Kissinger Winds Up Far Eastern Talks

TOKYO (UPI) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger briefed Japanese leaders today on his talks with Chinese diplomats and President Ford's planned trip to Peking next year, and then flew home to Washington.

Kissinger flew into Tokyo late Friday and called on Japanese Foreign Minister Toshio Kimura and other officials this morning. The secretary left Tokyo International Airport for the trip home at 3:30 p.m. (1:30 a.m. EDT).

His plane touched down at Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, at 7:30 a.m. EST for a brief stopover, and it was expected to arrive in Washington around 3 p.m. EST.

Ford Trip Discussed

Japanese Foreign Ministry sources said Kimura and Kissinger discussed the planned Ford trip to China and China's future relations with the United States, Japan and the Soviet Union.

The sources said during the one hour and 40 minute meeting Kissinger told Kimura that Ford's visit to China will take place in the latter-half of 1975.

Kimura asked: "Will there be something like 'Nixon shock' three years ago?"

No Surprises

Kissinger replied: "There will be no surprise like that," the sources said. Japanese leaders were shocked and displeased by former President Richard Nixon's surprise announcement in 1971 that he would visit China.

The sources said Kissinger's reply to Kimura would indicate there will be no immediate changes in the U.S.-China relations.

Meets with Kono

Kissinger later met with Kenzo Kono, president of the upper house of the Diet, Japan's parliament, to discuss political developments following the resignation of Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka.

Kissinger, accompanied by his wife Nancy and his son and a daughter from his previous marriage, flew in from Shanghai on board a U.S. Air Force plane.

American officials with Kissinger said he was anxious to return to Washington to face critics of the arms limitation agreement reached one week ago at the Vladivostok summit with Soviet leaders.

Matters Still Unsettled

Kissinger's Chinese talks did not settle such matters as the \$15 million claimed by U.S. citizens for property seized in China in 1949, not judged a major matter.

A major matter is Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's regime on Taiwan. Resident diplomats and Chinese in Peking said there could not be absolutely normal relations until the Taiwan issue is settled.

The crux is that Washington still recognizes Chiang and Peking refuses to give full recognition to any country dealing with Taiwan.

But American officials said for all practical purposes relations are normal and the U.S. liaison office performs all the functions of an embassy.

Buffer Force Mandate Renewed By U.N. Security Council

United Press International Israel and Syria looked forward today to what they hoped would be six months of relative peace in the Middle East, spurred by the U.N. vote to keep 1,200 buffer troops between their two armies on the Golan Heights.

The Security Council in New York formally renewed the six-month mandate of the U.N. troops Friday for another six months when it expires at midnight tonight.

Word Through Waldheim Israel received official word of Syria's intentions Tuesday from U.N. Secretary General Kurt Waldheim during his visit to the country.

"Another six months of tranquility may serve a greater purpose than just the peace-keeping role because what we need is not just peace keeping but peace making in order to make it more lasting and more secure," Foreign Minister Yigal Allon said of the renewal at the end of Waldheim's visit.

Man Buffer Zone

The U.N. troops have manned a buffer zone between the Israeli and Syrian armies on the Golan Heights since last May. Israel had occupied the Syrian territory since the 1967 Middle East war.

Israeli troops on the heights went on alert two weeks ago because of what the military command said was concern about

Syria's intentions. Part of Israel's army reserves were called to active duty at the same time.

Fresh Opportunity

Syria's ambassador to the United Nations, Haissam Kelani, said Syria's acceptance of the continued U.N. presence was designed to provide a fresh opportunity for implementing peace initiatives.

Israeli artillery units Friday shelled suspected Arab guerrilla concentrations in southern Lebanon, military sources in 'el Aviv said. They would not give details of the shelling.

Reports from Beirut said it was directed at the Lebanese villages of Dheirjat and El Khayam, two miles north of the frontier — the same region where an Israeli patrol killed five guerrillas late Thursday.

Arafat in Moscow

In Moscow, Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasser Arafat hailed Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev's upcoming visit to the Middle East as a landmark in the struggle against "Zionism and imperialism."

Arafat, who is visiting Moscow, said in a report carried by the official Tass news agency that Brezhnev's trip will help win "withdrawal of Israeli troops from all occupied Arab lands and insurance of lawful national rights of the Palestinian people."

P&W Workers To Vote On Contract Tonight

EAST HARTFORD (UPI) — Both union members and management at Pratt & Whitney are getting ready for a possible strike of 16,500 workers that could come Monday if the workers do not vote in favor of it tonight.

Members of the International Association of Machinists (IAM) are dusting off picket signs made for past labor deadlocks and the company is building watchtowers at plant entrances to observe and possibly photograph picketers.

Direct Approach

At the same time, the East Hartford aerospace contractor, the state's largest employer, has made a direct approach to workers with full-page advertisements in newspapers around the state explaining the terms of the company's final contract offer.

The ads calling the offer "generous" are appearing in today's newspapers, hours before the vote scheduled to be taken in Hartford this evening.

Union Accuses Firm

Louis Kiefer, a union spokesman, Friday accused the firm of trying to negotiate over the heads of union leaders.

The pact provides \$1.40 an hour hikes to hourly employees in the lowest wage scale over its three-year life, with a maximum \$1 an hour in cost of living adjustments, the firm said in the ad.

Hourly Increases

For P&W employees in the top hourly salary scale the contract provides wage increases of 73 cents an hour and the same \$1 maximum for cost of living adjustments for the next three years.

Union negotiators had demanded unlimited cost of living adjustments to keep pace with fast-rising prices.

The advertisement called the proposed pact "a generous offer," and said, "Only if we remain competitive as a company can we get the production orders that enable us to maintain stable employment."

Industry Pattern

Kiefer however said the wage offer "is still below the pattern set in the aerospace industry." The pattern included a 5.5 per cent wage increase the first year and 3 per cent increases in each of the next two years, "plus an uncapped cost of living adjustment," he said.

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GOP Leaders Take Action To Revitalize the Party

BRIDGEPORT (UPI) — Republican state Chairman Vincent Laudone says a commission to revitalize the Republican party in the wake of the rout at the polls earlier this month will be established Dec. 18.

Laudone said Friday the commission, with 25 to 30 members, will have three tasks — to determine how Republican candidates can win in Connecticut; develop ideas on how to reopen the party and get the entire party seeking new active members.

The GOP State Central Committee will meet in Hartford to name the members, aid Laudone after a meeting of party leaders in the City Hall offices of Bridgeport Mayor Nicholas Panuzio.

Among the about 20 persons attending the session were Panuzio, Sen. Lowell P. Weicker, R-Conn., GOP Reps. Stewart B. McKinney, Ronald N. Sarasin and Robert H. Steele, who lost the recent gubernatorial election to Ella T. Grasso.

Party Has to Open Up

Steele said of his House colleagues, "All three of us feel that the party has to open up. Being a Republican in Connecticut means you have to work twice as hard to get the opposition party and independent votes."

Steele, who lost to Mrs. Grasso by 200,000 votes, also confirmed he has been offered at least one post on the Ford administration, chuckling, "It's nice to now that I'm still wanted somewhere."

gressman however declined to reveal details of it and said he has not decided whether he will accept it or return to private life.

Weicker Still Undecided

Weicker, who has threatened to seek reelection in 1976 as an independent if the party does not reform itself, said he has not reached a final decision on the matter.

Laudone also denied recent reports that GOP headquarters may be shifted from Hartford to somewhere in Fairfield County, where Republicans are considered the dominant political force.

Party Loyalty Not Enough

Panuzio, defeated by Steele in the race for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, said, "Party loyalty for loyalty's sake must surely not be a thing of the past."

Asked whether he thought minorities and blue collar workers could be attracted to the Republican party, Panuzio said, "Our chances are excellent. We just have not sold our wares properly in the past."

NEWS CAPSULES

To Attend Game

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford scheduled a quick morning meeting with his Domestic Council to discuss revenue sharing today, before going to Philadelphia to attend his first football game as President. The game will be the 75th Army-Navy game. Ford was a former captain of the Grand Rapids South High football team and All-America center for Michigan.

Eight Pardoned

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The President acted on 18 clemency cases Friday. On recommendation from the Clemency Board, he granted a full pardon to eight individuals and conditional clemencies to 10 others. The conditional clemencies range from three months to a full year alternate service.

Haldeman Testifies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — H.R. Haldeman, former White House chief of staff, denied he intended any obstruction of justice in testimony at the Watergate cover-up trial Friday. He is expected to finish his testimony by midweek. Meanwhile, the three medical specialists who examined Richard Nixon, reported to Judge John J. Sirica that the former president would not be well enough even to make a deposition in his home before Jan. 6 and could not testify at the trial in Washington before Feb. 16.

Churchill Remembered

LONDON (UPI) — Britain today is remembering Winston Churchill, nine years after his death and 100 years after his birth. Members of the late prime minister's family — including his 91-year-old widow, Clementine — gathered for a private luncheon at Blenheim Palace. The British Broadcasting Corp. planned to broadcast a dramatization of Churchill's life Sunday, with Richard Burton in the principal role.

Finnish Santa Busy

HELSINKI (UPI) — Today about 40 of Santa's helpers, all employees of the Finnish Tourist Board, are planning to answer the mail to Santa Claus from children all over the world. The letters will be sent from Santa's home on Korvatunturi Mountain above the Arctic Circle, on special stationery with colorful portraits of Santa, pictures of his elves and, of course, Rudolph the reindeer.

Explosion Kills Two

BEAUMONT, TEX. (UPI) — An overheated chemical tank at a synthetic rubber plant caught fire and exploded five times in one hour Friday night killing two persons and injuring 10 others. The blasts destroyed half of the huge \$5 million Goodyear Co. plant and damaged homes six miles away.

The Jefferson County sheriff's office said firefighters found two bodies in the raging inferno early today.

Nine Persons Dead In Two Maine Fires

EAGLE LAKE, Maine (UPI) — At least nine people were killed in separate fires in two northern Aroostook County towns early today, and authorities said the death toll could go higher.

In Eagle Lake, a mother and her six children died in a blaze that swept through their home while they were sleeping.

In Cross Lake, two unidentified persons were killed in a pre-dawn fire at a residence at the rear of Brown's Store.

Authorities said there was a possibility that some other persons might have died in that fire, which firemen were still trying to extinguish late in the morning.

Authorities said an oil-fired furnace exploded in the home of Robert Martin of Eagle Lake sometime after midnight, sending flames shooting throughout the house.

Police said although Martin was badly

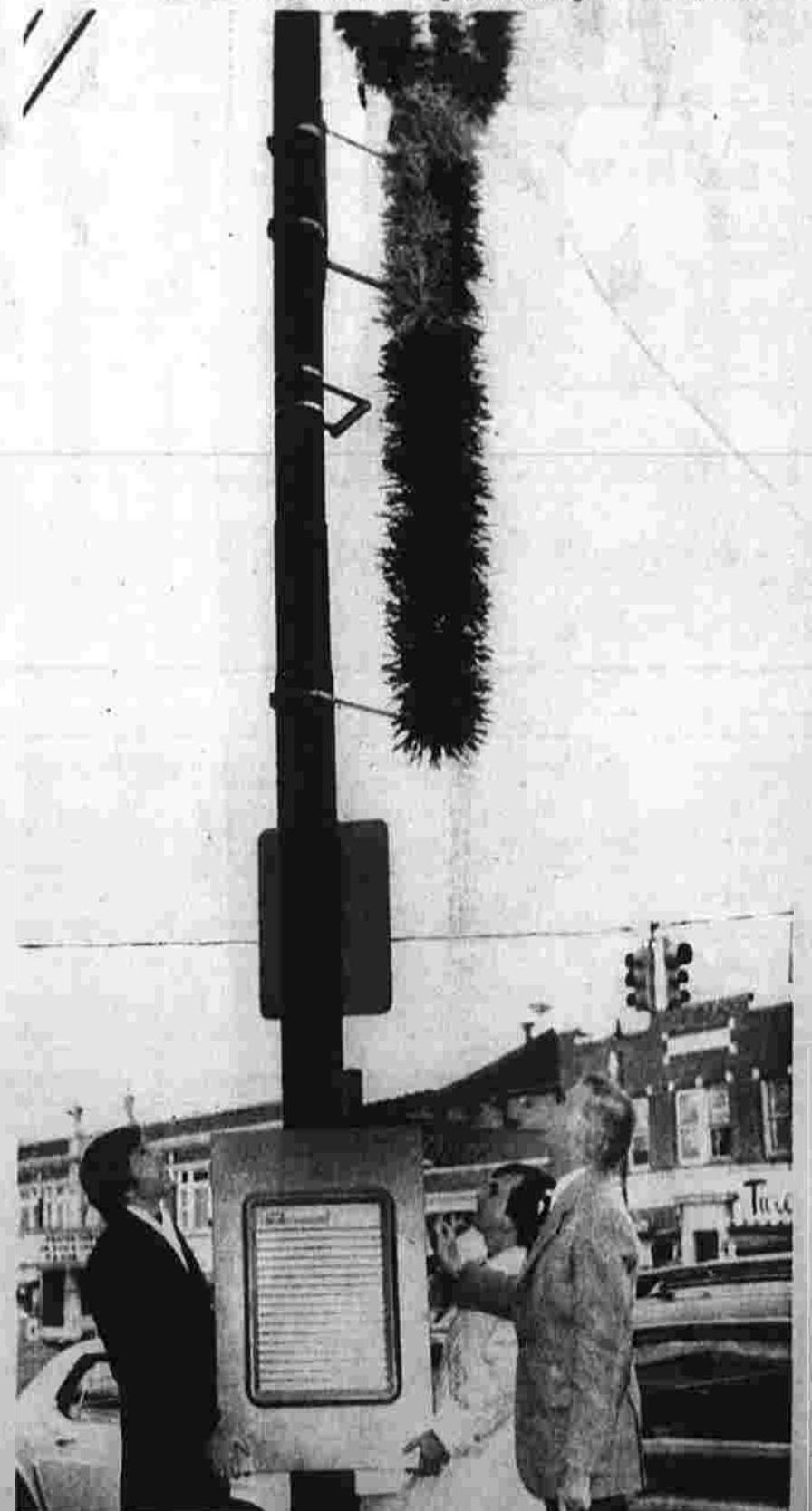
burned, he was the only member of the family to escape.

The victims were identified as his wife Lorraine, 36, and children Daniel, 14, Lisa, 12, Cindy, 9, Charles, 6, Scott, 5, and William, 20 months. All of whom died of asphyxiation, authorities said.

Martin suffered second and third degree burns over 30 per cent of his body and was hospitalized in Fort Kent.

Firemen battled the blaze in freezing temperatures throughout the night and well into the morning. Police said they recovered the bodies of Mrs. Martin and five of the children, but were still looking for Daniel's after dawn broke.

Martin is the son of the late Claude Martin, a state representative from Eagle Lake who served 15 years in the Maine legislature during the 1940's and 50's.

Consensus And Community

NEW YORK — In a Wall Street Journal piece, Irving Kristol reminds us that there are no great "secrets of state" in diplomacy, which is true enough, although it doesn't follow that all of us know everything about everything in global affairs that Secretary of State Henry Kissinger knows.

But he goes on to say that America has no foreign policy today, because there is no popular consensus behind the various policies that President Ford and Secretary Kissinger are pursuing.

For me that just doesn't follow. How much of a consensus will you find behind Harold Wilson's policy in Britain, or Valery Giscard d'Estaing's in France, or Helmut Schmidt's in Germany, or Indira Gandhi's in India, or Kakei Tanaka's in Japan or, for that matter, Yitzhak Rabin's in Israel? I list only the parliamentary democracies, but there are Communist and Arab states and in the more extreme military regimes around the world.

Also, the constitutional framers had seen foreign policy as molded by popular consensus, they would not have placed its shaping almost wholly in the hands of the President. But the people do have to get into the act somehow, since they are the ones who suffer or gain by the policies.

THE NORTH SLOPE fields of Alaska have not yet started to flow with their predicted great oil reserves. Scientifically we have been in the forefront of world progress for many decades. Certainly there are avenues of exploration, still uncharted, where we may develop an energy source other than oil.

It was quite shocking a few days ago when Secretary of the Interior Rogers

Going back in American history, what Presidents and their secretaries of state have had such a consensus behind their policies?

None of the three Presidents — John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison — who followed George Washington had it, if indeed, even he did.

There is an even harder question: Will any American foreign policy work if we don't have even the beginnings of a moral community between the nations involved?

While there is a social contract of sorts within nations, mostly in those with a thrust toward democracy, there is no social contract yet between nations. I mean the sort of social contract whose members agree to restraints on their individual freedoms and national sovereignties in order to get some collective security and law.

WASHINGTON — Let the record show that I am not altogether displeasing the thought that the United States eventually will be thrown out of the United Nations by those vicious, mindless boons of the so-called "Third World" who now constitute a majority of the UN's membership.

Such an action would not alter the character of what once was called the world's "peace organization," because the U.S. wields about as much influence in the UN as Costa Rica.

But in the new UN, dominated by totalitarian governments, there are two sets of standards — one for the new majority and one for the new minority, which includes thee and me.

School Adopts Policy on Student Records

The contents should consist of updated, factual and pertinent information, the policy states.
All such records will be considered the confidential property of the school system, their contents to be made available only to the student, his parents and guardians and professional staff members directly concerned.
These records are to be available to others only on written authorization of the student or parent, except where courts or other agencies with subpoena power make appropriate demands for such records.
The school record is of utmost importance to the individual student and therefore records, according to the policy.
All student records shall be kept secure from inspection by unauthorized persons. Procedures will be established for the periodic destruction of outdated or no longer useful information.
The stated purpose of student records is to meet state legal requirements; to have a record of pertinent, factual information from school social workers, child guidance clinics, juvenile courts shall not be placed on the student's cumulative record but be retained in a personal file kept in the superintendent's office.
It is recommended the student be given information concerning personal academic ability. Only faculty who have a need to know many examine the records. It is recommended that a parent be given information concerning a student's native ability and that other schools to which students transfer are entitled to transcripts and test scores. No information will be released over the telephone.

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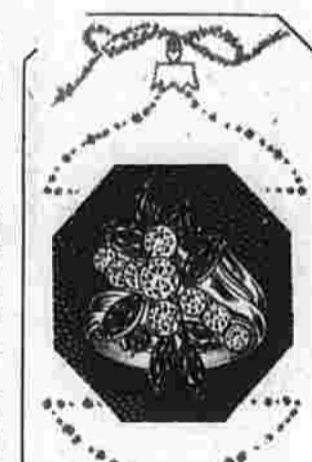

The home of the Sidney Keller family at 245 Mountain Rd.

When the Sidney Keller family outgrew its standard colonial type home on 245 Mountain Rd., it overlooked into the garage. This was not as bad as it might sound because the garage has been transformed into a spacious contemporary living room, lending more room to the rest of the downstairs area for family activities.

It's as though all the rooms just moved over one. The family room became the dining room, and the living room became the family room.

Half-walls, all white, separate the transformed dining room and the present living room. The half walls are capped with white plastic laminate, making these areas convenient for informal serving and entertaining.

Built-in storage is cleverly concealed behind recessed paneling in the half walls. Besides the white plastic top, another easy-to-clean feature is the brick red stone floor on the hallway, dining room and living room.

"I just wipe it with a mop, no waxing," says Mrs. Keller.

Against the stark whiteness, the earth tones Mrs. Keller has chosen for decor are in warm contrast.

A diagonal striped area rug in the living room in rust and gold unites the twin divans upholstered in ginger and two French Provincial arm chairs in dark blue.

The Roman shades are a loosely woven fabric in shades of brown and beige accented with orange and blue.

A large wall niche is used as a focal point for a spray of con flowers balanced on a gold metal Italian scale with a marble base. A wooden balancing man made by daughter Nancy, and an ornamental vase.

Cut glass objects and wood art carvings decorate the twin glass coffee tables.

The family room is carpeted in deep cocoa brown accented with a white flecked sheep skin in front of the divan upholstered in a brown, black and orange fleck material.

A recent addition to the room is a built-in book case unit with cabinets in stained walnut topped with leather designed plastic laminate and the original Georgian marble exposed chimney.

Oyster beige drapes maintain the room's simplicity.

For the dinette area in the kitchen, Mrs. Keller chose a butcher block table and six bentwood chairs.

So much in the Keller home is elegant, yet simple, that Mrs. Keller stresses the effortless maintenance of durable, washable surfaces.

With four children in the family, the Kellers made the most of bedroom space in their daughters' rooms.

Susan's room was small for twin beds, so with the help of an architect, the room is now designed to sleep four people in double built-in bunk beds and provides plenty of storage space besides. A counter along the opposite wall provides a desk area and general utility space.

Carpeted in a warm apricot color, this room, with its bright print bed coverlets, is definitely feminine.

Judy's room is similar, but with only one double bunk. Her room is dashing with bright red carpeting and bed cover and accessories.

Jonathan has taken over a section of the basement which, in the original decor, defines his sleeping quarters.

The redesigning of certain areas of this home, especially the downstairs, has achieved a spacious, easily maintained residence — formerly what might have been considered an ordinary house with an ordinary room layout.

Incidentally, the original garage moved over to an adjoining carport.

A year ago only the top 25 names and times were published and this caused a large number of protests. This year our decision was to publish all, if received, and Saunders saw to it that the list was available at 6 a.m. when this department opened Friday.

Road Race Happers

Will Hadden, general chairman for the Tall Cedars' Race Committee, said Jeff Koelsch and Ed Tomkiel returned the containers with the most money for the Muscular Dystrophy Fund. The top individual performers for Manchester High and East Catholic finished 77th and 78th in 25-45 clockings, Jim Guiliano, East just edging the Indians' Dave Lemieux. Joe McCluskey, who once "owned" the Five Mile with three straight wins in 1930-32, shuffled around in 34 minutes which wasn't bad for a 63-year-old all-time track great. It was a small homecoming for McCluskey, the town's most famous native son, who now resides in New York, and was well remembered all along the route by friends of many years ago when he was an All-American and Olympic speed member. Doc Robbins admitted he was getting old. For the first time in years, the 54-year-old physician didn't compete barefooted.

The latter and Doc Robbins were teammates at the University of Connecticut 35 years ago. Wes Fedorchak, outstanding local junior high cross country runner, placed a creditable 140th. Andy West, of Cheney Tech, who specializes in longer races, was 167th. There were several complaints regarding the race sponsors didn't offer any special awards for females. The fairer sex sought equal status and finally won out for the 1974 run.

Crothers a Prognosticator

NEW YORK (UPI) — Normally, playing the Houston Oilers wouldn't even break a sweat for Pittsburgh but things are different this year and Steeler Coach Chuck Noll is worried.

The Oilers, who won only one game in each of the past two years, have turned themselves around this season. They are 5-5 and had a four-game winning streak snapped last Sunday in a tough 10-0 loss to Dallas. Houston also gave Pittsburgh a major scare in their first meeting, bowing 13-7 at the Astrodome.

The Steelers, who lead Cincinnati by 1½ games in the American Conference Central Division, try to take a big step toward clinching that title Sunday at home against the Oilers. A Steeler victory and a Cincinnati loss at Miami Monday night would give Pittsburgh the division title.

"You could see it coming," Noll said. "Houston is an up-and-coming team. I knew after we played them earlier in the year that they'd win some games. They are a vastly improved club."

Baylor in Cotton Bowl First Time New Year's

NEW YORK (UPI) — For the first time in history, Baylor University will celebrate New Year's Day in the Cotton Bowl.

The Bears won their first trip to the Jan. 1 classic at Dallas Friday when Texas, a perennial Cotton Bowl host, defeated Texas A&M, 23-3, to knock the Aggies out of contention.

Baylor, which will meet Penn State in the Cotton Bowl, must play Rice today in its season finale, but the Bears' players began celebrating their good fortune early after watching the Aggies' demise on television.

"There is so much yelling going on here right now that I can't even hear what I'm saying," screamed Baylor center Aubrey Schultz, following the conclusion of the Texas game.

Texas' victory over Texas A&M not only wrapped up Baylor's first Cotton Bowl trip but also gave the Bears at least a tie for the conference title, one of only three ever won by the Bears in their 75-year football history. The last one was 50 years ago.

A victory over Rice in Waco Saturday would give Baylor an outright championship after not winning a conference game last year.

"No, this isn't the happiest day of my life," said Coach Grant Teaff, "but tomorrow could be if we beat Rice. Tying for the championship and playing Penn State in the Cotton Bowl won't mean near as much to us if we are not the champions, if we have to share it with anybody."

Texas' victory, which was sparked by running back Earl

Campbell's 127 yards rushing, continued the Longhorns' jinx over the Aggies at Austin. Texas A&M has won only once on Texas turf in 24 years, and the Aggies were out of this one before the game was a minute old.

On the first play from scrimmage Texas A&M's Bubba Bean fumbled at his own 23 and Texas recovered, then scored on an 18-yard run by Raymond Clayburn. The let-down continued when on the next offensive play A&M's Bucky Sams was stripped of the ball by Lionel Johnson, who ran 28 yards for a score.

"I guess I say this so much that people get to where they don't believe me, but I thought this game was a tossup and if we played again I still think it would be," said Texas Coach Darrell Royal, whose team finished with an 8-3 record and will play Auburn in the Gator Bowl. "If we had lost it would have been a disastrous season. Now it is an acceptable one."

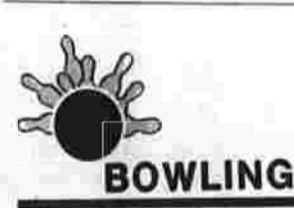

The Blazers' heroes were not yet over, however, as the Southern drove downfield and Bob Eiter tried a 40-yard field goal with time expiring.

Ex-Boxing Champ Succumbs at 68

NORTH BERGEN, N.J. (UPI) — James J. Braddock, whose rise from the depths of despair to the heavyweight championship in 1935 earned him the title of boxing's "Cinderella Man," died at his home Friday, just one week shy of his 69th birthday.

The irrepressible Irishman, one of the most popular boxers of his era, apparently passed away in his sleep from natural causes. Police said they received a call from Mrs. Braddock about noon, saying she was unable to wake her husband.

His survivors include his wife, Mae; two sons, Howard and Jay; a daughter, Rose Marie DeWitt; four brothers and six grandchildren. Funeral services will be held Tuesday, Dec. 3, at Clifside Park, N.J.

A member of boxing's Hall of Fame, Braddock, born in New York City on Dec. 6, 1905, fought 85 professional bouts during his 17-year career, winning 51, including 26 by knockout. His most famous victory came on June 13, 1935, at the Long Island Bowl when he went into the ring a 10-1 underdog and dethroned Max Baer in 15 rounds for the world championship. That victory still ranks as the biggest upset in heavyweight championship history.

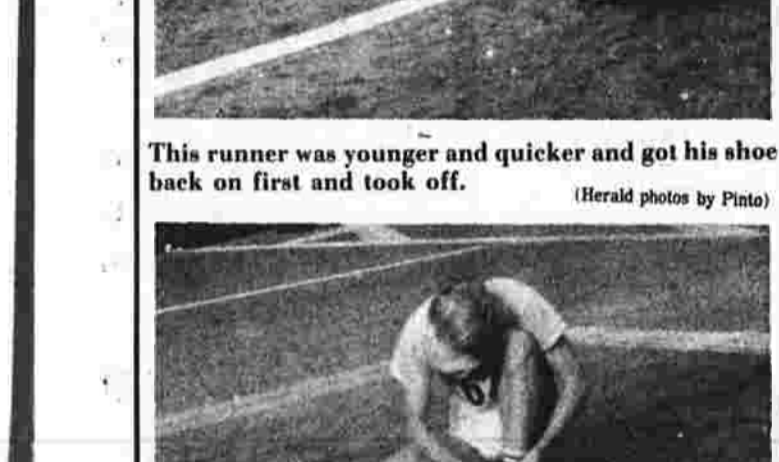
