

Board Sets Hearings On Funding Projects

Public hearings will be conducted April 2 by the Manchester Board of Directors on allocating \$168,356 in revenue-sharing funds for five projects.

And to make the five allocations available, the board will conduct a public hearing on appropriating \$150,000 to the Revenue-Sharing Account. A payment of \$111,425 in federal revenue-sharing funds is anticipated in early April.

The five proposed allocations are:

- \$80,000 for the second phase of storm drainage installations in the N. Elm-Henry-Tanner Sts. area.
- \$21,000 for the town's cost share (under its Industrial Guidelines) for a waterline to service a planned \$500,000 building off N. Main St. by the Georgia-Pacific Corp.
- \$27,000 to complete Phase I of renovations to Lincoln Center (the old Lincoln School).
- \$28,794 for a new rubber-tired loader for the highway department.
- \$1,500 for repairs to the

Flag Statute Ruled Invalid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court overturned Monday the conviction of a Massachusetts man arrested for wearing an American flag on the seat of his pants.

The court ruled 5 to 4 that the state law against mistreatment of the American flag was unconstitutional because it was too vague and too broad.

In his majority opinion, Justice Lewis F. Powell wrote that the law "falls to draw reasonably clear lines between the kinds of nonceremonial treatment that are criminal and those that are not."

He also said that "flag contempt statutes have been characterized as void of lack of notice on the theory that what is contemptuous to one man may be a work of art to another."

The case involved Valarie Goguen, who was convicted in Worcester County, Mass., for wearing a United States flag sewed to the seat of his pants.

Justice Byron R. White, in a concurring opinion, said he thought the law was not too vague, but believed it did violate the 1st and 14th Amendments guaranteeing free speech and due process.

In one of the two dissenting opinions, Justice William H.

Rehnquist said he thought the law did not violate the 1st Amendment since the defendant did not seem to be "trying to communicate any particular idea ... which is entitled to 1st Amendment protection."

"The significance of the flag, and the deep emotional feelings it arouses in a large part of our citizens, cannot be fully expressed in the two dimensions of a lawyer's brief or of a judicial opinion," said Rehnquist.

In other decisions, the court refused to review an appeal of a decision which struck down New Jersey's 1947 abortion law as an invasion of a woman's privacy and unconstitutionally vague. Since the court ruled last year that women and their doctors have a right to decide on an abortion in the first trimester of pregnancy, it has declined to hear any abortion cases.

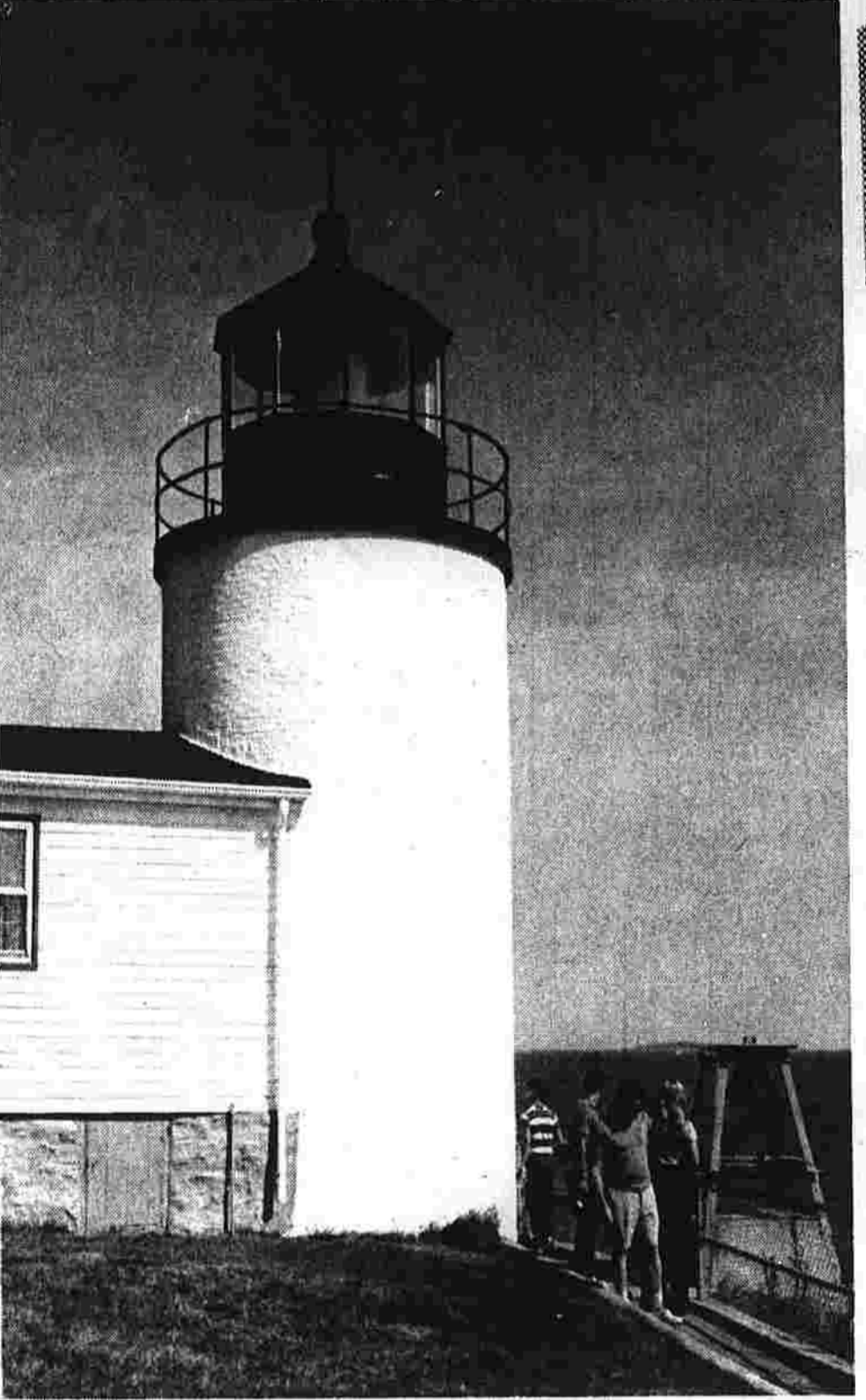

House Adopts Antibusing Amendment

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The two biggest hurdles behind it, the House moved today toward a final vote on a new federal aid to education bill substantially different from any before.

The House, working efficiently despite spirited debate, Tuesday adopted a strong antibusing amendment and rejected moves to provide more money for schools in urban and affluent areas.

On a vote of 293-117, the House accepted the idea except busing — to end school desegregation.

It also: Prohibits busing from one school district to another unless it is proven the district was intentionally drawn to perpetuate segregation.

Prescribes a standard definition of equal educational opportunity and imposes its use.

Allows court-ordered school desegregation plans during the legislative process and modified to comply with the new act.



State Deficits Pointed Out

State Comptroller Nathan Agostinelli of Manchester last night reviewed the state's fiscal condition under Gov. Thomas Meskill and used charts to indicate the deficits piled up during the previous Democratic administrations.

He compared the deficits in 1967-69 and 1969-71 under Democratic administrations to the surpluses in 1971-72 and 1972-73 under the Meskill administration.

He blamed the deficit on Democratic state officials who spent more than was appropriated, explaining that the first Manchester resident elected to a statewide office, "Over-spending accounted for five-sixths of the deficit and one-sixth."

He insisted, "The fiscal plan which the administration has been following, of turning from the phenomenal deficit of \$244 million to having two successive years of a surplus, put your state finances in a better situation for any diversity."

He added, "The ADM grant is always a matter of controversy. Whatever the governor and the legislature recommend is never enough. ADM grants, as do other state grants, go into a town's General Fund and, although they usually go for education, the law doesn't specify that they may or may not be used for that purpose."

Increase of 5.67 Mills Weiss Offers \$20.3 Million Town Budget

By SOL R. COHEN: Town Manager Robert Weiss is recommending a \$20,376,808 General Fund budget and 52.33-mill tax rate for 1974-75 — up 5.67 mills from the 1973-74 level.

Weiss is recommending a \$23,150 budget and a 12-mill tax rate — up \$2,192,735 and 5.67 mills from the budget and tax rate adopted by the Manchester Board of Directors last May for the current fiscal year (ending June 30).

Weiss' tentative budget is a little over 12 per cent above the \$18,184,076 budget adopted last year. It is about 10.3 per cent above the 1973-74 amended budget, if the Dec. 31, 1973 amended total of \$18,463,545 is used.

For the Town Fire District: Fund, Weiss is recommending a \$1,438,888 budget and a 6.17-mill tax rate for 1974-75 — up \$177,169 (14 per cent) and 0.82 mill over the current year.

For the Special Downtown Taxing District, he is recommending a \$53,150 budget and a 12-mill tax rate — up \$2,192,735 and 5.67 mills from the budget and tax rate adopted by the Manchester Board of Directors last May for the current fiscal year (ending June 30).

Federal Oil 'Yardstick' Opposed

United Press International: Federal Energy Chief William E. Simon said Tuesday it was his opinion formation of a U.S. national oil and gas company would only compound the nation's energy problems.

Speaking at a meeting of farm editors, Simon said he opposed a plan by Sen. Adlai E. Stevenson, D-Ill., for a government oil and gas corporation to operate as a "yardstick" competitor for private firms.

"Certainly it would not add competitive force to the industry," he said. Simon also now believes for the first time there is an "excellent chance" Congress will approve an Administration request to deregulate natural gas prices.

Kissinger told newsmen he saw nothing ominous in the cancellation of the morning meeting to continue talks on the issues to be resolved before President Nixon visits Russia in June.

Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, asked by newsmen how the talks with Kissinger were going, said, "Ahead, ahead."

Two sessions Tuesday totaling eight and a half hours were devoted to talks on the Middle East, the European security conference and troop and arms cuts in Europe, according to Vest.

Nate Agostinelli Given Hometown Party Support

By SOL R. COHEN: State Comptroller Nathan Agostinelli is Manchester's "favorite son" for the Republican nomination for governor. In a rising, resounding and unanimous vote Tuesday night, the Manchester GOP Town Committee enthusiastically endorsed him for the gubernatorial nomination.

On Jan. 22, when Gov. Thomas Meskill was still a possibility for re-election, the Manchester committee endorsed the governor for a second term and endorsed Agostinelli for "whatever high office he chooses to run for."

Buckland Rezoning Decision Faces Court Challenge

By DOUG BEVINS: Charges of traffic hazards, spot zoning and improper procedures are among the reasons cited in a court challenge to rezoning decisions made by the massive, mixed-use development on tobacco land at Buckland.

The defendants have been summoned to appear in court April 30 to answer the complaint, which is expected that the case will be continued to a later date and it will be some time before the challenge is settled.

In the legal complaint, the homeowners group members—all of them town residents and taxpayers who own land near or abutting the tobacco land development site—say they're aggrieved by the PZC decision because the rezoning will deteriorate the area as a residential area and will depreciate value of homes and the quality of life.

A specific list of reasons for the challenge charges that the rezoning causes "irregular protrusions" of CUD, business, and industrial zones into residential zones; that the changes constitute spot zoning and that the changes contradict land use envisioned by the PZC.

Israel May Agree To Withdrawal

United Press International: Hundreds of shells fell again today in the Golan Heights. Israeli newspapers reported Israel is ready to withdraw from most of the new territory it captured from Syria in the October war but not the larger part it occupied in 1967.

The newspapers Ha'aretz and Yedioth Ahronoth said Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan will take the proposal, with a detailed map, to Washington Friday for presentation to Kissinger.

While the daily shelling continues on the northern front between Israel and Syria, the southern front between Egypt and Israel has been calm since Kissinger arranged a troop disengagement there in January.
