A few years ago an article appeared in Time Magazine praising the construction of the Charter Oak Park recreation complex on land surrounding a highway interchange as a creative way of learning to live with highways.

This facility, which was conceived and developed under the leadership of then Mayor Nathan Agostinelli, has since been used and enjoyed by thousands of Manchester residents as well as being the site of several statewide athletic contests.

It is unfortunate that there are already signs of waning enthusiasm for the facility on the part of town officials. The entry way to the park has deteriorated into a rutted, rainwashed dust bowl. A drinking fountain with a faulty valve has been running 24 hours a day for over a month, wasting water which has probably cost more than the repair will. The tennis courts are frequently littered with dirt to the extent that play becomes hazardous.

Proper maintenance is necessary not only to enhance the enjoyment of the facility, but to prevent costly repairs in the future as well. If I am successful in my campaign for the Board of Directors this fall, I will make certain, as a board member, that this facility, as well as all other town recreation facilities, are maintained in top condition.

No Nit-Picking Please

While we have no doubt of the eventual confirmation of Dr. Henry Kissinger as secretary of state by the Senate, we hope it can be achieved without the acrimony which has sometimes accompanied senatorial hearings in the past.

Dr. Kissinger has become a respected and acclaimed international figure in his role as national security adviser to the President. His feats in dealing with the North Vietnamese, the Russians and China has made him a great reputation as a very skilled and effective diplomat.

Kissinger has been de facto secretary of state, even though he did not have the title, nor the responsibility of the administration of the State Department. He has emerged as the most outstanding figure that the country has had since Dean Acheson and Cordell Hull.

A long, nit-picking session with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee could send Kissinger to the State Department with a bruised image which would hinder his efficiency in foreign affairs by reducing his stature. When dealing with nations which put a great premium on "face," it is important that our chief foreign officer be of equal or superior stature to those with whom he deals.

The foreign relations committee seems to have two issues on its mind. One is electronic surveillance of subordinates shortly after Kissinger became national security adviser. The other his retention of his title and role

of security adviser to the President.

The fear has been expressed that Kissinger, as national security adviser, may be considered as a presidential aide and hence be less accessible to Congress. He has answered this, we think, by his assertion that he hopes to initiate a new era of cooperation and communication between the State Department and the Congress.

Electronic surveillance of subordinates took place only four months after Kissinger had taken the position as adviser to the President. It, further, was endorsed by the then attorney-general and the FBI head, J. Edgar Hoover. While it could not place now, without court warrant, it obviously seemed justified at the time for national security and the prevention of leaks of important documents.

Senate committees, in hearings, too, often seem to become enamored of their publicity and lose sight of the objectives of the hearings. To us, Senator Fulbright, chairman, has often in the past seemed to be working against national interest. We find hazard that Kissinger will find a strong supporter in Senator Gale W. McGee of Wyoming, who has been a strong supporter of bi-partisan foreign policy.

The committee, and the Senate as a whole, will be doing a disservice to the country if they use the hearings as an opportunity to downgrade Kissinger or settle old scores with the administration.

Connally's Triumphant Debut

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — In his debut as a California politician, Ronald Reagan, ex-Democrat John B. Connally showed how thoroughly and spectacularly he can sell himself to the most inbred and insular Republican true believers.

The reaction to Connally's stem-winding address to a banquet session of the Republican state convention here was typified by one state legislative leader, rigidly conservative and long a faithful supporter of Gov. Ronald Reagan. Like many others, he arrived here curious but skeptical about Connally. After the speech, he confided to us: "If this guy is really running for President, I would say Ron has got problems." It was a frequently voiced sentiment.

The fact that Connally was here at all removed one of the two great doubts about his prospects for the presidential nomination. Old Connally watches doubted he would tear himself from the good life in Houston and Jamaica for the tedious Republican mashed-potato circuit. Yet, he not only came to San Diego in the first of many such party appearances but, in his press conference, sounded precisely like a presidential candidate three years before the convention.

Moreover, Connally's intimate associations with Lyndon B. Johnson made him a suspect. One California party strategist wondered aloud before the speech whether the old Connally-LBJ partnership might prove embarrassing in a presidential campaign. The link was underlined by the fact that Connally was accompanied here from Texas by his close friend and political adviser George Christian, President Johnson's last and favorite secretary (and still a Democrat).

Contracting this attitude was a masterful performance by Connally in his press conference (agreed to by him after some early balking), a 46-minute walk-through of a \$100-a-ticket cocktail party for him and finally the banquet speech itself. When Connally digressed during the speech into an impromptu lecture on international economics, some Republicans here suggested he might just be a little deeper than their own Ronald Reagan.

Although one prominent state party leader complained that Connally "sounds too much like a Baptist preacher," his evangelistic conservatism delighted the rank-and-file members from the moment he took the stage. "I felt the Democratic party of my father's past to join the Republican party of my children's future."

Survive Another Summer?

WASHINGTON — In all honesty, it is hard to share Thomas Moore's melancholy over the "last rose of summer" left blooming alone, and not only because there is not even a last rose left in a garden long ago eaten alive by every bug ever conceived by a fickle Nature.

Indeed, as September promises relatively cooler air, the question is whether Americans are tough enough and have enough character to survive another summer. In some distant century, will the archeologists from space digging in our ruins conclude that summer was fatal to the American breed?

I'd be tempted to bet on it if Jimmy the Greek offered attractive odds. For a while there, during the recent heat wave, a body half expected the sudden demise of half the population — not from the heat but from fear of it. Never before have so many people been so scared of hot weather.

Agency Pays Pregnancy Benefit Claims

HARTFORD (AP) — The Connecticut Department of Labor said Friday it has paid \$38,000 to women who were denied unemployment benefits when they became pregnant during the past two years. The department said it paid the claims of 293 women and received hundreds of other inquiries.

A state law denying benefits to pregnant women for the last two months of pregnancy and the first two months after delivery was declared unconstitutional last June by U.S. District Court Judge Robert C. Zampano. The issue had been brought to court in March by a New Haven school teacher.

Zampano set Sept. 24 as the deadline for persons to file claims for benefits, which had been denied them under the law. The new guidelines provide that women seeking benefits must give the Labor Department evidence that they were available for work during the time they were denied benefits and that they were trying to find jobs.
