Rep. Paul N. (Pete) McCloskey credited the appearance of Vice President Gerald Ford for his narrow victory, the only one threatened. Others shooed off challengers easily. They'll be tested again in the general elections when they meet newcomers of the opposing party.

In South Dakota, Sen. George McGovern will face Leo Thorsness, a former prisoner of war, who defeated two other Republicans vieing for the chance to return McGovern to private

The impact of Watergate was felt in some elections when a low vote count showed many had stayed away from the polls. It was especially evidenced in its mistrust of the political process, with Republican voters favoring candidates who stressed the theme of integrity. On this plea, State Representative Davis Stanley won the

Burton won a special election to give Congress its only brother team. Philip Burton has been a member of Congress since 1964. This year's special election showed Burton to be the fifth Democrat to win a seat formerly held by a Republican.

In New Jersey, three women won congressional nominations: Democrats Helen S. Meyner, wife of the former governor; and Millicent Fenwick, pipe-smoking grandmother of 62; along with Claire J. Sheridan,

In Mississippi, James Meredith, the first black man to enter the University of Mississippi, after leading Democrats for the right to oppose Republican Rep. Thad Cochran, turned independent for the general



Evening

A funeral conference is usually a sad one, but it becomes tragic when overlaid with a deep sense of guilt. "If only I had done more for Mother!" "Why didn't I tell Dad how much he meant to me all through my life?" "I'm going to buy the most expensive casket on the market to show how much I appreciated my Father." When it is too late to say the word of love and appreciation, there are regrets. Why not say it — and say it now?

It is obviously not only in a family situation that a word of appreciation can give a lift. When someone does you a kindness, when you are grateful for a job well done, when someone's words have touched your life, whenever "thank you" comes to your mind, why not say it, and say it now? It doesn't have to be an effusive comment or a long speech to get the message across.

Soon after I was called to be a minister in Springfield. Vt. in 1940 I became aware of the taciturnity of Vermonters. I preached one Sunday afternoon in a little chape in East St. Lohnsbury to about fifteen or twenty faithful souls. After the service each worshipper filed out, tightlipped, shook hands, occassionally with an abrupt nod, but not one word. The last one came down the aisle. He was an elderly gentleman. Putting his cane on his left wrist, he took my hand and said: "Young man, you didn't do that text no harm." That is a comment I have not forgotten. Whatever word of appreciation comes to your mind - why not say it? - and say it now.

The Word for the Week is from the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the "meek" for they shall inherit the earth." If the word "meek" brings to your mind a Caspar Milquetoast or a Uriah Heep you may rightly question whether such people are ever likely to take over the world; one afraid of his own shadow, one who doesn't want to offend, who never stands up for his rights, who is walked over, who is obsequious? Why would Jesus say that such are to "inherit

A true understanding of the word's meaning throws a different light on this saying. "Meek" actually means "a wild horse tamed." Nothing bland and innocuous and ineffectual but power like that of a wild horse that has roamed the plains. He is now controlled and tamed for a

I asked Dr. Harvey MacArthur of the Hartford Seminary, a well known scholar of the New Testament, if this was the correct interpretation. He concurred that it Ladies Auxiliary Andersonwas and gave me several references in Greek literature Shea Post 2046. where the same Greek word is used to mean "tamed wild horse." The Beatitudes (Matt. 5) have been called the "charter of the Christian faith. "Blessed, (or happy) are the "meek" for they shall inherit the earth."

Probably many of you watch the Waltons on TV. It has been a remarkably popular program. I first heard about it when I listened to a sermon devoted to this family with the old fashioned virtues. Recently I read that the father in the Walton family is played by a man who used to be a clergyman in my own denomination, the United Church of Christ. He was disillusioned with the parish ministry. entered the field of religious book publishing, and now has become a successful actor. Incidentally, while in seminary he was a classmate of theologian Harvey Cox and also

Yale Chaplain William Coffin. Some feel that any clergyman who leaves the "ministry" gives the church a black mark. There are many who leave, and there are many reasons why they leave, but some are convinced that they can be a more effective "minister" in other fields than the local parish. It may be that they don't like the way congregations treat them, or they may be frustrated by the machinery of the church, or they may be better fitted to serve in another profession. Certainly the work of the church is not done merely by its professional ministers although they are important. God uses many people to do His work. He uses anyone who will listen to the Holy Spirit. Most people have to confess that, though they have intimations of the Spirit, they often fail to respond. Kenneth Kaufman makes such a confession in his poem "Tame Duck":

> There are three tame ducks in our back yard, Dabbling in mud and trying hard To get their share, and maybe more Of the overflowing barnyard store, Satisfied with the task they're at. Of eating and sleeping and getting fat. But whenever the free wild ducks go by In a long line streaming down the sky They cock a quizzical, puzzled eye And flap their wings and try to fly I think my soul is a tame old duck, Dabbling around in barnyard muck Fat and lazy, with useless wings, But sometimes when the North Wind sings, And the wild ones hurtle overhead, It remembers something lost and dead And cocks a wary, bewildered eye, And makes a feeble attempt to fly.

Nitze Quits Arms Talk

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Paul H. Nitze resigned Friday as one of the country's top arms limitation negotiators, indicating he believes Watergate lessens the chances of reaching arms control agreements.

Nitze, 67, is a Democrat who has served all five years of the Nixon administration as a negotiator for the U.S.-Soviet Strategic Arms Limitation

In a statement left in the Pentagon press room Friday, Nitze never mentioned President Nixon by name nor uttered the word Watergate.

But the implication was clear. Nitze said "the depressing reality of the traumatic events now unfolding in our nation's capital" carries over into the international arena. As a result, "I see little prospect of negotiating measures which will enhance movement toward (breaking the arms race)," he said.

"Until the office of the presidency has been restored to its principal function of upholding the Constitution and taking care of the fair execution of the laws, and thus be able to function effectively at home and abroad, I see no real prospect of reversing certain unfortunate trends,"

His statement came the same day Soviet Communist party leader Leonid Brezhnev said in Moscow the Soviet Union was ready to limit underground

DevCo Contribution Stirs Controversy

COVENTRY

(A contribution of about \$1,-200 to the Coventry Midget Football League by DevCo, a group which is proposing to build a new community in town, has stirred up a controversy in town over the propriety of accepting the money. The following article contains statement on the subject by Paul Diehl and Thomas Morris)

Last week two coaches from the Midget Football League approached by DevCo for a donation to the league. The coaches, Bob Pachesa

and Tom Morris had been

asking all of the taxpayers of Coventry for contributions because the league is in serious financial difficulties. When it became known to the Committee for the Preservation of Coventry that DevCo intended to make a donation,

Paul Diehl, a member of that group, issued a public statement calling the donation a type of subtle bribery. Tom Morris, head coach of the League, has since issued a

Diehl's Statement "At a June 12 meeting of the Committee for the Preservation of Coventry results were tubulated on the recent fund raising activities held in town.

rebuttal

"The Farm Tour, County Dance and the Beach Fling were all a financial and social success, and netted the coalition groups the necessary funds to pay the second installment of money due their attorney, John FitzGerald.

"Incidentally, at the meeting, it was brought to the attention of the groups that DevCo-Process has offered a sizable amount of money to one of the sports programs in town. The unanimous consensus of the membership was that this type of subtle bribery was both un-

ethical and highly improper." Paul Diehl elaborated by saying, "Why would DevCo offer money prior to the presentation of its city plan to the duly elected authorities? To purchase time, to purchase goodwill, to persuade others that they have the support of the group to whom they gave their gift, to use money to buy a place in the community. Although DevCo promises 'no strings attached,' there are automatically invisible lines used to manipulate people of a community, ie, a veiled promise of things to come, a subtle persuasion that money community division and a plea for support which they could

not get at an intellectual level." Diehl went on to say, "To accept a gift from a stranger is to incur a debt and to imply approval of him and his motives. If anyone accepts a gift as an individual, it is entirely between him and his benefactor to decide what value he will give in return. If this gift is accepted in the name of a civic group, this acceptance burdens the group with a debt to its benefactor, if only an emotional debt."

Diehl concluded by saying, "An offer of money to any legally constituted authority, or persons who in any way influence the decision of such authority, constitutes bribery. We ask all the citizens of Coventry to beware of DevCo's offers before the elected officials have made their decision."

of the morning of June 13, Paul Diehl called my home and said, "What is this I hear about the Football Association accepting money from DevCo? I think you are making a mistake, and if you do you will lose the support

of the town."

"Diehl went on to say that 'by taking theie money' we would lose his support and he would work to see that other people would stop supporting us also. He said 'he would also work to see that the Recreation Commission would withdraw its support and revoke the money they have given the program.

"I told Diehl that I didn't like to be threatened, and I considered his remarks a threat, and that I make it a practice to call all bluffs and challenges, and that he could not pressure or force the board into bowing down to his wishes.

"The Football Association is non-political and it will stay that way. Diehl has continually said that CPC was not political and we were being bribed and shouldn't believe DevCo. He implied that we were not intelligent enough to know the difference, which was another insult. He then made the statement that If we accepted money from DevCo, it would sway others to DevCo's side.

"I said he was being political again and that the football association would not be a ping pong ball between DevCo and

"After having asked to speak to the board before it voted and saying he would contact the president to arrange such, Diehl maliciously and underhandedly violated our agreement by releasing news to the papers full of half truths and assumption, to deliberately create animosity and conflict

among the people of Coventry, to turn them against the football program because he could no pressure or scare the board into following his beliefs.

"To me, such a breach of verbal contract leaves questions about CPC's motives and Diehl's character.

'DevCo Process should not be believed,' Diehl says so, Diehl should not be trusted, I know so.

"After failing to get enough money from the town to run the program and pay back debts, inquiries were made to local taxpayers for support in addition to planning other fund raisers; mainly a dance which has sold less than 100 tickets.

'We approached DevCo, told them of our situation and asked for assistance.

'Diehl and CPC are trying to destroy a program that keeps 20 per cent of the students in the middle school active from August to November by seizing the opportunity to drum up support for his ego by making a political issue out of a harmless contribution by a taxpayer who was asked by members of te association to help the kids of this town.

"Diehl and CPC brought the publicity; not DevCo or the football association.

'DevCo's main condition was that it would help if there was no publicity, because people like CPC might get the wrong impression.

"Diehl speaks many words with little substance. His philosophies remind me of Don Quixote with DevCo as his windmill. His implications that there are ulterior motives behind every gift is contrary to the American way and the practice of voluntary contributions. "When Paul talks about Peter, we learn more about Paul. 

Merle Haggard led a life of crime and even served time in San Quentin Prison before becoming a very successful country entertainer and song-writer. "Okie from Muskogee" is a song he wrote.

Country music is the simple music that mountain folk used to play at bake sales, square dances and other club meetings. Pianists, mandolin, fiddle, guitar and mouth harp or gourd players would provide the entertainment along with the singers.

This folk or country music has words that tell a story or express a feeling that everyone can understand.

Because of new, electrical instruments, country music is now more "polished" than it used to be so it appeals to more people. City people like it because it sometimes brings to mind the simple life they would like to lead. •

Bluegrass or folk music is big on college campuses. This type of music does not use any electrical instruments and usually includes the banjo sound.

Many country stars play the guitar. Country music instruments include the steel guitar, acoustical guitar, banjo, drum, bass, piano, mandolin, fiddle and sometimes even brass instruments.


Country music is being mixed with popular, rock, and other types of music. In fact, some entertainers play both. Elvis Presley is the most successful performer in the history of country AND rock music.




He got his start working as a nightclub entertainer between baseball seasons. One of his very popular songs is songs is "Kiss an Angel Good Mornin'."



The son of a poor dirt farmer from Alabama, Williams had a sad life and died at the early age of 29. His records still sell well today and bring the Williams family over \$100,000 a year.


