## Tax Cuts And Inflation

There are many ways to overcome

One is to increase taxes and thus take money out of the economy which is pressing prices upward.

This option, however, is politically unpopular even though it might be one of the more effective economic solutions.

So, we wind up with the second option, as proposed by the Democratic majority of the congressional Joint Economic Committee over the weekend, cutting taxes by \$10 billion. What this means is that instead of

limiting or reducing inflation, a cut in taxes will help us pay for it. This is fine perhaps for us working stiffs who now have a substantial bite

taken out of very paycheck for federal taxes but how does it help the lowincome or retired persons on social security with incomes that pay little or no income taxes?

What it means is that, if the taxes are cut, inflation still continues with temporary relief to those paying taxes but it also continues to erode the ouying power of those on fixed in-

If enacted, the tax break will be only temporary for as sure as we are sitting here, the Congress, after the election, will find it necessary once again to increase social security, other pensions, etc. because of inflation. Of course there will be a slight increase in payroll taxes and the limit on payroll taxable income will be raised to correct this "inequity."

The net result, if past experience is any criteria, is that increased income tax exemptions eventually are inevitably cancelled out by inflation and payroll tax increases.

Both the Congress and the administration have failed to control infl tion. We have tried price controls, tax cuts, and almost every other device known except balancing the budget by cutting buvk on government expenditures, and, if economical management can't do it alone raising taxes if necessary.

To "finance" inflation through deficits, tax cuts, and evercheapening dollars, is a prescription for economic disaster.

For example, out of a row or two of a couple hundred, why is it we are always stuck with the cart with the right front wheel stuck? As we attempt to pilot it down the aisle, we are uncontrollably directed into a canned goods display, irreversibly wedged between the freezer case and another cart, or stubbornly locked in on a 45-degree angle skid that makes

other shoppers retreat in alarm. Equally bad is the one cart, again out of hundreds, that will turn only one-way and that way is opposite to those inlaid arrows which are intended to keep cart traffic moving in an orderly fashion with the result you are just as confused as you are when going west on I-84's eastbound lane.

But the real cart catastrophe is outside the store. That stuck-wheeled model can become a runaway missile in the slightest breeze. The one that will only go in a circle inside the store suddenly zooms straight as a crow flies and stops for no physical reason right behind your car as you are

backing up. Carts are all safely stored under the eaves on hot, warm and sunny days, but let it rain and by magic they are clogging all the parking spaces nearest the entrance.

Now as perverse as these carts are in making man bow to the triumph of machines, the most perverse aspect of a grocery cart is that mysterious sensor it contains which no matter how light you load it, the total on the cash register tape unerringly nearly equals that last five, ten or twenty







#### Commentary Wallace

#### Motives Assessed

WASHINGTON (UPI) George C. Wallace is off and running for a third term as governor of Alabama - and undoubtedly for the Democratic presidential nomination. The question is whether he is serious about the White House or merely seeking to influence Democratic policies. The latter possibility has to given considerable weight considering the political bstacles in the governor's

Wallace has the support of many millions of Americans who like his uncomplicated approach to national problems, ot realizing the tugging and auling that invariably goes

But if he is serious about the presidency, his problem is how o win acceptance from a ready, willing and eager to hand its 1976 nomination to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy if only the Massachusetts Senator will

Despite Kennedy's trip to Alabama to appear with Wallace on a speaker's platform, there is an unreconcilable gap between their political philosophies. And while the current crop of Democratic power brokers might accept Kennedy, it is difficult to see how they ever could agree to Wallace.
Included in that category are Sens. George McGovern of

South Dakota, the party's 1972 standard bearer; Edmund S. Muskie of Maine and Walter F Mondale of Minnesota, all in the party's liberal spectrum. Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington says he would velcome Wallace in second spot on his own presidential ticket - but would he accept the reverse? Morever, Jackson and Wallace both are likely to courting conservative Democrats in the 1976 primaries, which could plunge them into some head-to-hea

Given all this, it is difficult to see how Wallace entertains any real hope of winning the nomination. More likely, the overnor hopes to win enough delegates in the primaries and sew up enough more at state entions to act as a power roker in deciding the eventual In that case, provided the

We wanted to know what our Dodge cars would do in gas economy in situations as close to actual driving conditions as possible. At the same time, we wanted to know how well Dodge would do against the competition's cars-cars of comparable size and even smaller.

The United States Auto Club (USAC) conducted its "Miles-Per-Gallon Showdown" in the Arizona-Southern California area between January 10 and 13, 1974. All automobiles used in the test were acquired by USAC through normal retail channels. Many of the drivers were sports car enthusiasts and amateur rallyists. However, none were professional automobile drivers.

The "Showdown" was divided into three distinct driving cycles:

1. Highway driving. Los Angeles to Tucson and return. A total distance of 972 miles. Average speed, 53 mph.

2. Light city traffic. Los Angeles area. 108 miles, total. Average speed, 25 mph.
