## Hold Onto Your Socks! — It's Earthquake Time

HOLLYWOOD — (INEA) — If "The Exorcist" scared the pants off you, just wait until "Earthquake" comes along. Your shirt and socks may be the next to go.

"Earthquake" is the latest in the new breed of Hollywood spectacles to go before the cameras. It follows in the same tradition as "Airport" and "The Poseidon Adventure" and will itself be followed by "Blazing Inferno." These are big films dealing with contemporary disasters and they're the nearest thing to spectacles that Hollywood of the '70s can produce.

Producer-director Mark Robson showed me a reet of

"Earthquake," and I can tell you that it's a temblor which will make you tremble, a quake that is built to crumble. All the interior sets are built on rockers, so they can be made to teeter and totter. All the exterior sets have "applications" covering them, so they can devastate easily.

The quake and the special effects are the real stars of this one but there are some pretty fair humans involved, too. The big cast is headed by Charlton Heston, Ava Gardner, George Kennedy, Lorne Greene, Genevieve Bujold, Richard Roundtree, Marjorie Gortner, Barry Sullivan, Lloyd Nolan and Victoria Principal. It's one of the studdiest of star-studded casts.

Heston gets killed in this film. He says he's been killed off in a surprising number of his pictures, surprising because he's always been a leading man and leading men are traditionally supposed to survive. He's defied that tradition.

"It hasn't seemed to have an adverse effect on my career," he says. "It just shows you — if you give the public what it wants."

He says he took the part because he was "quite sure" it would be a commercial success.

"Every actor," he says, "needs to be in a commercial success now and then."

He says it is a unique experience for an actor to be in a film in which the actors aren't as important as the special effects.

"The effects," he says, "make it a hard and an expensive picture to do. Whenever you have anything different — special effects, animals, kids or actresses — you have problems."

## Atomic Plant Leakage Not Harmful

WISCONSIN, Maine (UPI) — An official of the Maine Yankee atomic generating plant has confirmed there is a leakage in the plant's primary closed water system but he said there is "no leakage of radioactivity into the environment."

"There has been what they call 'unusual activity' in the fuel core," said Don Laubenstein, a Maine Yankee official. "There are some signs of leakage."

The uranium-fueled plant's primary loop was described as the first of three stages whereby water moves through the plant to cool down the heat produced by generating.

Laubenstein said a decision had not been made whether or not the plant, which produces the next to last stage of electricity used in the region, will be closed for six to eight weeks so the fuel system can be inspected.

"The way the fuel behaves between now and June will determine whether we close," Laubenstein said. "The decision will be made between now and June." He said the radioactivity that builds up from rods in the closed primary system sometimes decays as fast as it builds up.

"If this happens and the situation stabilizes, we will not have to close. If it does not stabilize we will have to open the reactor and inspect the fuel rods and replace those that are leaking," Laubenstein said.

Laubenstein said safety is not a factor. "It is a matter of fuel efficiency and fuel economy," he said.

## Vernon Career Program Approved

An exploratory program in careers for Grade 8 students at the Vernon Center Middle School will be instituted in the fall. Approval was given to the program by the Board of Education, Monday night.

The request for the program was made by Guidance Counselor William Bountress. He said the plan is to provide the Grade 8 boys and girls with many varied experiences to explore occupations within Vernon as well as occupations in the areas around Vernon. The program will be aimed at exposing the students to the world of work and in some cases to develop tentative occupational plans, at least, Bountress said.

Two part-time instructors will be involved in the program with each instructor being a guidance counselor who will devote two periods a week to the development and implementation of the program.

Bountress explained that a multi-course approach will be used to provide the students with more practical opportunities via the occupational

education program approved. He said many of the students are now scheduled for a number of study halls during the week. Students will be invited to participate in the program but will not be required to do so. A survey will be made to identify the interests of the participants. Once the survey is analyzed, clusters of occupations will be established, Bountress said.

It must be understood that this undertaking must be very limited in its scope because of the limited number of students and personnel who can be involved," the counselor said.

Awareness of the program in the community will require a close relationship between the school and community interest groups, Bountress explained. Ultimately, the program will relate to all the programs now existing in the school curriculum, he said.

Some of the plans for the program include developing a resource center of career education materials; visiting local and area businesses and industries to provide students with first-hand experiences of

the world of work; conducting assemblies to expose students to the experiences of businessmen, industrialists, labor leaders and such; and to inform the students of the many occupations that they may not be aware are available to them.

Plans are to run the program from Oct. 31 through March 4, 1975 and at the end of that period, the program will be evaluated.

The program, to be coordinated with other programs in the school, will require a budget of \$3,211.

The two instructors will need time to develop procedures before the fall term begins so that the program can begin soon after school opens in September, Bountress said.

Students for time spent in developing the program, making contacts, securing basic material and such, must be included in the budget. Also included in the budget are expenditures for visitations to occupational areas with students as well as expenses for the instructors to observe successful programs in other school systems.

## Vernon Thrall Rd. North Only

Starting Thursday, Thrall Rd. in Vernon will be a one-way street, northbound only. The Hill Rd. from Rt. 83, Andrew Tricarico, director of Public Works and acting chairman of the Traffic Authority, said Tuesday.

A few weeks ago the Traffic Authority voted to make the street one-way, southbound. Following the announcement of the decision, petitions were signed, many by customers of the A&P located at that intersection, objecting to the ruling.

The Traffic Authority then rescinded its action and said it would change the direction of the one-way traffic to go northbound instead. It was decided to wait a few weeks to see the reaction before putting the ruling into effect.

Tricarico said he received only three phone calls from two callers saying they were in favor of the action and one approving it after it was explained.

Tricarico expressed concern about the one-way northbound decision, noting it creates a hazard by making a left turn from Rt. 83 onto Thrall Rd.

## A Wise Approach

We applaud Gov. Thomas J. Meskill's creation of a joint-finding task force to assess the impact of possible oil exploration and refinery construction.

We are especially pleased the study group has been directed to make a purely exploratory effort rather than attempt to make conclusions, select sites, or formulate policy.

Free from pressures inherent in such decisions, the group should be able to compile and organize input from all elements involved so that those who may have to make the decisions will have a complete and objective basis upon which such decisions should be made.

Despite the region's lack of oil production and refining capacity there is no need to rush into any action which may later be regretted.

As the cost of oil increases and until the nation as a whole reaches a goal of energy self-sufficiency, the pressures for this type of development remain and will increase.

Therefore the governor, in setting up his task force representing his administration, the state Department of Environmental Protection, the state energy office, commerce commissioner and industry, has acted correctly in approaching this problem from a broad spectrum rather than in a crisis climate aimed at meeting narrow immediate desires.

We believe once the report is completed and presented to the people in an objective matter the decisions, which will have to be made, can be made in a climate of reason and what is in the best interest of Connecticut for the short-term as well as for generations to come.

## A Measure of Tolerance?

If you stop to think about it a little, it should not be any surprise that more crimes are committed than are reported to the police.

The recent survey conducted by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration disclosed that in five major cities, the crime rate was more than twice the figures reported by police to the FBI under the Uniform Crime Reporting system which attempts to present a statistical progress report on whether crime is increasing or decreasing in a community.

The implication of the study is that reported crime statistics may be misleading since all crimes are not reported to the police by the public.

The reasons for this can be varied according to the community involved. Most of us, at one time or another, probably has had something stolen from our homes or cars and didn't bother to report it because "it wasn't worth the time or trouble."

In some cases we may have chosen not to report the theft or vandalism because we knew the culprit and didn't want to cause trouble over such a trivial thing. We might have bawled the kid out, or even had the courage to mention it to his parents, but we didn't go to the police.

So first there is a natural reluctance on our part to report any crimes we are victims of or witness because we don't want to get involved—unless of course it was a major crime.

Secondly, we know there is a lot of crime which goes unreported because too many of us have an attitude that it is meaningless to do so since 1, The police won't do anything; 2, if they do catch the culprit, some smart lawyer will get him off; and 3, if he is found guilty, the judge and the courts will only slap his wrists and turn him loose.

Which leads us to our point. We all know there are more crimes committed than are reported to police. The rationalizing we do is all

too human and is not new for we would venture this has been true ever since man began his attempts to live under some code of laws.

Our tolerance of crime is the key to the quality of law enforcement we have which in turn determines the effectiveness of each community's crime control.

FBI statistics are still valid in the sense the figures do provide a yardstick for measuring community attitudes. If the number of reported crimes increases, it may not mean more crimes are committed, but that people are getting concerned.

Conversely, if there is a drop, maybe we should be concerned too since it might not mean fewer crimes are being committed but rather that fewer are being reported and there may be a deteriorating moral climate in the community.

But whatever reliance we wish to place in statistics, the fact of the matter is that crime thrives because we, as individual citizens, too often ignore it until it comes close to home. Even when it does we may cop out rather than get involved.

The tragedy is that our individual tolerance of crime is part and parcel of community tolerance and affects the whole community.

The statistics are not a reflection of police and court efficiencies or deficiencies as much as they are a projection of our collective moral attitudes.

Today, the adage that crime does not pay does not apply as it once did. Too many of us are willing to pay as much or more to become involved, rather than pay the price of more policemen, courts and correctional facilities, which we would need if all crimes were reported and prosecuted.

No, there is no comfort in the statistics. Something to think about perhaps. But since people do not change much overnight, we doubt the statistics will either.

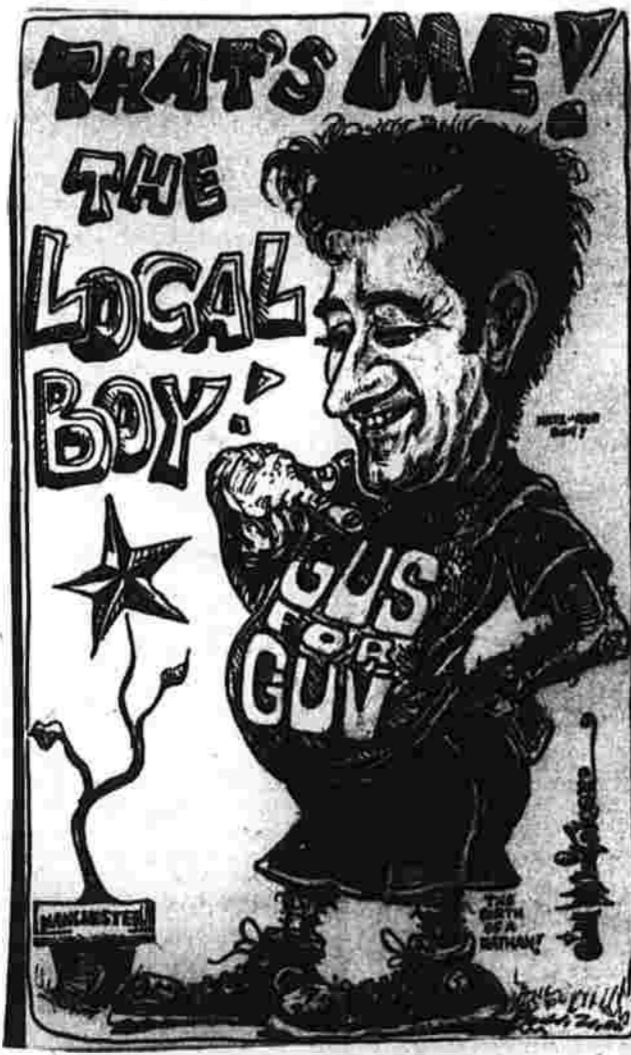

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## Hospital Auxiliary Hears Talk on Sexual Therapy

"The purpose of sex is to give and receive pleasure," said Dr. Alan Wabrek Wednesday as he spoke to members of the Manchester Memorial Hospital Auxiliary at their annual luncheon meeting at the Colony in Vernon.  
Dr. Wabrek, his wife, Lyn Wabrek, and Dr. R. Clay Burchill, all of Hartford Hospital, chose the theme "Sexual Therapy as a part of Medical Care" for their combined talks.  
Dr. Wabrek, a native of Manchester, and his wife are staff consultants in human sexuality at Hartford Hospital. Dr. Burchill is director of obstetrics and gynecology at Hartford Hospital.  
The three speakers alternated in a panel presentation of sexual difficulties between couples and what actually goes on in counseling with the emphasis on communication.  
In fact, Dr. Wabrek said anger, wrong assumptions and unrealistic expectations are the root of sexual problems.  
"Husbands and wives make fantastic assumptions about each other all the time," said Dr. Wabrek. He advises checking out these false assumptions.  
"People like to think they marry because they love each other," he said, "but it's more apt to be a case of 'How can this person fulfill my needs.'"  
The art and need of sexual counseling has developed within the last 15 years, said Dr. Burchill. Before the research and reports of the Masters and Johnson team, sexual counseling was virtually unknown, he said.  
Dr. Burchill sees sexual counseling as an integral part of medical care. He said there is frequently a need for this counseling at Hartford Hospital for couples where there is a coronary condition, or a renal transplant which affects sexual relationship.  
Dr. Wabrek gave two indications of how sex problems develop: the couple who have never had particularly good sexual relations, and the couple who have been doing fairly well until their marriage begins to deteriorate and then "it's only a matter of time until that feeling goes to the bedroom."  
The purpose of counseling is to put these people back on their feet, he said.  
The "common denominator" for sexual failure according to Dr. Wabrek is fear—fear of not pleasing, fear of inadequacy.  
Mrs. Wabrek said sex is not a natural phenomena, it is a learned thing depending on one's environment and culture.  
The customary "model" for sex counseling at Hartford

is designed for eight sessions at a cost of \$90 per hour for two people. Dr. Burchill said. But the patient pays according to his financial ability. However, sexual counseling is provided by the hospital for anyone who is in need of it even if they can't afford it, said Dr. Burchill.  
The first session is a "team work" session involving co-therapy. Counseling is more effective with couples than with just one partner. "We can counsel better when we deal with environments which are what each partner brings with him," said Mrs. Wabrek. The problem is identified and discussed.  
Individual histories are taken during the second session.  
At the third session, the counselor administer a gentle therapeutic examination to the couple. "It's a key point when they can observe each other in a clinical way," said Mrs. Wabrek.  
At a round table discussion during the fourth session, the sexual backgrounds of the client couple are formulated.  
The remainder of the sessions are generally programmed for treatments with special sexual tasks to be performed at home, said Mrs. Wabrek.

At the end of the sessions, if there are continuing problems, the couple may be referred to a psychiatrist, a marriage counselor, or a family service.  
One of the things they're interested in, said Dr. Wabrek, is who controls whom. "The trouble sometimes is when one person has all the control, he does not want to give up that control."  
Young people living together these days before marriage may be more successful in some ways in their sexual relationships than their elders.  
This was the reply by Dr. Wabrek to one of several questions after the panel presentation.  
"I don't think they have any less problems, they are of a different kind," he said. "Fifty years ago, couples could relate, but they had sex problems." He said. "Today, couples have little trouble sexually, but they have difficulty in relating," he added.  
Mrs. Wabrek said she would like to see "interdisciplinary sex education with English, math and social studies" when asked her opinion on sex education in the schools.  
"I think it should start in the first grade with trained instructors," she said.

## Hebron PZC Quizzed On Plans

An unusually large crowd was present at the meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday night. The appearance of about 30 residents prompted Chairman Sal Mastandrea to set aside the commissions printed agenda to find out what were the concerns of these present.  
One large group came to ask about the possible condominium development in the area of West St. and Martin Rd. which had been presented at the last meeting of the commission by architect Peter Abel.  
Mastandrea told the people that Abel had been inquiring about the inclinations of the PZC and that he was aware of the fact at the present time the construction of multi-family dwelling is not allowed in Hebron's zoning regulations.  
Mastandrea went to say that provisions could be made for condominiums under the new plan and new regulations if the land in question were found to be suitable for high density housing.  
In a later portion of the meeting, following a discussion of the matter Planning and Zoning Commission members voted unanimously to communicate with Abel and indicate that there was no interest in his proposal for a condominium development.  
Public Circle  
Another group present at the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting came with complaints about the builder of Londonberry Estates. Gary Duchene, resident of Pub Circle, stated that a request for permanent reference markers had been made 18 months ago. No action has been taken by the builder.  
Duchene said that no one in Londonberry can get a survey, improve the property or put up fences.  
First Selectman Aaron Rond told the group from Londonberry that he has been trying to get the builder to place the permanent reference markers, and if no action is taken by summer he will go to the bonding company or the state. Things move very slowly, said Rond.  
Rago Request  
The last large group were

citizens of the Daly Rd. area who were interested in the request of the Anthony Ragos of Daly Rd. for a change of some from agricultural-residential to residential.  
The Ragos had written to the commission some time ago stating that they were concerned about the presence of farm animals in a residential setting because of the possibility of health hazard.  
Paul Denmore, a resident of the area, summed up the problem stating that, "the whole situation is not helpful to neighboring relations."  
Chairman Mastandrea told those concerned with possible zoning change that if a formal request were sent to the commission a public hearing would be called in order to give everyone a chance to be heard. 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# Village Has Gold Fever

NEW YORK (UPI) — You'd hardly expect a small town in the Catskills to catch gold fever but it's happened in the village of Sidney, N.Y.

The folks there are excited because the chief factory in their town, owned by Bendix Corp., annually uses \$2 million worth of gold — at current prices — to plate the points in the cylindrical electrical connectors it makes. No other metal is nearly as good as gold for that purpose.

So, when the commercial price of gold trebled over a few months to \$183 an ounce in February (it later fell to \$175) the Bendix officials at Sidney naturally took extra precautions to make sure not a single speck of gold dust was wasted or lost in the plant.

The electrical connector business is only one of several that must be seriously concerned about the present world wide speculative fever in gold.

The jewelry industry is the biggest consumer of commercial gold, followed in turn by electronic semiconductor, dental supplies and the electrical connector makers.

When the "goldbugs," those economics writers who insist the world must return to the gold monetary standard or else into chaos, talk about gold hitting \$500 or even \$1,000 an ounce, folks in Sidney shudder.

For many years the electrical connector, jewelry and other industries that use gold, paid a steady \$37 an ounce for it. They weren't horribly concerned when it went up to around \$60, but the present price has them really shaking their heads.

The price went up \$20 in a single week not long ago.

# House Bill Stiffens Drug Laws

HARTFORD (UPI) — Taking the example of New York State, the Connecticut House has approved a tough penalty for certain drug sellers.

Non-addicted drug pushers would face a mandatory jail sentence of 5 to 20 years and a maximum of life imprisonment on the first offense under the bill passed Tuesday.

The measure, passed by a 141-2 vote, would make the state's anti-drug law more closely to New York's tough statutes, said Rep. James F. Bingham, R-Stamford, chairman of the Judiciary Committee.

In comparison, present state drug laws allow the minimum sentence of 10 years for non-addicted sellers to be suspended, and place a maximum of only 20 years for first offenders.

The mandatory provision goes away with "plea bargaining" which under present law allows drug suspects to plead guilty to lesser charges in exchange for dropping of the indictment or more serious charges.

The mandatory five to 20 years penalty applies to manufacture or sale of at least one ounce of heroin, methadone or cocaine, or five milligrams of LSD on first conviction, with stiffer penalties for subsequent offenses.

Mandatory five to 20 years in jail would also await sellers of any narcotic substance, amphetamine, hallucinogenic substance or one kilogram (2.2 pounds) or more of marijuana.

In other actions, the House: — Rejected to reconsider a bill partially repealing the Sunday Blue Laws. The House recommended the measure Monday, effectively killing it for the session, and Tuesday, Rep. Dorothy K. Osler, R-Greenwich, made an unsuccessful attempt to revive it.

— Postponed for Wednesday action on a package of election campaign reforms, pending technical changes in the Senate amendments to the measure. The bills were scheduled to be taken up in the House Wednesday.

The usual post lock supper was dispensed with this year since the fire marshal changed the seating capacity for diners in the parish house from 250 to 150.

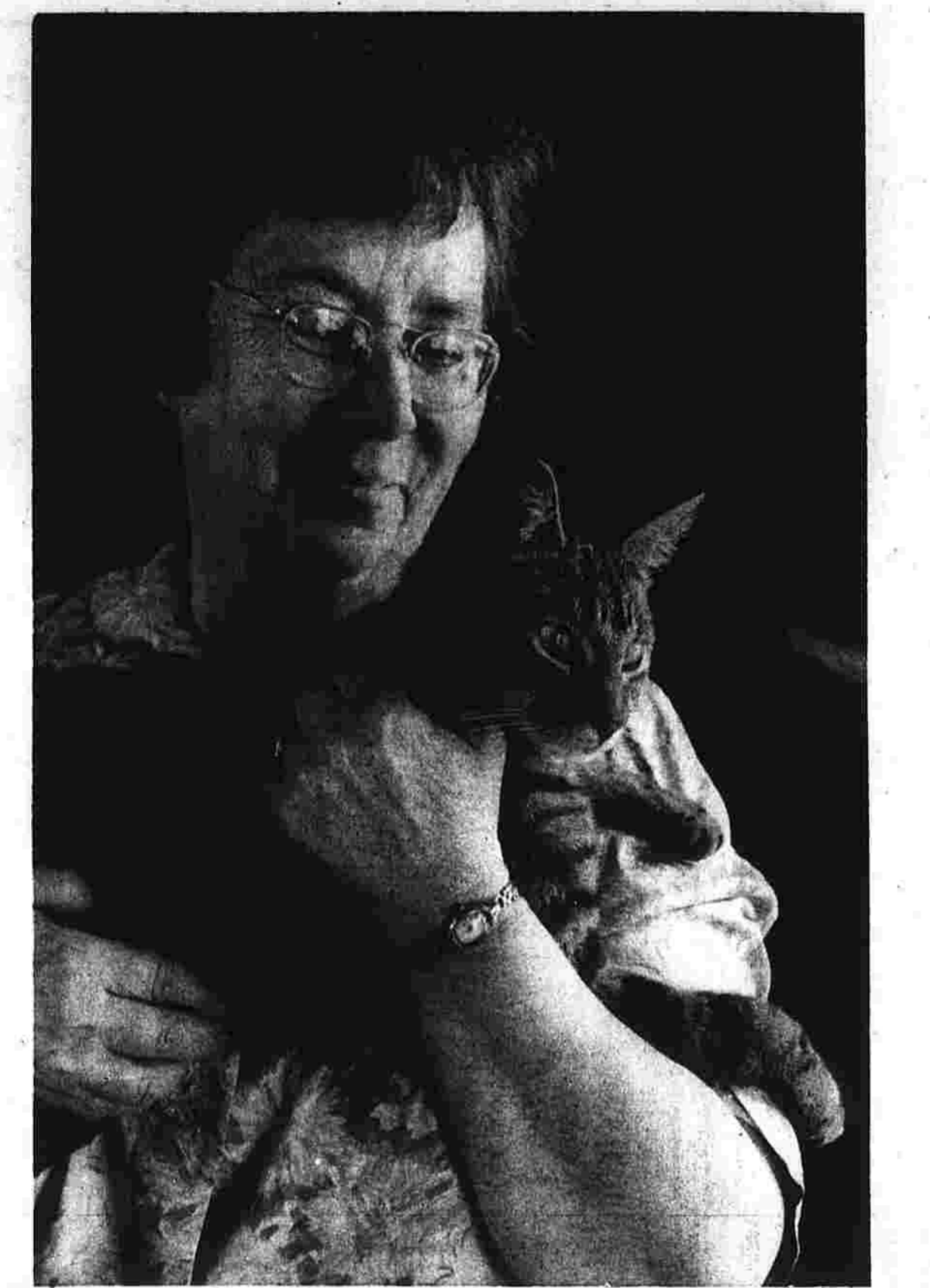
Next year the group will skate at the Bolton Ice Palace instead of Glastonbury.

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# Senate to Consider Fuel Adjustment Costs

HARTFORD (UPI) — The Connecticut Senate was expected today to consider a bill giving the public a greater say on the fuel adjustment costs tacked on to electricity bills.

Several amendments were expected to be proposed in the afternoon session, including one to make two additional members of the Public Utilities Commission elected rather than appointed.

The measure before the upper chamber would add two appointive members, require mandatory reviews of power company rates every two years and require monthly reports on fuel cost adjustments.

The measure also requires public hearings if the fuel cost adjustment totals more than 20 per cent of the basic electricity rate, add staff to the PUC and mandate separate identification of the fuel cost adjustment on monthly power bills.

The other amendments up for consideration would require the utilities to absorb 20 per cent of the fuel cost adjustment and set up a low-cost state bonding program to build power projects.

The Senate approved a measure Tuesday, increasing the state's per pupil school aid grant from the current \$215 to \$250.

The measure, which was sent to the House, would increase aid to local boards of education by \$2.5 million.

In his February budget message, Gov. Thomas J. Meskill recommended an immediate increase of 5¢ per pupil and an additional \$10 for the coming fiscal year.

On another matter, Sen. Philip N. Costello, R-Madison, said he wasn't sure that a bill requiring state Health Department approval before watered lands could be sold by water companies was warranted.

Costello said a measure being considered in the upper chamber didn't appear to set down any clear public health standards to follow in determining whether the land could be sold.

Any watershed land sale now must be approved by the Public

The New Haven Water Co. is planning to sell off 16,000 of the 28,000 acres of land it holds, most of it watershed lands.

"I certainly hope the water companies hold onto their watershed lands," Costello said. "But I don't want to try to repress them in an illegal fashion."

The sale of the lands could prevent problems for local governments which have assumed that the watershed acreage would remain as open space, he said.

Land Development

The New Haven Water Co. said it plans to sell about 13,000 acres for open space purposes while the other 3,000 acres would be offered for commercial or residential development.

On other matters: — The Senate approved a bill to crack down on the duplicating of records, tape recordings and motion picture sound tracks for unauthorized sale. Sen. William E. Strada, D-Stamford, said upper Connecticut acts it could become the center for the black market recording industry since most Northeastern states have approved legislation against parating.

— A measure to strengthen the state's franchise law to protect fuel and gasoline dealers against the large oil companies was approved and sent to the House. The measure arose out of protests that the major oil companies tried to freeze out independent dealers during last winter's oil crisis.

The New Haven Register disclosed that fraudulent absentee ballots were used in last year's November elections. Nine Democrats have been arrested so far.

### Presidential Campaign Fund Plan Working

NEW YORK (UPI) — The plan to pay for the 1976 presidential campaign for both Democrats and Republicans with federal funds through a 10-cent check-off on income tax returns now appears assured a success, the chief of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) said today. "We project that more than \$25 million will have been designated this year for the 1976 presidential election campaign when all the \$1 million returns have been processed," IRS Commissioner Donald C. Alexander told the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA) convention.

"When this amount is added to the almost \$4 million designated last year, the campaign fund should have a balance of over \$28 million by the end of the year," Alexander said.

Alexander said he expected funds designated by taxpayers in the next two years will put the campaign fund into operation in 1976. The fund will become operable when it reaches an amount equal to 15 cents for each American of voting age — a figure expected to be less than \$50 million.

He told the editors and publishers that the check-off was much more successful this year than last, due in large part to news reports and editorials. The commissioner also reported taxpayers have not been taking questionable deductions or refusing to comply with income tax laws as a result of the disclosure of President Nixon's tax situation.

He said "seers" who had predicted mass noncompliance apparently overlooked Americans' sense of responsibility to their fellow citizens.

Most of the second day of the convention, at which 1,400 ANPA members gathered, was taken up with reports from the Newspaper Advertising Bureau's annual dissemination of various problems facing the industry.

The ANPA's reported that advertising volume at daily newspapers again set all other media in 1973, getting a 30.2 per cent share of the advertising dollar. Leo Bogart, general manager of the advertising agency, said newspaper advertising, year in and year out, has maintained a steady 0.6 per cent of retail sales while other types of advertising have fluctuated.

## June Public Hearing Planned On Adams-Turnpike Project

Mayor John Thompson said Tuesday a public hearing is planned for June to keep the public fully informed of plans for reconstructing portions of W. Middle Tpke. and Adams St. The public hearing is necessary, he explained, because the town will be requesting property acquisitions, rights-of-way and slope rights. He said state and federal officials will be present to make a public presentation and to answer questions. The reconstruction will be under the State Urban Systems Program, established by an act of the 1971 General Assembly. In June 1972 the town received approval to carry out the local program, with 85 per cent of the cost to be funded by state and federal agencies. The estimated cost of the project is \$1,250,000, with the town's share \$239,000. To be reconstructed is about 5,100 feet of W. Middle Tpke., from New State Rd. easterly to Bigelow Brook; and about 5,200 feet of Adams St., from Center St. northerly to the Hockanum River.

Expressing his disappointment with delays in starting the project (it was to have begun this spring), Thompson said the wait is because of the "many difficulties which arise in conjunction with a project of this size and scope."

He added, "I believe that these much-needed improvements to these major town roads will be worth the wait."

He said the preliminary design phase has been completed and the final design is expected on or about May 15. Following town, state and federal reviews, property acquisition and construction bid specifications, Thompson said, bids will be taken about Jan. 1, 1975, with construction expected to begin about the middle of March — leading to completion of the project during the 1975 construction period.

The town's cost share of the project is part of an appropriation for roads and sidewalks approved in a November 1972 townwide referendum. Improvements along W. Middle Tpke. will include widening the roadway to 46 feet, curbs, a snow shelf and sidewalks on both sides. The 42-inch culverts carrying Bigelow Brook under W. Middle Tpke. will be replaced. Adams St. will be widened to 30 feet, curbs will be installed on both sides, and sidewalks will be constructed on the east side. Improvements will be made also to the storm-drainage systems on both roads.

### Australian Leader Anything But Modest Man

Self-confidence rather than modesty can be called an outstanding characteristic of Australian Prime Minister Gough Whitlam, and it has led him into some interesting conflicts, including a brush with President Nixon.

It also is contributory to the fact that on May 18, Australia will be going through national elections for both houses of parliament just half way through his three-year term.

In the year and a half since he overturned the 23-year rule of the conservative Liberal Country party coalition Whitlam has brought about a sharp turn in Australian foreign policy.

Owen Foreign Minister Acting as his own foreign minister until last November, he has intentionally loosened Australia's ties with the United States.

"We do not wish to grandstand or thumb our noses at the United States," he said during a visit to the United States last July. "When our interests do not coincide, we shall, as a good friend should, say so firmly and frankly and, usually and preferably in private."

Firmly but somewhat less than privately he criticized Nixon's decision to bomb Hanoi in December of 1972, leading to a chill between Washington and Sydney early in his administration.

Whitlam's independence of Washington has expressed itself in new Australian relations and sympathies with China, with black Africa, with North Vietnam and with anti-colonialism. He supports military ties with the U.S. but does not regard them as an end-all or be-all.

A New Course  
In steering Australia on to a new course in foreign policy, Whitlam frankly has enjoyed himself.

LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — "C. N. Bartow, violin maker." The sign hangs over the door of Clarence Nolan Bartow, 57, a round, grandfatherly man who handcarves violins out of maple and other fine woods. A violin takes a month to build. Today, there are very few craftsmen like him — and very few violins like his. "Some of these factories with stockholders, and all glue up a bunch of orange crates, spray them with lacquer and call

them violins," Bartow lamented. Bartow, a bachelor, lives and works in a cluttered part of an old rooming house. His shop is stuffed with violins people have asked him to repair, parts of instruments he is making, and the tools of his trade — clamps, molds and bottles of turpentine and varnish. Violin making business is good these days, he said. Last year he just sold four or five violins. But they went at \$1,000

apiece, so a few violins go a long way. Later, he attended a violin-making university in Cremona, Italy, the home of Anthony Stradivari, whose centuries-old violins are valued at thousands of dollars each. "Everybody thinks Stradivari had a secret in making a violin," Bartow said. "There is no specific secret to violin making. If I knew as much as Stradivari did, I'd have his tone. He was a smarter man than we are today."

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## Campaign Reforms Before House

HARTFORD (UPI) — State representatives peered across a rift on the issue of campaign reform today, as organized labor and Democratic figures criticized a controversial measure.

A Senate-passed amendment on group contributions to political campaigns was criticized Tuesday as discriminatory and useless in campaign reform.

The bill is part of a string of measures which would limit campaign contributions and expenditures and mandate their public disclosure.

They were adopted by the Senate last week and have since been on the House agenda, but the lower House postponed action on them until Wednesday.

One of the amendments would ban contributions from labor unions, public interest groups, and even the PTA.

This move threatens any organization, including labor unions, which would have a fine or imprisonment. The same is true for any priest who gives a sermon against an abortion referendum," said Leonard F. Dube, president of the 40,000-member Connecticut United Auto Workers. He said the bill would not in effect limit the amount of money a political candidate may receive.

"An individual could donate as much as \$50,000 in an election, but organizations cannot give even a single cent," he said.

**Woman's View**

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—The more the scientific experts study our food habits and idiosyncrasies, the more confused the whole thing seems to get.

For instance, some researchers project that the foods we prefer as adults are the ones we ate as children.

We've also acquired a predisposition for very high levels of flavoring. As one expert puts it, "Americans have been weaned on imitation flavors and are not even aware of it."

The name of a food often decides whether it will be accepted. For instance, we'll accept sole, trout, salmon, bass and several other well known fish species. But a spokesman for the National Fisheries Institute says "American fish

dealers no longer can sell Brazilian black-finned snapper as red snapper although it tastes the same and is from the same family."

Attitudes Change  
Our attitudes toward foods have had many changes, however. They're more liberal and there is less regionalism. Still, "whether we will be (one day) eating honeyuckle-meat hotdogs with sage flavored imitation milk, or whether we will still be willing to eat 20 years from now is at present a question that cannot yet be answered," says Michael Creedman.

Creedman examines foods and flavors, why we eat the way we do, and a myriad of other factors in feeding our faces in the current issue of "Human Behavior," a news magazine of the social sciences.

One conclusion: Most lower animals are guided in their eating habits by their bodies...but unless man is starving, he eats what he likes, not necessarily what he needs.

Flavor alone is enough to throw the researchers. Rosemarie Pangborn, assistant dean of the College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences at the University of California at Davis, says that by definition, flavor is "a sensation that requires human judgment."

"Genetic Background"  
"So depending on genetic background, body chemistry and our earliest experiences with food, everyone perceives flavor in a world of his own." As a result, chemists don't know how to fabricate new taste sensations that will be universally accepted.

If anyone knew how to do that, he'd be a millionaire," says Henry Rollins, general manager of E. Ritter and Co., a flavors firm in Los Angeles. "Flavor is still a black art."

Sometimes habit is the reason we eat what we do. As Howard Schultz, a consumer psychologist at UC-Davis, puts it, most consumers don't like fresh potato chips. "They've come to expect the slightly rancid flavor in the oil that develops after a few days storage."

People also do learn to like food from cultures other than their own. The popularity of the Americanization of pizza, or Coca-Cola, which Europeans spat out when they first tasted it but now is accepted around the world.

Commentary Earth Day Passes By Unnoticed

By DAVID E. ANDERSON WASHINGTON (UPI) — Earth Day, the once festive and balloon-riding celebration of the ecology movement, came and went this year—this past Monday—with scarcely a notice.

Perhaps it is just as well because the movement everywhere is in disarray. Many of the once active ecology centers which attempted to muster citizen support to fight freeways and promote bicycle paths have folded for lack of support.

Earth Day came on a little more than a celebration of spring, a time to fly kites and wriggle bare feet in the grass. And if participants were a little more self-consciously aware of the problems of water and air pollution, soil-waste disposal, energy production and transportation still remained.

They continue to remain today—tough and expensive to solve with the solutions environmentalists-biologists, zoologists, engineers, family planning experts and botanists—held a counter-revolution against the "independent declaration on the environment" that states as a premise the problem American environmentalists have not been able to solve.

When the movement moved from the celebration of spring rites to the challenge of economic systems it lost much of its glamor—and many of its adherents.

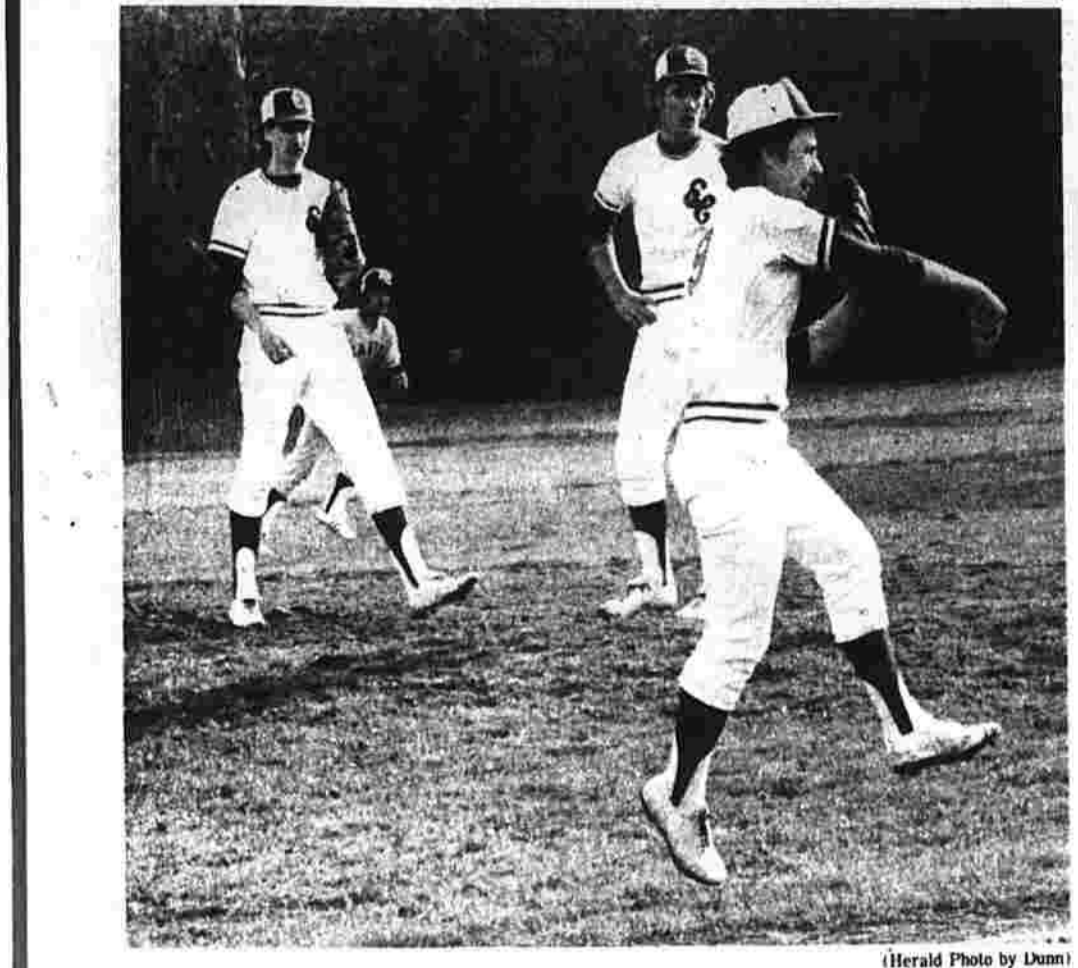

Drago, who lost 5-2 to his former teammates in Thursday's game, was upset by a statement in a local newspaper attributed to McKeon. The story quoted McKeon as saying the Royals went downhill last year along with Drago.

"The Royals aren't a bad bunch of guys—just the manager," said Drago, now 1-1. "I don't like McKeon. I had a 12-12 record last season and then he just forgot about me."

McKeon denied making the statement, saying, "I've got to be stupid to say something like that. You don't do things like that. I wish someone would say something like that about our team."

McKeon was told that Drago claimed the Kansas City manager hurt his pitching career last year. "Hell, he was a losing pitcher before I got to him."

"I pitched Drago in relief on Sept. 21 last year, then I started pitching some of my kids after that. I don't know what he is talking about because we never had any trouble. If he didn't like me, that's his choice. Every player can make his own opinion on the manager."

McKeon said trading Drago to Boston for Marty Pattin last fall had nothing to do with a personality conflict. "We always liked Pattin and when the Red Sox said they were willing to trade him one-for-one for Drago, I said what the hell—a change of scenery could help both of them."

Drago said he wanted to pitch well against the Royals "to show them I could still pitch."

He pitched well for 8 1/3 innings but was done in by a stolen base and a blop hit to deep short.

"I thought I pitched well but that doesn't count," Drago said. "The only thing important is not how you pitch, but if you win."

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# Celtics Seeking Clincher

BOSTON (UPI)— The New York Knicks need another problem today like Adam needed a second apple.

But the New Yorkers, down 3-1 and tottering on the edge of elimination from the National Basketball Association playoffs, have yet another one.

The Knicks, trying to play with both Dave DeBusschere and Willis Reed in crippled condition, announced Tuesday that Reed had excess fluid drained from his knee earlier in the day.

Reed, who has been limited action in the semifinal series, made the news and hoped to play at least a little.

The net result, however, is that Coach Red Holzman will have to send his Knicks into tonight's fifth game without an effective big man—a situation that makes the difference in the series to date.

"Certain opportunities present themselves with Reed and DeBusschere out of the lineup," Boston Coach Tom Heinsohn said. "And we try to take advantage of the situation just like the Knicks did when (John) Havlicek was out with an injury in last year's playoffs."

Heinsohn added that "name" players missing games was not as much a problem, as getting good replacements.

"Names don't mean anything if they don't perform. But if you don't have someone on the bench to put in, your overall effectiveness is hurt."

Heinsohn's statement is especially true in the case of the Knicks, who haven't been getting the backup help they had last year in winning the NBA title. New York has not gotten a backup center since last year's playoffs.

"When we play our game, we need pressure on them. That's great. But if we don't put pressure on them, it's their game and then they put pressure on us."

The Boston coach refuses to put pressure on his own team by looking back on New York to the Milwaukee Bucks, who already have earned a spot in the final series.

"I haven't talked about playing the Bucks and I don't want to," he said. "I'm still concerned about the Knicks."

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**Anti-Cold Buss Missed by Most**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Last fall, you may recall, medical researchers working under a federal grant established that people are more likely to catch cold from shaking hands than from kissing.

"Obviously, however, that message didn't get across to the general public.

"We are now emerging from a winter in which upper respiratory infections were as rampant as ever, if not more so.

Which strongly suggests that the ratio of handshakes to kisses has remained fairly constant.

In other words, many people are still shaking hands in situations where kissing would be equally appropriate and decidedly more healthy.

Why has kissing failed to catch on despite the medical evidence in its favor?

Seeking a scientific answer to that question, I obtained an interview with Dr. J. Lippering Schmaque, a professional phillematologist.

"For anyone not acquainted with Schmaque's discipline, phillematology is defined by Webster as "the science of kissing."

"Nobody in the oculation field expected there would be a 100 per cent switcher from

handshakes to kisses," Schmaque told me. "There definitely are some occasions at which kissing and handshaking are not interchangeable.

"The referee at a boxing match, for example, couldn't very well direct the pugilists to 'kiss and come out fighting.'"

I said, "I suppose that would spoil the effect."

"Nor would kissing be a suitable substitute when someone is shaking hands with a baseball umpire," Schmaque continued. "That mark he wears can rip your lips to shreds."

I said, "What you say may be true, sir, but there are many other times, such as greeting your wife on your wedding anniversary, when a kiss would serve as well as a handshake."

"With all the viruses that are floating around, why does the ceremonial handshake continue to flourish?"

Schmaque explained that much of the public resistance to kissing stems from confusion between "bussing" and "busing."

"Because of the similarity between the two words, many people have come to associate kissing with the school bus issue," he said.

Dr. Lamb Athletics Encourage Fad Diets

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D.
DEAR DR. LAMB - Reading of your disapproval of fad diets, I think you should comment on some of the weight-loss programs I saw in my association with secondary school wrestling. These are school wrestling. These are motivated by the desire to compete in a lighter weight class.

It was quite common for heavier boys to lose 15 pounds or more the first night of practice. A close friend of mine lost a total of 19 pounds through the season to wrestle at lighter weight. He said the last few pounds really came off hard. All he ate for a week was an orange, on a heavy exercise program to boot.

Many of them severely restricted drinking liquids a large part of the time. The idea was to eat like a king the weekend after the meet, and then starve, run in sweatsuits and take steam baths until the next meet. They sometimes took laxatives for the sake of losing weight. I remember one with two or three pounds to lose about eight hours before weigh-in, so he ran and steamed until it was off.

When the last meet was finished the friend who lost 19 pounds put all 19 pounds back on in two days. I wish I knew whether or not these teenagers took vitamins or mineral supplements while they were fasting, but I doubt that they did.

You would do a public service by warning of the possible repercussions of such starving and drying out. My friend said that he had one thing he wouldn't normally do the week he fasted. I find it horrible that our public schools cultivate such things. Don't you?

DEAR READER - That's a while. As your letter demonstrates in the case of your friend who regained all 19 pounds he lost in just two days, most of the loss was water loss. This also means a loss of salt and major disturbance in the body chemistry. Under such circumstances even the amount of blood in the body is decreased by eliminating water from the bloodstream.

Your description is important to other people losing weight because it points out that steam baths and a lot of these procedures, even when you lose 19 pounds, do not eliminate fat - just the water the body normally needs. Most people don't realize that the normal body is about half water. Over 70 per cent of the weight of our muscles is water. When you dry a person out you seriously affect the way all the vital cells in the body work, even those in the brain. Also, such people are more prone to faint.

Water loss from weightlessness in space flight has a similar effect. The loss is nothing like what you describe. Astronaut Ed White lost about nine pounds when he was on the flight with his space walk, but he told me he regained most of it the first day back. He regained the normal amount of water for earthlings. Those interested in losing weight safely without dangerous fads can get more information by writing to me in care of this newspaper, P.O. Those 15-pound losses during the first night's practice are mostly water and salt. It comes right back. The sweat suits simply contribute to draining the water and salt out of the body. This saps energy in a number of instances. This is not the way to train our youth to have a healthy body and develop healthy living patterns. And, I think it is rather poor sportsmanship to try such gimmicks so you can wrestle someone who is really smaller than you.

10-Year Cleanup Cost \$274 Billion

Chicago - It will take an estimated \$274.2 billion to control pollution of all types over the next decade, experts estimate. ## Real Estate Commission Target of Suit

NEW HAVEN (UPI)—A coalition of civil rights groups is suing the Connecticut Real Estate Commission for allegedly failing to act against realtors accused of promoting racially segregated housing.

The suit filed in New Haven federal court names Real Estate Commissioner Francis X. Cole and seeks to force the commission to follow the letter and spirit of state laws regarding licensed brokers.

It is the latest in a series of attacks against racism in Connecticut industry and commerce and the real estate industry.

Last week the federal government sued Pratt and Whitney Aircraft of East Hartford, a division of United Aircraft Corp., for allegedly discriminating against minority workers and job applicants since 1965.

A few days later, another large Connecticut employer, Travelers Insurance Co., of Hartford was accused of contributing to racial segregation through its personnel and investment policies.

The accused, Education-Instruction, a Hartford-based civil rights organization, asked state and federal authorities to investigate the giant insurer, particularly its alleged practice of investing funds in housing construction projects that ultimately end up being of little benefit for minority members.

Education-Instruction and its director, Boyd Hinds, are plaintiffs in the Real Estate Commission suit, along with a number of other individuals and organizations, including the Coalition for Open Suburbs, the Open Door Society of Connecticut and the Blue Hills Civic Association of Hartford.

The plaintiffs claim, among other charges, their civil rights have been violated through the commission's alleged failure to regulate Connecticut realtors with respect to racial discrimination in the sale and leasing of property.

Further, the suit accuses the commission of failing to act on a number of specific complaints against "dishonest and unscrupulous" brokers who allegedly practiced "steering and blockbusting." The brokers were not identified in the suit.

Blockbusting is the practice of encouraging whites to move out of racially mixed neighborhoods by exploiting

### Contribution Ban May Be Too Broad

HARTFORD (UPI)—Secretary of the State Gloria Schaffer questions the constitutionality of a campaign reform provision that prohibits contributions by groups of people.

The provision was added as an amendment to a set of campaign reform bills passed last week in the state Senate and now up for action in the House.

Mrs. Schaffer claims the amendment may go too far.

"The fundamental right of citizens, whether individually, or as members of groups, to freely express themselves on issues and candidates includes the right to contribute not only their views, but their time, energies and financial resources," Mrs. Schaffer said.

The amendment was on a bill requiring pre-primary and pre-election disclosure of campaign contributions and expenditures.

Mrs. Schaffer said a "realistic limitation on contributions and their full and regular disclosure," plus the creation of a state Election Commission would be sufficient to head off any campaign abuses.

### Apply Early For Number

"Students and other people planning to get summer jobs should apply soon for a Social Security number if they don't have one, according to Joseph Macciaro, Social Security manager in East Hartford.

"Applications from people who don't recall having a Social Security number before are a generally screened against central files in Baltimore, Md., to make certain a second number is not issued to the same person," Macciaro said.

"Screening takes time, so you should apply for your number several weeks before you need it for a job covered by Social Security," Mustiario said.

People applying for a Social Security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship, he said.

"Age can usually be proven with a birth or baptismal certificate, the proof requirement is intended to help prevent people from obtaining more than one Social Security number or obtaining or using a Social Security card under false identity."

Aliens and naturalized U.S. citizens must prove their citizenship or legal alien status to get a Social Security number when applying for the first time.

# UConn's Battle of the Sexes Heading for Court Showdown

By MARGARET MCGOVERN STORRS (UPI) — A battle of the sexes at the University of Connecticut is heading for a courtroom showdown.

The gauntlet went down in 1970 when the Women's Equity Action League, an offshoot of the National Organization for Women, filed a complaint that the university was discriminating against women in several areas. UConn was among 200 universities in the nation hit by the complaint.

Among the criticisms were the small number of women in faculty and staff posts and the lack of a feminist representative on campus.

UConn got that woman's representative — Gail Shea in 1972, and she was fired a year later and is still without a job.

Campus Siberia? She had a premonition when she showed up for work and found her office had been shifted from the administration building to the home economics department.

She's suing.

Miss Shea is not the only woman suing the university. An English professor who liberated the all male gym last year — Marcia Lieberman — is suing for more than \$200,000. Mrs. Lieberman had her tenure denied and some think it might be because she's an active feminist.

"I see it as the most blatant example of sex discrimination I've ever encountered," Miss Shea says of her job loss. The petite sociologist, who is a doctoral candidate at Brown University, said "I didn't really think this kind of discrimination still exists."

Sociology Teacher She was an instructor in sociology in 1971 when she and a

group of women on campus compiled a report on the status of women. By checking the school's catalogue, the group found that women were noticeably absent in many job categories. The report was presented to then president Homer D. Babbidge who concurred with the findings.

He appointed Miss Shea to be assistant provost and a women's representative in June 1972. She said she understood from Babbidge the assignment was to run for a minimum of two years.

Two weeks after Miss Shea started her job, Babbidge left UConn for Yale, where he became master of Timothy Dwight College. He has since

made a vain try in the Democratic race for the gubernatorial nomination.

Provost Edward Gant took over as acting president at UConn and that's where the trouble began, Miss Shea said. "Philosophically, we were miles apart. He thought there was no problem about women, so why did they need someone to solve anything," she said.

"Everything I tried to do was blocked," she said. Her job description was aimed at improving the status of women, organizing a women's center, drafting part of the university's Affirmative Action Plan, investigating day-care centers for women staff and faculty members, and helping departments recruit qualified women.

"But when I tried to do the

job, I was prevented from it," she said.

And last June Miss Shea was abruptly notified in the first part of the month that her job ended June 30.

There is a new president at UConn — Glenn W. Ferguson — but it doesn't look like he'll be sympathetic to the women.

Ferguson said new posts should not be created for women but, rather, they should be placed in currently vacant posts on campus. He said the quota system was law now in our society.

Miss Shea takes issue with Ferguson. She said the government doesn't talk about quotas at all. In fact, she said legislation forbids quotas.

"The quota system can also work against civil rights, by keeping qualified women out," Miss Shea said.

## Oil Firms Report Earnings

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Several of the nation's largest oil producing companies, including Standard Oil Co. (Indiana) and Gulf Oil, have reported first quarter earnings considerably higher than a year ago.

Gulf reports its first quarter figure at \$290 million, or \$1.49 per share, up 76 per cent over the 1973 quarter when income was \$165 million, or 80 cents a share.

Indiana Standard's first quarter figures for 1974 were even more impressive with estimated earnings of \$219 million, 81 per cent higher than for the same period the previous year. The per share figures were \$3.13, compared with \$1.74 last year for the same three months.

The Standard report attributed the major portion of the increase to what it termed higher foreign petroleum earnings and increased profits from chemical operations.

Ashland Oil Inc., Ashland, Ky., reported a 40.5 per cent increase in earnings in the six months ended March 31 to \$2.15 a share from \$1.50 a year ago. Net income was \$33.8 million against \$33.3 million a year ago. Earnings for the second quarter were 75 cents a share up from 61 cents a year ago.

## Gas Prices May Be Stabilizing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Both supplies and prices of gasoline appear to have stabilized over much of the nation, the American Automobile Association said Tuesday.

The AAA said its weekly survey of gasoline stations, covering all states but Alaska, showed that only 2 per cent were out of gasoline.

Highest averages were 58 cents for regular in Michigan and 61 cents for premium in New York. Texas had the lowest for both—50 cents for regular, 54 cents for premium.

The tightest supplies, as in the past, were reported in the Northeast — Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont—where more than 8 per cent were still limiting purchases and more than 3 per cent were out of fuel.

The best overall fuel availability, for the fourth consecutive week, was in a six-state area including Colorado, Montana, the Dakotas, Utah and Wyoming, with only one of 327 stations surveyed limiting purchases and none out of fuel.

New York, Maryland, Delaware and Hawaii still have mandatory odd-even rationing systems in effect following Virginia's dropping of its system last week.

Some major turnpikes also continue to practice the odd-even plan and stations along most of these throughways limit purchases, anywhere from \$1 to \$10, the AAA said.
