

# Luce, Joslin, Dumont, Palmer GOP Selectmen Candidates

## Allende Making Cabinet Changes

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — President Salvador Allende is reshuffling his cabinet for the first time amid indications of dissent in the military over its role in his Marxist administration.

His new "national security" administration began resigning Monday with the resignation of Gen. Cesar Ruiz as transport and public works minister after he failed to end the crippling month-long truckers' strike. The entire 15-member cabinet offered its resignation Thursday night, but Allende refused to accept it.

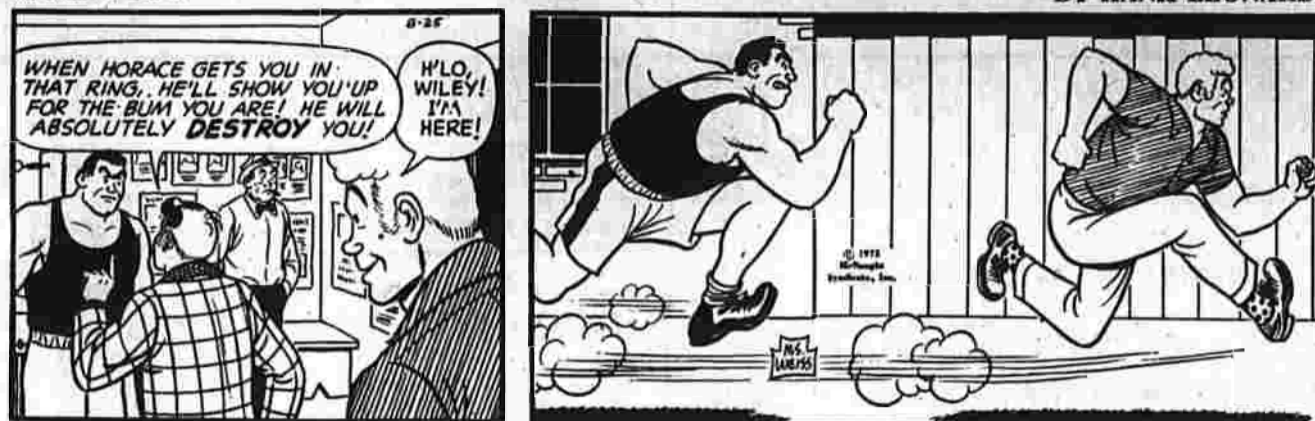

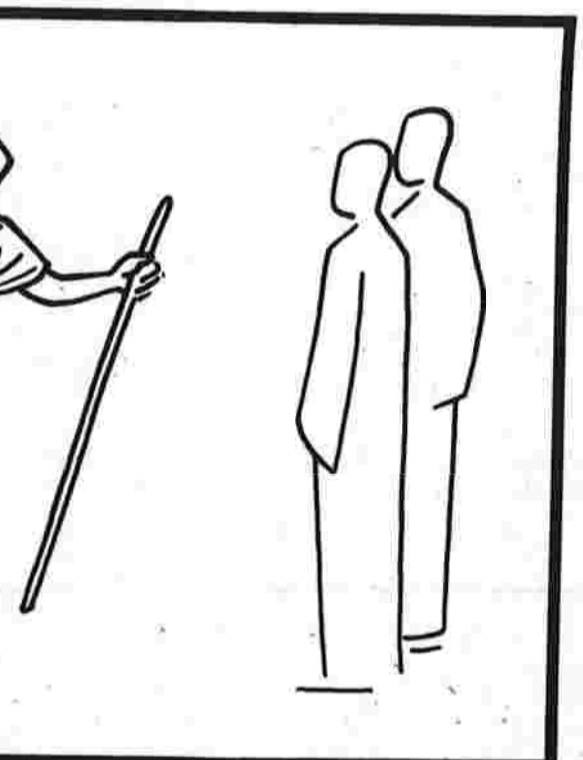

are still offering our "Big Mac." If there are going to be any changes I haven't heard of them yet."

**EPA Chief Tees Off Against Automakers**

**SIMSBURY (AP)** — Connecticut's new environment chief has accused the American auto industry of being "utterly lax" in trying to solve air pollution problems.

In only eight months the industry was able to convert from peacetime to wartime operations in the 1940s, Douglas M. Costle said Friday.

"My question is where the hell are they today?" years after auto emissions became a recognized hazard, the 34-year-old California native said in an interview.

Costle, who was acting commissioner of the state Department of Environmental Protection since July 1, after the resignation of Dan W. Lufkin, was named commissioner by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill Friday. He serves at Meskill's pleasure.

Besides blasting auto makers, Costle praised the response of Connecticut industry to pollution problems and portrayed the state as a national leader in the struggle to preserve the environment.

Costle, who was deputy commissioner of the department since January 1972, said "it would be easy" to blame pollution problems on industry, "but that's not entirely fair...people have to realize that we're all polluters, each in our own way, and our own assertion that we have to have our own steel box to drive to and from work in."

The American consumer is limited in his choice of cars and "it's an exercise in market absurdity" to say he can win the auto pollution battle alone, Costle said.

He added that auto makers "have a lock on the market" and have been dragging their feet in reducing pollution from their products.

"We're going to see across the country the federal government imposing transportation controls, saying essentially you have to limit the mobility of automobiles. So far, Connecticut has escaped the necessity of having to go to such extreme measures. But I don't preclude that for the future," the graduate of Harvard University and the University of Chicago Law School said.

Pollution from other sources is being attacked successfully in Connecticut, Costle said.

"There is not another state in the union that can show the measure of progress that we've

been able to show in Connecticut," he said. "I think we start with a very strong water pollution program and the payoff there is already beginning to be felt."

One of the main tasks Costle sees for his future is implementing plans that have been laid out since the department was established in October 1971.

"We've gone through literally a convulsive period in the last three years of awakened environmental concern and the determination of the people reflects that we're serious about cleaning up pollution problems, Costle added.

He also pointed to the recently-announced project to convert the state's solid wastes into usable materials. "We'll turn the garbage we're throwing away into a gold mine of raw resources," he said.

Costle expressed confidence that the American people are ready to pay the necessary costs to assure a clean environment.

"The thing that most people have got to understand is that we can do it. There's nothing technologically impossible about doing it. And the cost can be made reasonable," he said.

### Career Education in the Elementary Schools



This student might grow up to be a carpenter, or he might grow up to be a doctor who likes to work around the house. Whatever he decides, his early training will help.



Career education is one of the important ideas in teaching today. Each state has at least one test program where these ideas are being carried out.

Although teachers have been teaching some form of it for years, the new career programs are backed with more materials and equipment and special training for teachers.

Career education starts as early as kindergarten and continues through high school.

The idea behind the program is not that students make job choices at a very early age, but rather that they become more and more aware of the many different careers open to them. By knowing more about many careers, they can make wiser choices when they go to work.

The students in career education learn to read, write and do math. They study history, languages, sciences and social studies. But they also get to explore the "work world." Career education is not a separate subject. The teacher teaches it as she teaches math, English and many other subjects.

Since there are over 20,000 different types of jobs, it would be impossible to teach all of them. For this reason, these jobs have been grouped into 15 different "clusters."

The purpose of the program in the kindergarten through sixth grade is to create awareness of the many different careers. At this time the children are introduced to the 15 job clusters.

When students reach junior high school, they explore several careers and learn what skills are needed and what education is required.

In high school, the students pick a career. They might be going on to college, so they will learn what courses are needed and why. If they are going to work, they study subjects that will help them on the job.

One of the goals of the program is to develop a good attitude toward work and pride in a job well done.

By learning the different job skills, students will also learn a great deal about themselves, and what they are able to do.

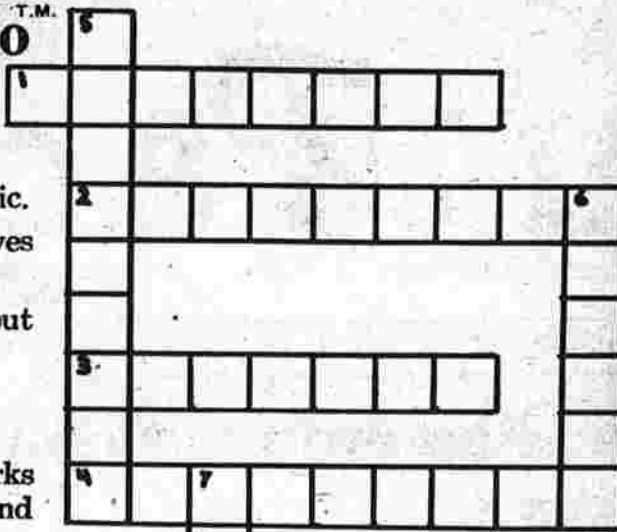

When it comes to riding race horses, Ron Turcotte doesn't "horse" around. The 5'-1", 112-pound jockey recently rode Secretariat to victory in the Kentucky Derby, Preakness, and Belmont Stakes. This was the first time a horse won the Triple Crown since 1948. Turcotte, age 31, was Canada's top jockey in '62 with 180 victories. He began riding in the U.S. in 1964, and has guided his horses to more than one million dollars in earnings each year since. Turcotte gets 10 per cent of his horse's winnings. Ron grew up in Canada with 14 brothers and sisters. As a youngster, he often helped his father cut wood. Now he is married and has three children. As a hobby, Turcotte and his family like to camp in the Canadian wilderness.

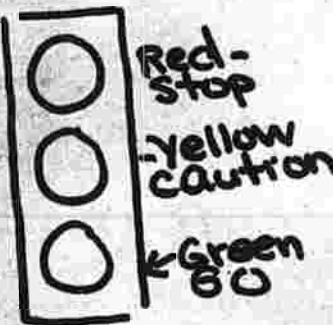
### Let's Go into Business!

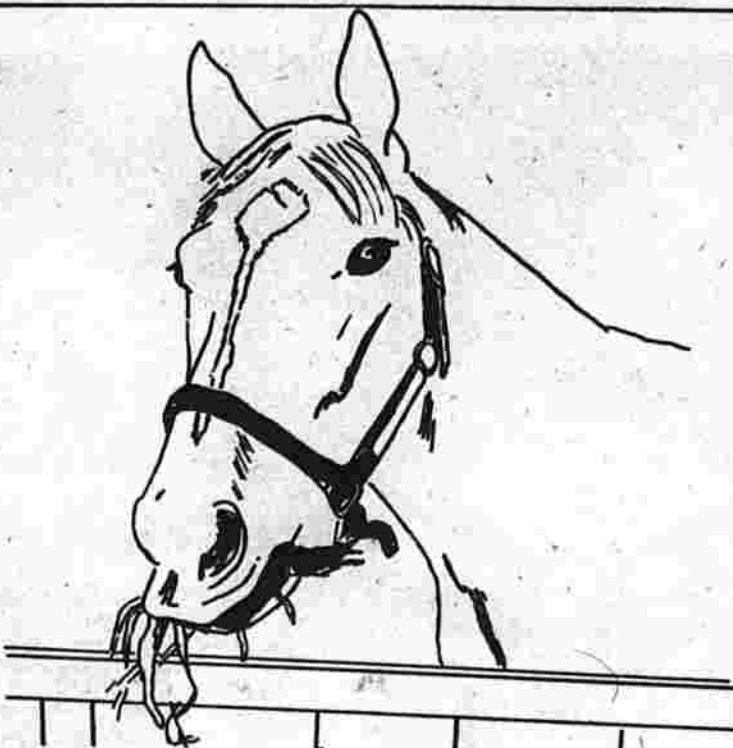

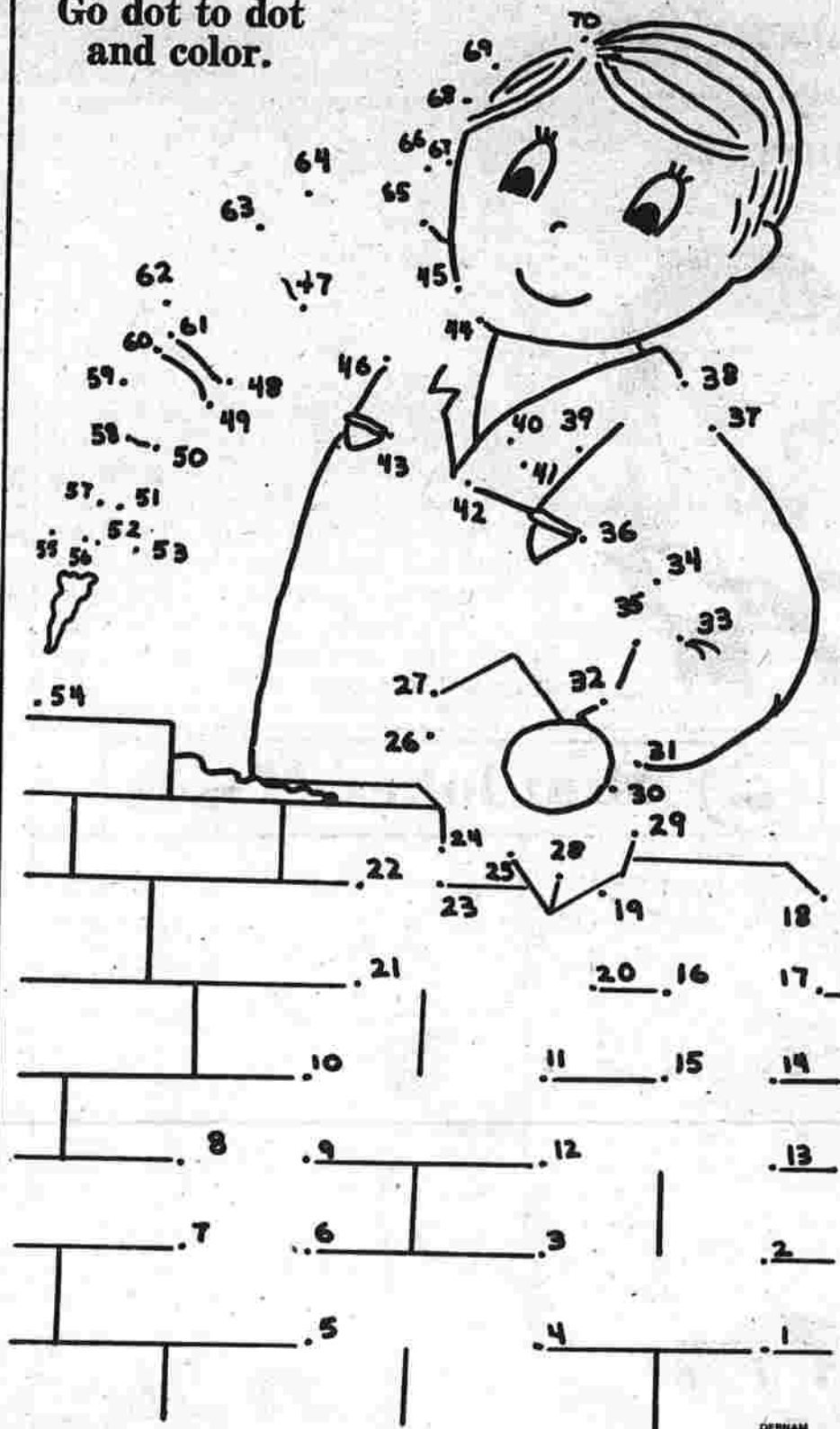
### Some Horse: Secretariat
