## Ford Pledges Help For U.S. Veterans

CHICAGO (UPI) — President Ford, saddened by the shooting death of the U.S. ambassador to Cyprus, today pledged help for Vietnam veterans and said he would nominate former Rep. Richard Roudebush to revitalize the much-criticized Veterans Administration.

Ford's first out of town trip as President was marred by the news that U.S. Ambassador to Cyprus Rodger Davies was shot to death by anti-American rioters in Nicosia. Ford expressed his shock and said he was "deeply saddened."

"This tragic incident emphasizes the urgent need for the end to the violence on Cyprus and an immediate return to negotiations for a peaceful settlement," Ford said in a statement released en route to Chicago.

### Open Door Pledged

In a speech prepared for the 75th annual convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Ford promised that "during my administration the door of my office will be open to veterans as it was in the Capitol."

"The veteran is a human being and not just a 'C' number to be processed by a computer system," Ford said. "The government knew your name when you were called to service. This administration is going to see to it that we still know your name and your problems."

Ford's choice of Roudebush, a former Indiana congressman, to head the VA was widely expected and had the backing of most major veterans organizations. Criticism of VA inefficiency from those organizations forced Donald Johnson to resign as head of the agency about two months ago.

### Served As Deputy

Roudebush has been Johnson's deputy at the VA. Earlier he served in the House as

a GOP representative from Indiana before failing to win a 1972 bid for the Senate.

Ford said he was "deeply concerned" about continuing high unemployment among former servicemen, especially those who served in Vietnam, and expressed determination to improve various assistance programs, particularly those involving education and medical care for the disabled.

"This administration puts a high priority on aiding the men who bore the brunt of battle," he said. "If we can send them thousands of miles from home to fight in rice paddies, certainly we can send them back to school and to better jobs at home."

### No Details

But the President gave no details and coupled his promises to a clear warning that he would veto big money bills for veterans just like any other legislation if he decided they would undercut the battle against inflation.

Specifically referring to the veterans education bill still awaiting final con-

gressional approval, Ford said: "America is fighting for its economic life. I will not hesitate to use the veto to control inflationary excesses."

Ford made no reference in his prepared text to his consideration of a vice presidential nominee. He alluded only vaguely at one point to the resignation of former President Nixon, saying: "I don't like red tape or any other kind of tapes."

As Ford arrived at O'Hare Airport, thousands of Greek-Americans were gearing up to protest U.S. policy on Cyprus. They were not present at the airport and Ford did not see them on his arrival.

On Sunday night, Ford set aside "thinking time" in order to review his final list of vice presidential candidates, a White House official said.

### Decision Expected

Ford was expected to make the decision later today after returning to Washington with the announcement coming Tuesday or Wednesday.

## Soft Coal Miners Launch Walkout

A five-day, nationwide work stoppage was started today by 80,000 soft coal miners to commemorate the more than 100,000 workers killed by the mines in this century.

United Mine Workers President Arnold

Miller said the walkout, the first such memorial since the 1969 commemoration of the late UMW president John L. Lewis, is to protest "the terrible slaughter that day after day turns miners' wives into widows."

The strike will close as many as 1,200 mines.

### Action Criticized

The Bituminous Coal Operators Association criticized the memorial saying it was being used by the union to improve its bargaining position when UMW talks begin with the soft coal industry in about two weeks. The current contract expires Nov. 12.

Under the 1971 bituminous contract, the UMW has the option to call up to 10 days of nonpaid memorial periods during which no coal can be produced by operators covered by the agreement.

### Charge Filed

A charge of unfair labor practices filed by the coal operators against the union to stop the memorial was dismissed last week by the National Labor Relations Board.

The memorial was to begin with services at Mannington, W. Va., to commemorate the 16 men killed in 1954 and the 78 miners killed in 1968 at Consolidation Coal Co.'s Farmington, W. Va., No. 9 mine.

Another rally will be held Tuesday at UMW International Union Headquarters in Washington with other rallies scheduled for Harlan County, Ky., Birmingham, Ala., West Frankfort, Ill., and Ludlow, Colo.

A spokesman for the Tennessee Valley Authority said it has a 23-day coal supply at its Widows Creek Generating Plant in North Alabama.

The West Virginia Coal Association said it thinks most steel companies have stockpiles of coal to last between 25 and 28 days, while utilities have accumulated reserves for 60 to 65 days.

## U.S. Ambassador To Cyprus Killed

Ambassador Rodger P. Davies was killed today in a rain of submachinegun fire by gunmen who stormed the American embassy in Cyprus under cover of a riot by 700 Greek Cypriots screaming against U.S. failure to stop the Turkish invasion of the island.

The gunmen wore the military-style uniforms favored by EOKA-B, the Greek Cypriot guerrilla organization that has fought for years to unite Cyprus with Greece.

Greek Cypriot President Glafkos Clerides said an unidentified U.S. Marine guard also was killed in a burst of submachinegun fire.

### 'Heinous Crime'

Clerides rushed to the embassy to try to help and issued a statement deploring "this heinous crime." In Athens, Greek Premier Constantine Karamanlis denounced the shooting of Davies and said it will only add to Greece's troubles over Cyprus.

On the military front, Turkish forces with American-built tanks slashed across the southern approaches to Nicosia in a drive to cut off the landlocked capital

from the sea despite U.S. criticism that the Turkish offensive has gone too far.

### Embassy Mobbed

In Nicosia, UPI Correspondent Michael Keats said Davies was killed when a mob of 700 Greek Cypriots descended on the

embassy at midday screaming "Kissinger! Kissinger! Get your Turkish friends to help you now!"

The mob burned Secretary of State Henry Kissinger in effigy and set fire to at least five cars in the embassy compound. The cars blew up when flames reached their gasoline tanks, darkening the embassy area with clouds of thick black smoke.

The demonstrators burned the American flag, shouting, "burn them down, as they burned Cyprus down."

### Police Helpless

Greek Cypriot policemen hurled tear gas grenades at the demonstrators in a futile effort to hold them back from the embassy building.

Still the mob came on, carrying banners reading "Murderers, your mask has fallen" and "NATO murderers of Cyprus."

Gunmen sprayed the embassy with submachinegun fire. The rioters cheered. U.S. Marine guards inside the building fired over the heads of the demonstrators and they broke and ran. Under the cover of the demonstrators, the gunmen stormed into the building.

Fighting has continued, however, and with the outgunned and outnumbered Greek Cypriot National Guard in constant retreat, Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger hinted Sunday at a possible cutoff of U.S. military aid to Turkey.



## President Shocked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford expressed his shock today at the shooting death of U.S. Ambassador to Cyprus Rodger P. Davies and said the incident emphasized the need for peace on the Mediterranean island.

Davies, 53, a career diplomat who specialized in Mideast affairs, was shot by Greek Cypriot rioters as he left his office in Nicosia. The rioters were protesting U.S. policy in the Cyprus situation.

White House Press Secretary Jerald F. terHorst issued a statement aboard Air Force One which was carrying Ford to Chicago for a speech to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. It said:

### Need for Peace

"The President was shocked and deeply saddened by the death of Ambassador Davies in Nicosia today. The President has asked Secretary of State Henry Kissinger to speak on the traffic incident at the State Department briefing at noon. This tragic incident emphasizes the urgent need for the end to the violence on Cyprus and an immediate return to negotiations for a peaceful settlement."

Davies was sworn in as ambassador to Cyprus on May 14 but did not go to Nicosia until about a week before Greek officers led a coup that toppled the Cypriot government. He had been the chief American diplomat there during the outbreak of warfare on the island.

### New Assistant

Davies was apparently killed as the anti-American demonstrators stormed into the embassy which housed both his office and living quarters.

Davies was assigned to Nicosia to replace Robert J. McCloskey, who was called back to Washington by Kissinger about nine months ago to serve as ambassador-at-large.

## Eighth District Directors May Pick Chief Tonight

Because of the widespread interest shown in tonight's meeting of the Eighth District board of directors and to accommodate an expected large turnout, the session will be in the second floor meeting room of the firehouse, Main and Hilliard Sts.

The board's meeting will begin at 7, with the possible appointment of a district fire chief the top priority item on the agenda.

**Re-Appointment Blocked**  
On July 15, the four carryover directors of the six-member board blocked the reap-

pointment of Granville (Ted) Lingard to be district fire chief and fire marshal. He had been chief since 1968 and marshal since 1971.

His reappointment was by Michael Massaro, new president of the district — subject to board approval.

Rejecting the appointment were Paul Cervini, Dante Balboni, J. Edward McKeever and Patrick Brown. Backing it were new directors Willard Marvin and Gordon Lassow. A motion to table the appointment (of whoever is named) carried 4 to 2.

At least three of the four who opposed Lingard's appointment have been seeking a successor to him from among fire department personnel.

### Brown May Be Key

It appears to many observers that Brown is the key to any action taken tonight.

Brown said on July 15 he wanted time to consider the situation — to check out the calls he received from district residents, expressing opposition to Lingard's appointment.

"I want to determine if they are sincere or vindictive," he said then.

He said a few days ago he seriously considered the situation — while away on vacation. He declined to announce his position, saying only he will make it known publicly at tonight's meeting. He gave no hint at what he will say.

Should a 3 to 3 tie vote occur on the board, Massaro's vote would break the tie.

## Austin Named Interim Director Of Public Health Nurse Unit

Miss Florence Austin, retired executive director of the Visiting Nurses Association of Hartford, has been appointed interim acting director of the Manchester Public Health Nursing Association.

Mrs. Margaret L. Shainin, president of the agency's board of directors, in making the announcement today said that Miss Austin will serve until a permanent director is named.

### Succeeds Mrs. Bates

The agency has been without a director since June 30 when Mrs. Jean Bates resigned from the post because of conflict with the board of directors. Mrs. Dorothy Gowett, agency supervisor, has been handling the day-to-day functions of the agency since then.

The staff of the Manchester Public Health Nursing Association, which threatened to walk out if Mrs. Bates' resignation was accepted by the board, is now seeking to have the Connecticut Nurses Association act as its bargaining agent. A petition for an advisory opinion has been filed with the National Labor Relations Board on the issue of whether that agency or the State Labor Relations Board will have jurisdiction in the case.

A graduate of Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Boston, Miss Austin received her public health nursing education at Simmons College, Boston, and Teachers

College of Columbia University, New York City.

Before her retirement, Miss Austin served as director of the Visiting Nurses

Association of Hartford for 17 years. She has also been assistant director of the Family Visiting Nurses Association of Brooklyn, N.Y., and director of the Eastchester Public Health Nursing organization of Tuckahoe, N.Y.

### Many Heroes

In 1966, she was made an honorary member of Mu Chapter, Sigma Theta Tau, at the University of Connecticut School of Nursing and also received an award from the Connecticut Nurses Association for service and leadership. In 1971, she was the second nurse to receive the C.E.A. Winslow Award for outstanding accomplishments in public health, and in 1973 was the recipient of the Community Service Award of the Community Council of the Capitol Region.



Sen. Majority Leader Mike Mansfield got a brief spot in the limelight last week for his longevity.

Last Thursday, the Montana Democratic senator broke the previous tenure record for Senate leader by serving 13 years and 22 days in the post.

Longevity is a trademark of the senator. Since he entered politics as a U.S. representative in the early 1940s, he has been on a leave of absence from his post as professor of history and political science at the University of Montana. This is probably a record for longevity in leave of absence in the academic world.

Someone Does Read Congressional Record

The integrity of the Congressional Record has been violated. It seems some hoaxster planted a spurious article suggesting President Ford name Richard Nixon as vice president and then resign.

Now we don't know what really motivated the perpetrator of this hoax but we do know that if he was really serious about his plan, the Congressional Record would be the last place to launch such an effort.

Tempest Put To Rest

Action of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in clearing Secretary of State Henry Kissinger of allegations that he had instituted wiretaps against reporters and White House aides should finally put to rest the tempest which caused him to threaten to resign in a dramatic press meeting in Salzburg, Austria, last June.

The charges which had come up in Watergate hearings were seized upon by Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington who made other allegations of secret agreements between Kissinger and the Russians.

In its report the Foreign Relations Committee stated that they would have confirmed Dr. Kissinger as

He does not do much fence-mending because, despite his duties as Senate leader, he continues to keep his Montana political fences in tip top shape all the time.

Unless his political style changes drastically, Sen. Mansfield's return to teaching will be a voluntary decision of his own. Should he decide this when his current term expires, we cannot help but envy his students who will be exposed not only to a man who has a solid scholastic background but who has also spent so many years in the eye of history's hurricane years.

The real unsung hero of the affair is the one who spotted the hoax. He or she must have been subjected to cruel and inhuman punishment in having to wade through page after page of trivia that is inserted into the Record by congressmen and after a while it is hard to tell fact from fiction.

But anyway, the hoax was discovered and those heretofore thrown or filed away copies of the Congressional Record which go out to libraries and subscribers throughout the land, will be a collector's item.

Who knows, next time somebody might insert a centerfold picture of George Washington sleeping on a Watergate waterbed.

Dr. Kissinger's role was a passive one of supplying names to then Attorney General John Mitchell and the late J. Edgar Hoover, veteran FBI chief.

The committee action should enable Dr. Kissinger to peacefully perform his duties as secretary of state without having to defend himself against piddling allegations.


If there has been a bright spot in the administration it has been Kissinger's almost miraculous feats in bringing a more peaceful attitude to the world.

His most recent accomplishment of working cease-fire agreements between first Egypt and then Syria and Israel circumvented a very explosive condition in the Mideast.

The United States and the world needs a Henry Kissinger who can go about his work without having to defend himself against the slings and arrows of those whom we suspect are seeking personal political advancement.

Lessons Of Cyprus

NEW YORK — The Turks, once known as the "sick men of Europe" and now exulting in their new military strength, have a different kind of sickness plaguing them — their tunnel vision about ends and means. They are blind to the moral and political consequences of their military muscle as they bomb towns, airports, hospitals, laying waste to whole areas and displacing populations.

At Geneva the Turks smiled and smiled, embraced the Greek envoys — and then went on to extend their military mastery of Cyprus. They want partition of Cyprus, the relocation of peoples and a massive permanent military presence on Cyprus. And they will doubtless get it. Greece is helpless, heartbroken about the casualties among its nationals on Cyprus but the repeated Turkish betrayals of the cease-

fire. The U.N. Security Council feels helpless because none of the Great Powers wants to take the lead. The NATO nations are also powerless, and the Greek withdrawal of its military units from NATO comes after the de facto Turkish deployment on Cyprus of ships, planes and armor committed to NATO.

The United States is not powerless but doesn't dare invoke the power it has. It has a vested interest in the status quo in this era of a sky-high cost of living. There are votes in preaching defense economies, simply because it is "something stronger than a Cost of Living Council that has no enforcement powers," and suggested restoration of wage and price controls.

Both House Speaker Carl Albert and Senate Democratic Whip Robert C. Byrd were dissatisfied with Ford's first step to curb inflation. "I'm glad he's gone that far," said Albert. "He probably should have some farther." Byrd demanded "something stronger than a Cost of Living Council that has no enforcement powers," and suggested restoration of wage and price controls.

For Ford could be in trouble even in the early days of his honeymoon. Legislators who want to slash Pentagon spending, mostly Democrats, have a substantial constituency in this era of a sky-high cost of living. There are votes in preaching defense economies, simply because it is "something stronger than a Cost of Living Council that has no enforcement powers," and suggested restoration of wage and price controls.

## Preston Subdivision Denied

By unanimous action, Planning and Zoning Commission denied the application of Arthur Preston for development of a five-lot subdivision on Rt. 31 near Wrights Mill Rd.

The PZC felt it would create traffic hazards as well as the heavy flow of water in winter creating ice conditions.

No action was taken by the PZC on the William Morgan subdivision on Goose Lane as it is waiting for a revised subdivision map.

At a public hearing held prior to the PZC regular meeting, no action was taken on a request for a zone change from industrial to commercial expansion by Raymond Roman for property on Armstrong Rd. near Rt. 31.

All those present spoke in favor of the zone change including the adjacent property owners and those living in the area.

The PZC is advertising for a part-time zoning agent, a position approved at a Town Meeting earlier this month. Applications for the position will be accepted through the first week in September.

The applications will be reviewed and the applicants interviewed prior to a decision by the PZC on hiring someone to fill the position at a salary not to exceed \$5,000.

Anthony Walsh and Frank Connolly will check into the possibility of fire ponds and fire hydrants. Their investigation will include cost estimates and other expenses involved, particularly with fire hydrants. They will report back to the commission at a future date.

A draft submitted by Connolly, town planner, concerning underground utility lines, was referred to the town engineer and town attorney.

Robert Keller, councilman, will attend the next meeting of the PZC to review the town roads and street numbering program.

Connolly presented the PZC with a recently completed map indicating possible areas for two-acre zoning. It involves approximately 10,000 acres of the existing 20,000 acres in town.

Connolly said if on-site testing indicated good soil conditions, a lesser lot size would be accepted.

The drafts were referred to the town attorney and planning consultant. The PZC plans to schedule a public hearing in September on the issue.

Earl H. Beebe Jr., collector of revenue, has announced that tax collections during July totaled \$1,538,866. The amount collectible for the fiscal year before additions and corrections was \$2,897,603. This represents about 50 per cent collections. Taxes are payable in town installments, July and January.

Car taxes that were due in July and paid are now delinquent. No registration can be obtained from the Motor Vehicle Department until taxes have been paid in full. All tax bills now carry late charges of \$2 or three-fourth of one per cent, whichever is greater.

Collections for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1974 totaled \$2,223,388. This amounted to 86.6 per cent of the total amount due with \$35,469 still outstanding. A total of 62 liens were filed on local real estate property where taxes had not been paid.

Fiscal year collections for delinquent years 1966-67-68-69-70-71 were \$25,559 from a total of \$62,021. Interest and fees collected totaled \$12,035.

Beebe has requested that persons paying late tax bills call the office to get the correct amount of interest due.

**State Aid To Town Increases**

State aid to Connecticut's 169 towns has grown faster than local property tax collections over the past 25 years, the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council said today.

State aid now accounts for 21.8 per cent of the 1973 state budget, compared to 14.7 per cent in 1950.

Much of the increased state aid is used to reimburse towns for state-mandated programs, such as education of the handicapped and disadvantaged children, and to provide health services for nonpublic school children.

It also replaces local property taxes lost from business and from elderly homeowners receiving property tax relief. Other state aid programs are for highways, welfare, loss of local taxes on State property, and for community affairs programs.

The growth of state aid has been particularly rapid in recent years. Local property tax collections for 1970 to 1973 are expected to grow by an estimated 10.8 per cent annually while state aid to towns will likely show an even larger increase of about 13.8 per cent annually.



## National Football League Roundup Dolphins, Vikings Meet Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI) — After a weekend of sparsely attended National Football League preseason games, the empty seats may be filled tonight in a re-match of the 1974 Super Bowl finalists, the champion Miami Dolphins and the Minnesota Vikings. The host Dolphins anticipate the first sellout of the exhibition season in the television debut of Monday night football. Both coaches plan to start a large contingent of veterans, but Miami is given the edge since 34 Dolphin veterans were already in camp when the striking players association called a 14-day "cooling off" period beginning last Wednesday. The Vikings only had six veterans in camp at the time. The Dolphin lineup will look a lot like the one that stopped the Vikings, 24-7, in Super Bowl VIII at Houston last January. Bob Griese will be making his first start of the preseason at quarterback and will have as his running backs Larry Csonka and Jim Kiick. Minnesota's backfield will include quarterback Fran Tarkenton and second-year running back Chuck Foreman. Veteran John Gilliam will start at one wide receiver post. Although striking NFL players officially traded their picket signs for football equipment and reported to camp last Wednesday, few saw action in the 11 games played over the weekend. In Seattle, which is receiving an NFL expansion franchise in 1976, the St. Louis Cardinals and the San Diego Chargers played before the smallest crowd of the preseason Sunday. Only 5,184 persons — about one tenth of Husky Stadium's capacity — watched as the Cards walloped the Chargers 48-14. Elsewhere in the NFL, stadiums were generally less than half full, with many clubs playing before an audience dwarfed by the enormity of the arena. Only Green Bay really impressed with its drawing power. The game between the Packers and the Bears Saturday drew 53,106 — by far the best of the exhibition season — but that still was short of capacity (56,267) and marked the first time since 1959 that the Packers have failed to sell out all of their preseason games. In other games Sunday, Denver dropped San Francisco 10-3, Buffalo trimmed Washington 16-15 and New England hobbled New Orleans 7-3. In Saturday's action, the New York Giants beat the New York Jets 21-13, Baltimore crushed Cleveland 37-3, Cincinnati nipped Falcons 13-7 in overtime, Dallas downed Houston 19-13 in overtime, Green Bay muzzled Chicago 20-10, Pittsburgh edged Philadelphia 33-30 in overtime and Los Angeles drubbed Kansas City 38-16. Bills 16, Redskins 13.

John Leybold booted a 52-yard game-winning field goal as the gun sounded to carry the Bills to victory over the Redskins. Leybold's only successful field goal in three attempts for the night wiped out a 15-13 edge the winless Redskins had achieved with 1:05 left on Mark Moseley's fifth field goal of the contest. O.J. Simpson scored a touchdown on a one-yard plunge after pacing the drive with 41 yards on eight carries. Broncos 10, 49ers 3. Rookie Denver linebacker Randy Gradishar, a No. 1 draft choice from Ohio State, returned an interception 82 yards for a touchdown with 3:52 left in the game to give the Broncos the victory. ## Dean Opposes Gov. Meskell's Nomination

HARTFORD (UPI) — The dean of Yale Law School reportedly is opposed to the appointment of Gov. Thomas J. Meskell to a high federal judgeship because the governor is not "very thoughtful or reflective." Dean Abraham S. Goldstein, quoted in the Hartford Times Sunday edition, said, "I don't think he is a distinguished appointment. He doesn't fill an impressive tradition of that court." Goldstein said the post requires "a very reflective, thoughtful person who has a good sense of the law." He characterized Meskell as a "man of action. He seems to enjoy shooting from the hip a great deal." The dean's comments were made at the American Bar Association convention in Honolulu. The bar association's committee on the judiciary last week reportedly voted to oppose the Republican governor's nomination because of his lack of courtroom experience. Meskell was nominated to fill a vacancy on the Second U.S. Court of Appeals for the states of Connecticut, New York and Vermont. The nomination was one of former President Nixon's last official acts before resigning. Meskell, who has spent most of his career in politics, was nominated for the post by Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn. Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., has not opposed the nomination.

Officers said he wore no helmet. Bue was the state's 24th motorcycle fatality. He was killed Saturday when his motorcycle collided with a truck in Suffield, police said. ## Congressmen Accused Of Discrimination

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI) — A newspaper has charged that job orders issued by 18 Washington offices of 19 U.S. congressmen and a Republican senator from Virginia indicate possible illegal racial and religious discrimination in their hiring practices. The Fort Worth Star Telegram, in a copyrighted article published Sunday, said the job orders to the Congressional Placement Office carried such demands as "no minorities," "white only," "no blacks" and "no Catholics." The newspaper quoted an unidentified senior Justice Department official as saying the practice was "the most incredible, gross example of overt discrimination." He said the offenders might be prosecuted for conspiracy to deprive persons of their civil rights. According to usual congressional procedure, congressmen and senators send their job needs to the Congressional Placement Office which handles requests for the Joint Committee on Congressional Operations. "We try to get as close as we can to what they want," a placement office official told the Star Telegram. He told the newspaper the placement office tries to "greatly discourage" discriminating requests from the congressman but if a congressman says "no minorities" on his order form, the office does not send minority applicants to be interviewed. When contacted about the suspect phrases found by the newspaper on the recently submitted job forms, most senior assistants denied any knowledge of discrimination. But Jack Mellon, administrative assistant for McEwen, said the allegations were "an absolute, malicious lie."

## Pats Less Sloppy In Downning Saints

FOXBORO, Mass. (UPI) — It was a more-or-less kind of game. Both New England and New Orleans used out-of-shape veterans and the Saints were a little more sloppy, the Patriots, a little less. And New England Coach Chuck Fairbanks was more or less pleased with his team's 7-3 win Sunday night before 20,546 at Schaefer Stadium. "It took our older guys kind of a half to warm up," the second-year coach and general manager said. "But the drive in the third period for the touchdown was one of the best assaulting ones we've had." The assaulting in the 60-yard, nine-play march was done mostly by sophomore Sam Cunningham, who carried seven times for 49 yards, including a one-foot touchdown run. Cunningham, somewhat of a disappointment last year because of knee injury suffered in the college all-star game, ran with the confidence and determination that carried him to four touchdowns in the 1973 Rose Bowl. He logged a total of 62 yards in nine carries for a 6.9 yard average. "The whole left side of the offensive line plus Josh Ashton (the other running back) was coming off the ball real well," said Cunningham, who started the TD drive with a 23-yard run behind left guard, John Hannah, and finished with a patented over-the-top dive from just outside the goal line. "The touchdown came on the same plays we were running (unsuccessfully) in the first half. We just got our timing and started to get off the ball well in the second half," Cunningham said. 




