







### Good Taste Prevails At Pot Au Feu

A new concept in restaurant dining has been introduced by Kermit Royce and Stefanie Shereky, owners of the Pot Au Feu in New York City. Opened just a few weeks ago and located in Rockefeller Center at 123 West 49th St., this chic eatery offers a feast for the eyes.

In this casually-elegant restaurant designed for the on-the-go gourmets, thick, hearty soups and stews based on recipes from around the world, dating back as far as the 17th century, fill the bill of fare.

The restaurant's namesake, Pot Au Feu, a New York-style soup brimming with chunks of meat, chicken, vegetables and a dumpling is a daily feature. Thirteen other one-dish meals share honors on a rotating basis weekly and include French Onion Soup, bubbling with tangy cheese; Rock Center Claw Chowder; Vienna Chicken Stew, made with sour cream and seasoned paprika; Hungarian Goulash Soup; Cream of Chicken Soup a la Reine, with wine and herbs; and Mushroom Beef and Barley Bowl are but a few of the delicious, homemade items on the menu. Accompanying the entrees are thick slices of dark rye bread, topped with butter, salt and pepper, plus a dust of deserts such as fruit cobbler and creme caramel; cabinet pudding and a mousse.

All are prepared under the careful guidance of Chef Alfred, award-winning Gold Medalist of the Societe Culinare Philanthropique. Swiss-born and European trained, Chef Alfred has worked extensively both abroad and in the United States over the last 25 years.

Prices are scaled to fit any budget. Dessert and coffee, tea or soft drinks are included. Draught beer or wine ordinaire are available.

Diners make their selections from a dark green Italian marble serving table, set off by orange tile, and a canopy in colors ranging from bitter-sweet to marigold, and a shimmering steel-beaded drape. A waterfall, surrounded by greenery, multi-tiered dining tables to accommodate 150 diners with butcher-block tables and weathered wood walls add the warmth of a country inn.

Large "pewter bowls" and sturdy stainless steelware add to the charm of Pot Au Feu. Appetizers and other drinks are served from 4:30 till 9 p.m. The restaurant is open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays.

The restaurant owners have graciously consented to share their "Pot Au Feu" recipe with us for our readers to clip and save.

#### Pot Au Feu

- Ingredients:
- 2 lbs. boiling beef (chuck, brisket)
  - 2 frying chicken (1 1/2 lbs. each, white)
  - 3 carrots
  - 4 stalks celery
  - 1 medium onion
  - 2 bay leaves
  - 3 cloves
  - 1 clove garlic
  - dash of nutmeg
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon peppercorns
  - 3 turnips
  - 12 pearl onions
  - 1/2 green cabbage (medium)
  - 2 stalks leeks
  - 6 ounces medium noodles
  - 8 scallions, chopped, stems and all

#### Directions:

Boil beef and chicken in uncovered kettle to which has been added 2 stalks of celery, 1 medium onion, 1 carrot, 2 bay leaves, 3 cloves, 1 clove garlic, dash of nutmeg, salt and peppercorns. Cook whole chicken 20 minutes, or until tender. Remove. Continue cooking beef about two hours or until done. Remove beef. Save broth and strain.  
Skin and bone chicken and cube. Cut meat into cubes. Dice remaining vegetables, except scallions, and cook separately in boiling, salted water until tender (about 15 minutes), but no too soft. Cook noodles in boiling, salted water about 10 minutes, until just done.  
Strain noodles and add to stock. Add vegetables, chicken and beef chunks, adjust seasonings with salt and freshly ground pepper. Mix through. Sprinkle with scallions, chopped, stems and all. Serves eight.

### School Bus To Omit Six Stops

Starting Monday there will be a change in the schedule of the bus route to Rockville High School with six bus stops on the afternoon run of Bus 4A to be eliminated.

Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, said the reason for the elimination of the six stops is that due to the long run the bus has to make, pupils were arriving late at the high school.

Dr. Ramsdell explained that rather than have pupils arriving late for classes he feels the pupils can walk to another bus stop thereby allowing the bus to pick up the necessary minutes in order to arrive at the school on time.

This bus leaves the high school at 12:20 p.m., drops off the students in the morning session and picks up those for the afternoon session.

Stops will be at the following points: Bolton and Cemetery Roads; Bolton Rd. & Pineview Dr.; Bolton Rd. and Hatch Hill Rd.; Bolton and Wildwood; Chiles Dr.; Grier Dr.; Hatch Hill and Brandy Hill; Bamforth and Cemetery; Tunnel and Estelle; and Warren and Frederic (east).

All students from the following areas will be involved in the change: Bolton Rd., Pineview, Brandy Hill, Dokerel, Hatch Hill, Grier, Cubes, Beechwood, Beverly, Lynwood, Baker, Bamforth, Maxwell, Tamra, and Cemetery, Tunnel (19-179), Hartford Tpke. (665), Maple, Warren, Frederic, Estelle, Susan, and Kanter.

The bus is scheduled to arrive back at the high school at 12:32 p.m.

The superintendent also said it has been brought to his attention that some students, while waiting for school buses, have been throwing snowballs at pedestrians, passing cars, and the approaching school bus. He said he wishes to warn the students doing this that it is a very serious offense and will be dealt with most severely. He requests their cooperation in eliminating this problem.

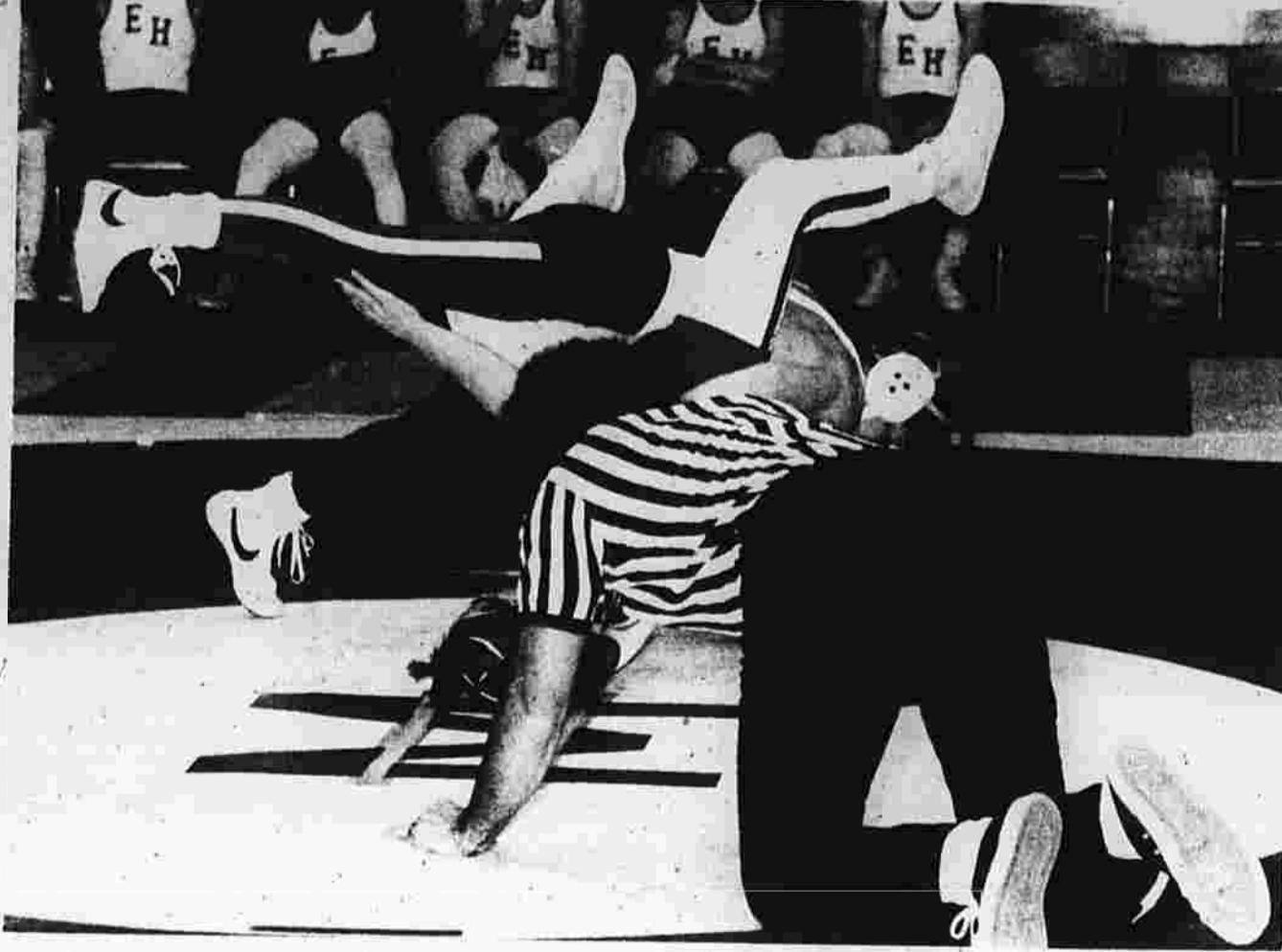

It took minutes for the ice to be cleared as the fans tossed beer bottles on the ice. Not surprisingly, they shattered, creating the mess. Once the game was finally resumed, Chicago blanketed Boston for that 50 seconds to preserve their 2-1 triumph over the Bruins.

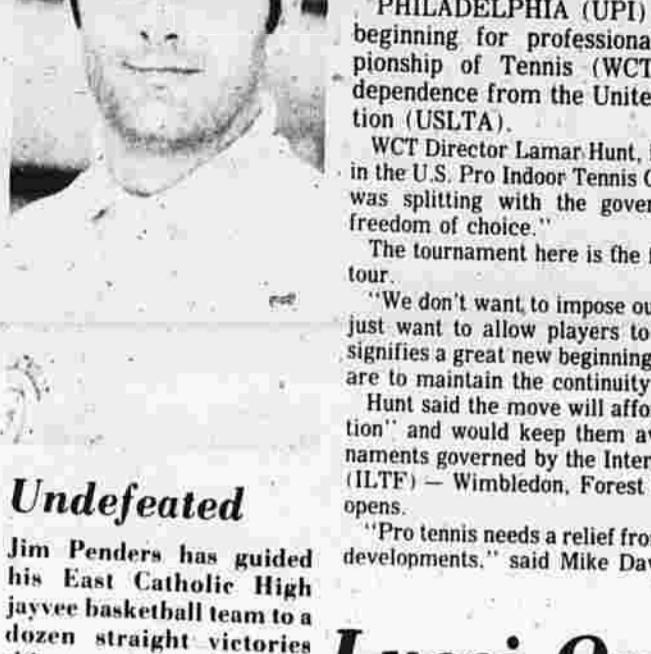

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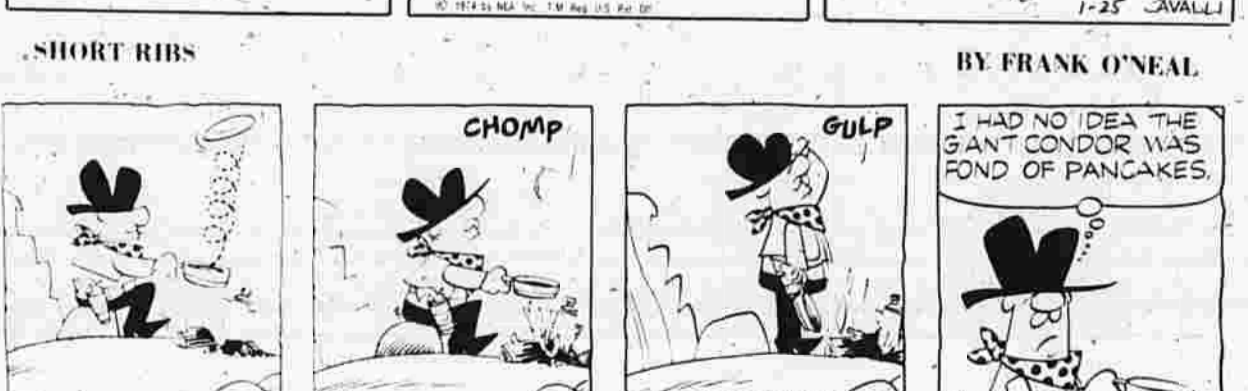

Louis' Lunch Swallowed. NEW HAVEN (UPI) - The aldermanic committee on urban development has approved a plan to build a medical complex which would swallow up Louis Lunch, believed to be the first hamburger restaurant in the country. The board of aldermen is expected to take final action on the plan March 4. The committee said the New Haven Redevelopment Agency will try to find a suitable site for Louis Lunch in downtown New Haven.

Vernon Killian Continues Attack On Major Oil Companies. BARBARA RICHMOND State Atty. Gen. Robert Killian is not letting up in his fight against the petroleum industry. Killian said he hopes that his stand against it as he spoke at the Distinguished Service Award dinner of the Vernon Jaycees Wednesday night. The approval was based on the provision that the town pay the advance fees for preliminary site costs, architect fees and legal fees. This is expected to run about \$22,000 and will be reimbursed by the state as part of the grant, if that amount is not exceeded. The additional units will go on town-owned land adjacent to the Grove Street housing project for the elderly and will include a community room for use of that project and the new one.

Vernon Plans Five-Mile Race. A group of Vernon residents have formed a five-mile race organization called the "Vernon Rabbit Run, Inc." and from this has developed plans for a road race for Vernon. The first official race is planned for April 13. Plans are not finalized although tentative by the race will cover five miles and will be open to runners of all ages. The race has been sanctioned by AAU officials and has been scheduled in its calendar for 1974. All proceeds will be directed to the Heart Fund and a facility for the Indian Valley YMCA. AAU officials have assured committee members that inclusion of the race on its schedule will guarantee at least 75 runners. Local committee members led the race will provide a "tune up" for those planning to participate in the Boston Marathon which is scheduled for April 15 and will cover 26 miles.

Federal Energy Administrator William E. Simon has agreed to send an investigative team to Connecticut "within a week" to look into reports that the state is being shortchanged under the federal gasoline allocation program.

Simon agreed to the investigation Friday after meeting with Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., who told Simon that consumers in Connecticut "are taking a beating on price and supply and we want to know why."

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Turkish Airlines Crashes

IZMIR, Turkey (UPI) — A Turkish Airlines twin-engine F28 jet with 72 Turks aboard crashed onto its right wing immediately after takeoff today and burst into flames, airport officials said.

Police said 62 persons died in what airport officials called Turkey's worst air disaster. The survivors were seriously injured, officials said.

The plane carried 68 passengers and a crew of five, police said. It was on a scheduled daily 50-minute flight to Istanbul.

Witnesses said the plane fell onto its right wing immediately after liftoff. A fuel tank exploded into flames and rescue workers were unable to get near the burning wreckage.

The cause of the crash was not immediately determined. Airport officials said when the plane crashed at 7:07 a.m. most died on route or shortly after arrival.

It was the second crash of an F28 jet this month. On Jan. 1, an F28 owned by Italy's Lavia airline crashed while landing at Turin, killing 39 of the 43 persons aboard.
