Watergate Grand Jury Indicts Seven

Postage Increases Tonight

Post Office Stamp Business Booms

Business is booming at the Manchester Post Office. Though the two-cent increase in first class postage becomes effective at midnight tonight, postal workers already are swamped with customers and bulk mail hurried out before the increase.

By early Thursday afternoon about \$15,000 worth of the new 10-cent stamps had been sold, according to Pat Humphrey, assistant postmaster. Only about \$500 worth of stamps is normally bought on routine days.

"I just don't understand it," Humphrey said. "People are buying coils of stamps and this is most unusual." Air mail goes to 13 cents, postcards increase to 8 cents and postage on books, records, newspapers and magazines, mail order merchandise and parcel post will also rise.

Humphrey urged people to check the pickup time posted on mailboxes. The last Manchester pickup for 8-cent mail was at 3 p.m. today except for about 20 mailboxes in the business district where the deadline is 5 p.m., and the box situated in front of the post office where the last pickup of the day is made at 6:45 p.m. Any letter mailed after these times will require the new stamps or an additional 2-cent stamp with the old 8-cent stamp.

Asked if he thought the increase would lower the volume of mail, Humphrey stated that he expected the amount of mail to grow steadily, as it always has.

At any rate, there won't be a shortage of paper at the post office.

Insurer Steering Of Glass Customers Alleged By Bosco

HARTFORD (UPI) — After 18 months of foot-dragging the Connecticut Insurance Department has finally agreed to say whether insurance companies may legally steer customers to chosen shops for replacing broken automobile glass.

The decision was promised amid charges Allstate and Nationwide insurance companies are violating federal antitrust laws and Connecticut insurance regulations in the booming business of replacing broken automobile glass.

The president of the Connecticut Glass Dealers Assn., Salvatore A. Bosco Jr., also accused the firms of "extorting" small glass shop owners with threats of undercutting their business unless they agree to lower prices in exchange for being designated the firms' chosen shop for local customer referrals.

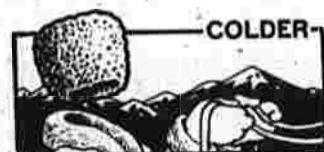
"Allstate sends men around to the shops and tells them, 'If you will meet our low price we won't bring in the mobile units,'" Bosco told United Press International.

The mobile units, Bosco said, are specially-equipped trucks often dispatched from distant places to replace broken automobile glass at a smaller cost to insurance companies than is regularly charged.

One mobile unit operates out of Danbury, Bosco said, owned by Federal Glass, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Shatter-Proof Glass Corp., of Detroit. Another, located in Manchester, is Assurance Glass Corp., a subsidiary of Globe-Amerada Glass Co., Chicago, Bosco said.

The Manchester firm is located at 61 Tolland Tpke. and is managed by Daniel Lee. The mobile units can charge less because they get glass for less from the big companies, that own them, Bosco said. Globe-Amerada is involved in about 30 antitrust suits in the Chicago area for the same practices occurring in Connecticut, Bosco said.

When an insurance company threatens to undercut local business unless the designated

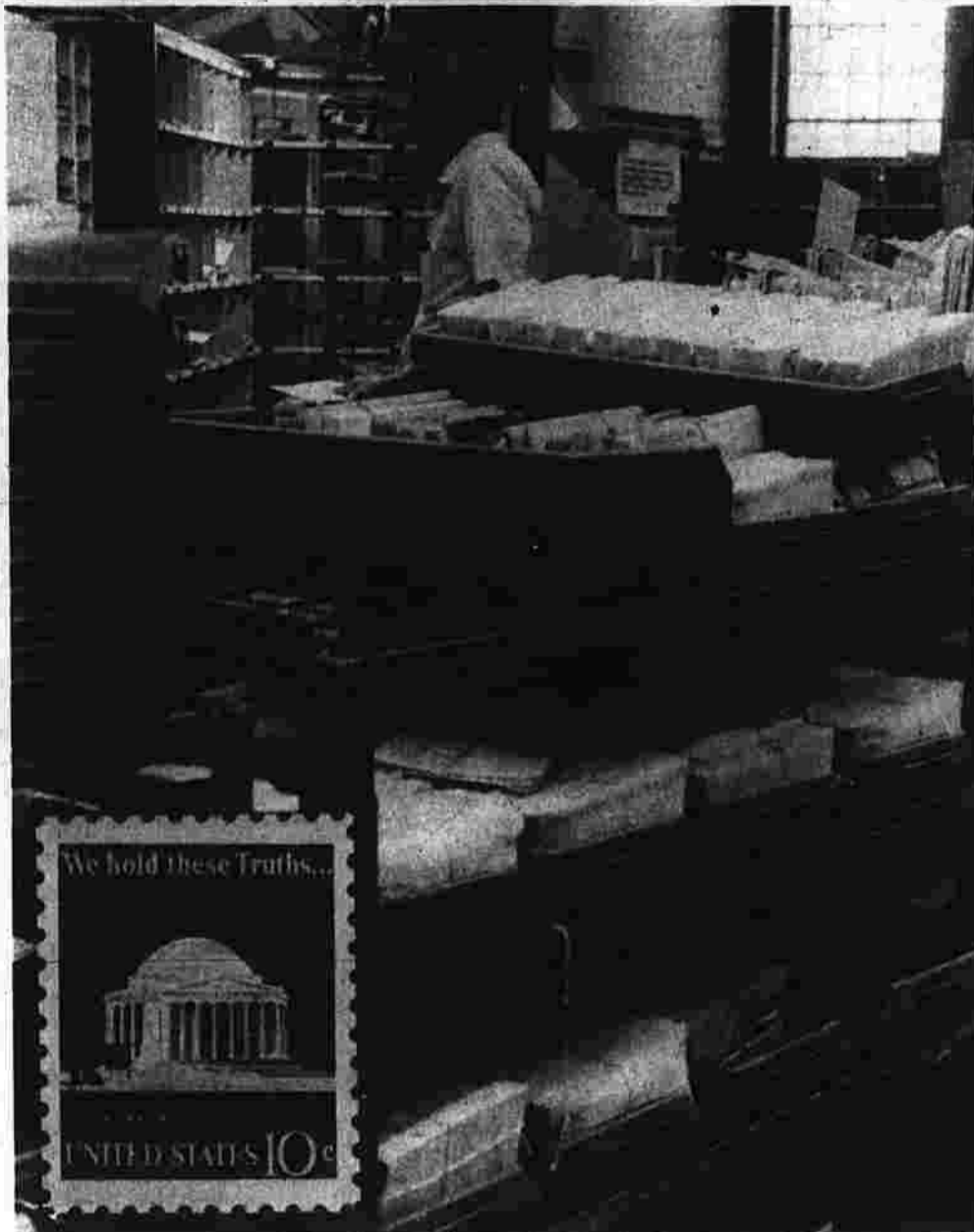

Town Directors Given School Budget Overview

The Board of Directors' general reaction to the proposed operational budget for the next fiscal year starting July 1 as presented by the Board of Education last night was generally favorable.

The Board of Education explained a budget of more than \$11,959,103.

In presenting the overview of the proposed budget — which members of both boards followed with their own copies — Allan Thomas, chairman of the Board of Education, described it as one which carried over the present budget and projected into the future.

Most of the discussion between the two boards centered on explanations for requests for extra teachers in different fields.

John Yavis, chairman of the finance committee for the Board of Education, explained the recommendation for two art teachers to be added to the present elementary school staff. He said they could provide art classes to the elementary classes weekly instead of every other week as in the present schedule. The recommendation is for \$18,000 to provide for the two art teachers.

one such teacher at a cost of \$11,000. Seeking improvement in the services of the learning disability program, the proposed budget recommends 2.2 teachers and 2 aides.

Kennedy said between 5 and 6 per cent of the elementary school children are exceptional. Kennedy also expressed regret that "We do not have a residential setting for such (exceptional) students." Many are being sent out-of-town to other schools and tuition is a big item, although two-thirds of it is reimbursable.

The maintenance program is one of which Kennedy said, "Of all the services we perform, this is the one we do least well."

Yavis said two full-time maintenance employees spend most of their time replacing broken windows as a result of vandalism — two employees who could be working otherwise on maintenance.

A capital improvement budget item calling for a centrally controlled burglar and fire alarm system costing \$50,000 would substantially reduce the vandalism, the Board of Education feels.

President Nixon Not Charged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A federal grand jury today indicted seven of President Nixon's top aides, including H.R. Haldeman, John D. Ehrlichman, John N. Mitchell and Charles W. Colson for the Watergate bugging and coverup.

Nixon, who publicly has accepted responsibility but not blame for the scandal, was not charged.

Others indicted included Robert C. Mardian, former assistant attorney general and a Nixon campaign aide; Washington attorney Kenneth Wells Parkinson; and former Haldeman assistant Gordon Strachan.

Along with the indictment, Watergate special prosecutor Leon Jaworski handed chief U.S. Judge John J. Sirica what Jaworski described as a "sealed report" from the grand jury.

The contents were not disclosed, but it had been reported that the jury intended to make a separate report on its views of Nixon's possible role in Watergate and its cover-up.

Although it had been expected that a number of former

presidential aides would be accomplices, none was mentioned in the 50-page indictment.

All seven were named in a single indictment. Sirica set March 9 for arraignment, at the suggestion of Richard Ben-Veniste, assistant Watergate prosecutor. Ben-Veniste explained that Mitchell, on trial in New York, would be unavailable until that date.

The richly detailed indictment, signed by Leon Jaworski, capped an exhaustive 20-month grand jury investigation and was believed to represent the most comprehensive accusation of political wrongdoing in American history.

The indictment charged that all seven men "unlawfully, willfully and knowingly did combine, conspire and agree together with each other to commit offenses against the United States, to wit, to obstruct justice."

Referring to the Watergate cover-up in the conspiracy charge the indictment charged the seven with using "deceit, craft, trickery and dishonest means" to interfere with the functions of the Central Intelligence Agency.

In addition, it charged that they conspired to defraud the United States by interfering with the FBI and Justice Department investigations of the Watergate case.

The conspiracy charge also alleged that the seven "destroyed documents, papers, records and objects" relating to the investigation.

The prosecution also charged the seven with conspiring to make clemency offers to three of the seven original Watergate defendants, E. Howard Hunt Jr., G. Gordon Liddy and James W. McCord Jr., as well as to Job Stuart Magruder, who was Nixon's deputy campaign manager.

There were a number of perjury charges, relating to testimony the seven men gave before the Senate Watergate Committee last summer.

Much of the indictment set forth facts already testified to publicly before the committee. But there was fresh material as well — including an allegation that Mitchell in January, 1973, authorized the promise of executive clemency to be made to McCord.

The crimes mentioned in the indictment included conspiracy, obstruction of justice, making false statements to the FBI, perjury and lying before a grand jury or court.

The historic court proceeding lasted only 10 minutes, and Sirica signed an order banning "extra-judicial statements" on the part of prosecutors, defendants, witnesses and any others connected with the case.

Court observers said Sirica's order would prohibit virtually any type of comment by persons connected with the affair.

Jaworski told Sirica he expected it would take three or four months to try the new cases, adding the process would certainly be "long and protracted."

Sirica did not release the grand jury, which has been investigating since shortly after the June 17, 1972 break-in at Democratic headquarters at the Watergate.

He told the jurors they might be asked to "return to the courthouse in about two weeks." He did not explain why.

The indictments were returned less than 24 hours after a jury was chosen and sequestered in New York City for the perjury-conspiracy trial of former Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans and Mitchell in connection with a tainted 1972 Nixon campaign contribution.

All seven defendants today were indicted on one count of conspiracy which carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

Labor Wins Upset Victory

LONDON (UPI) — Labor party leader Harold Wilson emerged today as the likely upset victor in Britain's most cliff-hanging general election this century and said a new government must be formed at once to get Britain back to a full work week.

"This is of paramount importance," Wilson said before heading back from Liverpool to London to confer with other Labor party leaders on prospects of forming a minority Labor government. He has ruled out any coalition with the small Liberal party which now wields the balance of power.

Promises Veto

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Arguing that the rollback provision of the emergency energy bill passed by Congress would not provide incentive for the oil industry to find new supplies of

oil, President Nixon said he will veto the bill "within the next few days." In the meantime a two-cent-a-gallon increase in gasoline price granted to dealers last week goes into effect today. Another penny will be added to the price within ten days.

Resume Relations

CAIRO (UPI) — For the first time in seven years the American flag was raised over the U.S. Embassy in Cairo, signaling the full-scale renewal of diplomatic ties between Egypt and the United States. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger attended the ceremony, and then arrived today by plane in Israel to pick up details of an Israeli troop separation plan to relay to the Syrian government.

Ex-Convict Slain

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI) — As he attempted to flee law enforcement officers, ex-convict Jacob "Jake" Cohen was shot to death Thursday in the driveway of a house where he had taken three children hostage.

Cohen had slipped through a police dragnet in Chicago, where he allegedly shot and killed policeman William Marsek and Bruce Garrison when they tried to question him in a tavern Wednesday night.

Hope for Break

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Groceries valued at more than \$200,000 were distributed to between 25,000 and 30,000 persons in a smooth operation Thursday, building new hope that the kidnapers of Patricia Hearst would break an eight-day silence.

The Symbionese Liberation Army has not been heard from since Patricia's father, president and editor of the San Francisco Examiner, said he could not meet a demand for \$4 million worth of additional food. The Hearst Corp. pledged to provide the money if the girl is released.

A Challenge For The Parties

One of the interesting spin-offs of Watergate, which is only a small ripple now, is more and more concern for political parties and their role in our democratic society.

In Manchester, for example, there has been some shock and dismay expressed because there is going to be a challenge primary in one of the districts for positions on the town committee.

We think this interest and controversy in the long run will help the Democratic party and perhaps will be an omen that party leaders in both parties should heed.

For whatever the outcome of Watergate, it must be remembered that the Committee to Re-elect the President, the committees for McGovern, the committees for this candidate and that candidate, proliferate when the regular party organization, for whatever reason, becomes subordinate to the candidate or loses the confidence of party members.

Unfortunately today, we hear too often, the expression "I always vote for the man, not the party."

While the speaker may be expressing his "political independence" the full implication of the remark is derogatory to political organizations — Democrat and Republican.

In recent weeks we have heard and read more students of politics voice genuine concern that Watergate will hurt incumbents of both parties. What this means is a disenchantment with personality politicians in the main.

The ultimate result of Watergate may just be a return to party politics in its most idealistic form in the wake of this disillusionment with political personalities.

The political parties have long been open to membership and new ideas. It has been our fault as citizens that we

have too often opted to follow men on horseback with charisma rather than political substance. Now there is an active interest in party participation by a few. The incumbents may not always welcome the challenge but we would hope that both parties on the local district, town and state levels, will have more and more new blood transfusions in the months ahead.

Impetive in the two-party system is the need for viable parties to be open to change, not only in membership, but also ideas. The party, instead of being a base of political power after elections, should be the embryo of the philosophy and principles that it represents, as derived from its grass-roots memberships, rather than the platitudes that today often represent the thinking of the winners of a personality poll.

If we can restore the prestige and importance of political parties in our democratic scheme of things we will be taking the major step toward restoring credibility in government and protecting it against those who would abuse government.

Political parties must become more than an organization registering voters and fawning over potential winning candidates. They should be aggressively and constantly seeking out voter views, digesting these views into a party credo, and then demanding that candidates be dedicated to fulfilling this credo.

The best jockey in the world still needs a good horse to win and it is our hope that the benefit of Watergate for political parties will be a concerted effort toward "improvement of the political breed."

We think the political parties of Connecticut in particular need a good revitalization. If this weren't true, why is it almost a third of our voters are listed as unaffiliated?

Kissinger's Style

LOS ANGELES — Secretary of State Henry Kissinger gets a better press among liberals abroad than in the United States. I suspect this will be his fate in the history books, too. Which may suggest that a prophet is often thrown for a loss on his own turf.

On the plus side of Kissinger's prestige ledger, note the reaction of Latin American diplomats to his meeting with them at the Meico City conference before he set off on his new Middle East mission. Remember that what happens in the Middle East carries more of the world's immediate hopes and fears with it, but that the relation between the two Americas has even greater long-range importance for both.

Mexico City was a success on both sides. The talks were informal and intimate; there was no stiffness, no punctilio, no stalling, polarizing issues and no public grandstand orations as at past conferences. Kissinger got the deep and even affectionate respect of his fellow diplomats.

The basic reason for this is not generally noted, although it says something about the Latin American mind and about the sources of good U.S. diplomacy. The Latin Americans care about words, ideas and personal warmth. They also care about the tangible material results of diplomacy, but the intellectual and emotional elements of diplomatic style outweigh even the hard results. They are the equivalent, in diplomacy, of the embrace.

What they resent more is being taken for granted by their rich, powerful neighbor to the north. Next to that, they resent having someone outside — especially the United States — enter at will into their affairs.

Sexism In Comics

WASHINGTON — We male chauvinist pigs have gotten used to being under siege by women's libbers, but I'm feeling a little better these days, thank you.

Apparently carried away by their success in persuading certain craven males to adopt the prefix Ms. the Movement people have now embarked upon the project of making women and men equal. They have launched a campaign against newspaper comic strips as anti-women, and thus subversive.

As best I can understand the feminists' complaint, comics are un-American because they portray males as strong and smart and females as dumb, docile and subservient to husbands, boy friends and casual male pick-ups. Comic strips are guilty of — you guessed it — sexism, and their creators should be flogged around the fleet and then taken pen in hand and linn the glories of neuterism.

You tell yourself they've got to be kidding, but they're not. And that may sound the knell for Woman's Liberation as the MCP's sadky know it. Any movement that takes what used to be called the "funnies" seriously inevitably will be laughed out of town by rational folks of both sexes. It is the view of the professional feminists that comic strips mirror the nation's mores and troubles and that therefore such art expressions should show only "desirable social and political attitudes." In short, they should be subject to ideological censorship and forced to carry only those messages one sees pasted on walls in Hanoi or Moscow — or Greece, under the benevolent dictatorship of the military.

But this view is not dangerous, merely silly. Comic strips are not everyone's dish of caviar, but their value is that they are not. This is the latest vagary. Nietzsche undoubtedly would rewrite his dictum that "Woman was God's second best idea" and give her first place.

Mary Worth is so sensible she is sickening. Mammy Jorum rules Pappy with an iron hand. Blondie is what passes for the intellectual in the Bumstead family. Little Orphan Annie is an obnoxious little office manager, but she is also a very smart little girl who can handle several male villains at once and occasionally even out-think Daddy Warbucks.

"But the point is, so what? Give or take the aforementioned crusaders, comic strip artists do not set out to save the world or even to influence people. They are not always trying that belly laugh or even that therefore such art expressions should show only "desirable social and political attitudes." In short, they should be subject to ideological censorship and forced to carry only those messages one sees pasted on walls in Hanoi or Moscow — or Greece, under the benevolent dictatorship of the military.

Drilling Techniques Are Hurting Too

WASHINGTON — Even with the most improved methods of extracting techniques imaginable, the proportion of usable resources would — according to research estimates — rise from one to around 45 to 50 percent in existing wells. The proven sources have to be found.

As these reports have indicated in prior times, some very promising estimates of future conventional crude oil reserves have been made. But proving them out is just a matter of getting a big, new batch of drilling permits.

The estimates include a potential added reserve of 90 billion barrels in the Prudhoe Bay area of Alaska's North Slope, where the proven supply is figured at 10 billion. Also included are at least 100 billion barrels in offshore, continental shelf sites, a large share of these in the Atlantic basin, in the already developing Gulf of Mexico.

Easier talked about than done. As an example, a major oil producer has a leasehold on some 32 million acres of the continental shelf off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland. So far it has drilled 15 wells. Every single one has been dry.

There are two hard lessons in this kind of experience. One is that the presumptions which underlie these sometimes gaudy estimates are just the kind of dreamy guesses which in some instances may indeed add lavish new supplies to our reserves if tested out, but likewise may often lead to disappointment.

The other lesson is that present methods of test-drilling are not merely costly but too frequently wasteful.

As outlined in the President's budget for fiscal 1975, the Nixon administration's "new energy policy" makes bare mention of the need for more test drilling and offshore development. The

At a special meeting Thursday the Board of Education unanimously accepted a budget of \$1,296,493 for 1974-75. The figure compares to an adjusted 1973-74 budget of \$1,187,382.

The school board will attend a work session with the Board of Finance March 18 and 19.

Filled with sympathy and humanitarian concern for the welfare of Patricia Hearst, and sharing in the distress of her family, we are overlooking a basic element in the sad situation. A capital crime has been committed.

Imitators in Georgia were quick to take their cue from the terrorists who had Miss Hearst and kidnaped Reg Murphy, editor of the Atlanta Constitution. The newspaper corporation said, quickly, that it would pay the \$700,000 ransom asked, and Mr. Murphy was released.

Since we are in no way connected with the Hearst newspapers, we think that we can speak our convictions without prejudicing the well being of Miss Hearst.

The Hearst's have had an outpouring of sympathetic messages as well as gifts of money, food, and aid in distribution of food which is being exported from them, under threat of injury to their daughter. The matter is very much in the public mind.

One thing, it is high time that a very substantial reward was raised and offered for the arrest and conviction of these criminals.

Raising ransoms only excites the greed and hope for notoriety in which these criminals seem to wallow.

paid to those who can help to bring kidnapers to the punishment which they deserve. The depth of public opinion would create it. We might weigh the loathing which some of the poor have expressed for accepting funds from the Hearst crime.

It would be presumptuous for the Herald to take on the task of raising such a fund. It should be done by large metropolitan publications.

A board of trustees could be established to administer and pay rewards to those who give effective information. By-laws should insure that no money, even for expenses, should go to any trustee.

We cannot allow ourselves to be victimized by this sort of action. Humanitarian motives and concern for victims is all well and good, but they do not bring well-deserved punishment to one criminal.

Last year the Ford Motor Company paid over a million dollars in health supplies, including ambulances, to Argentine terrorists as insurance against further kidnappings of their executives. Another one has been kidnaped this year.

At a banquet for John Marshall in 1798 the toast was given, "Millions for defense, not one per cent for tribute." It referred to a bribe solicitation by an agent of France.

Are we lesser men than we were in 1798? We are acting that way.

In addition to sympathy it is time for indignation and calculated rage.

To Aid Elderly

Genovesi Would Ask DOT For Funds for Mini-Bus

By ALICE EVANS
State Rep. Donald Genovesi offered his assistance to the Manchester Community Council Thursday to obtain funds from the State Department of Transportation for a mini-bus service for Manchester's elderly and handicapped.
The food budget of those on welfare may be stretched by food stamps, she said. However, the food stamps may not be available to some because they have to put down a lump sum of \$45 and because of the inaccessibility of the stamp distribution center because of distance," she said.
More than one-half of the budget of the poor goes for food, she said, and the flat grant should come closer to the needs of the poor. The 1973 poverty

level for a family of four is \$4,200, and the flat grant allows only \$3,780 for such a family, Mrs. Schatz said.
"There are a number of bills in the legislature this session to increase the average daily membership (ADM) allowances to local board of educations," Launi told the council. One bill will provide for financial reimbursement by the state to school districts for children living on property owned or leased by the state, which would also apply to group homes, he said.
Some of the other bills he discussed are: State aid for special education to be increased from 66 per cent to 100 per cent; public health services to receive an increase from about \$228,000 to \$1 million; provisions to give the same assistance to non-public schools as to public schools for special education; a proposed \$2 million for special education occupational training; and revenue sharing coming into the state be designated in specific amounts for such areas as welfare and roads, he said.
He also spoke of the regionalization of the Department of Mental Health and the proposed merger of its children's services into a Children's Bureau. He said there is such a duplication of services that at times children are "ping ponged" around the various services.
In the Department of Mental Health, he said, children get about three per cent of the funds. "If 50-cents is to be spent it goes where there is the greatest number of problems, and that is for the adults," he said.

Utility Tax Bill Signed

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. Thomas J. Meskill today signed the first of his election year tax-break measures, a bill repealing the 6.5 per cent sales tax on utility bills. The measure is estimated to save taxpayers \$30 million.
The governor said, however, that Hartford Electric Light Co. customers won't get immediate relief from the tax because the utility's billing period began two days ago before the effective date of the bill.
HELCO customers will have to wait two months in order to get the tax break, Meskill said, unless the legislature approves an amendment to the bill.

Vernon Mothers, Babies Move To New Hospital Wing

It was moving day at Rockville General Hospital, Wednesday, and the "cargo" being moved was precious. It was the mothers and babies from the old maternity department into the new wing, along with all of the equipment for the department.
Moved were five mothers and seven babies, including a set of girl twins.
Located on the second floor of the new Butler wing, the new facility includes two nurseries, with room for 12 bassinets, five patient rooms with a total of 10 beds, two delivery rooms, three labor rooms, an emergency delivery room, a fathers' waiting room, and a doctors' lounge.
The new maternity department has been designed for maximum efficiency and patient safety. The system of twin nurseries, a standard procedure with new hospitals, allows for one to be used while the other is being cleaned. Also a separate isolation nursery is provided should there be a case of infection or communicable disease.
Another efficiency feature is the arrangement of the delivery rooms, labor rooms, nurses area,

scrub rooms and admitting rooms in the delivery suite.
The rooms have been arranged so that the doctors can go from the locker room, to the scrub room, to a delivery room, back to the locker room without having to back-track through a sterile area.
Similarly, patients from admission through labor and delivery and back to their rooms, maintain a one-way traffic flow. To make the one-way flow possible, a corridor surrounds the entire labor-delivery area.
Another new feature is the air conditioning system which maintains a rigid air quality control throughout the delivery suite. This unit controls dust, temperature, and humidity. The patients' rooms and nurseries are also air conditioned to ensure comfort during the warm months.
Altogether, the new unit is a big step forward for maternity care in the Vernon area. It takes its place beside an education program for expectant parents which the hospital conducts.
