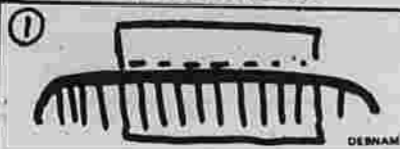
