"I think we're going to be in good shape," said Chris Hemmeter, the WFL's newly elected president. "I feel we have made a very positive forward step today."

Hemmeter was officially named president of the financially troubled league - reputed to have lost \$20 million in its first year - by an almost unanimous vote Friday and his Hemmeter Plan for reorganizing the league was approved by all owners present, with one abstention. Hemmeter denied reports that the Friday session was a stormy one,

saying that there was general agreement on the major issues. The Hemmeter Plan, approved by the league's Board of Governors, calls

for the revolutionary concept of making the players and coaches on the WFL teams part owners of their respective franchises. Highlights of the plan call for minimal exposure to financial loss and risk and optimize financial stability. The six assumptions of the

\$1.8 million in net revenues from ticket sales and \$200,000 in local radio, minimized: A WFL franchise can operate sucessfully in a 40,000-seat stadium; · A WFL franchise can operate successfully with a \$700,000 equity investment; · And, that there be absolute

assurance that all players, coaches and coaching staff payroll, including payroll taxes and benefits, be paid in accordance with contractual terms and all league travel and group medical and life insurance be prepaid prior to the commencement of each

The key provision, according to Hemmeter, is the setup of an escrow account prior to the season. Any individual player could be given a flat fee as a bonus for signing with the club and this would go into escrow before the first game of the season. "That's the beauty of the plan,"

Hemmeter said. "This way the player is ensured of getting his money before he plays a game." If this plan had been in effect when the league was first formed, the Jacksonville and Detroit franchises would never have been allowed in the league because they would not have





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
