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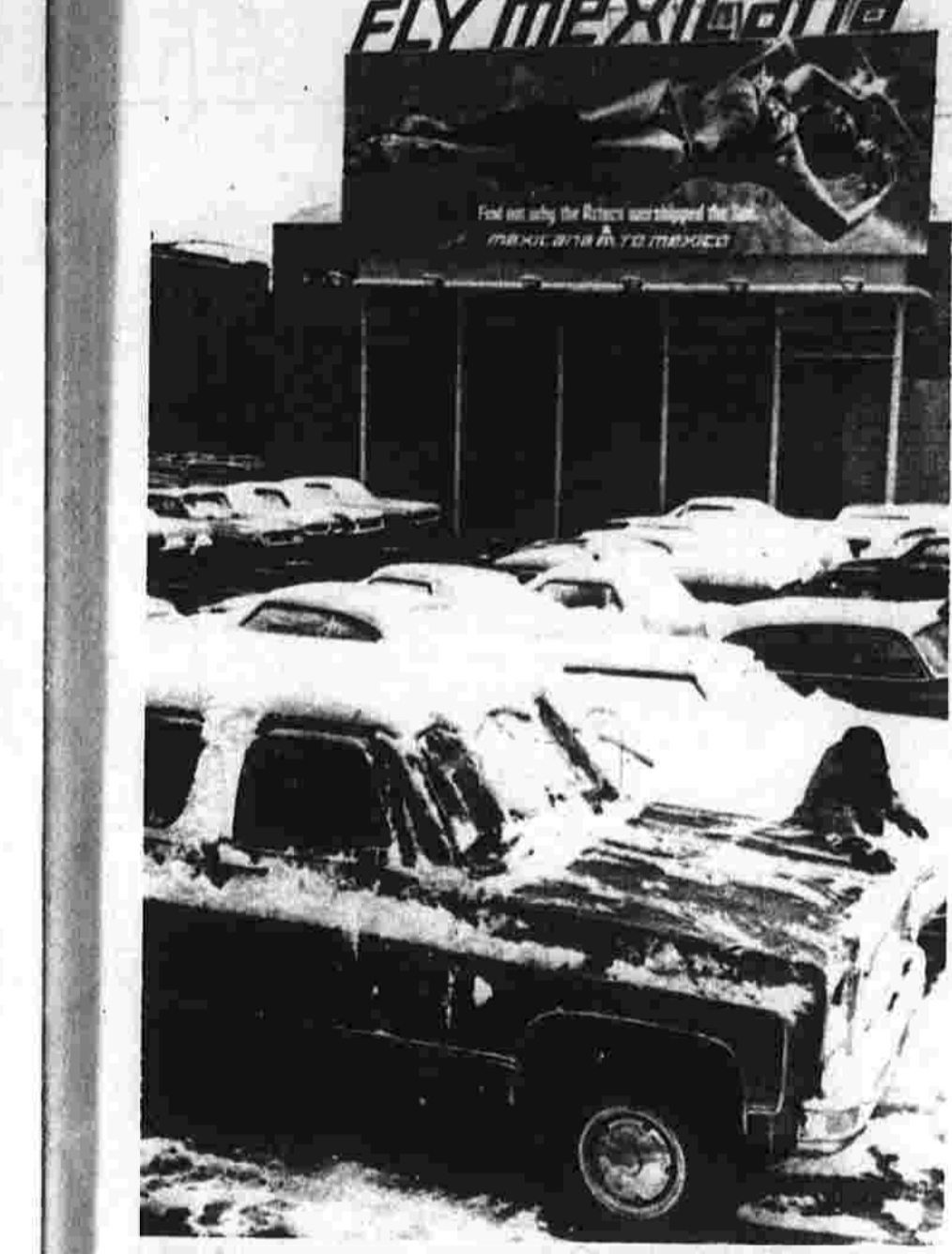

Snow Hits Buffalo, Drivers Leave Cars

United Press International Eastern highways became a no-man's land of abandoned cars, buses, trucks and snowplows, people turned to snowmobiles for transportation and skiers took to the slopes Friday as a powerful fall snowstorm swirled over the region.

The blustery storm dumped more than two feet of snow on the Buffalo, N.Y., area, stranding hundreds of motorists, closing schools and shutting down some industries and businesses. The storm was blamed for at least six deaths.

Seven inches of snow graced the North Carolina mountains and some skiers took advantage of the early season.

Snowmobilers zipped up and down deserted streets in the Buffalo area Friday night, passing abandoned vehicles.

Four cars managed to move.

Mark Kozwan, 18, Grand Island, N.Y., was stranded in an ambulance on the island north of Buffalo for three hours after being injured in a snowmobiling accident.

Three Buffalo residents and one Tonawanda, N.Y., resident died of heart attacks while shoveling snow. Another Buffalo man died of a heart attack while plowing through the deep snow and a sixth person suffered a fatal heart attack while driving through the mounting snow in the Erie County community of Brant.

Most major streets in the northern Buffalo suburbs became impassable by Friday night, though in many cases only one lane was open.

A 134-mile stretch of the New York State Thruway between Rochester and the Pennsylvania border was closed for five hours and many major expressways in the Buffalo area were closed or impassable because of blowing and drifting snow.

U.S., Russia Conferencing On New Mideast Tension

United Press International Russia and the United States have opened urgent consultation on the explosive Middle East situation, diplomatic sources in London said today.

The sources said the consultations were being held at the highest level, with both superpowers anxious to avert a new war and its "most serious consequences."

There have been widespread reports of a mobilization of Israeli reserves, but Israeli officials have not commented on them. The Israeli national radio carried a warning today, however, that tensions in the Middle East were nearing the breaking point.

Diplomats in London said the United States and the Soviet Union have reported "hot-line contacts and ordered envoys to urge restraint in key Middle East capitals."

Russian supplies of a large variety of new weapons to Syria apparently have played an important role in the current part in putting Israel on an alert, the diplomats said.

The fact that Russian arms have been shipped at this crucial stage were said to have set off fears that Syria may not renew the agreement on the continuing presence of United Nations forces in Lebanon said both superpowers are worried that war might be unleashed by miscalculation, with Israel jittery and determined not to be taken by surprise again, as was the case in the October war of last year.

In Tel Aviv, the Israeli national radio said Israeli troops shelled Arab guerrilla targets in south Lebanon during the night. The national radio quoted the Israeli

ambassador to Washington, Simha Dinitz, as taking exception to Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's statement that war in the Middle East is not likely.

"His observation was a preliminary observation, and we would like to share it," he was quoted as saying.

"But we can't take chances because for us it would not be a mistake in a press conference."

"For us it could be a matter of life and death."

The national radio did not give details of the bombardment of Lebanon, but Lebanese officials said they turned back Israeli troops attempting to cross the border.

The radio also quoted Kissinger as saying in Friday's press conference that Israel had indicated "grave doubts" about the extension of the U.N. emergency force on the Golan Heights separating Syria and Israel.

"Failure to extend it would undoubtedly contribute to the tensions in the area," Kissinger said.

In Beirut, the newspaper Al Safir news media as saying Israel has called some of its reserve forces to active duty because of tension on the Golan Heights in Syria. It gave few details, but it was the first public mention of such action.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said in Washington Friday that the United States was checking reports of military mobilization in the Middle East "on an urgent basis" and had relayed the reports to Moscow.

The secretary said he did not believe any major power would encourage a new conflict.

The New York Times reported in Beirut that the State and Defense Departments' confirmed that the Ford administration has received reports of the same scale Israeli military mobilization.

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President's Curb on Grain Export Deflates Food Conferees in Rome

ROME (UPI) — Delegates to the U.N. World Food Conference met in final sessions today, deflated by the U.S. president's pledge to curb grain exports to feed the starving nations.

The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization and most other of the 130 nations attending the 12-day conference had pleaded with the United States for additional aid.

President Ford sent word to the American delegation Friday that he could not support appeals to specify a definite quantity of aid to the conference.

U.S. Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Buttz bitterly accused three Democratic senators of playing politics with the world's hungry. He rejected as inflationary their proposals that the U.S. grain exports be increased.

"President Ford is trying to hold the line on inflation," Buttz said. "Such a pledge would have a bullish impact on the price of grain in the American market."

He accused Sens. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, George McGovern of South Dakota and Dick Clark of Iowa of "trying to make news for themselves" rather than help the cause of hunger.

U.S. officials said America would eventually provide financial aid to India, Bangladesh and the sub-Saharan region of Africa, the three areas hardest hit by mass starvation.

Conference sources said the United States would provide more than four million tons of grain to help feed the world's hungry over the next fiscal year.

The delegates agreed Friday night to establish an early warning system to alert nations of impending food shortages and proposed the creation of a world food security system with stockpiles to guarantee 10 million tons of grain a year for emergency aid.

Conference sources said approval of the information and early warning system was a major accomplishment because the Soviet Union, which has not participated in existing information exchanges, said it "would not object in principle to setting up such a system" and was prepared to consider taking part.

Because of crop failures in recent years, the Soviet Union has been a major purchaser of wheat on world markets. The conference resolution calls on the

U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization to set up a system pinpointing areas where acute food shortages and malnutrition appear imminent.

It also directs the organization to monitor world food supply and demand conditions so governments can move swiftly to meet needs.

South Korea Says North Tunneling In

SEOUL (UPI) — North Korea has been building underground tunnels inside the "no man's land" between the two Koreas in an attempt to launch a large-scale sneak attack against South Korea, Defense Minister Suh Yung-chul said today.

Suh called a news conference following the discovery of one of the tunnels Friday in the southern half of the demilitarized zone separating the North and South Korea at the 38th parallel.

"Most noteworthy from a military point of view is the fact that they are not designed to smuggle a few dozens of agents or subversives to the South but to stealthily send down a large force and stage a big-scale surprise attack," Suh said.

"We have intelligence reports that such tunnels exist not only in that particular area but also in other locations," he said.

"I make it clear at this juncture that there will be proper measures taken at a proper time in the future against such tunnels."

The U.N. Command held a surprise news conference Friday and announced that a nine-member South Korean Army patrol squad discovered a North Korean underground tunnel before a gun battle erupted between South and North Korean troops across the truce front Friday morning.

A U.N. spokesman said the discovery was made when a member of the South Korean Army patrol noticed steam rising from air holes in the ground.

Balloons Blow Long Distance

Full winds have not only swept the leaves from trees but North Jersey children's toy balloons from New Jersey to Vermont.

Friday night, Jeffrey Schiavetti, the 17-year-old son of Mrs. Ethel M. Schiavetti of Tunnel Rd., found five balloons tied together along with a deflated one in his backyard.

The balloons were released by the Knollwood School PTA of Fair Haven, N.J. Tags on each balloon call the name of a child and the request to return the tags to the school to help determine which balloon traveled the longest distance.

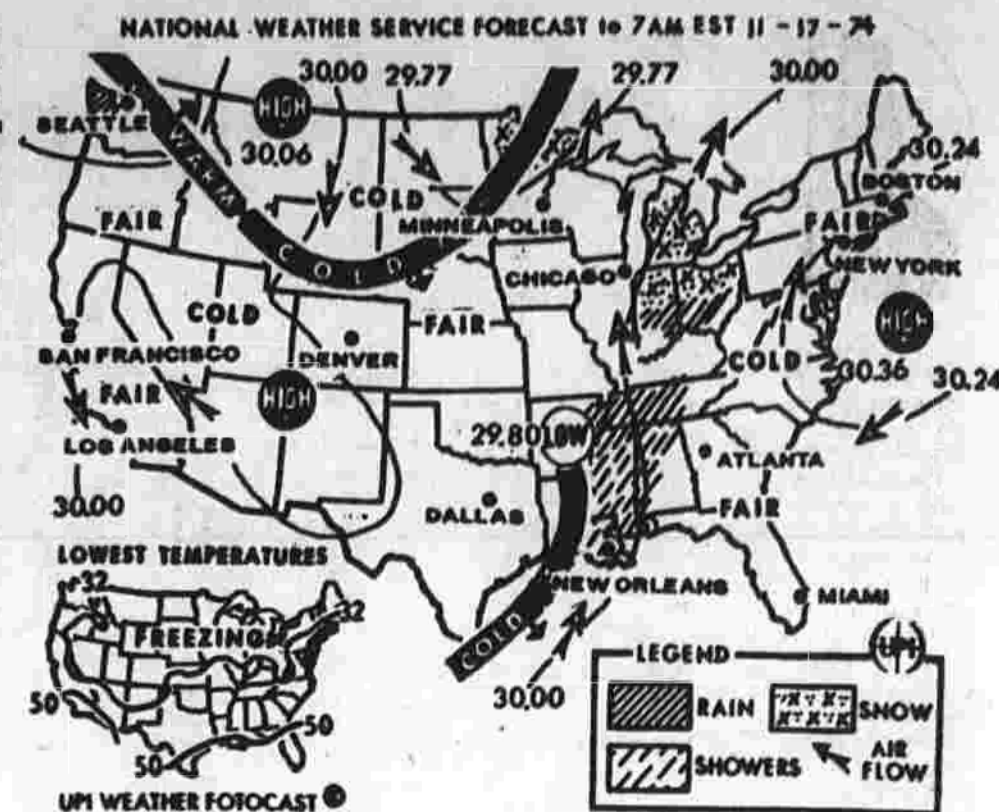
They Kill the Bull

OLD CODGER'S CODGITATIONS

In 1915 a couple fellows took the name of the Flint Aircraft Co. at Flint, Mich. They assembled little biplanes of struts and wires without any covering for the fuselage. The motor was a four-in-line like a model T Ford.

Two people sat on the lower wing beside the motor with feet braced on the front wheel landing gear. The pilot sat on the port side and the student or passenger on the starboard side where he felt the blast of blue flames from the exhaust ports because there was no manifold.

There was a dual-deck control steering with foot tillers for the rudder and wheel and column like a Ford only it moved forward and back to operate the elevator and turning the wheel tipped the ailerons. If only one person was taking it up a piece of lead pipe was strapped on the opposite wing tip for counter-balance.

The vibration was so great that it kept one's cheeks flopping, and without goggles the tears streamed back out one's ears. It was necessary to plug some cotton in one's ears if he hoped to be able to hear anything when he landed.

It was mailed in Washington last evening and reached Philadelphia in time to be placed on Pennsylvania passenger train No. 23. By using the aerial mail service instead of the regular mail service from 18 to 34 hours was saved in the delivery of the letter."

WASHINGTON — A House Small Business subcommittee, calling for an end to the U.S. Postal Service's monopoly on first-class mail, may have committed the understatement of the year.

In a review of the first three years of the independent postal agency, the subcommittee has complained that although the agency gets a federal subsidy of more than \$2-billion a year it has failed to noticeably improve the quality of mail service.

That's the restraint for you, Mrs. Balderdash. My mail — meaning that percentage which survives handling by the Postal Service — is larded with complaints about the scandalous inefficiency of Postmaster General Elmer Klassen's monstrous barony. In fact, mail service hasn't improved at all, let alone "noticeably"; it has deteriorated and continues to deteriorate under a Postmaster General whose most "noticeable" activities seem designed to improve his own official status, financial position and pension rights.

It is hard to figure out just what is wrong with a Postal Service which has gotten practically everything it asked from the taxpayers and mail users. The agency's operating deficit has doubled since it took over the mails, and the cost of first-class mail has increased by 25 per cent — from eight cents to 10 cents an ounce.

According to the subcommittee, 11 private postal services — with no subsidies from the government — are now operating profitably. Obviously, these companies are run by businessmen, not professional time-servers. It is no good blaming your neighborhood postman, either. If a business fails, it is management's fault, not that of employees who have no say in operating policies.

Thus, the outrage I feel about the more than \$2-billion a year the government provides the Postal Service is not concerned with the concept of subsidies. I have long argued that the Postal Service, like police and fire departments and public schools, should be subsidized — to some extent, at least — because the agency purports to provide a needed public service. To repeat myself, we don't ask the Defense Department to show a profit or even to operate in the black.

National Sampler: From the Country's Editorial Pages

By United Press International Atlanta Daily World: For over 30 years we have had in this country a welfare system that in spite of itself, brought about the weakening of family ties, the increase in crime and a general dissatisfaction by the poor in our way of life which they could only view from a point of need and frustration.

That is why President Ford's welfare reform measure is so important and long overdue in this country. The old system that we have had for years reduced welfare to a needy family if the father was able-bodied. Often this able body was not trained for work that would bring enough to support his family, and his presence would deny them benefits. So the answer was easy — the father was sent away, and as soon as he no longer was supporting his family they could get welfare.

Young boys, then growing up without a male parent's guidance, were easy prey to crime elements, which have hurt our society. Columbus, Ga., Ledger-Inquirer: The nation's voters, lumping together the woes of Watergate and the excesses of inflation, heeded the call of the Democratic party and provided it the wherewithal to make its own program.

As a result the actions of the Congress during the next two years will generate reverberations in the elections of 1976. If the Congress acts responsibly without the pressures and splintering effects of fractious special interest backers, and if as a result of such responsible action, the economy improves dramatically, the Democrats will have an excellent chance not only of electing a president and vice president but will probably extend their majorities in the two houses.

San Francisco Chronicle: Many people who express themselves for reimposing controls seem to be expressing a natural enough hope and wish to see prices stop going up without taking account of the monstrous machinery and disruption of free markets that would have to ensue. In short, they want the advantage of a closed economic system without having to pay the penalty.

Des Moines Register: The final word on who owns public presidential papers apparently will be declared by Congress and the courts, rather than by Ford and Nixon. Numerous bills have been introduced to establish the public's right to material. Litigation also is pending. Congress and the courts are at a much better position to arrive at a solution that will serve the public interest than a former president and a president, who both stand to benefit financially from having presidential papers treated as private property.

South Bend, Ind., Tribune: At a time when Arab militancy is placing greater pressure on Israel and fears are being voiced of another Middle East war, the United States has signed another agreement selling wheat to Egypt on terms favorable to that Arab nation. Supplying Egypt with grain is not as close to encouraging a renewal of hostilities as supplying arms, something Cairo may be looking to Moscow for. We are furnishing Israel with arms, however, and any aid to either side should be examined in the context of a precise military use. One can only hope that the agreement takes account of the limits on our food supply measured against our own needs and those of nations more needy than Egypt as well as whether Egypt showed signs that it will act responsibly in resolving its differences with Israel.

San Francisco Chronicle: Perhaps the best description of the new Congress was made by a senior Democrat, who called the outcome "a mixed blessing." In some ways, it is a McGovern Congress. The electorate doesn't know what it has done. We predict it won't like the results.

Sacramento, Calif., Union: In retrospect, the World Food Conference in Rome went about as any expert observer could have predicted. Efforts by the United States and other Western nations to enlist the Soviet Union into international food organizations failed at the outset — as all such efforts have. Third World nations attending the conference, which also had the greatest need for more food, automatically blamed the United States of America and other industrial nations for their own agricultural shortcomings, as they always have.

Identifying themselves with the Third World, the Communist Chinese predictably joined in attacks against the United States, and sought any political openings that developed to make the World Food Conference an East-West confrontation.

St. Louis Post-Dispatch: Henry E. Petersen, the man who former President Nixon said he had "on a short leash" during the early Watergate investigation has resigned (effective Dec. 31) as assistant attorney general. Still maintaining the propriety of his actions during the period when Mr. Nixon and his associates were trying to cover up administration scandals, Mr. Petersen said: "If you can't trust the President of the United States, you are in trouble."

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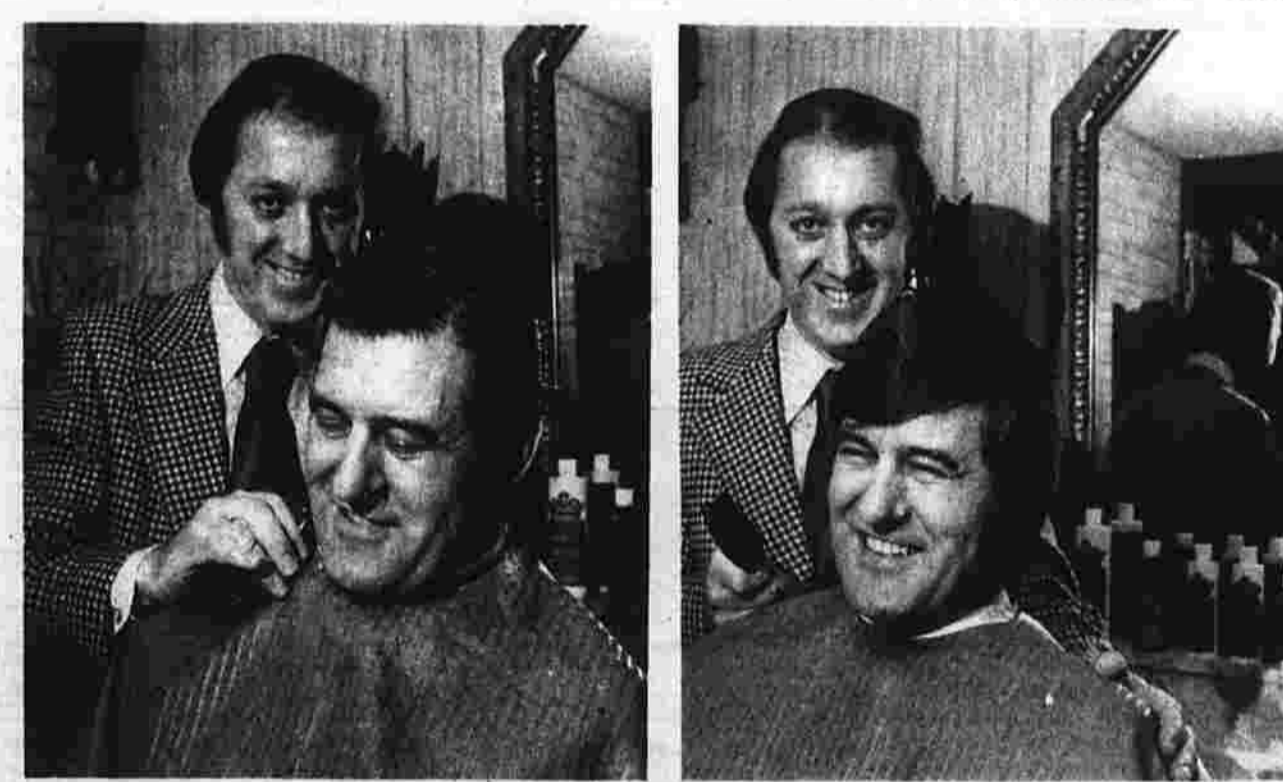

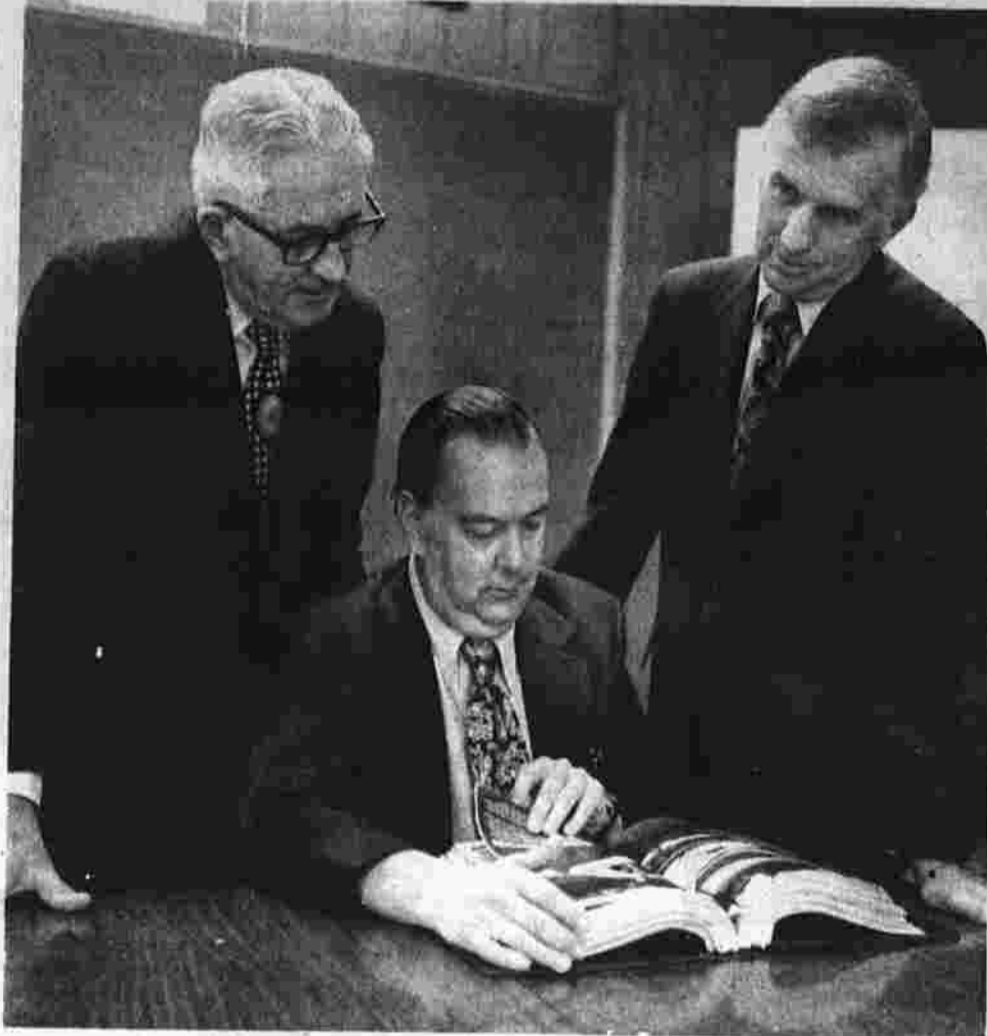
