



The first amendment offered would. if adopted, prohibit discrimination upon the basis of sex. It merely adds the word, "sex" to the present clause prohibiting discrimination because of religion, race, color, ancestry or national origin.

Those lovely bouquets and colorful corsages which come to us so carefully wrapped in delicate tissue paper and boxed and tied with ribbon, are the finished product of many hours of tender loving

The beauty of the blossoms depends on the shippers, the time of arrival, and the condition of the flowers when they reach their ultimate destination - the shop of your favorite florist.

According to Mike Orlowski, manager of Flower Fashion in Manchester, "They must be properly handled and refrigerated as they make their long journey to us. Many of our flowers come from the Midwest and the West Coast."

As soon as a shipment is received, Orlowski says the flowers are refrigerated and watered to help preserve their "just picked" appearance.

While seasonal flowers are always popular, Orlowski says roses and green plants are the favorites. House plants such as violets, azaleas and chrysanthemums are frequently ordered and during the Easter season this spring over 200 orchids were purchased.

Orlowski, a graduate of floriculture at the University of Connecticut, tries to accommodate his customers. "Sometimes they will bring in their own special container for us to fill with plants or a floral arrangement. Most times we can. Once in awhile someone will bring in a large water jug, for instance, and we just don't have tools to handle placing a plant inside it."
It takes skilled hands to handle delicate

flowers and arrange them into sturdy corsages or fragile looking centerpieces, all the while mindful that customers want them to last longer than the dance or candlelight dinner does.
