

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



apartments, but never a really happy one. Dogs are outdoor creatures. Nature never intended that they should be walked or run on a leash, nor even given the freedom to employ a euphemism - of a two-by-four urban courtyard. City dogs bark a lot and sometimes bite. I don't blame them. I'd bite first and then

bark if I were confined to an apartment or even a townhouse in Washington or New York or Chicago. In fact, I think city dogs would be a lot happier if they were occasionally permitted to take a symbolic nip at their captors. Frustration is not just human ill.

Dogs also make a mess. Doggy neighborhoods and gargantuan outdoor comfort stations, and it is only the unwary citizen who takes a step on a side-walk or front lawn without closely examining the spot where that step is about to land. Most dog owners try to be oughtful, but an encounter with a dog's refuse is just as disconcerting in a gutter or public park as it is on your front stoop.

Dogs definitely should not sleep indoors. It's bad for their health and general psychological well-being. As a boy, I went through a succession of mongrel canines and one reason they were never sick was that they slept in the barn or the shed, not on somebody's bed or Pa's favorite armchair. In fact, in that small New England town, I cannot recall anybody ever taking a dog to a veterinarian for any reason. Dogs died when they attained a certain age. They were not given monthly shots by some whitegowned intern to protect them against measles.

Several of my friends who live in the country own dogs. Those dogs are happy because they have the run of the great outdoors. They are good watchdogs, but they obey immediately when told by master or mistress to knock off harrying a visitor. The city dog has to be dragged off a caller. Or he becomes too confounded chummy and is all over you with affection, errant dog hairs and drooling muzzle.

Good night nurse. I know people who spend more time, money and affection on dogs than others spend on human children. A friend of a friend admits, proudly, that his Great Dane's food bill comes to 20 bucks a week. This puzzles me because the Great Dane is confined to a one-bedroom apartment and even our 7-year-old couldn't work up an appetite in such a



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

"The struggle for the 1976 omination should begin for behind us the kind of devisiveness which is responsible for two successive defeats."



# Eligible Voters Down by 1,025

By SOL COHEN Manchester has 1,025 less eligible voters as of today than it had for the November 1972 election, figures released by the registrars of voters of-

A total of 27,227 voters are eligible to cast ballots Nov. 5. The total was 28,252 in 1972. Democrats total 10,824 for this year's lection, a drop of 138 from two years ago; Republicans total 8,604, a drop of 576; and naffiliated 7,799, a drop of 201. Manchester Democrats have increased heir lead to 2,220 since 1972, when their ead was 1,682. The Democrats lead the Republicans in 8 of Manchester's 10 voting listricts.
