Postage Increases Tonight

Post Office Stamp **Business Booms**

By CONNIE TUTTLE

Business is booming at the Manchester Post Office. . Though the two-cent increase in first class postage becomes effective at midnight tonight, postal workers already are swamped with customers and bulk mail hurried out before

By early Thursday afternoon about \$15,000 worth of the new 10-cent stamps had been sold, according to Pat Humphrey, assistant postmaster. Only about \$500 worth of stamps is normally bought on routine days. "I just don't understand it," Humphrey said. "People are

buying coils of stamps and this is most unusual." Air mail goes to 13 cents, postcards increase to 8 cents and postage on books, records, newspapers and magazines, mail order merchandise and parcel post will also rise.

Humphrey urged people to check the pickup time posted on mailboxes. The last Manchester pickup for 8-cent mail was at 3 p.m. today except for about 20 mailboxes in the business district where the deadline is 5 p.m. and the box situated in front of the post office where the last pickup of the day is made at 6:45 p.m. Any letter mailed after these times will require the new stamps or an additional 2-cent stamp with the old 8-cent stamp.

Asked if he thought the increase would lower the volume of mail, Humphrey stated that he expected the amount of mail to grow steadily, as it always has.

Insurer Steering Of Glass Customers Alleged By Bosco

HARTFORD (UPI) - After 18 months of foot-dragging the Connecticut Insurance Department has finally agreed to say whether insurance companies may legally steer customers to chosen shops for replacing broken automobile glass.

The decision was promised amid charges Allstate and Nationwide insurance companies are violating federal antitrust laws and Connecticut insurance regulations in the booming business of replacing broken automobile glass.

· The president of the Connecticut Glass Dealers Assn., Salvator A. Bosco Jr., also accused the firms of "extorting" small glass shop owners with threats of undercutting their business unless they agree to lower prices in exchange for being designated the firms' chosen shop for local customer

"Allstate sends men around to the shops and tells them, 'If you will meet our low price we won't bring in the mobile units," Bosco told United Press International.

The mobile units, Bosco said, are specially-equipped trucks often dispatched from distant places to replace broken automobile glass at a smaller cost to insurance companies than is regularly charged.

One mobile unit operates out of Danbury, Bosco said, owned by Federal Glass, a whollyowned subsidiary of Shatter-Proof Glass Corp., of Detroit. Another, located in Manchester, is Assurance Glass Corp., a subsidiary of Globe-Amerada Glass Co., Chicago, Bosco said.

The Manchester firm is located at 61 Tolland Tpke. and is managed by Daniel Lee.

The mobile units can charge less because they get glass for less from the big companies, that own them, Bosco said. Globe-Amerada is involved in about 30 antitrust suits in the Chicago area for the same practices occurring in Connecticut. Bosco said.

shopowner charges less, the "shopowner who doesn't play with them can't survive." Bosco said.

Once a special shop is selected, Bosco said, the insurance companies then tell customers to have their repairs done there under the implied threat they will have to pay part of the claim for going elsewhere to an unfavored shop, Bosco said.

"The customer is naturally wary that he'll have to pay part of the claim, and will follow the company's directions," Bosco

Such practices are prohibited under a state insurance regulation stating, "No appraiser shall request that repairs be made in a specific repair shop," Bosco said.

"As far as I can tell," Bosco said, "they have never refused to pay the claim if the customer goes somewhere else to get his glass replaced.

They will pay the claim because you have the right to go wherever you want.

"But if they felt a little weakness in you, they might say they would only have to pay half and you would be responsi ble for the rest," Bosco said. "They know the law and they

know the right thing to do but they try to get around it," he

Bosco said he complained about the alleged practice to former Insurance head Paul B. Altermatt a year and a half ago. After Altermatt resigned last summer, Bosco said, he then complained to the new commissioner, Thomas C. White, asking for a ruling on the legality of the alleged practice.


was No response forthcoming, he said.

"All I'm saying is let's get an answer from the Insurance Department on this question. All they've done is hedge. If I'm wrong then I'll apologize, but let's get an answer."

The Insurance Department, contacted by UPI Thursday, promised an answer to Bosco's question shortly, and said the charges were dubious.

"They may well rattle off names to get repairs," said Division Chief Gerald Wholey,' But I don't quite buy what Bosco is saying.

Town Directors School Budget Overview

The Board of Directors' general reaction to the proposed operational budget for the next fiscal year starting July 1 as presented by the Board of Education last night was generally favorable.

The Board of Education explained a budget of more than \$11,959,103.

In presenting the overview of the proposed budget - which members of both boards followed with their own copies Allan Thomas; chairman of the Board of Education, described it as one which

carried over the present budget and projected into the future. Most of the discussion between the two boards centered on explanations for requests for extra teachers in

different fields. John Yavis, chairman of the finance/committee for the Board of Education, explained the recommendation for two art teachers to be added to the present elementary school staff. He said they could provide art classes to the elementary classes weekly instead of every other week as is the present schedule. The recommendation is for \$18,000 to provide for the two art

teachers.

Yavis said the Board of one such teacher at a cost of \$11,000. Education hopes to add one vocal teacher and one instrumental teacher to the

elementary school music staff. The Board of Education is mindful of the adult education program. A modest increase of about \$6,700 is requested for program expansion in order to provide opportunities for any person aged 16 or over who wishes to complete residential setting for such requirements for a high school

The Board of Education has paid particular attention to the educational needs for exceptional children. School Superintendent James P. Kennedy defined the exceptional child as one who deviates from the norm in any way. The special category identifies exceptional children as having specific learning disability of either academic or emotional nature, or as being the academically and/or creatively

talented students. At present, the Board of Education recognizes the need for someone to provide a program for gifted students at the elementary level. Yavis said there have been several requests for such a program.

Seeking improvement in the services of the learning disability program, the proposed budget recommends 2.2

teachers and 2 aides, Kennedy said between 5 and 6 per cent of the elementary school children are exceptional. Kennedy also expressed regret that "We do not have a (exceptional) students." Many are being sent out-of-town to other schools and tuition is a big item, although two-thirds of it

is reimbursable. The maintenance program is one of which Kennedy said, "Of all the services we perform, this is the one we do least

well. Yavis said two full-time maintenance employes spend most of their time replacing broken windows as a result of vandalism - two employes who could be working otherwise on maintenance.

A capitol improvement budget item calling for a centrally controlled burglar and fire alarm system costing \$50,-000 would substantially reduce the vandalism, the Board of Education feels.

Committee last summer. Much of the indictment set forth facts already testified to ublicly before the committee. But there was fresh material as well - including an allegation that Mitchell in January, 1973, authorized the promise of executive clemency be made to

The crimes mentioned in the indictment included conspiracy, obstruction of justice, making false statements to the FBI, perjury and lying before a grand jury or court.

The historic court proceeding lasted only 10 minutes, and Sirica signed an order banning "extra-judicial statements" on the part of prosecutors, defendants, witnesses and any others

connected with the case. Court observers said Sirica's order would prohibit virtually any type of comment by persons connected with the affair.

Jaworski told Sirica he expected it would take three or four months to try the new cases, adding the process would "long and certainly be

protracted.' Sirica did not release the grand jury, which has been investigating since shortly after the June 17/, 1972 break-in at Democratic headquarters at the Watergate.

He told the jurors they might be asked to "return to the courthouse in about two weeks." He did not explain

The indictments were returned less than 24 hours after a jury was chosen and sequestered in New York City for the perjury-conspiracy trial of former Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans and Mitchell in connection with a tainted 1972 Nixon campaign contribu-

All seven defendants today were indicted on one count of conspiracy which carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. ___

Labor Wins Upset Victory

LONDON (UPI) - Labor party leader Harold Wilson emerged today as the likely upset victor in Britain's most -cliff-hanging general election this century and said a new government must be formed at once to get Britain back to a full work week.

'This is of paramount importance," Wilson said before heading back from Liverpool to London to confer with other Labor party leaders on prospects of forming a minority Labor government. He has ruled out any coalition with the small Liberal party which now wields the balance of power.







In Manchester, for example, there has been some shock and dismay expressed because there is going to be a challenge primary in one of the districts for positions on the town com-

this means is a disenchantment with personality politicians in the main. The ultimate result of Watergate may just be a return to party politics of this disillusionment with political

The political parties have long been open to membership and new ideas. It has been our fault as citizens that we

have too often opted to follow men on horseback with charisma rather than political substance. Now there is an active interest in party participation by a few. The incumbents may not always welcome the challenge but we would hope that both parties on the local district, town and state levels will have more and more new blood transfusions in the months ahead.

Imperative in the two-party system is the need for viable parties to be open to change, not only in membership, but also ideas. The party, instead of being a base of political power after elections, should be the power base for elections. It should embody the philosophy and principles that it represents, as derived from its grass-roots memberships, rather than the platitudes that today often represent the thinking of the winners of a

 personality poll. If we can restore the prestige and importance of political parties in our democratic scheme of things we will be taking the major step toward restoring credibility in government

and protecting it against those who would abuse government. Political parties must become more than an organization registering voters and fawning over potential winning candidates. They should be aggressively and constantly seeking out voter views, digesting these views into a party credo, and then demand-

Imitators in Georgia were quick to take their cue from the terrorists who had Miss Hearst and kidnaped Reg Murphy, editor of the Atlanta Constitution. The newspaper corporation said, quickly, that it would pay the \$700,000 ransom asked, and Mr. Murphy was released.

Since we are in no way connected that no money, even for expenses, with the Hearst newspapers, we think that we can speak our convictions without prejudicing the well being of Miss Hearst.

The Hearst's have had an outpouring of sympathetic messages as well as gifts of money, food, and aid in distribution of food which is being extorted from them, under threat of injury to their daughter! The matter is

one very much in the public mind. We think, it is high time that a very substantial reward was raised and offered for the arrest and conviction

of these criminals. Raising ransoms only excites the greed and hope for notoriety in which these criminals seem to wallow

We cannot stand like dumb sheep in a pasture waiting for the wolves to strike again so that we may raise more ransom for them.

A massive permanent reward fund can be raised in the United States to

have expressed for accepting foods from the Hearst crime.

It would be presumptious for the Herald to take on the task of raising such a fund. It should be done by large metropolitan publications.

A board of trustees could be established to administer and pay rewards to those who give effective information. By-laws should insure should go to any trustee.

At a banquet for John Marshall in 1798 the toast was given, "Millions for defense, not one per cent for tribute." It referred to a bribe solicitation by an agent of France.

Are we lesser men than we were in 1798? We are acting that way. In addition to sympathy it is time for indignation and calculated rage.

Francis Mahoney also attended the luncheon meeting, at which the social and health legislation being considered by this session of the state legislature was discussed by Mrs. Norman Schatz, chairman of the public affairs committee of the Community Council of the Capitol Region; and Charles Launi, associate commissioner and director of Mental Health Children's Services of the state Department of Mental Health.

Individuals or agencies wishing to make an impact on the legislative process should go to public hearings on bills in which they are interested," Mrs. Schatz told the council. She also suggested that they go early to such hearings and make their feelings known to

Utility Tax Bill

The new maternity department has been designed for maximum efficiency and patient safety. The system of twin nurseries, a standard procedure with new hospitals, allows for one to be used while the other is being cleaned. Also a separate isolation nursery is provided should there be a case of infection or communicable

Another efficiency feature is the arrangement of the delivery rooms, labor rooms, nurses area,

It was moving day at Rockville General scrub rooms and admitting rooms in the delivery

The rooms have been arranged so that the doctors can go from the locker room, to the scrub room, to a delivery room, back to the locker room without having to back-track through a

Similarly, patients from admission through labor and delivery and back to their rooms, maintain a one-way traffic flow. To make the one-way flow possible, a corridor surrounds the entire labor-delivery area.

Another new feature is the air conditioning system which maintains a rigid air quality control throughout the delivery suite. This unit controls dust, temperature, and humidity. The patients' rooms and nurseries are also air conditioned to ensure comfort during the warm

Altogether, the new unit is a big step forward for maternity care in the Vernon area. It takes its place beside an education program for expectant parents which the hospital conducts.
