Campbell

Morgan Campbell of Rockville is the Republican candidate for state representative from the 56th District (Vernon). He is a senior buyer for the Pratt & Whitney Aircraft.

Campbell is serving his fifth year on the Vernon Town Council and previously served five years on the Vernon Board of Education.

Campbell is in support of the Republican State platform which calls for increased state aid to towns from the Federal Revenue Sharing Program.

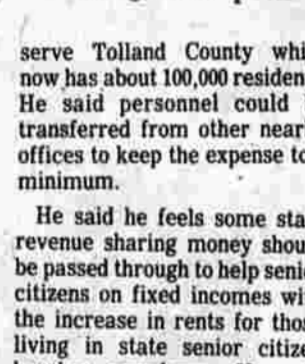
He is immediate past president of the Manchester Community Child Guidance Clinic, a trustee of the Rockville Public Library, and is town attorney for Ellington.

He and his wife, Ellen, have three sons.

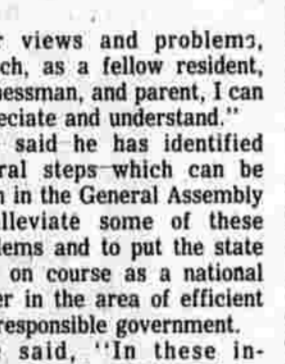

Ford Ends Campaign On Inflation Issue

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — President Ford said today America can spend itself into "raging inflation" unless congressional big spenders are defeated in Tuesday's national elections.

In a speech prepared for delivery to a GOP meeting, Ford also said the federal bureaucracy must be decentralized.

Stresses Inflation
On the last day of a barnstorming campaign trip to help Republican candidates, the President again stressed the fight against "Public Enemy Number 1" — inflation.

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Steele Confident of Victory

Robert Steele is confident he'll be elected Connecticut governor Tuesday, even though all the polls show Democrat Ella Grasso far in the lead.

"I always run scared. Half the polls had me losing in 1970, when I first ran for congressman. All the experts said I'd lose. What happened in history — I was elected by 11,000 votes."

Tough Fight
"It's a tough fight. They're underdogs and we know we're underdogs, but we're encouraged," he said. "What's so encouraging is that every poll shows about 30 percent of the voters still undecided. That's where the strength lies — in those undecided voters."

Notes Oddy in Polls
He noted an oddity in most of the polls. "The older the age group, progressively up to senior citizens, the better I do. I do worse with the younger element. The only way I can explain it is that the young voters are being turned off from the Republican party. They're signing up as Democrats or unaffiliated."

Need Broad Spectrum
"We need everyone in the party we can get and we want every Republican to stay Republican," he said. "Our party has the broad ideology we think is best for all. What we need is a broad spectrum of views within the party."

He said about Mrs. Grasso, "She's promising everyone the moon. I refuse to make any pledge I can't fulfill. She gets the endorsements and, because I have to tell it the way it is, I get the dirty looks."

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WASHINGTON (UPI) — A two-day conference on prices, costs and productivity in the food industry ended Friday with the consensus that the government itself may be the major culprit contributing to high retail food prices.

The talks emphasized not only by food processors, retailers, consumers and the transportation sector of the food industry but also by government representatives.

ICC Prime Target
Singled out repeatedly for criticism were the regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission that govern truck and rail carriers of food.

In the light of this — and of recent speeches by some Ford administration officials criticizing ICC — it appears that agency will be a prime target in the move to eliminate federal regulations that contribute to rising food costs.

In a keynote address at the conference, Albert Reiss, director of the Council on Wage and Price Stability, suggested that one of the major ways to lower food costs is to improve efficiency in transportation which will "require changes in the rules of the independent regulatory agencies of government."

Another government spokesman, Wesley Liebler of the Federal Trade Commission, called the performance of the ICC as it relates to food distribution "a

Our entertainment was by Mrs. Betty Ingatilla who gave a very interesting talk on the life and culture of Japan.

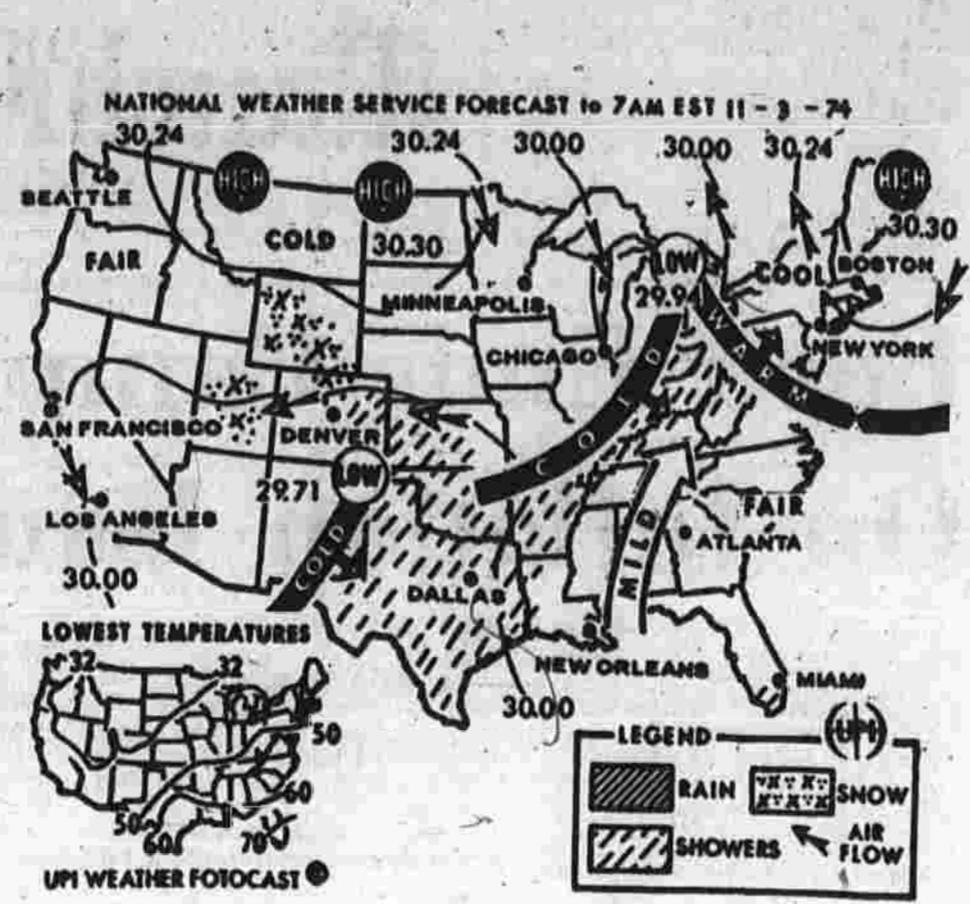

Most State Editors Back Steele

If editorial writers and publishers of Connecticut daily and Sunday newspapers elect the governor, Republican gubernatorial nominee Robert H. Steele would be Connecticut's next.

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CAB Plans to Abandon Cheap Charter Rates

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board plans to abolish cheap charter flight rates for members of "affinity groups."

Legally, an "affinity group" is supposed to be a collection of persons who have been affiliated — as in a club or firm — for six months. Actually, the CAB says, their only affinity often is that they went to the same charter flight broker.

CAB said Friday that such persons interested in attending a particular event.

ERA Proposal Gets Support

HARTFORD (UPI) — The Connecticut Civil Liberties Union (CCLU) says the passage of a state equal rights amendment would help implement full enforcement of laws governing sex discrimination.

William Olds, CCCLU executive director, advocated a "yes" vote on the referendum on Tuesday's ballot for a constitutional equal rights amendment.

"Many women are still subject to discrimination in everyday life, and the passage of the amendment should encourage state and municipal agencies to pass regulations which would help eliminate sex discrimination," he said.

Constance Treddwell, chairperson of the CCCLU board of directors, said Friday, however, that men would probably benefit more than women from passage of the amendment. Many laws now on the books giving women preferential treatment in divorces or other situations would be invalidated, she said.

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The Right of Free Silence

WASHINGTON (UPI) - When a New York publishing house brought out a volume of blank pages called "Nothing Book," it was accused of plagiarism by the Belgian publisher of a blank book called "The Remains of an Amnesiac."

The American firm rejected the claim, contending that blankness was in the public domain and therefore not subject to copyright restrictions.

This issue may strike you as being rather vacuous, but there is a lot at stake here. When you consider that 73,000 copies of "The Nothing Book" already are in print, you can see the financial ramifications are enormous.

And more is involved than the question of whether anyone can publish empty pages without fear of being sued for literary piracy.

For one thing, there is the matter of movie rights. In the absence of copyright restrictions, a Hollywood producer presumably could make a blank book into a movie without paying royalties to the publisher.

And what of foreign editions? Already in certain countries, there are a number of blank books, such as a campaign speech, and blankness, such as an empty page, I believe there is a subtle distinction.

Blankness, in the proper hands, can be creative. Is not the blank stare a bona fide and meaningful expression?

Would anyone deny the existence of blank checks, blank walls, blank verse or mental blanks? Have not most of us at times drawn blanks, shot blanks or blanketed?

Blankness can ever serve as an expletive, as in "blankety-blank."

Saying nothing, on other hand, requires no creativity. And, in the case of politics, it may already be protected by the First Amendment.

Students Take Bead On Energy Crisis

NEW YORK (UPI) - Teams of engineering students from the nation's top schools this academic year will try to zap the energy crisis.

In a nationwide competition, they will design and build working models of devices and systems capable of providing energy to the nation.

The current energy crisis, pushing up prices of many vital items and services on the homefront, stems from a high price of imported oil - virtually a universal cry for our complex technology.

The nation is aiming for independence on the energy front by 1980, but who knows - the engineering students might come up with a system that can operate with the sun.

The competition is sponsored by SCORE - which stands for Student Competitions on Relevant Engineering - and a number of teams of engineering students to enter SCORE's third national intercollegiate competition is expected to be announced by students from 80 colleges.

Miracle of Mombasa

NEW YORK (UPI) - At Lumus Co., Bloomfield, N.J., machinery manufacturer and construction firm, they call it "the miracle of Mombasa."

It's a story of how Lumus Co., a subsidiary of Combustion Engineering, Inc., Stamford, Conn., trained African workers fresh from the bush for much of the work in expanding a refinery at Mombasa, Kenya, to make it one of the biggest in Africa.

The job is finished, leaving the Kenyan government with a pool of trained African workers, including 200 skilled welders and pipefitters, for work on other projects.

Mombasa is just south of the Equator on the Indian Ocean. It's a climate where any physical work is quite an effort and to put on a welding mask, stand next to the arc of a torch after hour and produce 50 inches of welds a day is a great triumph of the will.

Two British welders, George Robinson and Don McPherson, did most of the instructing. At first they said the agreed program to make the Africans into skilled welders in only 17 weeks was "biologically ridiculous," but soon they too were infected by the enthusiasm of the Africans and went ahead and did it.

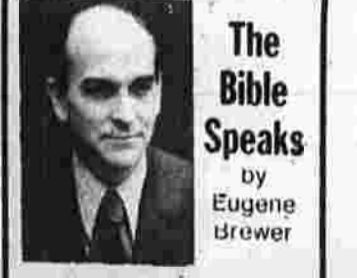

Aaron won \$50,000 and Oh received \$20,000 from the sponsor of the event.

The contest was based on the number of homers hit on 20 fair balls by each competitor. They alternated with five fair balls each.

Righthander Joe Pignatano, a coach of the New York Mets and former catcher of the Los Angeles Dodgers, pitched for Aaron and righthander Kuniyasu Mine, special batting practice pitcher for the Yomiuri Giants, was Oh's pitcher.

Oh went to the plate first and hit three homers into the rightfield fence. Aaron followed and belted two into the leftfield stands.

In his second trip to the plate, Oh hit three into the rightfield stands. Aaron followed and smashed four into the leftfield stands. And they were even 6-6.

In the third session, Oh hit only one into the rightfield bleachers. His other tries were fair balls to rightfield.

Aaron took a 9-7 lead by belting three into the leftfield stands in his third trip to the plate.

Oh in his last chance, smashed two into the rightfield stands for a 9-9 tie. He missed another by a slim margin.

Coming up to the plate for the last time, Aaron grounded to left and followed with another grounder through third. On the next pitch, though, he smashed a high fly into the leftfield bleachers for his winning and 10th homer.

Flowers Bring Spring To Every Season

According to Mike Orlowski, manager of Flower Fashion in Manchester, "They must be properly handled and refrigerated as they make their long journey to us. Many of our flowers come from the Midwest and the West Coast."

As soon as a shipment is received, Orlowski says the flowers are refrigerated and watered to help preserve their "just picked" appearance.

While seasonal flowers are always popular, Orlowski says roses and green plants are the favorites. House plants such as violets, azaleas and chrysanthemums are frequently ordered and during the Easter season this spring over 200 orchids were purchased.

Orlowski, a graduate of floriculture at the University of Connecticut, tries to accommodate his customers. "Sometimes they will bring in their own special container for us to fill with plants or a floral arrangement. Most times we can. Once in awhile someone will bring in a large water jug, for instance, and we just don't have tools to handle placing a plant inside it."

It takes skilled hands to handle delicate flowers and arrange them into sturdy corsages or fragile looking centerpiece, all the while mindful that customers want them to last longer than the dance or candlelight dinner does.

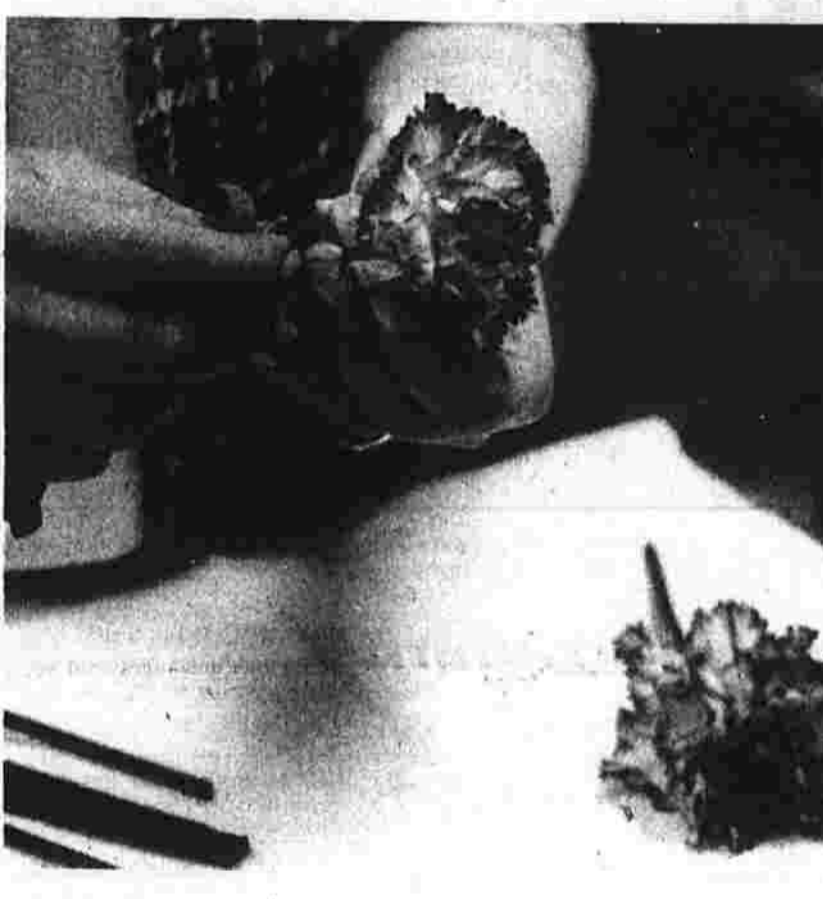

Safety play can save contract

Assuming East plays low, South sticks in his nine; cashes the king, returns to dummy with the ace of spades and knocks out East's queen of diamonds.

This insures nine tricks, but if East leads back a heart, South can come to 10. He wins in dummy, cashes the last diamond, cashes his last high spade and if he has kept count can throw West in with a heart and make him lead to the ace-queen of clubs.

So our pessimistic expert wins the heart lead in his own hand, he leads a diamond to dummy's ace and a second diamond toward his hand. This is a standard safety play designed to produce four diamond tricks against any 4-1 diamond break. Of course, there are always four tricks against any 3-2 break.

Francis B. Lake Forest has adopted a 3-2-3 calendar which provides opportunities for the diverse student of 1,800 to concentrate on two subjects during the winter term, or take advantage of off-campus programs such as internships with nearby businesses, extended field trips (such as in marine biology in Florida), or course work at other colleges or universities. Foreign study is also an option available to Lake Forest students.

Anti-Freeze High, But Available

HAMDEN (UPI) — The Connecticut Motor Club said Friday a survey of service stations, garages and department stores shows that anti-freeze is in sufficient supply but expensive. Nearly 50 outlets reported that supplies of anti-freeze, though smaller than normal, appear sufficient to meet the needs of Connecticut car owners.

This year, the price of anti-freeze ranged from \$4.99 to \$9.95 a gallon, with most between \$7 and \$8. The motor club said last year prices for anti-freeze ranged from \$6.25 a gallon to \$6.50, with most in the range of \$3.25 to \$3.75.

Less than a quarter of the outlets said supplies are poor, and only 5 per cent said they have ran out. The motor club, affiliated with the American Automobile Association, says less than a third of the stations and stores contacted found customers stampeding to buy anti-freeze.

\$44 Million For Plant

Vishakhapatnam, India — A size smaller plant being built here at a cost of \$44 million is expected to be in production mid-1975. It will have an initial capacity of 30,000 tons of size 10 and 10,000 tons of size a year.

HARTFORD (UPI) — Whether either Ella T. Grasso or Robert H. Steele shakes the money tree next January, the winner of the Tuesday election is likely to find it sparsely laden.

Both Mrs. Grasso, the Democratic gubernatorial candidate, and Steele, her Republican opponent, have promised to veto an income tax and have even said they will make a constitutional amendment prohibiting one.

But the prospect of being forced to renege on boldly stated campaign pledges at the moment faces the winner when he or she starts preparing the 1975 state budget next winter or fields a well-sharpened knife to cut state spending.

Coal Talks Broken Off

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Coal negotiations broke off Sunday night and a bloc of union delegates who must approve a new contract, voted unanimously to go home and prepare for a nationwide strike.

The strike deadline is a week away — 12:01 a.m., Nov. 12. The union, which represents 120,000 miners in 25 states, has a "no contract, no work" tradition and under Miller's leadership has adopted a ratification process that requires secret balloting by each member.

Arab Refugee Camps Placed Under Alert

United Press International Palestinian guerrilla factions and refugee camps throughout Lebanon went to "maximum alert" because of intelligence reports that Israel intended to launch a military attack in the first half of this month, the Beirut newspaper Al Moharrar said.

Judge Has Tape Problems

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House tapes may prove the star witness in the Watergate cover-up case and they still are giving Judge John J. Sirica problems. He spent a good share of the weekend listening again to tapes the prosecution has picked to use as evidence in U.S. District Court, weighing transcripts prepared by the government against a thick sheaf of "corrections" demanded by the defense. Jeff Stuart Magdur was to be back on the witness stand today for a fifth day of questioning by defense attorneys bent on shaking his story of high-level involvement in the plot to hush up the Watergate bugging. The trial is beginning its sixth week.

Nixon Improving

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Richard Nixon's health was better today than it has been since his medical crisis began a week ago, and doctors say he is no longer in critical condition. Nixon, buoyed by a surprise weekend visit from President Ford, was taken off the critical list Sunday and allowed to eat soft foods and sit up. His doctor called it "the most encouraging report" since Nixon entered Long Beach Memorial Hospital 12 days ago, and underwent urgent surgery last Tuesday morning.

U.N. Bars Public From Headquarters

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Security forces barred the public from a rally during the appearance of Palestinian guerrillas at a General Assembly debate. Security guards were strengthened for the mass demonstration at Dag Hammarskjöld Plaza, New York City police erected double sets of wooden barriers outside the world site of the building on East River.

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The pro-guerrilla newspaper said the alert was declared a few days ago before the Israeli navy shelling of the southern coastal refugee camp of Hashidiyah Oct. 31 which killed five persons, wounded 20 others and destroyed 50 houses.

Palestinian leaders received "information from inside the occupied territories (Israel) and from Arab and friendly sources, all of which indicated the possibility of an Israeli military action," the newspaper said.

Barbs for Democrats

"I don't belong to an organized political party. I'm a Democrat."

Of 27,235 voters are eligible to vote in Manchester. A survey of local political leaders averages out to a 70 per cent turnout estimate for Tuesday. We predict a higher turnout — between 75 and 80 per cent.

In 1970, with 23,218 eligible to vote in Manchester, 19,971 or 86.1 per cent voted. In 1972, with 28,700 eligible, 25,058 or 87.4 per cent voted.

Polling Hours

The polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m., with Town Director Robert Price, a Democrat, the chief moderator.

Republican Disgraced
