

Family Life Committee Hears Opinions

Fifteen residents attended the first in a series of meetings by the Family Life Committee at which public views on the proposed family life curriculum could be expressed Monday at Bolton Center School.

More information about the program, from its inception to the present, was given at the meeting by committee members than at any other time, although they said the Board of Education would not allow them to release any information earlier.

There has been a definite communications gap between FLC members and interested residents.

Marlyn Breslow, one of the nine FLC members present, began the meeting by explaining how the committee came into being and the work it has done since its inception two and a half years ago.

She stressed many times that nothing relating to the proposed curriculum would be approved by school board members until a thorough consensus from A to Z was taken, essentially resulting in a happy medium.

The committee hopes through its scheduled meetings to obtain input from the community as to the proposed program. They felt it is important for residents to attend one of the meetings, expressing their views so the goal can be reached.

Mrs. Breslow noted there are still many unanswered questions pertaining to the program such as who will teach

it? How will it be implemented if approved? How much it will cost.

She said the biggest problem seemed to result from the listing of the vocabulary for students in Kindergarten through Grade 5. She said although other towns did not list a vocabulary relating to their programs the Bolton committee felt that such a list could be used in correlation with various subject areas.

She said in the end the curriculum would not be composed of many small pamphlets but rather would be one book pertaining to the growth and development of children.

The book would include the following areas relating to growth and development of children: social, emotional, intellectual, physical and ethical.

Mrs. Breslow said that presently there is no health curriculum in Bolton schools.

She said she would like to have guidelines to follow to which she knows what extent, if any, students questions can be answered.

Mrs. Breslow said many in the Bolton community are not aware of the many problems caused by living with a step-parent as well as specific areas such as pregnancies at the high school, shoplifting and drinking including drinking at the Grade 7 and 8 dances.

Bunny Placco, committee member, said it was not the committee's plan to teach children but rather to help them develop. She said there are emotionally upset children, in the Bolton schools.

She said, "I don't believe the

questions tonight pertain to the mental health aspect of the proposed curriculum, they pertain only to the physical growth portion."

That comment was proven when those in attendance were asked if they had any comments or objections to the mental health portion. Only one comment was given — "it's good."

Jeffrey Heintz, guidance counselor and committee member, said the mental health curriculum was important for students as they do have trouble getting along.

He said the reason people were at the meeting was not to hear from the mental health curriculum but rather would be one book pertaining to the growth and development of children.

Heintz said in his counseling sessions he has many questions relating to various parts of the body and so on. He said it is the home's responsibility, but that the kids were educating themselves.

Heintz gave approximate figures as to students at the high school and the center school. He said about 13 percent of students at the Center School are living with a single parent and another 4 percent are living with a step-parent.

He said at the high school about 19 percent are living with a single parent and another 7 percent with a step-parent.

Mrs. Breslow, after asking if the vocabulary words turned people off, said it was never the intention of the committee or the teachers to teach words, rather to be able to use correct terminology in answer to questions.

Barbara Spoto, member of the Committee of Concerned

Parents, said parents she spoke with are not approving the program as they were too busy with their own children and felt the program was not necessary. Mrs. Breslow said it was lovely they had a good relationship but that the committee still wanted ideas from parents as to what they approved and what they objected to.

Parents in general felt the proposed program was too extreme as to grade level implementation. Even at the high level they felt many students would not be ready emotionally to handle such instruction.

Parents didn't seem to have any objection to teaching the human reproduction system from Grade 7 up in line with the science or biology course, but objected strongly to any sexually being taught.

One parent who seemed to sum it all up said that teaching the reproductive system would be okay in the biological aspect but not in the social aspect and further said it would be okay to begin in Grade 7, not Grade 4.

Parents seemed to feel strongly that it would be impossible to teach sex as related to emotions and morals. As for emotions, they can't be taught and as for morality, parents want no one else teaching that to their children.

Committee members told parents in attendance that their opinions were being respected and they asked for respect. They said they want the final curriculum to be accepted by the community, including the children who cannot attend.

At that point, Tom Sheridan, teacher and committee member, said that he is against

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King Favors Manager Type Of Government

"I certainly don't have any monopoly on the truth nor an excessive amount of wisdom, but I'd be less than candid if I were to tell you I'm here as a neutral person."

So spoke Preston C. (Bud) King last night, in an appearance before Manchester's government-study committee (Blue Ribbon) committee.

King, for 30 years a town manager and for 18 of those years in Bloomfield, is now executive vice president of the Connecticut Bankers' Association.

"The growth of the council-manager form of government in America is proof of its strength," he insisted. "It didn't grow by accident and it's a miracle in some ways it even surprised me. It grew out of the mind of Richard Childs (a Manchester native who founded and nurtured the concept). It was never backed openly by any political party. It grew because of its worth — a worth that's been proved in the past."

He said, "The unique thing about the council-manager government is the presence of a full-time professional, experienced and experienced on a day-to-day basis."

He said of himself, "I'm a very political animal, but I was probably a maverick manager, yet, in the swing town of Bloomfield, I worked well with both parties."

He said his family was "up to the eyes in Boston and Massachusetts politics," and that his grandfather was

speaker of the Massachusetts House.

"I love politics, yet I'm all for the council-manager form of government," he said.

King, a dynamic manager, praised Mayor Richard Blackstone of East Hartford as a dynamic strong-mayor "who has recognized the importance of professional competency." Blackstone addressed the committee last month.

King said East Hartford, because it is a power base for the Democratic party and because a mayor can get re-elected often, provided he is in-charge of a strong mayor, is an exception to the rule.

"Because the mayor is a competent mayor and will be around for awhile there, he is building a real professional staff."

He said, "The name of the game in politics is 'survival,' and many times in many places elected officials stay out of the front lines — fearful of defeat — and let the manager carry the ball, assuring him of their backing." He said that was the case for him in Bloomfield.

Some managers, he acknowledged, run caretaker administrations, while others involve themselves in the

The members of the Planning and Zoning Commission voted to grant two requests for public hearings at their meeting Tuesday night. The hearings, which are scheduled for Feb. 5, at 8 p.m. in the Town Office Building, are for the Foxborough subdivision on Baskethor Rd. and Northern Hills subdivision on Old Colechester Rd.

Concerning the Foxborough subdivision, Paul Schur, principal sanitarian of the Connecticut State Department of Health, said in a letter to Richard Keele, Hebron building inspector, "The lots in their present condition offer severe limitations for one-side sewage disposal."

Schur added, "We do not recommend approval of these lots for subdivision until a satisfactory solution has been reached to install sewage disposal systems in compliance with the Public Health Code."

The commission members also reviewed a new preliminary map of property owned by William Eisenman. The property is on Wall St. and Loveland Rd. Eleven lots, each with a minimum of 200 feet of frontage and each two acres or more were shown. The balance would remain as a farm. The new map will be sent to the Conservation Commission and the Recreation Commission.

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Turn Stock Market Losses to Tax Gains

As a general rule it is best to make a stock market gain long-term so that only half the profit is taxed and to make losses short-term in order to make them fully deductible. But most people will have more than one transaction during the course of the year. Some will be profitable, some will not. Some will be short-term, while others will be long-term. What then? Take your short-term transactions first. Offset losses against gains and arrive at a final net figure.

Now do the same thing with your long-term transactions and arrive at a net figure in that category. You now have two net figures, one for short-term transactions, the other for long-term dealings. Again, offset one against the other. You now have a single figure which will fall into one of these categories:

- 1. A net short-term gain. That's bad. It is fully taxable.
- 2. A net short-term loss. This is good for tax purposes. Take \$1,000 of the loss as an offset against other income. If any loss still remains, carry it forward to next year.
- 3. Net long-term gain. This is the best. Only one-half of the gain is added to your other income to be taxed.
- 4. Net long-term loss. This is the worst possible ending. Such loss dollars are worth only 50 cents each. If the total loss is less than \$2,000, divide it by two and subtract that amount from other income. If it is more than \$2,000, use \$2,000 of it to cancel out \$1,000 of ordinary income and carry the excess forward to next year.

Whenever you carry a tax loss forward it retains its original identity as either short-term or long-term and is applied accordingly in future years.

Initial agreement has been reached on a new policy relating to teachers who are ordered into active duty as a member of the military reserves and/or the National Guard.

Agreement on compensation for summer curriculum writing is expected soon. Both sides are confident of reaching accord on the contract, according to spokesmen.

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Lull Before The Storm?

Despite feelings to the contrary, there is a more or less state of suspended animation in a certain sector of state politics.
In a few weeks, Gov. Thomas Meskill will be unveiling his budget for the state. In the meantime, what he is recommending is a tightly kept secret except for a few tantalizing teasers like a one-half per cent (but no more) cut in the sales tax and elimination of the sales tax on utility bills.
The various state agencies know what they have requested and now are more or less holding their breaths to await what the administration will actually recommend to the General Assembly.

Private colleges, costs are increasing. Particularly of concern to Manchester is how the budget for the state's community college system will fair under the governor's economy-minded budget reviewers. Manchester Community College is growing and the projection is for continued growth meaning greater needs for facilities, staff, and other services.
The community college concept is just coming into its own and in the light of changing life-styles, especially the energy crisis, this commuter-oriented form of education can reasonably be expected to gain more favor with Connecticut students in the future.
We do not envy the governor in his attempts to pare budget requests, which undoubtedly exceed anticipated revenues, nor the assembly which will be faced with finalizing a state budget.
There will be many groups, representing diverse interests, seeking their "fair share" of the state's revenues.
The governor's budget message will reflect his priorities and to the extent that these are acceptable to the agencies involved and the assembly will set the tone of the coming session. If the governor is generous, and some believe he can be in the light of the current surplus and his need for reviving popular support in an election year, the budget may have smooth sailing. If it is an austerity one, the session could become a free-for-all.
In the meantime, we all wait for the first shoe — the governor's budget recommendations — to fall.

Then, depending how each fared with the governor, the politicking will begin. For those who fared well, it will be a defensive thing to keep it and for those who may feel they have been unfairly cut back, pressure will be mounted on the assembly to over-ride the governor's budget recommendations.
So far now the efforts to influence legislators are more general than specific and might be termed the cultivation phase that is a necessary prelude to what is hoped will be a bountiful harvest later on.
The cities and towns are pushing quite strongly for increased state school aid. Indications are that there will be some increase but it is doubtful it will be on the scale desired by the hard-pressed property-tax dependent towns and cities.
Education on the higher levels too will be seeking more, despite a general leveling off of enrollment in four-year institutions and a decline in

Give DST A Chance

Connecticut, Congresswoman Ella Grasso has asked the Congress to determine whether energy saving from year around daylight time is worth the hardship it imposes on Americans.
In particular, she has cited the danger of children going to school in darkness during the winter months, a problem most Manchester area schools have overcome by opening the school day about 30 minutes later. She also stated that at least five students were injured since DST started Jan. 6 before school changed starting times.
While such a study might be useful, we feel the problem has been resolved as far as the school children are concerned by the later opening of schools. It is unfortunate that the change to DST came in the middle of a school year and that school and safety authorities did not adequately anticipate the potential dangers of children walking to school or waiting for buses in early morning darkness. However, now that DST will be in effect until April 1974, we can see no

reason why the school day should not be adjusted accordingly.
We would suggest the school opening time be set with DST in mind on a full school year basis to reduce to a minimum confusion in the minds of younger children as to when school starts under a split opening time schedule. Further, a uniform full-time schedule, would enable working parents to more readily work out daycare or sitter arrangements.
Granted the energy saving in the schools may not be great but the fact is that the bulk of our energy use nationally is in business and industry and it is here, we feel, the study requested by Mrs. Grasso will show substantial energy savings.
The problem of hardship or inconvenience is relative and in this case we think the shifting of the school day to a later starting time is a fair compromise that can be made if we are to conserve energy. The problem is one of adjustment, rather than abandonment, of a rather simple and easy way to save substantial energy in this crucial period.

An Insult

To the editor:
The juggling and manipulation of town tax funds to placate a small minority of Manchester people in the purchase of Case Mountain did not come as any great surprise. Yet, it sets a new low in the consideration of the total voting population of the town. Town Manager Weiss, Mayor Thompson, and the eight directors all became willing parties to his foolhardy stroke on Tuesday, Jan. 15.
All of these town officials had full knowledge of the following estimated heavy expenditures that are just ahead:
1. December ice storm cleanup, \$100,000.
2. Increased gasoline and fuel costs, \$125,000.
3. Increased garbage pickup cost, \$50,000.
4. Increased education department demands, \$600,000.
Did these town officials display one iota of concern for tax funds conservation, or any desire to apply the \$107,000 against the above increases that will fall heavily on the taxpayers? No, of course not. Instead they took full advantage of the situation and crammed the purchase of Case Mountain down the throats of the voters and taxpayers.
The directors have adopted the policy that luxuries are to be bought with the money taken away from necessities.
The ultimate cost of the Case Mountain program will probably reach \$500,000 when the roads, fencing, parking facilities, insurance, police and fire protection, etc., are reckoned in.
The Case Mountain purchase really points out a glaring defect in the Town Charter. The expenditure of any sum in excess of \$100,000 should be decided by a referendum to enable the voters to approve or reject the spending of such an amount.
The Charter Revision Commission in 1973 made sure to settle and shoot down just such a proposal. Members of that commission who had connections with the Conservation Commission knew that the purchase of Case Mountain would come up and stood a good chance of defeat if put to a vote.
The suppression of the voters' right to a referendum by the mayor and the Board of Directors is an affront and an insult to the townspeople.
Where do these officials get the idea that they can eliminate the democratic process and nullify the American tradition of government by the people and for the people?

McCarthy Has A Point

WASHINGTON — Gene McCarthy, who more or less ran for President in 1968 and 72, does have a point. The former senator from Minnesota thinks we should punish naively Presidents by repealing the constitutional two-term limit and "say a President has to keep running." McCarthy always keeps his tongue close to cheek, so he may have been kidding in a lecture delivered to a passel of reporters and students. But I for one will take the proposal under advisement. If only as a device for sparing the people of America the trauma and annoyance — and boredom — of another Watergate scandal.
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The two term amendment never made sense. It was simply a right hook to Franklin D. Roosevelt's groin. I refuse to be drawn into a discussion of whether FDR deserved this back-handed tribute because I don't have all year to write this piece. But it is fair to recall that Roosevelt did not get to serve third and fourth terms in the White House by executive fiat but by vote of the people. Anyway, although McCarthy didn't say so, the two-term limit could be an awful temptation to a President entering his second term.

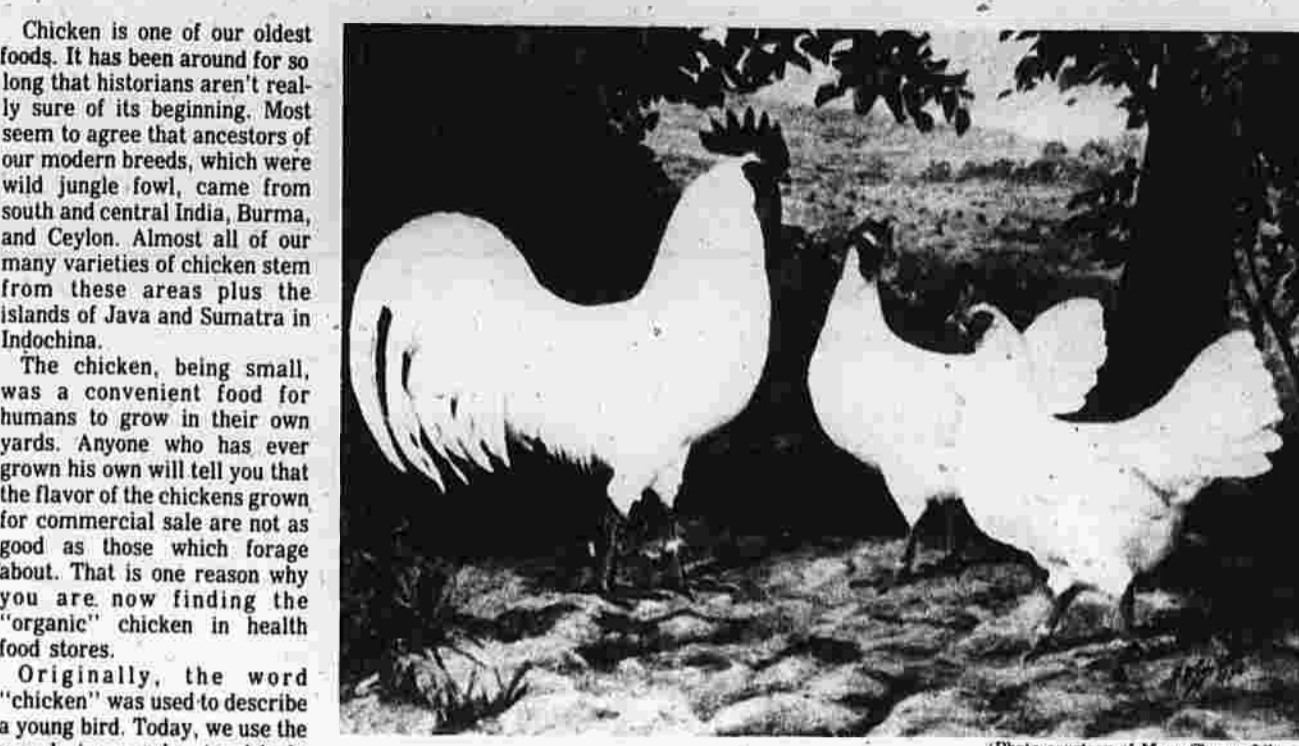

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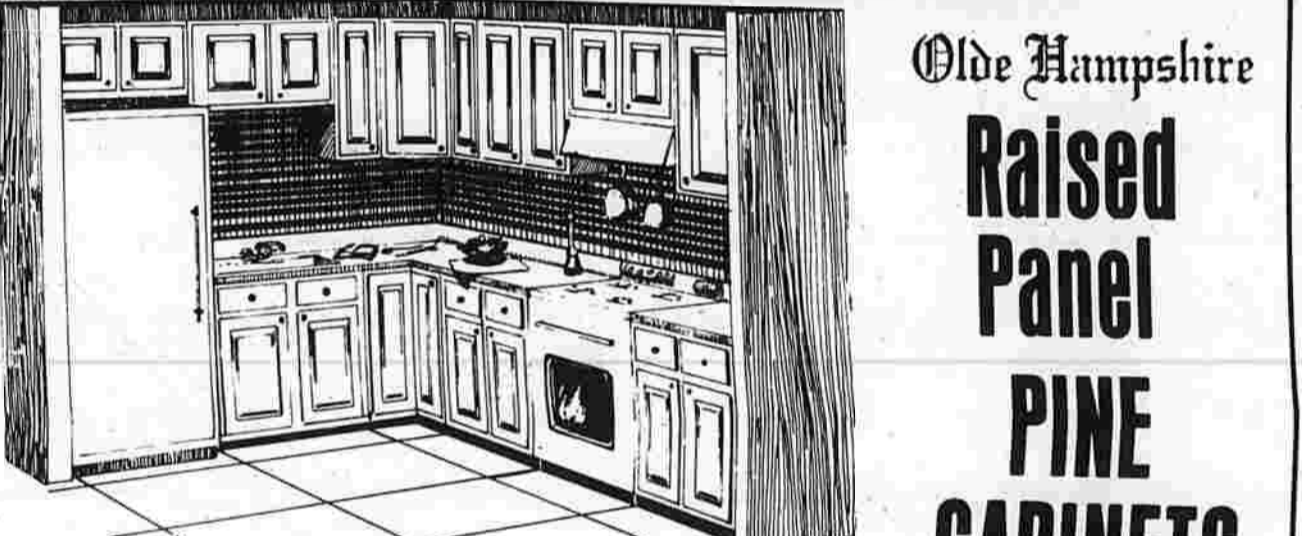

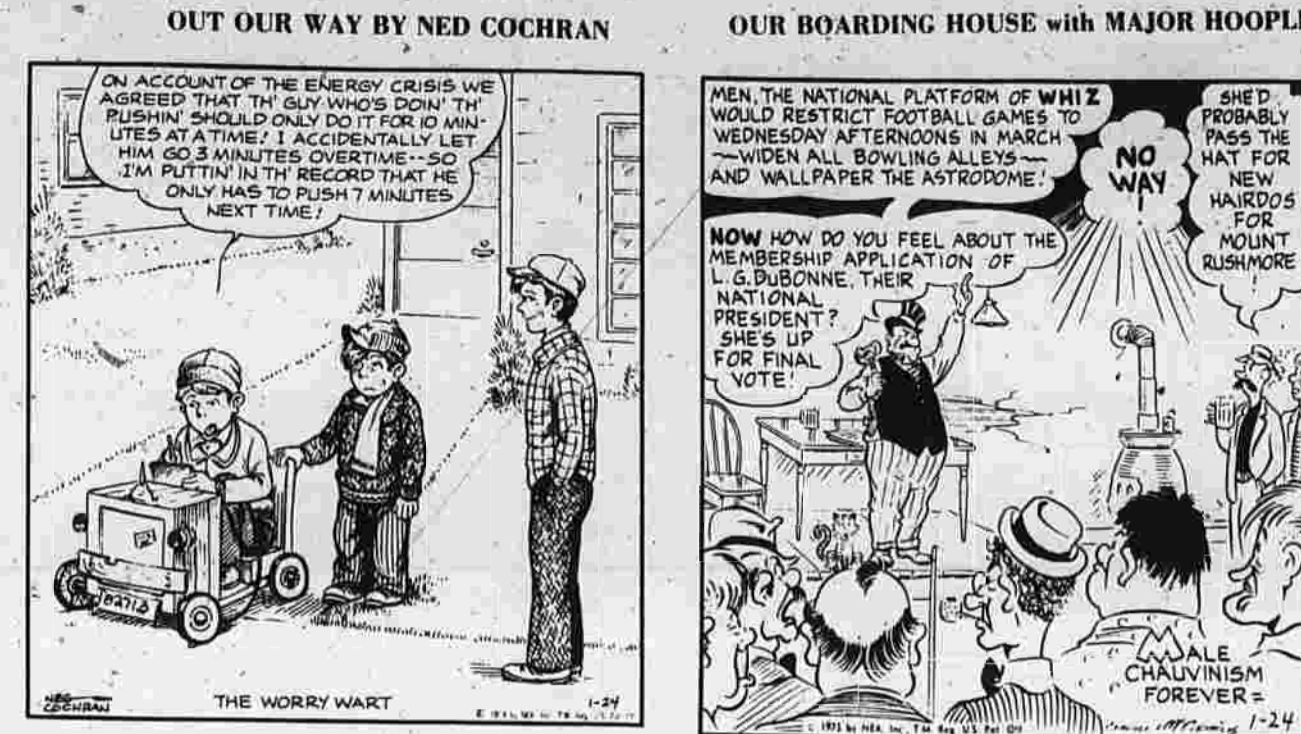
