Unity Appeal Expected

Ford to Address Nation On Administration Goals

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Ford goes before a joint session of Congress tonight with a nationally televised appeal for unity and a renewed spirit of cooperation between legislators and the White House.

There were abundant indications Ford would receive a warm welcome in his first appearance as President in the chambers where he served for 25 years as a Michigan congressman. His speech was scheduled to start at 9 p.m. EDT.

Ford got an early start on his long day, beating most of his staff to the White House at 7:30 a.m. He scheduled morning meetings with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger to discuss the Cyprus situation and with other aides to work on shaping his new administration.

Veep List

Another task facing Ford was consideration of his growing list of proposed vice presidential candidates. Congressional and political leaders who met with him for

30 minutes Sunday said Ford had a list of about 15 possibilities and asked for more suggestions.

Administration officials said Ford's speech to Congress, which was expected to run about 30 minutes, would present a general overview of what he considers to be urgent domestic and foreign problems. Ford spent much of the weekend working on it.

Members of Congress, meanwhile, anticipated having much better relations with Ford than they did with the Nixon administration.

"We do have a better climate, no question about it, and we'll have more cooperation between President Ford and the Congress," Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield said today.

Honeymoon Will Last

"I think that the honeymoon will last up to and through the election, because we want to cooperate and work in partnership with President Ford and the administration," he said.

Appearing on NBC-TV's "Today Show," Mansfield said fighting inflation should be Ford's top priority. "Whatever he thinks is necessary to decrease inflation from the present rate of 12 per cent, we would give consideration to," Mansfield said. "And we would eagerly await any initiative he would show."

Ford emerged from his suburban Alexandria, Va. home early today after fixing his own breakfast and taking a dip in his backyard swimming pool. He waved to a small crowd of bystanders and press.

When asked what he would do without a swimming pool at the White House he grinned and said: "I'm going to miss it."

That relaxed style was also apparent in the way Ford has run the White House since he took office Thursday. There are no restrictions on the movements of reporters and the staff, taking its cue from Ford, was much more open and friendly than former President Nixon's staff had been.

The main domestic problem facing the Ford administration is the economy.

His aides said the speech would not provide specific programs, although Ford might announce plans to start high-level discussions soon about the economy before coming up with any new programs.

Internationally, they said, Ford will stress continuity of Nixon administration foreign policy and the need for stability and world peace.

The address itself will be "newsy" but will contain "no blockbusters," one aide said.

The most immediate problem, however, is selection of a vice president.

Ford met for six hours at the White House Sunday with GOP leaders, speaking with each for 30 minutes alone.

'Helpful Advice'

Ford said he got "constructive and very helpful advice." Congressmen emerging from the one-on-one sessions said that Democrats, blacks and women were among the possibilities. When asked directly about a woman vice president, Ford said, "We don't rule out anybody."

Ford was said to have a personal list of about 15 names he showed the advisers.

Among the most prominently mentioned for the job were former New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and GOP national chairman George Bush. Other names discussed were Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass.; Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz.; former Attorney General Elliot Richardson, and former Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird.

Ford has promised to submit a name to Congress by early next week.

Homecoming

Tonight's speech brings Ford back to the House, where he cultivated deep friendships on both sides of the aisle during his 25 years as representative of Michigan's Fifth District.

David and Julie Eisenhower, the only members of former President Nixon's family still in Washington, have been invited to sit with the Ford family in the House gallery along with Mamie Eisenhower.

Though there is no doubt his old friends don't need to be asked, Ford will request cooperation from Congress and pledge a smooth relationship in return.

So cordial are the relationships between Ford and almost every member, says Rep. Barber Conable, R-N.Y., his former colleagues may have trouble calling him "Mr. President."

"One of the bright things about him," Conable said, "is that we still want to call him Jerry. I think that is what America is looking for at this time."

Tolland Woman Faces Charges

Mrs. Aulthia Jacobs, 43, of Hurlburt Rd., Tolland was waiting for presentment today in Circuit Court 12 in Manchester on charges stemming from the shooting death of her husband over the weekend.

Datry Jacobs, 40, of the same address died Sunday at 3:25 p.m. at Hartford Hospital from one shot in the head with a .32 caliber pistol, according to State Police of the Stafford Springs Barracks.

The shooting reportedly ended a domestic disturbance at the Jacobs home Saturday at 9:30 p.m. Neighbors called police who arrested Mrs. Jacobs and charged her with first-degree assault.

Tolland Volunteer Ambulance took Jacobs to Rockville General Hospital. He was then transported to Hartford Hospital.

Mrs. Jacobs was taken to the state correction center in Niantic over the weekend. Her bond was set at \$5,000.

She was brought to the Manchester court this morning where she spoke with attorneys while waiting for presentment.

An autopsy was to be performed today. State Trooper Alphonse Maynard was the investigating officer.

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Governors Optimistic

CHICAGO (UPI)—With Richard Nixon out of the White House, the nation's Republican governors are hoping to put more Republicans in governors' mansions across the country.

"We're determined to make this year a start toward eroding that Democratic advantage and increasing the number of Republican governors," Tennessee Gov. Winfield Dunn, chairman of the Republican Governors' Association, told a news conference Sunday.

In 1967, Dunn noted, there were 32 GOP governors and 18 Democratic governors. Now, he says, the figure is identical but reversed.

Hopeful

With Nixon out of the way, the GOP governors are hoping that Watergate will take a back seat in the upcoming campaigns and that the Republicans will be able to turn the tables.

Sixteen GOP governors or gubernatorial nominees were on hand Sunday for the strategy session.

Dunn told newsmen he felt Watergate would remain an issue in the upcoming elections, but said he was glad Nixon resigned.

"I hope his action cleared the air so that

the governors' races can be carried out on current issues, such as inflation, employment and educational opportunities, for instance," he said.

Funds Small

Dunn said campaign contributions to the GOP coffers were small at this point, but indicated there would be plenty of financial backing for the party's campaigns.

"It's in the hundreds and low thousands now, but it convinces me the Republican party still has good financial support," Dunn said.

Dunn, Missouri Gov. Christopher Bond and North Carolina Gov. James E. Holshouser Jr. told newsmen they would focus on any efforts by President Ford to solicit a Democratic vice president.

All agreed that former New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller would make an acceptable candidate. Dunn said Rockefeller was at the top of the list of prospective vice presidents he submitted to Ford. Bond called Rockefeller an excellent choice and Holshouser said he also would approve.

Rockefeller, who addressed the meeting, refused to discuss the vice presidency, saying it would be unfair to Ford.

Greek-Led Troops Start Releasing Turkish POWs

Greek-led troops moved to cool the explosive Cyprus crisis today, freeing the first of thousands of Turkish prisoners of war and beginning a pullout from occupied minority enclaves.

Greece, however, beefed up troops outside Athens in what the government called a test of Athens' ability to meet any new Turkish military moves on Cyprus.

Britain, the former colonial ruler of Cyprus, also ordered 1,000 tough Nepalese Gurkha troops to reinforce its 10,000-man force on the eastern Mediterranean island of 700,000.

Free 13 Sunday

The Greek-led Cypriot National Guard freed the first 13 Turkish war prisoners Sunday night in "a unilateral act of good will" and promised more releases today after giving the Red Cross a list of 3,200 Turkish POWs.

British Foreign Secretary James Callaghan said the national guard also pulled out of some Turkish Cypriot villages and handed the areas over to U.N. peacekeeping forces.

Callaghan, mediator at the Turkish-Greek peace talks in Geneva, called the twin moves by the Greek-led national guard "a step in the right direction."

Leave Villages

A U.N. spokesman in Nicosia said today national guard troops had left four Turkish villages in Limassol Province, adding that they would evacuate Turkish areas in the cities of Larnaca and Paphos later today.

But a UPI newsman said national guard units were still in Limassol's Turkish sector and some 1,700 Turkish prisoners still were being held in two of the port's elementary schools.

Delegates said the Greek and Turkish foreign ministers edged a little closer to agreement at the on-again, off-again talks in Geneva, and decided to stay another day to try and reach accord on the island's political future.

Leaders of the island's Turkish minority have called for dividing Cyprus into two autonomous regions, but Greek Cypriot officials have come out strongly against partition.

Red Cross officials drove the first freed Turkish troops from a detention center in Limassol to the U.N.-supervised "green line" dividing the Greek and Turkish sectors in Nicosia, the island's capital.

The prisoners, many of them unshaven, looked fatigued, trudging along in shoes or boots without laces. A national guard spokesman said some had been picked up in civilian clothes, but "were not treated as spies but as prisoners of war."

Senate Sentiment Against Prosecution

WASHINGTON (UPI)—While there appears to be strong sentiment in the Senate that Richard Nixon should not be prosecuted for any crimes, there seems to be little support for passing a resolution to that effect.

The proposed resolution, sponsored by Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., would not be binding and only would request that local, state and federal prosecutors refrain from bringing charges against Nixon.

"In my judgment Dick Nixon could not get a fair trial," Senate GOP leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania said Sunday in a broadcast interview (CBS "Face the Nation"). "Hanging is enough without drawing and quartering."

The House Judiciary Committee, which will hold hearings on President Ford's eventual vice presidential nominee, this week prepares to dispose of its impeachment business.

Chairman Peter W. Rodino, D-N.J., who is firmly against continuing with impeachment, says he is most concerned about getting out a final report to serve as a precedent for future impeachments and to make it clear Nixon had good reason to leave office.

"The facts as we have shown them will forever be spread on the record," Rodino said.

One possibility is to present the House with a resolution formally ending the proceedings. Another alternative is merely a formal presentation of the committee report to the House. Rodino has asked House Parliamentarian William Brown to recommend a way of ending the process.

Committee counsel John M. Doar gave Rodino the final draft of the report during the weekend, and Rodino planned to make some changes before giving it back to the 38-member panel today or Tuesday.

Nixon Remains in Seclusion

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)—Former President Nixon, after spending a quiet weekend with his family and friends, was expected to remain secluded at his oceanside villa today.

A private citizen for four days now, Nixon has ventured outside of his guarded compound only once—when he went to the Camp Pendleton Marine Base at Ocean-side for a swim and a walk along the beach.

During the weekend, Nixon conferred several times with his closest friends and financial confidants, Charles "Bebe" Rebozo and Robert Abplanalp.

Rebozo Along

Nixon was accompanied by Rebozo, an unidentified passenger, two cars of Secret Service agents and some 10 cars of following newsmen when he went to Camp Pendleton.

Pat Nixon, daughter Tricia Cox and her husband, Ed, already were waiting for Nixon at the beach and returned with him when the motorcade left to return to the villa, La Casa Pacifica.

An aide, who asked not to be identified, said, "His spirits are good, he is not down-

cast. The decision he announced the other night is a decision he is very comfortable with, and he is satisfied that in the national interest, it was the right step for him to take."

Rebozo, a Florida banker, and Abplanalp, a wealthy industrialist, conferred with Nixon Saturday and Sunday.

'Here as Friends'

"We're here as friends to do what we can—that's all," said Abplanalp. "Anything more than we said now would not be appropriate."

They did not indicate how long they intended to stay.

Both men are partners in B & C Investment Co., formed to buy most of Nixon's estate here. In 1970 the company bought 23 of the estate's 29 acres from Nixon for \$1.25 million, leaving Nixon the owner of the main house and other buildings.

Mortgage

Nixon, Rebozo and Abplanalp all are responsible for the estate's mortgage. They were unable to meet a \$226,000 "balloon payment" on the mortgage when

it fell due last month and have secured an extension until January.

Nixon also was said to be anticipating potential legal action against him in connection with alleged misconduct during his presidency.

Last month he was named as an undicted coconspirator in the Watergate cover-up. Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski now is free to take steps against Nixon as a private citizen, possibly on grounds of obstruction of justice.

May Get A New Lawyer

An aide said Nixon was discussing such matters with associates and might retain a new lawyer to replace James D. St. Clair, the Boston trial attorney who headed Nixon's White House legal defense team.

There will be little information about Nixon's activities in the coming days, an aide said. "The president looks at this as a private time—he will be spending the time with his family."

The aide said Nixon had not spoken to President Ford since the transfer of power, but that he expected to do so in the near future.



Paying More For Health Care


One thing for certain, Americans are going to be paying more for health care. Just how much more they will be paying will depend on which proposal is adopted by Congress after it gets around to disposing of other issues.
The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare just completed new cost estimates for all eight national health insurance proposals now before Congress.
The projections show that total health expenditures under our present system, with no new law on the books, will increase from \$94.1 billion in 1973 to \$116.4 billion in 1975, or by 24 per cent.
Spending for personal health care services, hospital and medical care, health insurance, is expected to jump 23 per cent from \$84 billion in 1973 to \$103 billion in 1975.
Under our present system, about 62 per cent of personal health expenditures in 1975 will come from private sources, including health insurance

and out-of-pocket payments. The remaining 38 per cent will be funded by government—federal, state and local.
Any new national health insurance proposal enacted by Congress will cause spending to rise even more.
The cost of the various proposals range from \$107 billion to as high as \$116 billion.
Five of the eight major health proposals would require employers to provide their employees with comprehensive health insurance benefits marketed by private enterprise. Financing would be provided through employer-employee premium payments.
One of the proposals would fund 71 per cent of the personal health care outlay from government sources.
We doubt if Congress gets around to acting on health care in this session. There is also the thinking we are likely to have a more liberal Congress in 1975 and health care will probably be shelved until that session.

Our Gasoline Supply

The regulatory effects of the market may be seen in the surplus of gasoline which now exists in the United States.
In response to higher prices, the major oil companies have produced so much gasoline that they are now finding it difficult to store.
Indeed the majors are urging their retail outlets to keep longer hours and open on Sunday to try to sell more of the large stocks on hand.
In some states lower prices have already appeared, even though the prices are still much higher than a year ago.
One factor which may result in lower prices and even a "gas war" is the plentiful supply to independent dealers, who traditionally are in the forefront of competitive gasoline pricing.
Concurrent with the great production of the motor fuel has been a

decrease in usage. Higher prices, plus the 55-per-hour speed limit, have combined to make motorists use less gasoline than they were prior to the Arab oil boycott.
With the shadow of an Arab cutoff, or "control," we cannot be said to be operating entirely in a free market situation. Yet for the time being the weight of supply and demand are being seen.
What effect this will have on oil exporting countries is to be seen. There may well be a curtailment of production in order to maintain the present high prices for crude petroleum. Or a price cut is possible.
In retrospect it can be seen that the President was sensible in resisting the exhortations of some Congressional liberals who were vociferous in their pleas for gas rationing. Seems a little ridiculous today, doesn't it?
The argument that is being winning the day with the labor liberals in Congress is "national security." That is, in order to secure delivery of imported oil, the United States must build up its own fleet of tankers, manned with U.S. seamen. The Commerce Department estimates this will require the construction of 40 tankers at a cost of \$4 billion by 1977.
If in that year the Arabs cut off our oil, we won't get any more oil, but Americans can rest easy that what does get here will be carried in U.S. vessels. Somewhere else in the world there will be 40 empty tankers; some national security.
The cost of building and manning American tankers is so much higher than the competition that even the House Merchant Marine Subcommittee shamelessly admits it might add "a penny a gallon at most" to the price of gasoline; the Maritime Administration projects two cents a

Where Are You, Ralph Nader?

Now that the American consumer really needs him, Ralph Nader seems to have gone fishing. Congress is on the verge of passing a fancy item called the Energy Transportation Security Act of 1974, in what can only be a straightforward deal with the free-spending maritime unions. The bill requires 30 per cent of all oil imports be carried on U.S.-flag vessels, compared to almost none today; it would add at least \$20 billion and perhaps \$60 billion to U.S. energy costs over the next decade. Why are the consumer advocates so quiet?
What is really ironic is that the maritime unions have been pushing cargo-preference legislation for years, scattering campaign contributions and sky-high lecture fees all over Capitol Hill to insure an attentive audience. They've always been rebuffed. Yet now, with Congress supposedly on a higher moral plain inspired by the Watergate revelations, great merit is suddenly discovered in the idea. The House has passed the measure by a 266 to 136 vote and the Senate is poised to adopt it.
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The cost of building and manning American tankers is so much higher than the competition that even the House Merchant Marine Subcommittee shamelessly admits it might add "a penny a gallon at most" to the price of gasoline; the Maritime Administration projects two cents a

gallon by 1985. With U.S. consumption now at 100 billion gallons a year, that alone is \$1 billion a year in increased cargo costs, rising to more than \$2 billion a year by 1985.
And that calculation assumes that the rest of the world is going to happily permit the United States to violate existing treaties that prohibit preferences for commercial cargoes. It would be hard to reason with Saudi Arabia or Venezuela if they propounded laws requiring that 30 per cent of the crude they ship to the United States must be carried in Saudi or Venezuelan bottoms at the highest commercial rates, which of course will be those charged by the U.S.-flag vessels.
There is nothing in this legislation that is good for consumers, taxpayers or the nation as a whole. But those who should be complaining loudest about it, the Naderites and Common Cause, do not wish to irritate the AFL-CIO and thereby lose labor support for their Consumer Protection Agency, which is also before the Congress. The homebuilders and mortgage bankers haven't complained either. They're too busy pleading for direct relief themselves. Yet here is a measure that will take \$4 billion from the capital market in three years and at least \$20 billion from consumer spending in ten. Doesn't anyone realize the pork barrel is empty?
Perhaps they do, and are simply counting on the new President to veto the bill if it passes. The administration, at least, opposes the bill, which may be why so many members of Congress can vote for such a boondoggle and still live with their consciences. What alarms us most, though, is that a bill so worthless and inflationary can command so much support in Congress at a time when the United States is going through one of the worst inflations in its history. If Congress passes this, what won't it pass? — Wall Street Journal

Schools Buy New Gear For Safety

New electric typewriters, science equipment, and laboratory fixtures are being purchased by the South Windsor school department in order to comply with the federal safety act.

OSHA — Occupation Safety and Health Act—has been the subject of recent bidding and purchasing on the part of various municipal departments in order to replace equipment which could be interpreted as hazardous.

School Superintendent Robert Goldman said school purchasing agents have begun spending the \$14,000 allocated to the school department this fiscal year, and have already replaced numerous electrical and laboratory equipment.

Under OSHA, all municipal buildings must be as hazard free as possible. The building will be inspected periodically by federal representatives who will file reports on the building's conditions as well as make recommendations on items that need replacing.

Dr. Goldman said he believes that if there are potentially hazardous areas or items reported by the inspectors the school department will be given a deadline by which corrections must be made.

He said that it is expected that all of the \$14,000 will be spent by the end of the year on OSHA requirements. All town departments are now in the process of complying with OSHA, and violations of the federal act could result in fines.

"I expect an inspection will be conducted within the next few months. We'll probably be given deadlines — 30, 60 or 90 days — to make the recommended changes, or we may be told to make them immediately," said Dr. Goldman.





Birth Defect Is Her Problem

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB — I was born with a short leg. My left leg is several inches shorter than my right. I'm 20 now and about five feet tall, weighing 105 pounds. Also, I have no toes on my left foot.

I started walking with crutches at age 2, and when I was 7 was fitted with my first elevated shoe. While I was growing the shoe was elevated regularly. By the time I was 18 my left shoe was built up about 10 inches. It was very clumsy.

About a year ago my mother found a great orthopedic shoe specialist. He made a special shoe for me and may I say, Doctor, I was just about ready to cry when he put the shoe on my useless foot. My right shoe was a black patent oxford, laced type with a half-inch heel.

Doctor, I am really happy with my unusual shoe. I almost always wear slacks so my shoe is not noticeable. My boyfriend has taught me to dance, and I even go on long hikes with him.

DEAR READER — That is not a decision you can make without a careful study of the details of the problem. First you need the benefit of an expert evaluation of the problem by a specialist in orthopedic surgery.

It is not a decision that has to be made tomorrow. Why don't you ask your family doctor to arrange for you to see an orthopedic surgeon and after you have all the facts as they apply to your particular case then you will be in a better position to make a good decision?

Petty Credits Luck, Baker for Victory

TALLADEGA, Ala. (UPI) — Richard Petty credited luck and Buddy Baker for his 162nd career victory Sunday in the sixth annual Talladega 500 stock car race at Alabama International Motor Speedway.

"Buddy won it for me," a smiling Petty told reporters after edging David Pearson by inches at the finish line. "His (Baker's) car was the quickest on the track. I was able to draft him for most of the race and

"My pit crew did a tremendous job and we had a lucky break."

Petty, a Randleman, N. C. millionaire, won \$21,965 in first prize and lap money, boosting his NASCAR leading total to \$201,170. He also stretched his lead over Cale Yarborough in the Winston Cup Point standings. Petty has 2,751 points and Yarborough 2,261.

Bobby Allison finished third in the race, followed by Yarborough, Benny Parsons, Baker, Ramo Scott, Bobby Isaac, Marty Robbins and Earl Ross. Petty's 1974 Dodge was one of 10 cars damaged Saturday night by a saboteur who slipped into the garage area despite the presence of two security guards.

"The in-toy on my car had been messed up but we corrected it pretty quick," Petty said. "We checked everything else, drained the gas tank and tightened all the bolts we could get to."

Damage to the cars ranged from readjusted front tie-rods to slashed tires and oil lines and "an unknown substance poured into the gas tanks," authorities said. Most of the damaged cars belonged to top drivers.

Only two drivers, Neil Castles and Joe Frasson, attributed their racing problems to the vandals. Both said oil lines were cut and not discovered until after the race began.

Lee Passed Up Rest To Win First PGA

CLEMMONS, N.C. (UPI) — Almost exactly a month after he said he was over-golfed and in need of a two-year rest from the tour, Lee Trevino Sunday won his first PGA championship and looked for new horizons to conquer.

His game in tatters and his morale at a low ebb after an opening round 79 in last month's British Open, Trevino said he needed a long rest. But, instead, he returned to the tour and Sunday shot a one-under-par 69 for a 72-hole total of 276 and a one stroke victory over defending PGA champion Jack Nicklaus.

South African Bobby Cole, who shared the lead after 62 holes, ran into trouble on the back nine, shot a 71 for 279 to be tied by Sam Snead, 68. Dave Hill 69, and Hubie Green, 70. Trevino, whose only previous 1974 victory was in the New Orleans Open in March, swelled his 1974 winnings to \$166,886 with the PGA's \$45,000. Nicklaus earned \$25,700, while the four-way tie for third was worth \$10,956 to each man.

"I'll be back at Augusta next year if they'll have me," quipped the 35-year-old Texan from El Paso. "Now that I've won three of the big ones, I must give myself a chance at the fourth."

Trevino has an intense dislike for the Augusta National course which, he insists, does not suit his game, but Nicklaus said, "he can play any year of his life."

Merry Mex, as Trevino is when he's on his game, said he'd also show up at Akron Ohio, for the World Series of Golf. "I'll collect my \$5,000 (last place) and leave," he said amid roars of laughter.

The World Series brings together the Big Four winners of the year but Trevino never has performed well at Akron because Firestone is another of the courses he dislikes.

Sunday Trevino withstood Nicklaus' challenge by driving down the middle and hitting inside his rival most times they arrived at the green.

"I played attacking golf," said Trevino although he posted only two birdies against a single bogey. "I went for the flag and if I'd putted reasonably it would have been over on the front nine."

Trevino dropped puts of eight and 20 feet for birds at the first and ninth holes, but he three-putted the 17th from 30 feet and saw his lead reduced to one over Nicklaus.

Jimmy Fund

Longtime rivals, the Hartford Dovelettes, 27-2-1 in their 23rd straight season under one sponsor and the Keene Merchants (29-7), the New Hampshire East-pitch champs, will take part in Manchester's 11th annual Jimmy Fund softball doubleheader Tuesday night at Fitzgerald Field at 6:15. The Dovelettes will send to the mound either Doug Willett (18-1) or Howie Reilly (6-0) while Keene will counter with Dick Willard and Fred Taylor.

Members of the striking NFL Players Association agreed Sunday to report to their training camps Wednesday for the duration of a 14-day "cooling off" period, but reserved the right to walk out if no contract settlement is achieved with the owners in the meantime.

W. J. Uesery Jr., the government's chief labor mediator who proposed the ceasefire, termed the players' decision a "tremendous breakthrough" and arranged for negotiations from both sides to resume negotiations on Thursday.

Wellington Mara, president of the New York Giants and a member of the Management Council who is generally the leader of the hard-line faction of owners, said, "if it's good enough for William Uesery, it's good enough for me."

He said he expected no major problems with the return of the vets. "They are professional. There will be no trouble," he said.

From a fan standpoint, it means that beginning next weekend pre-season game lineups will consist of regulars and stars rather than the untried rookies and unknown free agents who have played before skippy crowds in the first two weeks of NFL exhibition games.

For the striking players, it means they will begin training on a weekly basis 10 percent of their annual salary to \$10,000 for their pre-season play. It also ends a growing erosion of veterans who gave up on the strike and turned up at the training camps.

Generally, striking veterans indicated they would be ready to perform in the coming weekend pre-season games, because they have been working out intensively on a team basis during the 42-day-strike.

But they also signalled plainly they would renew the war if they are quid pro quo coming from the owners.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The six-week-old pro football players' strike ended in a temporary truce today, but it wasn't completely over yet.

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Laver Goes Out Winner On Net Tour

BRETTON WOODS, N.H. (UPI) — Australian Rod Laver says he likes to go out a winner, and his victory in the \$50,000 Volvo International Tennis Tournament Sunday won't alter his decision to drop off the pro tennis circuit until next January.

Laver, who celebrated his 38th birthday Sunday week, defeated Harold Solomon of Silver Spring, Md., 6-4, 6-3, to grab the first prize of \$9,000 plus a new automobile valued at \$7,000.

The red-haired leader, the all-time leading money-winner in tennis, also split \$2,400 for winning the doubles with Jeff Borwick of Berkeley, Calif. They beat French Davis Cuppers Francois Jauffret and Georges Goven, 6-4, 6-2.

"I must have been in good luck before the week started that this would be my last tournament of the year, win or lose," said Laver, who was coming off an 11-week layoff but feels he wants more time off with his family at their home in Corona Del Mar, Calif.

Mantle, Ford Join Baseball's Immortals

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (UPI) — Mickey Mantle and Whitey Ford, both to the manner born, join baseball's immortals today when they formally are inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Receiving the game's highest honor in addition to the New York Yankee superstars of the 1950s and 1960s were Cool Papa Bell, a star in the Negro Leagues prior to 1947, umpire Jocko Conlan and the late Sunny Jim Bottomley and Sam Thompson, sluggers of other eras.

The induction ceremonies were scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. EDT on the porch of the National Baseball Library, Commissioner Bowie Kuhn will preside over the ceremonies which will be attended by a host of dignitaries, including Hall of

Famers Stan Musial, Casey Stengel, Warren Spahn, Roy Campanella, Joe Medwick, Lefty Grove and perhaps a dozen more.

Hank Aaron, whose election to the shrine is only a matter of time, also will be on hand to play with the Atlanta Braves against the Chicago White Sox in the annual Hall of Fame game beginning at 2 p.m.

The inductions of the six new immortals raised membership in the Hall to 146.

Mantle, one of the most powerful sluggers in baseball history, compiled a .298 batting average and hit 538 homers during his career with the Yankees which lasted from 1951 through 1967, won the American League's most valuable player in 1956, 1957 and 1962; won the Triple Crown in 1956; hit a record 18 homers in 12 World Series, and led the league in slugging percentage four times.

Ford, a chunky left-hander who pitched for the Yankees from 1951 through 1967, won 258 games and posted a .690 percentage — highest among pitchers with 200 or more decisions. He led the AL in victories and win-loss percentage with marks of 25-4 and 24-7 in 1961 and 1963, respectively, and had a lifetime earned run average of 2.74.

Belit, 71, played 29 summers and 21 winters of professional baseball in the old Negro League, the Cuban and Puerto Rican leagues before retiring in 1950. Records from the leagues are fragmentary but he is said

National Football Roundup

Rookies Pack Bags As Veterans Return

NEW YORK (UPI) — There could be a lot of heartbroken and disillusioned rookies packing their bags this week and heading home from the National Football League training camps.

The NFL Players Association, with representatives meeting in Washington, Sunday agreed to a 14-day "cooling off" period in which veteran players will be allowed to report to camp beginning Wednesday. The move was made, the players say, in order to speed up contract negotiations with the NFL Management Council, which represents the owners.

Most clubs have been stocking their rosters with free agents, guys who played college or semi pro football but weren't drafted. With the veterans expected to pour in this week, tonight's final three exhibition games of the weekend could mean the end of the no-name pre-season.

The veterans have indicated they could walk out in two weeks, leaving the teams high and dry should they release the bulk of their free agents. But most clubs probably will take that chance, just on a dollars and cents basis. Owners probably don't want to pay per diem to nearly 100 players, and coaches, who are already a month behind schedule, aren't going to want their practice fields cluttered.

In pre-season play tonight, Chicago is at Pittsburgh, San Francisco at Cleveland and Buffalo at Kansas City. The New York Giants beat New England 21-0 Sunday night while in action Saturday, San Diego edged the New York Jets 20-14 in the first sudden death overtime under the new rules, Oakland topped Atlanta 28-16, Cincinnati beat Philadelphia 35-21, Miami whipped New Orleans 45-20, Green Bay downed St. Louis 13-0, Denver defeated Minnesota 27-21 and Dallas trimmed Los Angeles 13-6.

Under the refund system where fans can get their money back rather than watch the rookie-laden clubs, crowds were low for the second straight week.

Only in Milwaukee and Los Angeles did the fans turn out in any great numbers.

An estimated crowd of 43,000 — only 4,000 short of capacity at County Stadium — showed up to see the

Listening to spokesmen for the Committee for Fairness to the President and the Committee for the Presidency, we get the feeling a "Nixon Call" is about to be established and the cloak of "martyrdom" is about to be placed around the shoulders of the first President in United States history to resign his office.

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

Michael Ford Sees Need For Truth of Nixon Role

ESSEX, Mass. (UPI) — Michael Ford, eldest son of President Gerald R. Ford, says he believes that what is needed from former President Nixon is "a confession, or an admission of any guilt involved," in connection with Watergate. He said Nixon eventually may be vindicated by full disclosure.

"I don't pass judgement at all on the man or anything," Ford, 24, a student at the Gordon-Cornwell Theological Seminary, said in an interview (with radio station WEEI, Boston). "Whatever may have happened he could be completely vindicated, or not involved in anyway. But I think truth, like my father said, is the glue that binds the world and nation together, and I just really hope that we can live by that standard, in the presidency and on down the line."

Emphasizing President Ford had a "great feeling of sadness and sorrow" because of what had happened to Nixon, Michael Ford said "there are many accomplishments on his (Nixon's) record. I just think he as well as anyone else is responsible for all the actions he has done."

"I would say the same for myself, an expression on his part of exactly his knowledge and understanding of what transpired in the whole Watergate affair, and I think what is needed is a confession, or an admission of any guilt involved."

Asked if he thought his father would agree with him, Ford said "I would imagine, hypothetically, just trying to guess, maybe he would hope to see from the president or anyone a coming forth with all the evidence, facts, data that transpired."

State Lenders Accused Of Failure to Use Special Mortgage Fund

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. William R. Cotter, D-Conn., says that only a handful of Connecticut lending institutions have taken advantage of about \$30 million in offered federal funds to help ease the home mortgage market.

Cotter said only six lending institutions took advantage of the offer announced last May through a special "forward commitment program" by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. (FHLMC).

He said his own investigation indicated that the state institutions "were either asleep at the switch when the program was announced May 17 or for other reasons were reluctant to participate."

As a result, Connecticut institutions will get only \$13.6 million or less than one half of one per cent of the \$3 billion in the program, Cotter said.

He said based on population, Connecticut should have received about \$43 million to help fund mortgages on new houses. In contrast, Utah, with only one third of Connecticut's population, received \$60.5 million, Cotter said.

Texas took advantage of the offer, collecting more than \$300 million with only 5.3 per cent of the nation's population and California, with less than 10 per cent of country's residents, got \$34.6 million, Cotter said.

He said New York, like Connecticut, failed to take advantage of the program and received only \$19.4 million, instead of an available \$260 million.

"It is clear that we lost a golden opportunity to pump

millions of dollars into our stagnant home building industry," he said.

Cotter said he has asked Thomas Bomar, chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board to explain why the financial institutions in Connecticut, "which have been complaining loudly about their lack of lendable funds," failed to take advantage of the government offer.

The program was designed to pump new money into the mortgage market to offset declining savings by individuals and competition from the short term money market which offers higher interest rates.

The FHLMC offer, which was totally grabbed up by July, purchased mortgages from banks and savings and loan associations on a first come first served basis.
