

In a letter to Moses today, Zinsser said the town charter contains no provision that directors have administrative or executive powers. In fact, Zinsser pointed out, the charter states "the general ficer and the head of the administrative branch of the town government."

Charter Cited "None of the administrative duties of the town shall be performed by any Zinsser said, quoting a charter provision. Zinsser contends that the role of the directors, as defined by the charter, is purely legislative.
