

#### Financial Disclosure

It seems likely that the Connecticut General Assembly may consider legislation calling for full financial disclosure of all public officials.

Meanwhile, out in California, city councilmen and county supervisors have been expressing irritation over a new financial disclosure law which affects them this year.

The law provides that as of April 1 councilmen, supervisors and other officials will have to make a full and public disclosure of their finances. It is known as the California Governmental Conflicts of Interest

Broadly it says that public officials are prohibited from having economic interest which are in substantial conflict with the proper exercise of his duties or powers.

What does this mean? It means, for instance, that a mayor or city manager cannot be a silent partner in a cement or asphalt plant which is a city or county's principal supplier of those commodities.

It means that a county supervisor who is deeply engaged in the real estate or developing business cannot make decisions, or participate in decisions, on zoning, when the area to financial interest.

It means that an insurance man holding public office cannot vote on where the insurance of a political unit will be placed, with consequent premium profits.

It means that a banker, who is on a county or city board cannot vote on where the unit's funds will be deposited, with consequent gain to the bank through the use of the money. It means that a city manager who owns a part of an electrical repair or supply house, or plumbing business is engaged in an illegal activity and should not continue in his position without divesting himself of such

business interest. Ownerships and business relationships such as we have cited are but a little more subtle refinement of the type of kickback which caused Spiro Agnew to resign from

the second highest office in the land. Those involved do not get their money in kickbacks but get it in profits which they are able to garner through their governmental position and influence.

The annuls of public service have been full of such instances in practically all of the history of the United States and for that matter all governments. But that does not make




NEW YORK (UPI) - Alabama and Purdue held on to their conference leads Monday night but they had to do it
