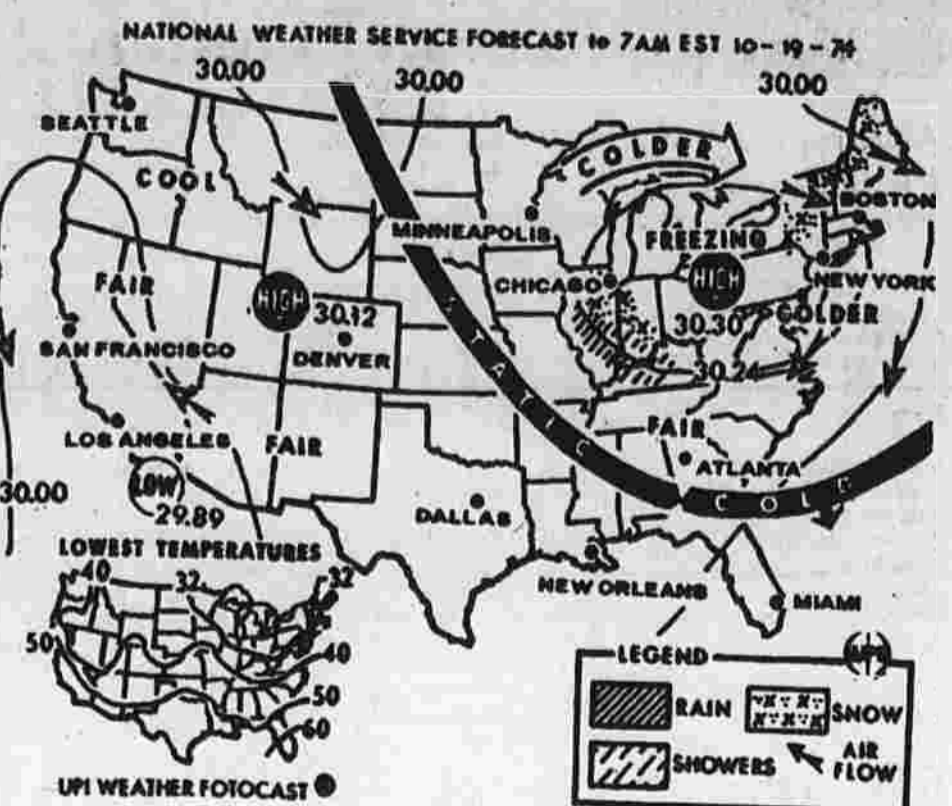

Gross National Product Down Again

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Gross National Product declined at an annual rate of 2.9 per cent in real terms in the third quarter of 1974, throwing the nation into its longest economic slump in 14 years, the Commerce Department reported Thursday.

The GNP which is the market value of the nation's output of goods and services, actually increased 9.3 per cent at an annual rate but with inflation added, there was a decline. Inflation in the third quarter was estimated at 11.5 per cent.

The July through September decline followed a 1.6 per cent dip in the second quarter and a 7 per cent plunge in the first quarter. It was the first time the Commerce Department has measured three successive quarters of decline in the GNP since 1960.

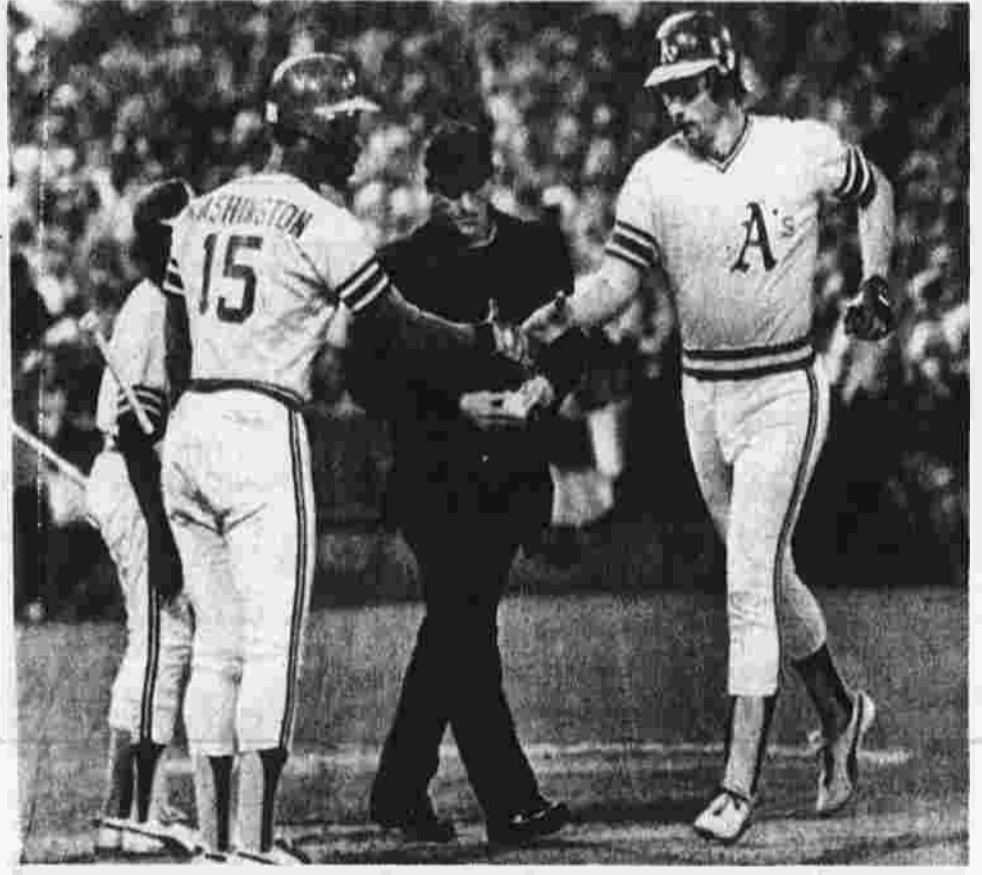

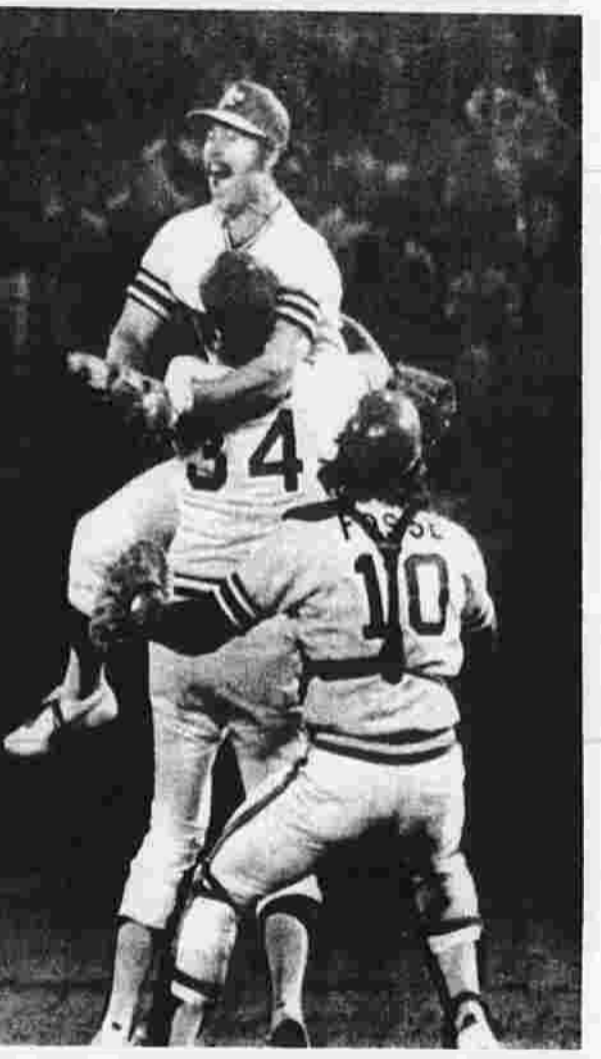

Skip Policy Overhauled

This year MHS has enacted a new policy concerning truancy and unexcused absences. Most of the rules are based on those used in past years, and were reworked by the administration and teachers. Most of the provisions are based on skips and their effect on class credit.

Ten non-excused classes in one subject area per semester will result in the loss of credit for that class. An "F" grade will be given; parent conferences will also be held during the accumulation of the skips. Suspension procedures will still be followed and are outlined in the Student Handbook.

It is possible for a student to lose his study hall privileges and receive the "no school" suspension. For suspension, the student must report to the office by 8 a.m. All students must attend the homeroom period. If a student is late to homeroom, he must report to the office before attending any class.

After an absence from school a note must be brought in to the office before any of the student's scheduled class. The note should include the days absent, reason, and signature of the parent.

Economy Top Issue, Schaffer Tells Students

"The economy, as all of you know, is the overriding issue in this year's campaign," said Secretary of the State Gloria Schaffer in Manchester Thursday. "The people are feeling the bite and now realize 'all ain't right in the State of Denmark.'"

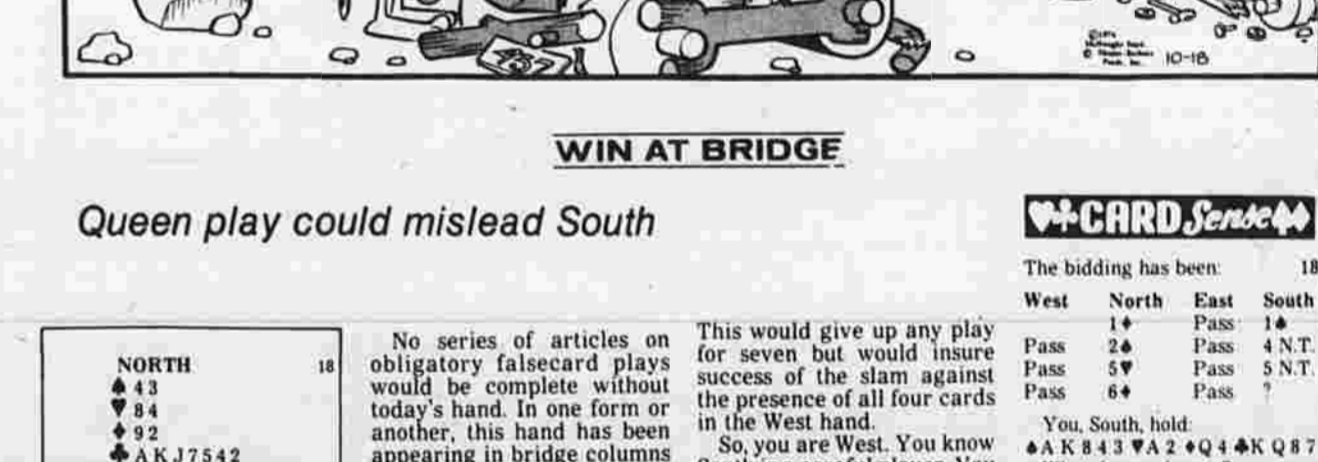

Ford Making Political Swing To Bolster GOP Underdogs

GREENVILLE, S.C. (UPI) — President Ford today took his campaign for congressional and state GOP candidates into the South, urging voters to send "anti-big spending" Republicans to Congress to help him battle inflation.
