Greyhound Corp. pleaded guilty Wednesday to making illegal campaign contributions totaling \$16,040 to the 1972 presidential candidacies of Richard M. Nixon and George S. McGovern. Thomas G. Finney Jr., a

entered the plea before U.S who delayed further action and said "We will look into it." Finney told reporters later

that most of the illegal contributions went to former President Nixon's re-election committee, but he did not have an exact breakdown. "We intended no violation of the statute," Finney said, explaining that Greybound

reimbursed with double bonuses its executives and senior employes who made contributions to the campaigns. He said Gerald Troutman chief executive officer of the Phoenix-based corporation wrote 200 Greyhound executives and senior employes to urge them to make a conribution. Of these, Finney said. 55 did so and they in turn were given a bonus and a supplemen al bonus amounting to twice the size of their contribution Greyhound became the 12th firm to plead guilty to a misdemeanor stemming from contributions in the 1972 election campaign. Two others have leaded guilty to felonies.

# A Long, Proud Heritage

A long, proud heritage has developed in the 28 years Dick Danielson has coached Manchester High soccer. One of the most respected and knowledgeable coaches in the state, Danielson has seen his teams compile an aggregate record of 239-86-28 in the first 27 years of his tenure. Through the years the ledger is outstanding. Manchester

has qualified for the State Tournament 20 out of the last 27 years and has been state finalists on nine occasions. The latest was a year ago when the Silk Towners bowed to downstate powerhouse Staples High of Westport, 1-0, in double overtime in a memorable contest. Danielson outfits were state champs in 1956, 1958 and 1962, present assistant Coach Doug Pearson a tri-captain that year.

The Tribe has laid claim to the Central Connecticut Interscholastic League (CCIL) title 11 times, taking the crown in 1973 with an unblemished 14-0 mark. The 1973 edition also set a school record in scoring with 56 goals. Werner Cacace paced the scoring derby with 20 goals with younger brother Reiner collecting 13 markers. Billy MacLean, a co-captain this campaign, also played a major role with 11 tallies.

Possessing a sharp memory, Danielson recalls that only in 1949 when his team was 3-6-1 did he have a losing record. He vividly recalls his first year, 1947, at the helm.

At a soccer banquet staged at the conclusion of the 1973 season, Danielson remarked, "I said that first year to the Latin teacher 'If you have anyone who can walk down the aisle without hitting a chair send him to me'. All returnees have a special place in our lives. I always want my former players to come back and even just say hello."

At that banquet Pearson made these observations, "Soccer at Manchester High is something special. It goes beyond the season. It's a big part of your life and one of the happiest and as long as you live Manchester High School

soccer will be one of your fondest memories." The personable Danielson has always reminded others that the success, the credit, must go to the players. But nevertheless year after year players come and go and some remain but the quality and the products stays un-

Notable players of recent years include Blaz Stimac, who holds the school scoring record, Werner Cacace and Connie McCurry. Some former players have gone into the coaching aspect of the sport. Jimmy Kuhlman, co-captain of the 1954 team, is coach at Fairfield University. Paul Ryan is the skipper of Bloomfield High and Chuck Saimond, co-captain of the 1959 CCIL champs, is presently at

Rockville High. The list is seemingly endless. Each year an alumni game is held and players from as far back as when Danielson started return. And they are remembered by their former boss.

The 1974 team is a blend of veterans and promising sophomores. Featured in the photos are just some of the members of the team which is keeping Manchester near the top for another shot at a CCIL title. The tradition is a long and glorious one. And one which is continuous.



CLEVELAND (UPI) - Frank Robinson was scheduled to be introduced today as playing manager of the Cleveland Indians, a launching pad from which he can achieve a number of distinctions in the next 12 months: -He will become the first black major league manager

in baseball history; -As designated hitter, he can reach his stated goals of 3,000 career hits and 600 home runs, a twin plateau equaled only by Henry Aaron and Willie Mays: -He could become the first manager to lead the Indians to a World Series since 1954.

Before the 10 a.m. (EDT) new conference, Robinson said, "I will say it is not so important being the first black in history to be named manager, but to manage, period. "Managing is the important thing with me, not managing because I am black. Of course being first is special, but it's not the most important hing."

Tom McCraw, a veteran utility man expected to be named a playing coach, and a black, saw it differently. "Frank is not just managing a ball club. He isn't managing for himself, either. He is managing for all black people, and the future of all blacks depends on how good a job he does," McCraw said.

McCraw said the Indians are an ideal club for Robinson to lead under the circumstances. "It won't make any difference to this club because of all the young kids. They don't care so much about the color of skin as do older players who grew up in a different time," said McGraw.

In a general preview, Robinson saw the Indians in the

same rosy light as did Ken Aspromonte, the man he'll
