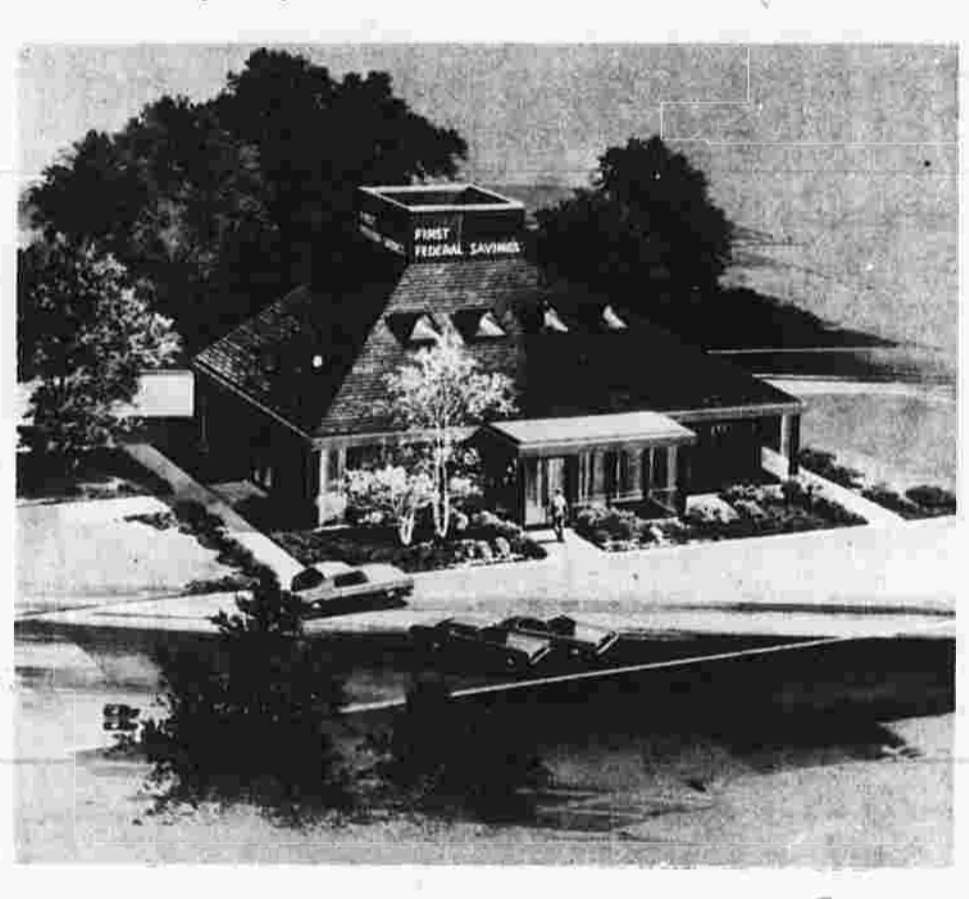




Now and Later

EARNINGS GAIN

This compares with \$1.5 million or 38 cents a share on sales of \$69.9 million for the similar period last year before giving effect to a change of accounting principles which reduced earnings per share to 32 cents.

College Board Exams For Juniors Oct. 18

Junior students at Manchester High School will have the opportunity to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) as an important step in making college plans.

themselves and their abilities, the PSAT/NMSQT can lead to other opportunities such as entering the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Participating in the College Board's Student Search Service so they can get information from colleges that may be looking for students like them.

The test, to be given at the school Oct. 26, is designed to measure verbal and mathematical abilities that are important in doing college work. The PSAT/NMSQT is co-sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Oil Consumers, Producers Seek Solution to Problems

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For the first time since last year's Arab oil embargo, petroleum producers and consumers are sitting down together in search of solutions to problems caused by quadrupled crude oil prices. The representatives of Kuwait and Iran said they had tried since February to meet with oil consuming nations and discuss mutual problems but their requests were not granted until this week. The producers indicated they would be willing to cut oil prices in return for cuts in commodity prices by industrialized nations.

For example, said Iranian Ambassador Ardeshir Zafraee, half a barrel of oil used to buy a bushel of wheat, but it now takes four barrels to buy a bushel. "The United States is interested in reducing the price of oil," he said. "It has

Ford Advisor Suggests Gasoline Rationing Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — While President Ford pondered his "anti-inflation choices" for an anti-inflation program to be announced next week, one of his closest advisers suggested that he should impose a strict rationing system to curb the use of gasoline. Former Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird made the proposal Thursday as the White House rejected a plan by federal energy chief John C. Sawhill to add 20 cents a gallon to the retail price of gasoline. Laird, an unofficial but influential voice in the Oval Office, noted during a conference on world oil problems that the nation's gasoline consumption is increasing again since the scare of last winter's Arab boycott. Some \$100 billion a

year now going to oil producing nations would reach \$400 billion, he said. "Sooner or later," Laird said, "a rationing system is going to be needed as far as the United States is concerned because there is no awareness as far as the public is concerned to this energy problem we face." He said it should be "a very tough, firm, hard rationing system." Laird agreed with a Ford's chief spokesman that Sawhill's proposal should not be adopted. "It is fair to say that the President does not favor this kind of tax on gasoline," White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen told reporters. Another Ford intimate, with an eye to the political winds, had a more candid assessment: "You couldn't sell any kind of gasoline tax right now. We've got an election coming up in November, remember?"

Unemployment Rate Jumps

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Production cutbacks caused the unemployment rate to jump four tenths of a percent to 5.8 per cent in September, the Labor Department reported today. The department said the number of persons unemployed increased in September by 440,000. The sharp increase from August was attributed primarily to production cutbacks that resulted in widespread unemployment. An estimated 250,000 workers lost their jobs in September.

Total employment was estimated at 77.1 million, changed from August and an increase of 1.4 million over the past year. But the effect of the increase in employment was softer than in the previous year when an expanding economy created approximately twice as many jobs as the Labor Department said. The slowdown in economic growth is a prime reason for the increase in unemployment. Although employment of nonfarm workers remained about constant from August to September, the average work week increased slightly to 38.8 hours per week and the average hourly earnings increased to \$12.11. This means that an \$100 earned in 1974 had risen to an average of \$162.10 last month.

State To Get \$4.9 Million For Public Service Jobs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Connecticut will receive \$4.9 million to provide public service jobs for jobless persons in areas of the state suffering high unemployment. The funding was granted by the Labor Department and comes at the request of President Ford after a White House meeting Sept. 11 with labor leaders. The program has been funded nationwide at \$415 million to create 85,000 public service jobs. Eighty per cent of the funds are for state and local governments with areas having unemployment of 6.5 per cent or more. The rest are to be used at the discretion of the secretary of labor for most severely affected areas with unemployment of more than 6.5 per cent. Public service jobs can be in any public

Candidates Agree PUC Not Doing Its Job Well

The Democratic and Republican candidates for governor say they agree the state Public Utilities Commission has not been doing its job, but one called for its replacement and the other for its reform. Rep. Ella T. Grasso, D-Conn., who has accused power utilities of overcharges amounting to \$9 million during the past three years said Thursday the 65-year-old agency should be abolished to "assure protection against special interests" in the regulation of utility costs.

He said, however, if doctors kept their prices low, there would be no need for CMS to seek rate increases. "They could take the first major step in curbing inflation," he said.

Steele and Grasso called for the establishment of an independent Office of Consumer Advocate "appointed by the General Assembly to assure insulation from the executive office and the authority."

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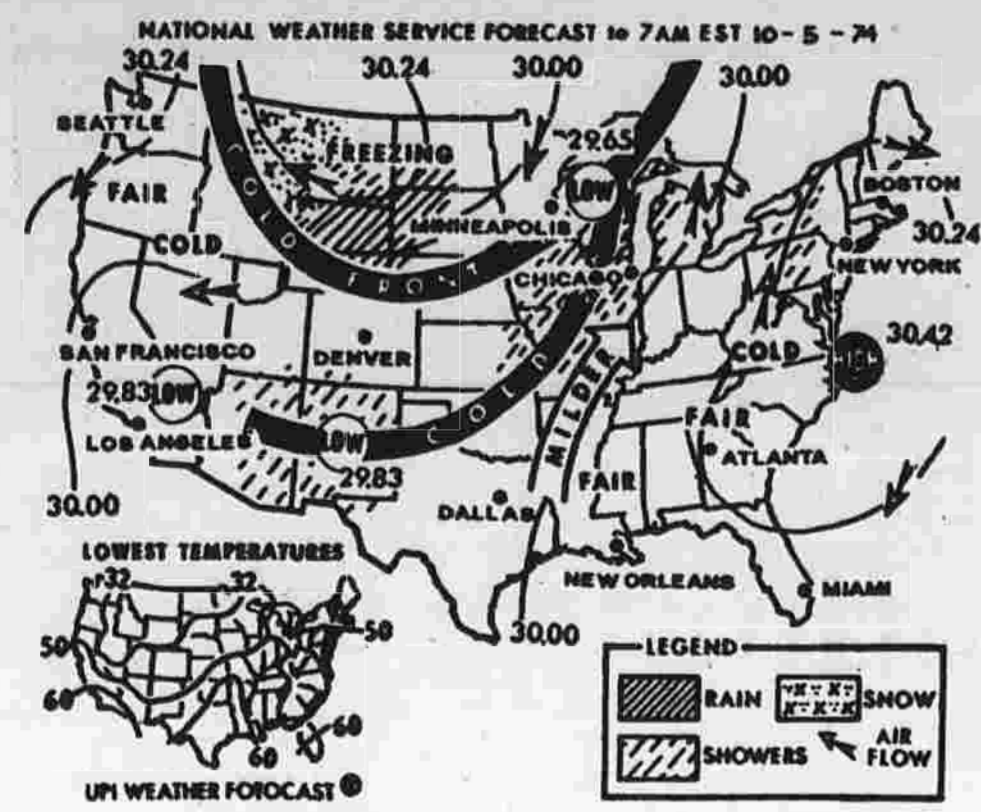

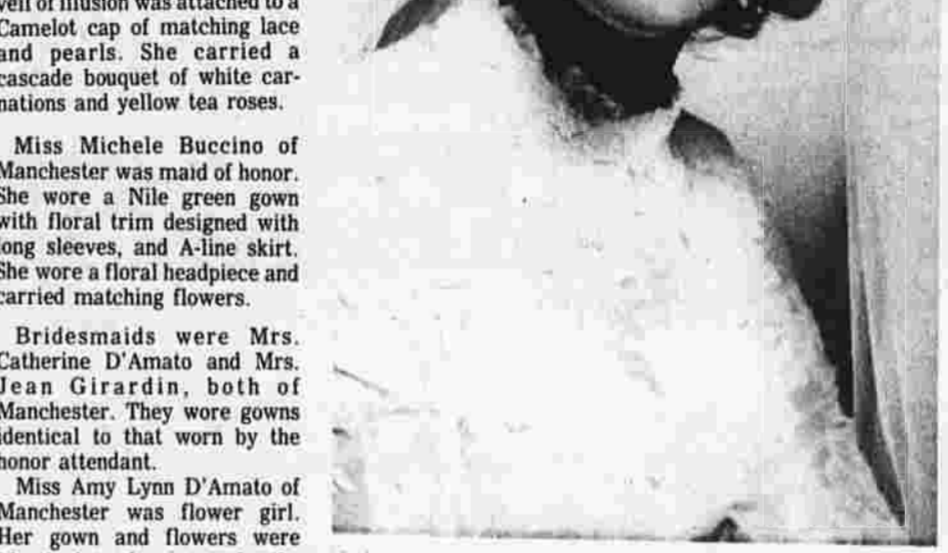

Despite some initial start-up difficulties, the recent Concert '74 series in Center Park was well received by the public and we think the idea should be continued and expanded next year.

Corollary to the series is the recent appeal by Ken Morgester for the town to consider construction of a band shell to further such a summer concert series.

We think it is an excellent idea for several reasons.

The shell would be a civic asset and could also serve other purposes than musical concerts, such as drama productions.

The people who turned out for the last concert, despite threatening weather, clearly indicated there is a potential audience for public performances in the community.

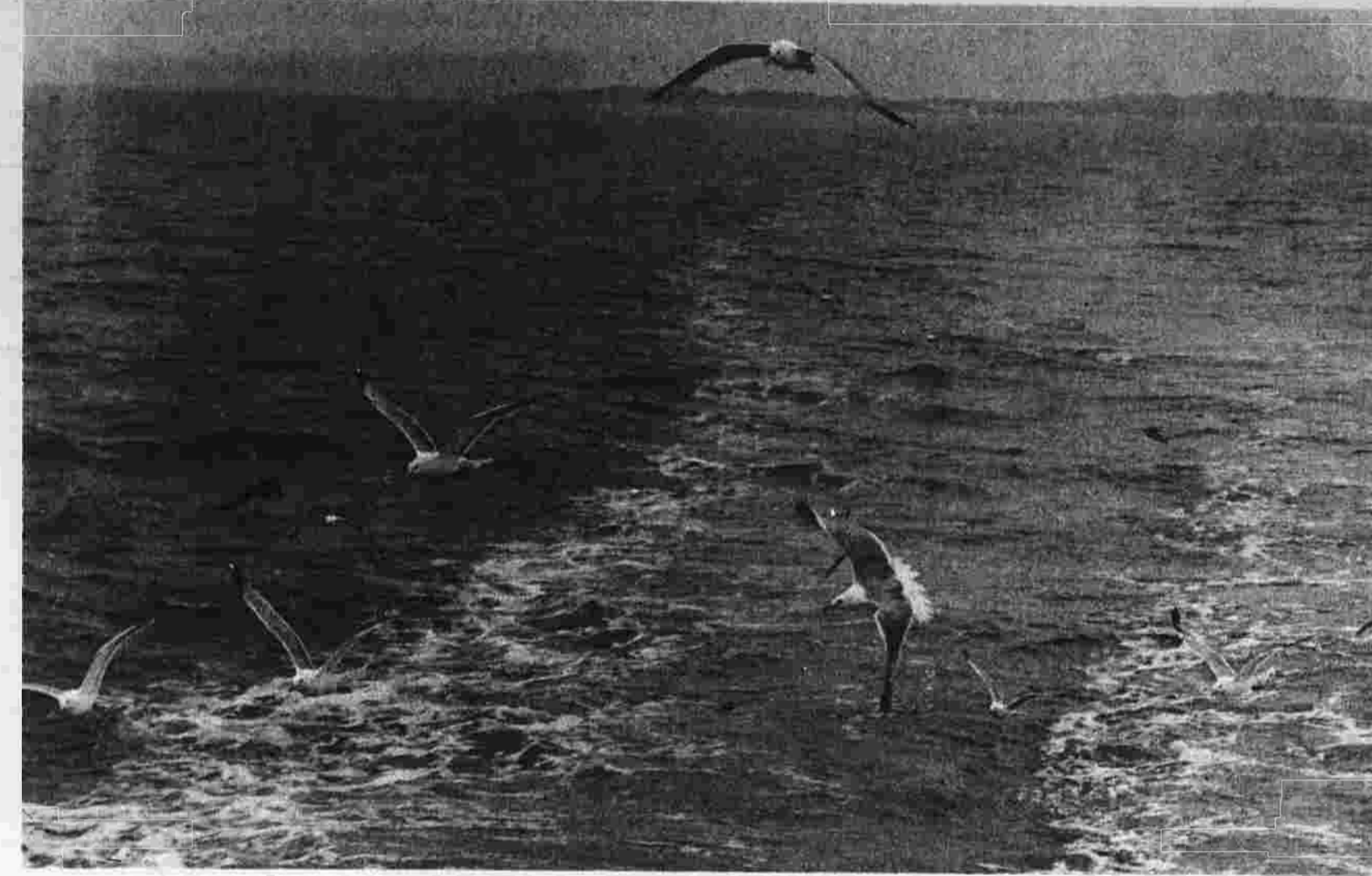
And finally, the two concerts this year, by the Sphinx Shrine Band and Morgester's Jazz Band, represent only two of the many fine musical

groups available to our community. With well-designed facilities, other groups could be encouraged to take part in a future concert series.

While we think there is more than sufficient justification for a band shell on the basis of the musical interests of Manchester people, there is a potential that a regular concert series offering a wide range of musical groups could become an attraction to bring people from all over Connecticut to the City of Village Charm.

We commend town directors for asking the Bicentennial Commission to explore the idea further but would only add, if the idea is feasible and the cost within reason, its implementation need not be delayed until 1976.

We also commend the Retail Trade Commission of the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce for sponsoring the recent series and hope it will continue the program next year with even greater success.

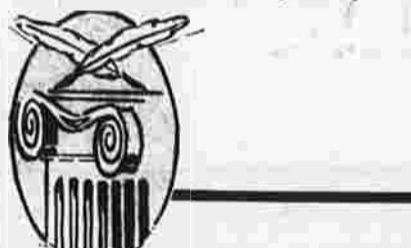
Tragedy At The Top

Economic Crisis

Dear editor:

The central issue of today's economic crisis is money and those who control it. Americans caught in the squeeze of rising costs and vanishing jobs are mindful of the symptoms of distress which preceded the crash of 1929. Then as now, people who confronted by a skidding dollar, leaping interest rates, a skidding stock market, and, in the final days, evaporation of business capital with resulting unemployment.

Then, as now, the people were assuaged by elected officials, and by so-called "financial experts" that the economy was sound. The American taxpayer who bears the agony of economic crisis has the right to know who decides whether the United States will be prosperous or it is to be plunged into a new depression in 1974.

Historical roots of planned economic panic lead to the Federal Reserve Act of 1913. In violation of their oath of office members of Congress, Dec. 23, 1913, transferred power to coin and regulate the value of U.S. money from the Congress to the Federal Reserve System, a private banking "elite" whose sick-brained policies have spawned depression, war and revolution. It is in the Congress that these crimes began and it is in the Congress that they must be stopped.

We the people, ordained and established this government, to secure our liberties and to protect our lives and our property and for no other reasons did we delegate to government any portion of our sovereignty.

The U.S. Congress has altered our form of government without our knowledge or consent in violation of their oath and in contempt of our laws.

you will find a wound somewhere — a bruise, a fresh wound, perhaps a long-festering one. We live with our wounds, and we are lucky if we can mute the ache and in time cover it over with the fresh vibrance of the new things that happen to us in life.

Tragedy goes hand in hand with renewal. We need an effort at renewal to overcome the pain of the tragic. We need the tragic to deepen our understanding of life, perhaps furnish the impetus for renewal.

We often confuse the tragic with the pathetic. Pathos is man-made, and being man-made it can be man-resolved. There are millions of people in America who can't afford adequate medical care when

serious illness hits their families. The failure of Congress to pass a national health care bill, after years of study and debate, is part of that national pathos. It bears heavily on the very people whose lives are hard enough, even without the added burden of medical costs which wipe away their savings — if they are lucky enough to have put any away.

Life has enough absurdities. There is no reason to make it any more absurd by failing to deal collectively with the pathetic individual life. Good legislation can deal with questions of cost, just as good medical research can deal with strategies and tactics of treatment.

As it happens, a breast-cancer task force of the National Cancer Institute has

informed and generated a wide variety of questions.

Abruptly before 10 p.m. Mr. Morton Tenzor of the University of Connecticut (who co-sponsors these seminars) officially ended the meeting which had begun at 8:30. My astonishment was coupled with deep disappointment that this unique opportunity of education was terminated. We, who are faced with a monstrous plan of a city of 20,000, were short-changed!

I now feel compelled to air some information regarding Columbia which I was unable to present at the seminar. First, in a \$-year, \$1.1 million federally funded study by the National Science Foundation, results show that "new towns" in the U.S. are failing to live up to expectation. The report shows only a very low percentage of persons living in the new towns are satisfied with the services and facilities as indicated in an article in the Aug. 24 Washington Post.

Also, I question the justification of the fact that Connecticut General financially bailed out its partner, the Rouse Co., in Columbia and has since shown a \$5,000,000 loss in Columbia in the past two years to its stockholders. As Jim Rouse states in the Forbes Magazine of Oct. 1: "These projects take more than a decade to get started and there is just too much uncertainty as to their ultimate viability. Privately developed new towns are dead in this country for the foreseeable future."

Praises Steele

To the editor:

I am writing in response to a recent letter from Vernon Democratic Town Chairman James Roche which criticized Congressman Bob Steele for trying to persuade Volkswagen to build a plant in Connecticut. Mr. Roche called Congressman Steele's efforts "dangerous" because he contended, "Connecticut just does not have any reservoir of unskilled workers" to work in such a plant.

As a voter and taxpayer, I am frankly upset by the weakness of Mr. Roche's argument, and I wish to go on record as one who applauds Mr. Steele for his efforts.

According to the reports I have read, Volkswagen has expressed interest in the possibility of building an automobile manufacturing plant on the East Coast which would ultimately employ 5,000 workers, generate a \$75 million annual payroll, and pump hundreds of millions of additional dollars into the surrounding economy.

Such a plant would draw workers from both the skilled and non-skilled labor markets. In the first instance, it would require non-skilled workers who would be trained for well-paying jobs on the assembly line. These jobs would be filled essentially by persons currently working in low-pay, labor intensive jobs who wish to move up and by unemployed production workers, and would also provide employment and training opportunities for many other persons.

In addition, a substantial number of persons would be employed under the plant's chief engineer, including carpenters, plumbers, general repairmen and other maintenance people.

With \$3,000 persons currently unemployed in Connecticut, Volkswagen should find little trouble finding sufficient employees to begin operations and then build up to the 5,000 mark.

All I can say is that I hope Mr. Steele's efforts to attract Volkswagen to Connecticut are successful as the plant would give us a major economic boost as well as some additional industrial diversification which we greatly need.

If I could to congratulate the congressman for being one of the few politicians with the concern and energy to go out and try to solve some of the problems we face.

More power to him.

To Quit White House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Rev. John J. McLaughlin finally leaving the White House staff.

His resignation letter, dated Wednesday and effective Oct. 15, told President Ford: "I do not take particular satisfaction in my work for your predecessor — whose achievements for the nation and the world will live on in history — at the time when he was facing personal adversity and when the effects of that strain were being felt by the nation."

He, like all in his order, vowed "perpetual poverty." Yet he has an apartment in the Watergate apartment building and, as a White House speech writer, earned around \$2,000 a year. He has declined to say what he does with the money.

He ran for the Senate from Rhode Island in 1970 in Roman collar and black suit, but when he came to the White House after his defeat by Sen. John Pastore, D-R.I., he began wearing well-tailored, "tasteful" laymen's garb.

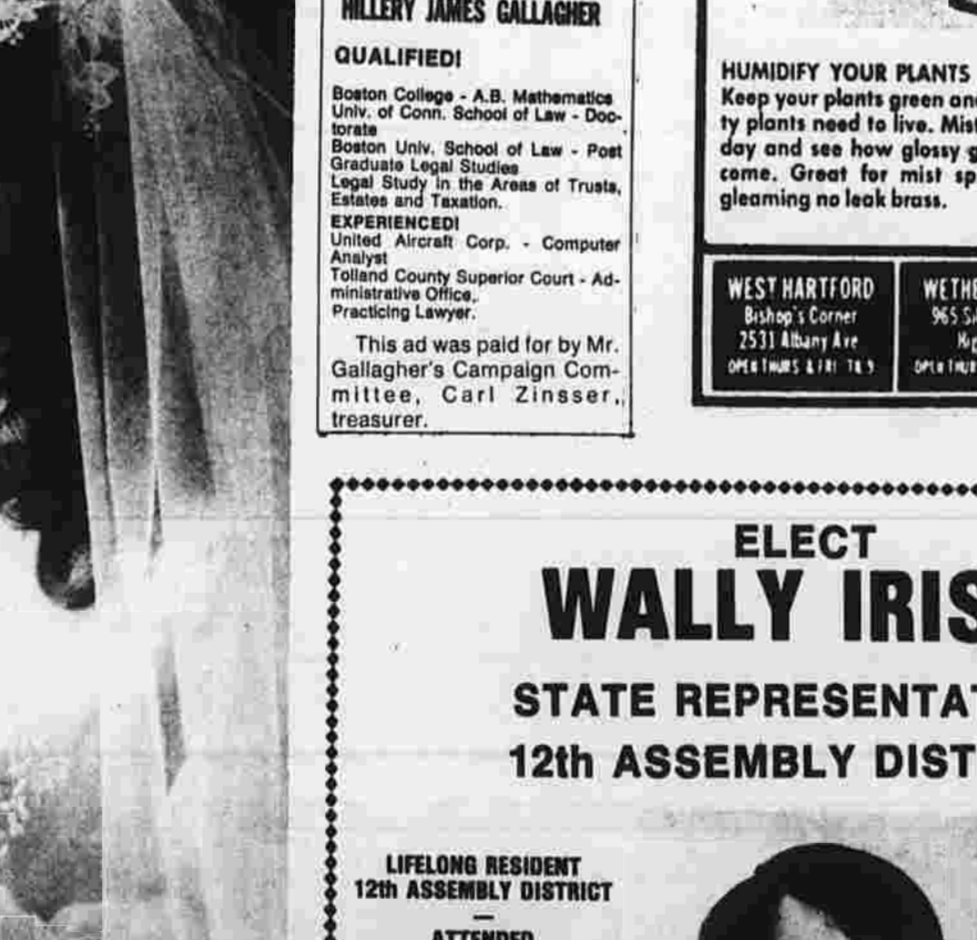

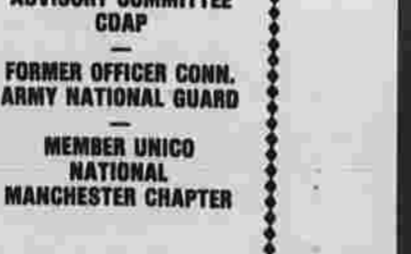

Training Center Plan Endorsed by Genova

A proposed state-funded Regional Occupational Training Center in Manchester—subject of a town referendum on the Nov. 5 election ballot—was endorsed today by State Rep. Donald Genova, R-12th Assembly District.

The proposed center, to be built on land at Manchester Community College's Bidwell campus, would provide training facilities for mentally retarded, physically and multi-handicapped students from Manchester and 15 surrounding towns.

"The center will be the first of its kind in the country," Genova said, "and will train the handicapped in such fields as automotive, industrial arts, home aides, and food service."

The center will also benefit students from Manchester Community College majoring in specialized fields to help them gain practical experience in their major field of study," Genova said.

Over-all cost of the project is \$1.4 million, to be reimbursed fully by the state after completion of the center. Town expense is estimated at \$60,000, representing the amount of interest of building notes.

School Work Progressing

Progress in new building and renovations at the town's two junior high schools is going ahead according to schedule, said Paul Phillips, chairman of the Town Building committee.

A review of the construction progress revealed that color choices are now being made for the décor in the renovations at Bennett Junior High School, Phillips said.

The new building at Filling Junior High School has not yet reached that stage, he said, but to date progress at each school is up to date.

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Housing Inspections Uncover Violations

A number of electrical, sanitary, and heating violations were uncovered by Manchester Health Inspector John Salcius in the second phase of his townwide housing inspection program. Salcius reported today.

In the last two months, Salcius inspected 139 dwelling units and found 34 units with violations. The dwellings inspected were on Brainard Pl., Johnson Ter., Bissell St., Birch St., Oak St., and Cottage St.

Salcius' inspections uncovered:

- Nine electrical violations, including overfusing, bare wires, inadequate outlets, and so on.
- Seven sanitary violations, such as leaky sinks, showers, or plumbing.
- Five specific outside violations, including rotten porch, rotten cellar hatchway, and rotten stairs.
- Two inadequate heating facilities.

Ten units in deteriorating condition, and several others with violations such as broken windows, leaking roof, etc.

Gun control laws now on the books are adequate to assure public safety, if the laws are properly enforced, says State Sen. Sam Hellier.

The Second District Republican congressional candidate said he does not favor adding more federal gun control legislation.

"I believe it is the province of the individual state, based upon the needs of its citizens and the character of the state, to legislate its own gun control laws," Hellier said.

If enforced, Hellier said federal gun control laws now seem to be sufficiently strong to control the interstate sales of weapons.

"One of the major features of Connecticut's laws is the provision for a one-week cooling-off period between the purchase and delivery of a handgun," he said.

"While we must prevent

gross abuses of the privilege of owning a weapon, we must avoid interfering with the rights of sportsmen and collectors," the congressional hopeful said.
