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Winds, Rains Disrupt Electrical Services

High winds and heavy rains came to Connecticut this morning, disrupting electrical service for more than 5,500 homes and businesses in the Manchester-Bolton area.

Power lines came down with tree branches in several Manchester locations. Two schools — Manchester High School and Assumption Junior High School — were closed today because of morning power failures.

The National Weather Service at Bradley International Airport clocked winds at 33 miles an hour this morning, and measured more than an inch of rain by 10 a.m.

Sleet Expected

The rain was expected to mix with sleet and freezing rain this afternoon, and then

taper off to snow flurries tonight. Winds, forecast at 30 to 40 m.p.h. throughout the day, were to diminish to 15 to 20 m.p.h. tonight. The outlook for Tuesday is mostly cloudy with a chance of snow flurries.

Charles Hoffman, Manchester manager of the Hartford Electric Light Co. (HELCO), said three major power outages affected approximately 5,675 customers in Manchester and Bolton this morning.

The last of the stricken areas had power restored by 10:30 a.m., Hoffman said, except for a few scattered areas hit by minor outages.

First at 6:26 A.M.

The first reported blackout occurred at 6:26 a.m., when wires came down at Highland St. and Carriage Dr., causing problems at HELCO's Hartford Rd. substation, Hoffman said. That outage,

affecting about 2,200 customers in the eastern Manchester and Bolton area, was corrected by 10:20 a.m.

The second failure listed by Hoffman occurred at 6:53 a.m. when a tree hit power lines in the Buckland area. About 2,200 customers throughout the North End were without electricity until 8:25 a.m.

The other major blackout occurred at 7:36 a.m., Hoffman said, when downed wires disrupted service to about 1,275 customers on W. Middle Tpke., Broad and Center Sts. The area was partially restored at 8:35 a.m., he said, and fully restored by 9:35 a.m.

Schools Affected

Several Town of Manchester schools were affected by the power failures,

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Winter Storm Hits Major Part of Nation

A second day of snow, fierce winds and driving rain lashed the nation today following stormy weather that snarled highways, stranded motorists and left many homeless.

More than 15 inches of snow smothered southeastern Michigan, and 13 inches of snow clogged Ohio.

The storm, extending from southern Michigan into the Appalachians, forced cancellation of professional hockey games

in Detroit and Cleveland and the closing of airports for several hours in both cities. Many Michigan and Ohio schools were closed today.

"People trying to enter Michigan are being stranded in their cars or put in farmhouses and schools," Lt. David Furiate, of the Ohio Turnpike Patrol, said. "We are urging them to get off at the nearest exit and seek their own accommodations."

Sixty mile-an-hour winds canceled several flights from National Airport outside the Washington, D.C., area and knocked out power in some areas.

Gale force winds battered the Atlantic Coast, triggering flooding and beach erosion. Rains prompted flash flood warning for the Virginias and Maryland.

Trial Delay Sought For Nixon Testimony

WASHINGTON (UPI) — John D. Ehrlichman's lawyer today asked the court to excuse the Watergate cover-up jury over the Christmas holidays to await testimony from former President Richard M. Nixon early next year.

The prosecution called the proposal "unrealistic."

Attorney William S. Frates made the proposal with the jury, which has been sequestered for two months, out of the room. U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica declined to rule immediately on the request and asked the prosecution to reply in writing by Wednesday.

Nixon Testimony Needed

Referring to Ehrlichman's subpoena of Nixon, Frates said that "to conclude this trial without the direct examination or cross-examination—certainly direct participation—would leave really a big hole in this case."



92 Persons Killed

Flight Recorders Found In Air Crash Wreckage

UPPERVILLE, Va. (UPI) — Search parties digging through a two-inch overnight snowfall today found the flight recorders they hoped would provide a clue to what caused a Trans World Airlines jet to crash Sunday killing 92 persons.

The search for bodies in the worst domestic air disaster of the year resumed at 6:30 a.m. today in the mountains 20 miles west of Dulles International Airport.

Thomas Kunkel, FBI special agent who is coordinating the body search, said at least 80 bodies had been removed from the mountain by four hours later.

Both Recorders Intact

Bill Weston, of the National Transportation Safety Board which investigates domestic air crashes, said both flight recorders were found intact.

"The flight recorder located in the tail section will tell us the altitude, air speed, heading, and G's (gravity pull)," said T.R. O'Brien, a Safety Board spokesman. "The flight recorder in the nose will hopefully have the last 30 minutes of conversation between the crew and the Dulles tower."

Officials hoped the recorders could help solve the mystery of why the Boeing 727

went down on a landing approach to Dulles, where it had been diverted from Washington's National Airport because of severe winds and heavy rain.

Inaugural Flight

The airliner, on an inaugural flight from Indianapolis, Ind., to Washington via Columbus, Ohio, ripped through the trees, hit a six-foot rock outcropping and exploded. The scene is about a mile from a tightly secured government relocation center on Mt. Weather, part of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

An air freight truck was at the crash site collecting the remains of baggage and clothing that belonged to the passengers and crew. Shoes, purses, brief cases and a pair of red pajama bottoms were visible.

300 Work on Rescue

An estimated 300 rescue workers,

firemen and police from nearby towns were involved in recovering the bodies. The bodies were taken to the makeshift morgue in Bluemont, Va. Many bodies were lying under black tarpulins beside the road.

"Hopefully we'll get all the bodies recovered today although the snow has hampered the recovery operation," Kunkel said. "It's very difficult. We are finding bodies today that we overlooked yesterday."

"There were absolutely no survivors and it will be difficult to identify many of the remains because of their condition," said Dr. George Hocker, the Loudoun County medical officer.

Impact Severe

The impact of the crash was so severe many bodies were unrecognizable, making positive identification a drawn-out task.

Charter Jet Crashes Killing Crewmen

HAVERSTRAW, N.Y. (UPI) — A Northwest Airlines Boeing 727 chartered flight on its way to pick up the Baltimore Colts football team crashed in eastern New York State Sunday night, killing three persons.

There were no passengers aboard. The victims were crew members.

Second 727 Crash

It was the second Boeing 727 jetliner to crash during the day. The other crash, a Trans World Airlines flight from the Midwest to Washington, killed 92 persons and left no survivors.

The Northwest jet was a chartered flight en route from New York City to Buffalo, N.Y., to pick up the Colts football players and fly them back to Baltimore. The plane crashed in Harriman State Park about 30 miles north of New York City.

'Mayday' Message Heard

It went down shortly after taking off from New York's Kennedy Airport. State Police said the pilot's "Mayday" was heard at Westchester County Airport Control Tower about 12 minutes after it took off.

A Coast Guard reserve officer participating in the rescue team, said, "It looked like to me the plane came down almost vertical. It hit at about an 80 degree angle." He said the debris was "not scattered too much, just in one area."

No Explosion

Police said today there was no explosion or fire when the plane crashed, but there was "a strong smell of fuel."

The plane plunged in a heavily wooded swampland area on a 1,200-foot hill. Rescue teams had difficulty getting to the crash site and were hampered by strong winds, freezing cold and wet snow mixed with ice and rain.

A spokesman for the Colts in Buffalo said that the plane was sent from New York City because the team's original flight originating in Detroit was grounded by a heavy snowstorm.

Crew Identified

Two of crewmen were identified as Capt. John B. Lagario, 35, the pilot who worked for Northwest for eight years, of Edina, Minn., a suburb of Minneapolis, and second officer James F. Cox, Jr., 33, of Seattle, Wash., a five-year-veteran pilot. The third crew member, the copilot, was identified as Walter A. Zadra, 34, of Seattle, Wash. He had been with Northwest for 8 years.

Cable TV Films On Sex Criticized

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — A Roman Catholic priest has criticized the showing of sexually explicit films on cable television.

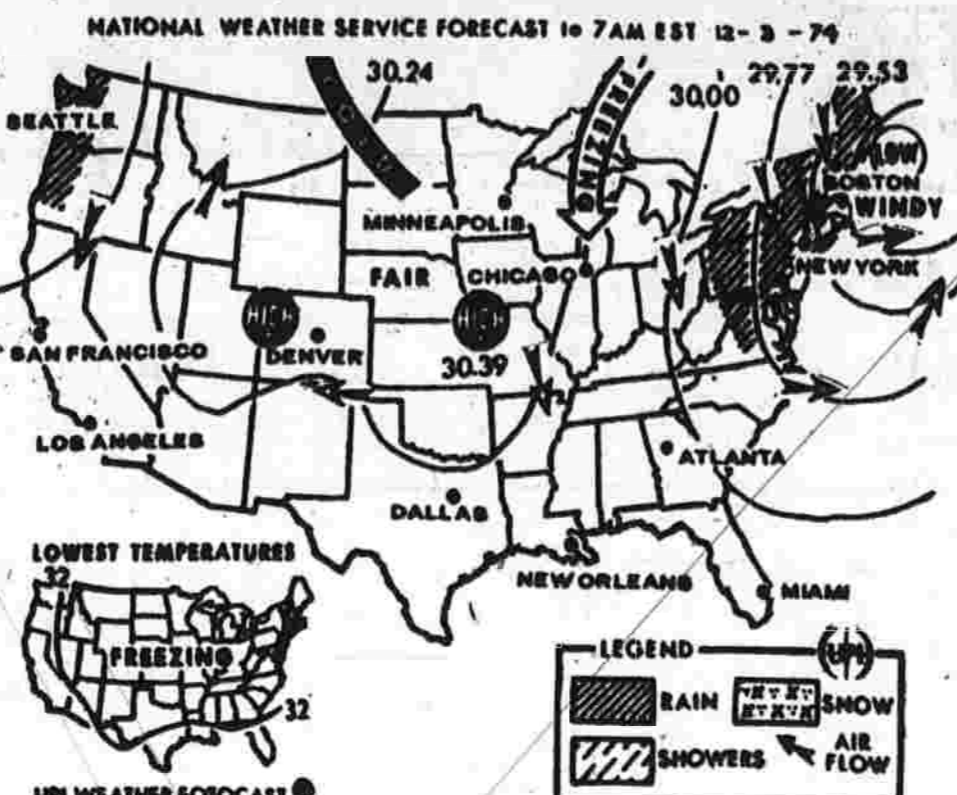
The Rev. George Byrne says in an article in the January, 1975, edition of Columbia, the Knights of Columbus monthly magazine, that he was basing his criticism on news accounts of "certain programs featuring aberrant sexuality."

Byrne, assistant secretary for film and broadcasting in the United States Catholic Conference, said one program showed a nude TV serviceman cavorting with the couple whose TV set he was supposed to fix. Another showed a woman undressing as someone recited poetry.

He said under Federal Communications Commission regulations, all cable television programs are subject to obscenity laws.

Cable television stations are required by law to make at least one of their channels open for public use, he said, urging Catholics to use them for religious programming.

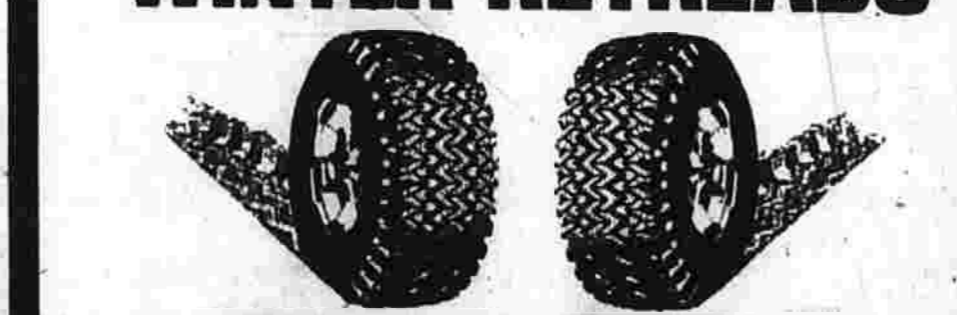

Tax Saving Opportunities In Standard Mileage Rate

Squared against high gasoline prices, the standard mileage rate for deduction of expenses incurred in the use of a personal car for business opens up a big opportunity to save taxes, according to Commerce Clearing House (CCH).

What's more, the recent increase in the rate from 12 to 15 cents per mile for the first 15,000 business miles during the year creates still another operating an automobile for business purposes in which a per-mile allowance takes the place of separately calculated expenditures for gasoline, oil, repairs, depreciation, license tags, and other similar costs aside from parking, toll and parking charges may be deducted separately.

First, in the matter of depreciation, an automobile used in business might be depreciated down to its salvage value, as separate costs are deducted for gasoline, oil, repairs, etc. Then, when the automobile is no longer depreciable, the standard mileage rate might be used for further business miles.

There is no prohibition against this in the IRS ruling approving use of the standard rate; the only caution is that the standard-rate may not be used where depreciation on an automobile has been claimed, CCH said.

As for the second potential tax saving, it's possible that some employees may be reimbursed by their employers for automobile expenses, but at a rate of less than 15 cents per mile. In such a case, use of the standard 15 cents-per-mile allowance not only can offset any reimbursement received but, also, can result in an employee's winding up with additional deduction.

Example: Brian McMahon drives his automobile 21,000 miles during the taxable year on business-connected activity. His expenses average out at 12 cents per mile, and he is reimbursed by his employer at this figure. On the basis of 21,000 miles driven, McMahon receives reimbursement of \$2,520.

On his income tax return, however, he uses the standard mileage rate approved by the IRS and takes a deduction of \$3,150 (15,000 miles at 15 cents plus 6,000 miles at 10 cents). After setting off the reimbursement of \$2,520, Brian has an additional deduction of \$330.

In claiming a deduction for the business use of an automobile, the maintaining of adequate records is essential. While the standard mileage rate has done away with the need for keeping many individual receipts, slips, chits, and other types of documents, it has not dispensed with the preliminary requisite of recording the actual number of miles driven and the business purpose of the travel, CCH said.

For a center to qualify, 20 per cent of his rent and utility costs in 1973 must exceed five per cent of his 1973 adjusted gross income. Elderly renters in subsidized housing may apply for circuit-breaker tax relief.

Elderly renters who qualify for this tax relief will get a check from the state for a portion of the total amount paid in 1973 for rent and utilities (heat, electricity, gas and water).

Applicants should bring to their assessor's office proof of their 1973 income and what they paid for rent and utilities in 1973.

Ford Enhances Image Abroad

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford has enhanced his position in the White House as a result of his first successful adventure into global diplomacy.

The whole question of his ability to handle foreign affairs has been open since the moment President Aug. 3 with the resignation of Richard M. Nixon. As a congressman from Grand Rapids, Mich., Ford had never been concerned with domestic problems.

But in the White House, he wanted to quickly establish his credentials in the field of statesmanship, which Americans have come to expect of presidents since World War II.

Ford also was following in the footsteps of Nixon, who paved the way for an era of détente and set the stage for summit agreements to limit the nuclear arms race.

Ford's two-day Siberian summit meeting with Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev resulted in a tentative agreement to limit, and later perhaps to reduce, nuclear arsenals in the next decade.

The triumph seems greater because there was no advance buildup that such an agreement was possible at this time. But now Kissinger's diplomatic fact, Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger told reporters in Vladivostok, "We didn't come here to make an agreement. We were not going to make an agreement here."

The summit was viewed as a get-acquainted session with Ford getting his feet wet in personal diplomacy. The fact that much more was achieved adds to his laurels, although it is clear that this was the moment that both sides wanted to see made even though Nixon was hampered by his being a lame duck president, a point he makes even though Nixon won election by a landslide and had nearly two and a half years more to go in the presidency.

Kissinger is now like a proud professor when he speaks of Ford. He told reporters Ford was "tough and unflappable."

Kissinger also said that Soviet planners would have to consider Ford as a "six-year phenomenon" because he is running for the presidency and in his century only one incumbent, Herbert Hoover, has lost when running for re-election.

Ford soon will make another foreign trip, this time to Martigny to meet French President Valéry Giscard d'Estaing in an attempt to heal the differences between the United States and France.

It is doubtful that Ford will be encouraged to make as many trips abroad as Nixon did, because the nation's economy is in dire straits and begging for a solution.

But the two foreign journeys are bound to broaden Ford's image when he runs for a full term in the White House in 1976.

More Women Seek MBAs At UConn

HARTFORD (UPI) — A student in the program says new job opportunities are responsible for a doubling of the number of women in the University of Connecticut's Master of Business Administration program in the past year.

This fall there are 47 women enrolled in the program at the Hartford campus, compared to 24 last year at a student body of 221, said Ted Torrey, a second-year student active in the program's women's advisory group.

"She attributed the increase to the Equal Rights Amendment approved by Congress in 1971. This has opened up equal job opportunities for women and has motivated them to try for the payoff," she said.

While the MBA programs at Storrs and Stamford also have shown increases in female enrollment, the rise has not been as dramatic as in the Hartford campus.

"A lot of women are interested in management careers, but they don't know what they are getting into," Ms. Torrey said. "We, as women, have to talk to women on the outside and answer their questions, in a way that admissions officers for instance can act on."

She said, because women often feel embarrassed about appearing unsure of their aspirations in front of male school officials, she has begun to pass on their application.

Pope Awards Peace Prize To UNESCO

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul VI awarded the \$40,000 John XXIII International Peace Prize Saturday to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

The Pope described UNESCO and the Roman Catholic Church as two bodies meeting "on the road to peace."

"Each traveling its respective path, we find ourselves here, almost at a point of convergence, to celebrate together this highest ideal that appears more and more as a beacon of orientation for society — peace," the Pope said at a Vatican ceremony attended by retiring UNESCO director René Mahu and his successor, Mahou M'bow of Senegal.

It was the second time the Vatican has awarded the prize established with funds from the 1960-61 Balzan Peace Prize presented to the late Pope John in 1963. It went first in 1970 to Mother Teresa Boyzhin for her work in charity.

In announcing the recommendation of the John XXIII International Peace Prize Foundation, Vatican secretary of State Cardinal Jean Villot noted that the late Pope had served as the Holy See's observer at UNESCO and had strongly supported the establishment of the United Nations.

Shopkeeper Lives In 19th Century

The Maine Department of Commerce and Industry, which dreamed it up, thinks the "Me" gimmick is a good way to promote the pleasures and beauties of the state. The DCI will even help businessmen think up new twists on the theme to help sell their wares.

"Doesn't Olson have anything better to do with his time?" a DCI staffer asked.

"When you cross the bridge into Boston a giant billboard asks 'Are U A Me?'" Olson said. "Well I'm not and there are other people who aren't either."

Olson has recently finished mailing out 375 petitions in support of his drive to abolish "Me," which if successful will prohibit any state agency, board, commission, department, council, authority or institution from using the abbreviated form of the word "Maine."

Olson needs 37,500 signatures—one-tenth the vote in the recent general elections—to bring a request before the 107th Maine Legislature to outlaw use of the abbreviation. He already has the editorial support of nine Maine newspapers, the unanimous backing of the Maine State Senate and promises of support from registered voters anxious to sign his petitions.

The "Maine Me" drive started over the summer when Olson criticized the DCI campaign in his magazine "Maine Life," a monthly publication for "people who love Maine."

"It's editorial offices are in Liberty, where Olson also runs an antique business from his home.

"So many people wrote in to say they agreed with me I thought I might get something started," Olson said. "Although I'm not a native Maine I love the state and the commercialization of it in this way offends me."

"So many of these 'Me' slogans are ridiculous and promote nothing more than double entendres."

Fire! It's always frightening, but even more so if a fire develops during the night, when everyone is asleep and victims are overcome by smoke or poisonous gases before flames reach them.

New home fire alarm systems give early warning because they are activated by smoke or fumes, rather than by heat as is the case with traditional smoke detectors.

Smoke detectors use an electric eye; alarm is set off when smoke cuts down the amount of light reaching the photoelectric cell. But insects can set it off, too.

Ionization-chamber type detectors give earliest warning of all, while fire is still in its incipient stages. They are activated by the first products of combustion, the microscopic particles that matter gives off before flames are even visible.

Early warning detectors are available either battery-powered, or run on household current. Be sure they are fully approved. Favor those for units area or near ceilings in an attic, and not near a door, or at such as stairway.

On Restoring Confidence

One of the more overworked words these days is confidence.

We are asked to have confidence in the White House, the Congress, the economy and in the American way of doing things.

Overlooked, we suspect, is the fact that confidence is not a one-sided arrangement. There has to be a reason for one to have confidence in another and conversely, for one to lose confidence in another.

Merely appealing for public confidence in government, or in business, or in our leadership, is not enough. The government, business community, and our leaders, must perform in such a way that there is something upon which we can justify our confidence.

How can we put confidence in administration plans to fight inflation when within hours of any administration proposal, the plans are criticized by opponents?

The critics rarely inspire confidence either, they rarely offer alternatives and when they do, the alter-

natives become a springboard for debate.

Business leaders are quick to blame the lack of consumer confidence in the economy for declining sales. They seem to ignore the consumer has had his confidence severely tested by many products which continually cost more but perform less.

We recognize that a lot of the criticism about government, business and our leaders is unwarranted and unjustified, but the tragedy is that there are enough proven cases of bad government mistakes, business chicanery, and leadership immorality to test the confidence of each of us most sorely at times.

The question before us is not who lacks confidence in who but whether we are going to continue to talk about confidence instead of working toward re-establishing confidence between the people and government, business and leaders.

Putting it quite simply, confidence must be earned by actions which inspire confidence.

Presidential Limitations

We sympathize with President Gerald Ford. His every act seems to make someone unhappy or voice concern that he may not be big enough for the job.

But these critics are a bit unfair, we believe, because President Ford sits in the White House under a peculiar set of circumstances which have a restricting effect on what he can do as President.

His 25-year congressional background tempers his approach to problems at hand in the terms of what Congress will or will not accept.

As the nation's first non-elected President, he has no national mandate nor does he have a duly-recorded national constituency to whom he can appeal over the heads of Congress.

And finally, as a Republican, this lack of a national constituency is even more limited since Congress is overwhelmingly Democratic in composition.

Thus the President has the highest office in the world but his exercise of that authority is muted by the reality that he is of the minority party and his ascendancy to the office lacks the clot inherent to the winner of a national election.

His predecessors could influence and at times even intimidate the Congress with their election mandates. His predecessors could appeal to the electorate as a whole to rally against an errant or obstructive Congress.

His predecessors, because they

Renter Files Complaint, New Furnace Promised

After two years of requests and a formal complaint to the building inspector, Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Gardiner of Oak Trail, Fine Lake Shores have received authorization to have a new furnace and chimney installed in the house they rent from the Farmers Home Administration.

Mrs. Betty Gardiner said early this week that she was worried that her two children, Ronnie, age 4 and Keith age 3, would get bad lungs from smoke and soot the furnace was backing into the house.

Mrs. Gardiner said, "When we moved in two years ago, a repairsman came to get the furnace going. He told us that the furnace shouldn't be in the closet, and I then asked John Slate, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, to fix and replace it. The furnace started smoking and backing soot into the house about two months ago. I told Slate about the problem and he told us to get an estimate to have a new one installed. We sent him two estimates and didn't hear from him any more."

The Gardiners said that they had been having trouble with the furnace since last winter when a transformer blew out, and Woodrow Gardiner lost three days of work just trying to keep the house warm.

The Gardiners said that they hadn't paid their rent for two months because the house was almost unlivable with the soot. Building Inspector John Willnaeur said he had tried to contact Slate for two days last week and couldn't reach him.

"I told his secretary that they had best get down here and do something about that furnace on Friday," Mrs. Gardiner said.

The house was originally a summer cottage that was converted about five years ago. The first floor has two bedrooms and a living room. What was once the basement has been converted to a kitchen and a bathroom. The furnace is installed in a closet in the bathroom.

The Gardiners said that they haven't moved because they couldn't afford to pay a large amount for rent and couldn't find anything else to rent in that same price range of \$105 per month.

don't believe the Gardiners mentioned the furnace problem and I can't see putting money into a property that we are leasing out. I will have to go to the state office to get their permission to fix the furnace. I don't know what their feelings are on the people being late on their rent.

About three hours later Slate called the Gardiners and informed them that he had the authorization to have the furnace replaced.

Mrs. Gardiner said, "we want to buy a house through Farmers Home Administration and Slate told us that he wouldn't let us purchase any home other than this one under Farmers."

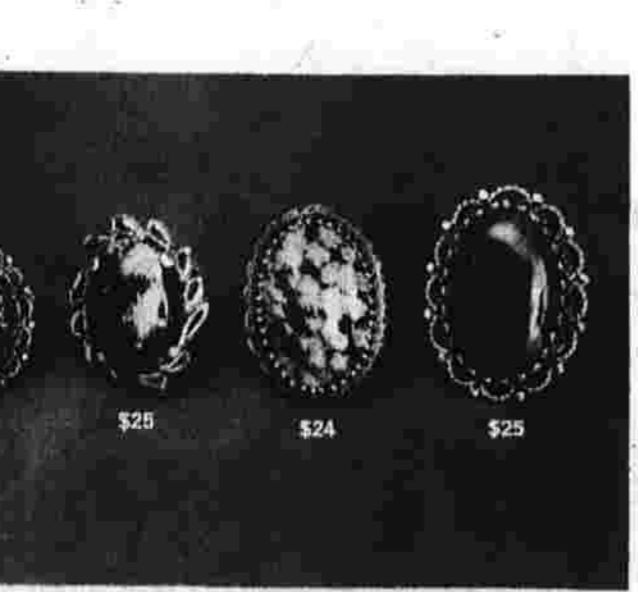

Democrats Chide Joslin Over Budget Forecast

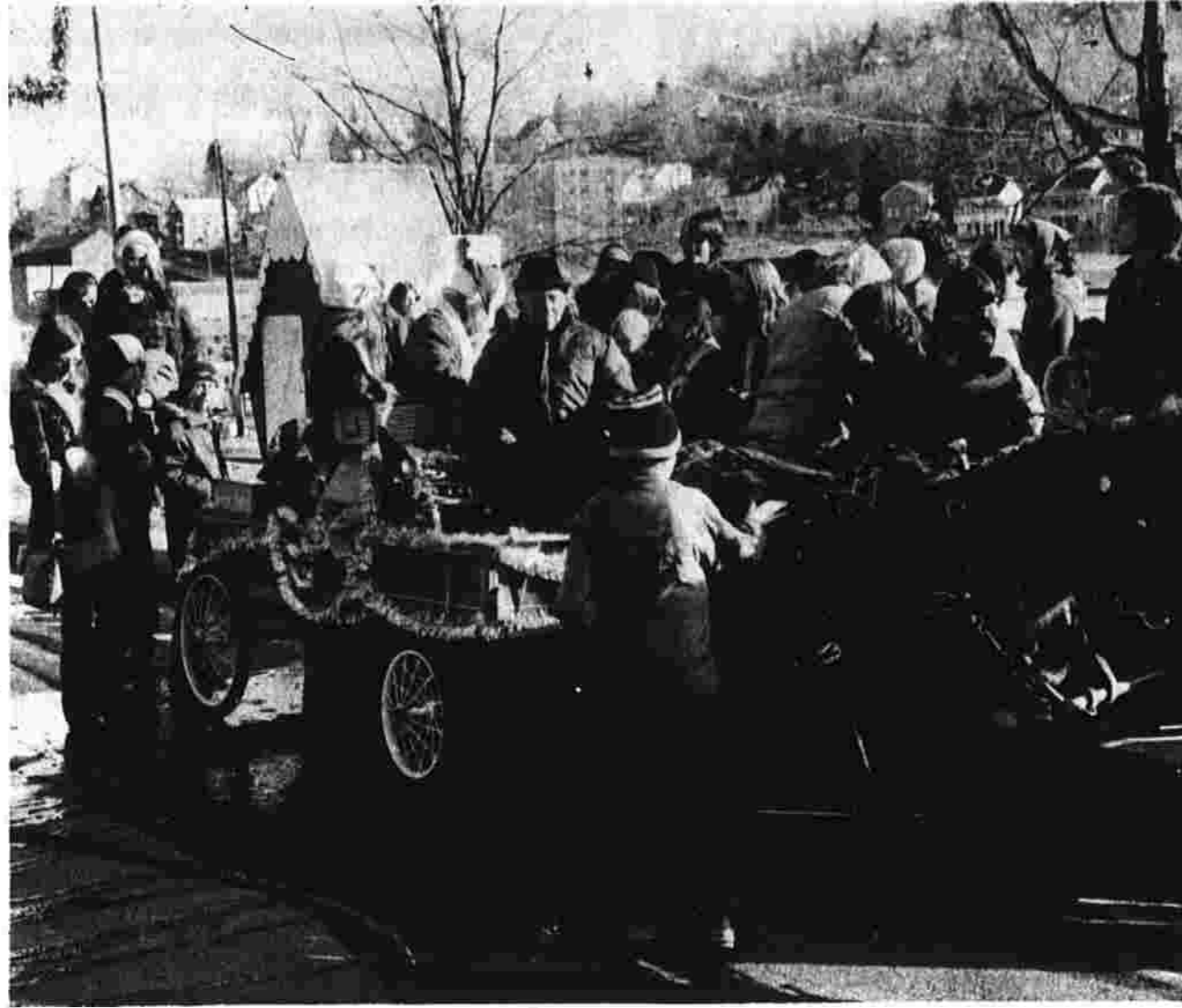
The Democratic Town Committee released Sunday a resolution drawing attention to a series of actions, statements and forecasts concerning the town budget for fiscal 1975.

"In the wake of threatened cancellation of the spring sports schedule due to insufficient funds, the outcome of the stormy annual budget meeting and the statements of (selectman) Stuart Joslin that swayed the meeting in favor of adopting an undersized budget are reviewed.

"Joslin had publicly forecast a surplus for the end of fiscal 1974 amounting to \$165,000, in direct contradiction to the estimate of Town Manager, John Harkins. He (Joslin) repeated his forecast at the meeting, where it appeared that forces seeking to force a referendum were about to carry the day.

"Confidently explaining his close working knowledge of the budgeting system, Joslin swayed the meeting to believe that a combination of the projected surplus and a pledge to set the mill rate as if the surplus were not available would result in the availability of sufficient extra funds to placate the supporters of a higher education budget and a fire truck.

"Asked if he would resign if the surplus did not appear, Joslin stated, 'I will stake my reputation on it. The auditors came and went, and the \$165,000 surplus did not appear. The difference involved the use of a change in accounting practices, resulting in a final surplus of \$19,000. Had the old method been used, a surplus of \$70,000 might have been available. Some of these amounts is enough to satisfy the proponents of the fire truck and the added education items.

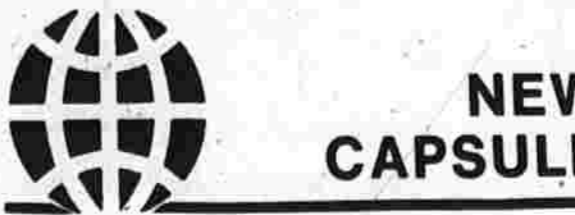

Hijacking Thwarted

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Victory-Starved Bears Add to Giant Miseries

CHICAGO (UPI) — Coach Abe Giron said six weeks ago there was "no way" his Chicago Bears could lose six straight games, and it took 30 minutes of shutout football by his defense and a 24-yard field goal by Mirro Roder with 36 seconds to play to prove him right.

The Bears carried a five-game losing streak into Sunday's game with the New York Giants. Though the Bears scored twice in the first period, they had only a 12-13 yard Roder's game-winning kick. It was the third straight game in which the Giants and New York's fourth straight defeat.

But Roder would have had no chance to win had not the defense made good on its halftime promise to Giron.

"We'll shut them out the rest of the way," defensive captain Doug Buffone told him. Buffone said it wasn't his idea but "a mutual thing" that they could hold the Giants scoreless.

In fact, the defense held the Giants inside their own 10-yard line in the last half until after Roder's game-winning kick. He had been set up to try an earlier field goal of 18 yards, but Norm Hodgins fumbled the snap from center Rich Coady, preventing the kick, and his desperation pass was no good.

The Bears' mistakes cost them two touchdowns, once when Perry Williams fumbled and lost the ball on a first down plunge from the Giants' two and the second time when Randy Montgomery intercepted a Craig Morton pass and went 64 yards for a score, only to have the play called back because of a clip by Gary Rivrnik.

For the first time this season, veteran quarterback Bobby Douglass started and went the whole game, running more than he passed. He went a yard for a touchdown and gained 66 yards in 16 carries while completing five of 12 passes for 73 yards.

"The weather changed our style of play," he said. "It's tough on anybody moving the ball on a day like this, and if you're a runner, you're not running as recklessly. The wind was worse than the rain for the passing game. We were using the double wing 50 to 60 per cent of the time."

Giron called for the double wing because of the 20-mile per hour wind plus the rain and snow flurries. He

said a 14-yard pass to right end Fred Page, which set up the winning field goal, came on "a play we had saved."

"We were going to let the clock move to 12 seconds before kicking the field goal, but New York called the final time out and we had to go sooner," he said. "There was no way I wasn't going to take three points. Roder hasn't missed one from there since I can remember. We played a lot better than the score."

The 35-degree temperature and the sloppy field conditions resulted in 10 fumbles, five by each team.

"We didn't get anything going in the second half and that's about all there is to it," Giants' Coach Bill Arnsparger said.

The weather resulted in 36,951 on-shows. Only 18,802 showed up for the contest.

AIC Back Gets Cited

BOSTON (UPI) — AIC quarterback Jim Reidy, an accomplished cartoonist, could draw a swell picture of the UPI New England college division player of the year.

John Provost New England Top Gragger

BOSTON (UPI) — If actions speak louder than words, then John Provost is the nation's most talented young man in New England.

The 5-10, 175-pound senior safety from Holy Cross and Quincy attracted the attention of New England coaches because of his defensive and punt-returning skills.

And the coaches, by way of the UPI poll, responded by naming the mustached interloper as the region's major college player of the year.

So what did he do that turned the coaches' heads? He intercepted a New England record-tying 10 passes this season to lead the nation in that category. He also had an 18.3 yard average on 13 punt returns.

The red-haired economics major picked off four of those passes and returned punts for 65 and 59 yard touchdowns in the Crusaders' opening win over Brown.

John's father, a shipyard worker, bred just one son among his seven children. But the one made much his mark, shifting from running back at Quincy High School ("I wasn't that good a runner") to defensive back when he reached Worcester.

In his college career, he scored six touchdowns, four on punt returns and two on interceptions, and earned the praise of his coaches and opponents. "He always seems to be where the ball is," said Holy Cross coach Ed Doherty and many others. "That's what makes him such a good safety."

"John has real good hands and good moves. I think the pros might be interested in him—maybe not as a defensive back because of his size, but as a wide receiver."

What Provost is receiving now is honors. In addition to receiving the UPI award, Provost has been selected to play in the East-West Shrine game, Dec. 21, in San Francisco and the All-American Bowl in Tampa, Fla., Jan. 6.

Provost was to receive his UPI Player of the Year plaque and Awards banquet at Fantasia's Restaurant in Cambridge.

Routine Performance For Stabler, Raiders

OAKLAND (UPI) — It was another routine game for Ken Stabler and another routine victory for the Oakland Raiders.

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Worst Team in NFL? No Longer the Jets

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Jets dissected the San Diego Chargers Sunday, one could hardly believe this was the same team that just a month ago had lost seven of eight games and was being ridiculed as the worst team in the National Football League.

The Jets, with Joe Namath passing through 50 mile per hour gusts as if on a balmy summer day and John Riggins blasting through the line like a wounded elephant, roared to a 24-0 halftime lead and beat the Chargers 27-14.

It was the Jets' fourth consecutive victory, their longest winning streak since they reigned as World Champions in 1969, and lifted them to 5-7. San Diego dropped to 3-9.

Namath completed 17-of-27 passes for 254 yards, including a five-yard touchdown pass to Riggins, in three quarters of action and set up scoring runs of three and two yards by Riggins. Rookie Pat Leahy added field goals of 20 and 45 yards.

marched up and down the field. New York's defense held San Diego scoreless until the final quarter, when rookie whiz Don Woods threw a 27-yard hback option pass to Gary Garrison

for one score and ran four yards for another. Woods finished with 142 yards rushing, but much of it came after the game was out of reach.

"We felt like we could throw on them," said Namath, who teamed with tight end Richard Caster on seven passes for 137 yards.

"Our running game was going good, too, so we could mix it up pretty well. The wind was strange—it changed a lot—but it wasn't that bad. I've seen it a lot worse here."

Namath agreed. "It was a time to let down and we didn't," he said. "We had bad practices early in the week. We weren't concentrating. But late in the week we realized we just couldn't let them get on top. We figured if we could get up on top against them with a rookie quarterback playing, we'd give them trouble."

The rookie quarterback was Jesse Freitas, making his first pro start after Dan Fouts, suffered a broken bone in his hand last week.

Freitas was able to generate only three first downs in the first half; two in the last minute, and had all sorts of problems with the wind.

Charger Coach Tommy Prothro was impressed with Namath's performance.

"I don't usually notice the other team," he said, "but you can't help notice Namath. He had some good receptions help him out, too, and their defense just took the ball away from us."

And Prothro, who fined three players and suspended veteran running back Ed Edwards earlier in the week, wasn't particularly pleased with his club.

"I know they don't feel like they quit," he said, "but they sure didn't have the emotion they should have had."

Though happy with the winning streak and the team's turnaround, Namath wasn't about to overestimate the Jets.

"We're getting better," he explained. "We're still not a good team—we're 5-7 and that can't be good. But we're improving. I don't know if the potential is there for a championship team. I know we need some help at some positions. But we do have some outstanding material."

Rookie tackle Carl Barzilauskas turned in his fourth straight impressive performance in anchoring the J defense.

Anthony Davis, who single-handedly beat the Irish two years ago by scoring six touchdowns, had USC's first on Saturday including the 102-yard kickoff return that ignited a 35-point third quarter—the worst quarter in ND's proud history.

168,000 No Shows in NFL, Cards, Vikings in Playoffs

NEW YORK (UPI) — The last month of National Football League regular season play began Sunday with ice, snow, rain, freezing winds, about 168,000 no-shows, and for St. Louis and Minnesota, the warming assurance that they've clinched playoff berths.

Not since the winter of 1948 has the St. Louis Cardinals participated in post-season play and Sunday they backed into a berth despite losing, 17-13, to Kansas City, when Philadelphia defeated Green Bay, 36-14. The Cards, 9-3, and leading Washington by a game in the NFC East, were assured of at least a wild-card playoff spot as the team with the best intra-divisional record.

Minnesota's 29-9 triumph over the New Orleans Saints gave the Vikings the NFC's Central Division championship. Los Angeles clinched the AFC West last weekend.

Oakland, which clinched the AFC West two weeks ago, seriously damaged New England's chances of a playoff spot by beating the Patriots, 41-26. The Pats' competition for the AFC wild card berth, Miami and Cincinnati, will square off against each other tonight on national television. Pittsburgh, which was upset 13-10, by Houston, still claims a slim lead over the Bengals in the AFC Central Division.

The harsh weather on the first day of December kept attendance down around the league, especially at three "meaningless" games where no playoff positions could be affected. In a contest between two last-place teams, Chicago beat the New York Giants, 16-13, in Los Angeles. Rams battered the Falcons, 30-7, in Atlanta and in Cleveland the Browns edged San Francisco, 7-0.

Attendance was down, though, even at the "important" games. Only at Oakland and Buffalo were the stadiums filled. Playing in mere 29-degree weather against gusty winds, the Bills scored a 6-0 victory over Baltimore while 79,540 watched in relative comfort.

All together, just over 168,000 ticket holders skipped Sunday's games while about 410,000 bundled up and took their seats.

At about 9 a.m., emergency lighting at MHS began to fade, Kennedy said, and the decision was made to cancel classes there and at Illing. Shortly after the decision was made, power was restored, but students had already left MHS. Most Illing students were still at the building, so classes were resumed there.

Assumption Junior High School on S. Adams St. was the only parochial school in Manchester affected by the power outages, and classes there were canceled at about 9 a.m.

Howell Cheney Regional Technical School in Manchester wasn't affected by the storm.

Street Flooding

The Town Highway Department reported scattered street flooding of a minor nature, apparently caused by leaves plugging catch basins. Highway Supt. John Burchill said inclement weather and other problems forced his department to fall behind in its leaf collection program, which was to be finished last week.

Thompson Opposes Off-Track Parlor

Off-track betting parlors, either mini-track or branch office, won't be considered by the Manchester Board of Directors,

on a recommendation by Mayor John Thompson.

"It is my personal judgment," said Thompson in a memo to the directors dated Nov. 22, "that neither facility would be a welcome addition to Manchester."

He said the mini-track, while it may have certain attractive features, such as new revenue, would detract from the public image of a self-sufficient and socially aggressive community.

The branch office, he explained, could present hidden public costs.

Thompson said that "Not a single citizen has commented to me on these proposals," explained to the Board of directors at its Nov. 12 meeting by the executive director of the state's Off-Track Betting Division.

"Unless I hear to the contrary from any director," said Thompson in his memo, "the proposal will not appear on a Board of Directors' agenda."

Establishment of a mini-track or branch office in Manchester would require the approval of the Board of directors, and only after a public hearing called specifically for that purpose.
