Youth Services Workers: There If You Need Them

There are many helping hands to be found in Manchester. This became very evident to me after visiting with the people at Youth Services, a program dedicated to aiding youth.

At the Youth Service Center, located on Park Street, Director Bob Digan reminded me that there are 17 thousand youth in Manchester between the ages of 1 month and 21 years. What Youth Service does, is aid those among the 17 thousand who are runaways, have parental or school problems, or are burdened with other troubles.

During the school year, Youth Services, which is funded by the Board of Education, aids youth who make a habit of skipping school. They deal with students from elementary grades up through high school. No truant officer tactics are involved in the Youth Services' approach to the problem, however. They attempt to find out why the person is staying away from school, and what can be done in the school or home environment to improve the situation.

Other areas of concern facing Youth Services during the school year include a school police liaison, whereas only plain clothes policemen may go into the schools, and working with the police in preventing vandalism. In an effort to tear down many of the stereotypes youth have of police, Youth Ser-

Night Biking Minus Lights: A Bad Reflection on You

Bicycling is now the number one participation sport in the country, according to the latest government statistics. More people ride bicycles than play golf, baseball, or any other summer sport. Bicycle sales last year totaled over \$12.5 million, and this statistic is readily borne out by the number of bicycles one sees on the road these days.

It is equally important to be seen by motorists approaching from the rear. Reflectors are the most effective means of accomplishing this goal, as well as the least expensive. These safety devices allow the rider to be identified as much as twice the average spotting distance for the rider without reflectors. Many bicycles now come factory equipped with pedal reflectors, which appear as moving flashes of light to the motorist approaching from behind. Bikes not equipped with these reflectors can usually be fitted with a large circular reflector mounted on the rear of the bike. In the rare case where this is not possible, leg reflectors strapped to the legs of the rider may be used.

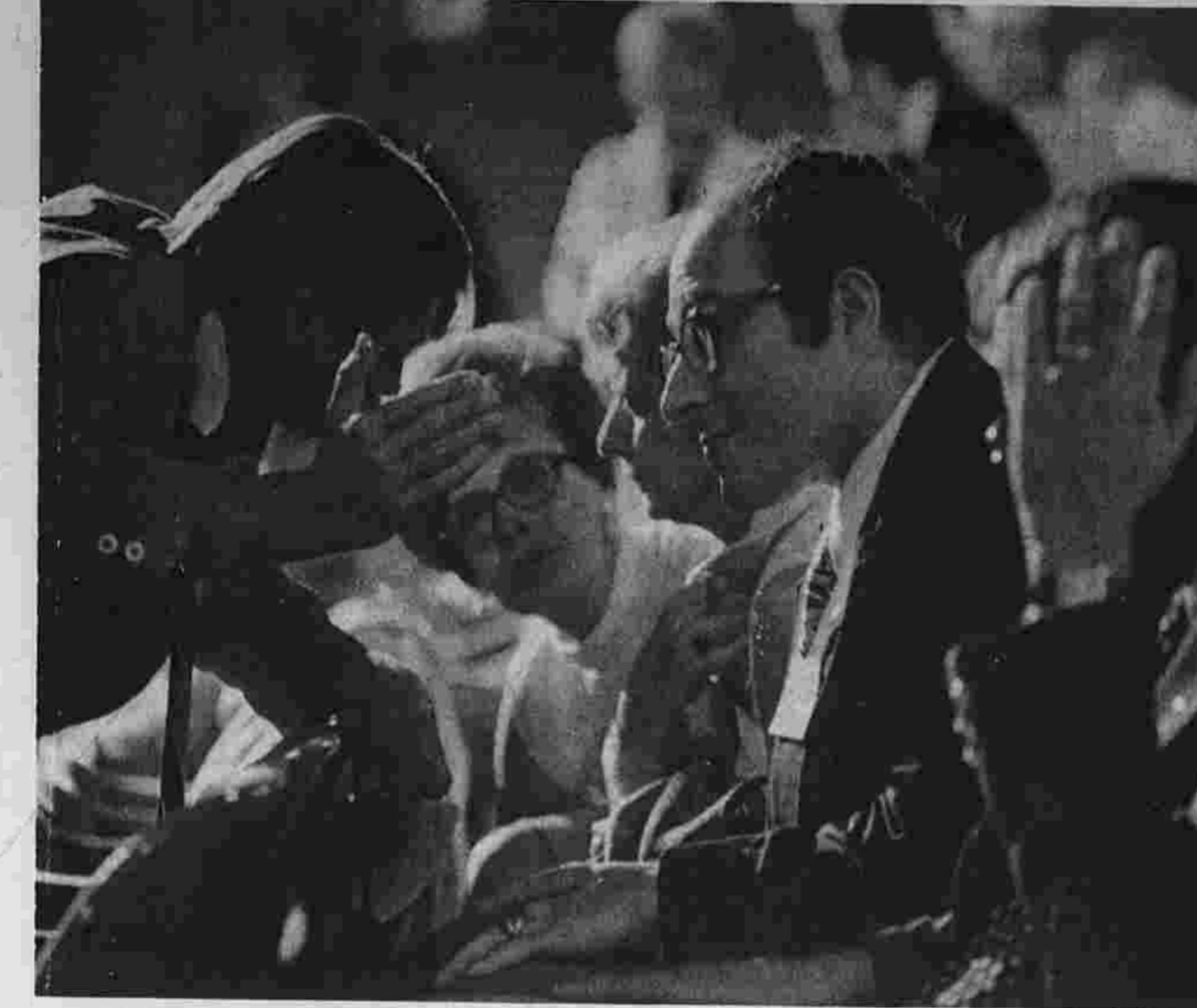
Take Your Pick

By keeping the following points in mind, even the beginner won't return empty-pailed.

Doar Outlines Possible Impeachable Offenses

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Judiciary Committee staff has proposed impeachment of President Nixon for complicity in the Watergate cover-up, abuse of presidential power, defying congressional subpoenas and tax fraud.

The committee's counsel John M. Doar laid out four possible grounds of impeachment before the members of the committee Friday, and the committee called a closed session today to begin considering them. It is expected to begin voting next week.

Turkey Claims Capture Of Cypriot Capital

Turkey invaded Cyprus today and battled Greek Cypriot forces from the Mediterranean island's northern beaches to the gates of the capital city of Nicosia. Greece ordered a general mobilization of its armed forces and rushed troops to the Turkish border.

Turkish land, sea and air forces struck at dawn in a two-pronged attack, storming ashore on the island republic in the north near the port city of Kyrenia and at Limassol in the south.

Planes Hit Targets

Waves of Turkish warplanes struck targets near Nicosia.

A little more than seven hours after the invasion began, the Turkish government in Ankara announced that the city of Nicosia had fallen to the invading army. There was no immediate confirmation from correspondents in Nicosia.

Rules Against Hoffa — A federal judge ruled Friday President Nixon had every right to ban James R. Hoffa from union politics as a condition of pardon. The American Teachers' president was pardoned in 1971 on the condition that he stay out of union activities until 1980. Judge John H. Pratt said Hoffa did not take the restriction, he could have stayed in jail.

Two Killed — DECATUR, Ill. (UPI) — Two persons were killed and at least 127 injured by an explosion Friday of a tank car containing liquefied petroleum. Eight of the injured were in critical condition.

Franco temporarily transferred power Friday to Prince Juan Carlos, his designated successor to rule Spain.

Keynoter Critical Of Nixon Economics

HARTFORD (UPI) — Sen. Lloyd Bentsen Jr., D-Texas, openly seeking the Democratic presidential nomination in 1976, told Connecticut Democrats Friday night that President Nixon's economic policies have placed the average American worker on an economic treadmill "working more every day for less and less."

"Not since the days of Herbert Hoover has this nation's economic policy done so little for so many, and so much for so few," Bentsen said in a keynote address opening the Democratic state convention at the Bushnell auditorium.

Ferry Bombed

BELFAST (UPI) — A bomb exploded aboard a ferry Friday, forcing the evacuation of two hours after it arrived from Liverpool today, police said. No injuries were reported.

Police said the blast followed a telephone warning from a caller identifying himself as a member of the Provisional Irish Republican Army, who said there were three bombs aboard the ferry. The spokesman said army bomb experts searched the vessel but found no other bombs, and the area was declared clear at noon.
