## Chicken vs. Egg

Vice President Agnew has taken a bold stand in his announcement that he will not resign his office, even if he is indicted by a federal grand jury convened in Baltimore to weigh charges against him.

First of all, however, it should be remembered that indictment is not a conclusion of guilt. It is a decision that sufficient evidence exists against a defendant to make trial proper. Guilt of the offenses charged is arrived at only by trial. Hence, the Vice President should be accorded the legal presumption of innocence until such time as a trial is held.

It is evident, however, that Agnew is accepting a view of his invulnerability from trial and indictment, from his lawyers, which is based upon a presently undefined interpretation of the Constitution.

Article 3, paragraph 7 of the Constitution deals with the case at hand in the following language: "Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than removal from office and, disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall, nevertheless, be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law."

Mr. Agnew is undoubtedly basing his defense on the premise that impeachment must precede indictment and subsequent legal steps. This is the matter in dispute which will probably reach the Supreme Court.

There are, however, constitutional lawyers who argue that the language did not define a sequence of events but merely specified, that in cases of

impeachment, a defendant would not be able to use a plea of double jeopardy to forestall the application of other legal processes.

Because of the imprecision of the Constitution there are many legal facets of the Agnew case which are in doubt.

Three previous vice presidents were involved in scandals or charges, but none of their cases precisely fit the present one. They were John C. Calhoun, Schuyler Colfax and Aaron Burr.

Calhoun appealed his charge to the House—as Agnew did unsuccessfully—and was found without blame. Colfax under went impeachment proceedings but the House did not bring him to trial because the alleged offense had taken place prior to his ascendency to the vice presidency. This is also true in the case of Agnew.

Burr was indicted in criminal proceeding for killing Alexander Hamilton in a duel but was never convicted. His later disgrace came from other charges.

Another facet in the Agnew charges is that the statute of limitations on them—five years—runs out this winter. Hence, if he is not indicted and brought to trial prosecution will be outlawed.

## Voters And Watgate

There is a lot of speculation as to what effect Watgate and the allegations against Vice President Agnew will have on 1973 congressional elections.

We are concerned what effect they might have on our upcoming town elections.

Our concern is not that Republicans will suffer because of the events in Washington and Maryland or that it will be an open issue in the local campaigns.

Our concern is whether the voters will still turn out to vote.

Our fear is that there may be a strong tendency to take on a "pox on both of your houses" attitude by the voters and not vote.

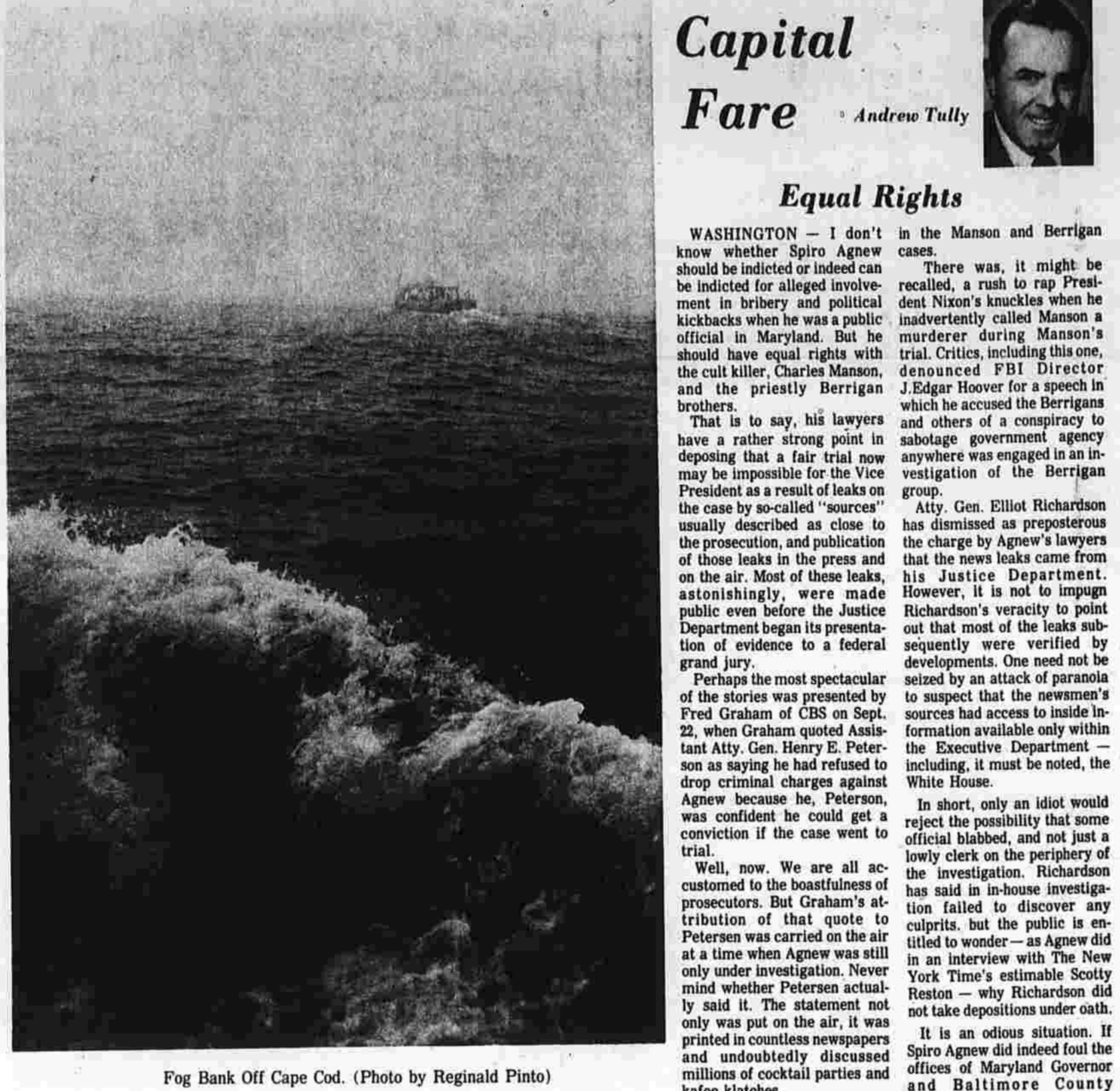

### Connally in Trouble

WASHINGTON — From his position of seeming unassailability as President Nixon's choice to succeed Spiro T. Agnew as Vice President, John B. Connally now confronts growing hostility from the conservative regulars who dominate the Republican party and outright threats of retaliation from his former Democratic brothers who would control his vice presidential confirmation.

That was not the way Mr. Nixon and neophyte Republican Connally had planned it when Agnew suddenly found himself in trouble eight weeks ago. Republican strategists are convinced that the President and Connally made a deal under which Connally's nomination would expose the Connally charm to Republican audiences. The purpose: to show that the former Texas Democrat could be as politically attractive a Republican campaigner as he had been. Mr. Nixon's Secretary of the Treasury.

The coast-to-coast exposure, which started in San Diego Sept. 8, would climax in an orgy of pro-Connally sentiment among Republican pro-looking voters for a winner at the moment. Agnew — according to the script — handed in his resignation. Connally's name would then be whittled to Capitol Hill for routine confirmation.

Agnew's stubborn refusal to play that script has now brought Connally under sharply critical political focus. Although still a leading prospect of success, Agnew is finally forced out, these bleemies show:

1. Agnew followers, in the phrase of one, are affronted by Connally's "obvious enthusiasm for Agnew's departure." The grumble that Connally has not hesitated to comment publicly on the Agnew case and even speculate on the vice presidential vacancy (in contrast to alliance from the probable new favorite of the Republican right wing, Gov. Ronald Reagan of California). When Connally commented recently that the thought of being President would "terrify" him, one Republican
