Jewish Remnant In Egypt Visited

old and seemed a "dying" community. The trip to Egypt was the first time leaders of a major American Jewish organization had visited the country since 1956. At the time of the 1956 Arab-Israeli war, there were 80,000 Jews in Egypt. "The Jews we encountered were us wherever we went," Schindler said. The decline of the Egyptian Jewish com munity was brought home to the delega-

tion when they were shown in Alexandria the part of the synagogue where births, marriages and deaths were recorded. "In 20 years we have no children," they quoted a synagogue leader as saying. "We are, in effect dead." At the same time, however, Matthew H. Ross, chairman of he Board of the 1.1 million member Reform organization, said the Egyptian Jews appeared to be relatively well off conomically and appear to have enough money to meet their living expenses. Ross and Schindler said they gained the

impression, particularly from talking with American diplomats in Cairo, that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat has seen to it that Jews in Egypt lead a peaceful

Ross added that "I encountered in Alexandria what I never found in America: A temple president with all the money he could use." Schindler also indicated some stereotypes of the Egyptian people were



There was once a mental hospital in England named St. Mary's of Bethlehem From it came our word for "bedlam" because of the slurring of syllables and corruption of the language. Once we worshipped at the manger where "Peace on earth, gold-will to men" was proclaimed. How far the world has wandered from Bethlehem into the bedlam of war, racism, hatred, and corruption! We need now to return to Bethlehem.

At the Manger Although the nativity stories come from two sources (Matthew and Luke), for the purposes of poetry, drama, painting and omiletics the two traditions run together

Consider for a moment. Did you ever think about the barriers of society that were bridged in that manger scene? The Wise Men from the East and the Shepherds from the nearby fields portray the hope of a world where all differences are surmounted: rich and poor, educated and unlearned, artisans and scholars; differences of color, language and homeland. The nearer we come to the manger the closer we are to each other.

At this season may we leave behind the bedlam of our foolish ways and be reclothed in our rightful minds as we come to bring gifts, and worship at the

A Lavish Holiday? There are signs of wild extravagance in this year's celebration: the "21 Club" already has over 50 revelers signed up for New Year's Eve at \$125 a head; Cartier's in New York City is selling thirty \$750 watches every day; in Chicago more Cadillacs rolled out in one month than the firm sold in its entire three years of

existence. And so it goes. A man paying \$325 for a bracelet remarked: "As long as I can pay my bills, I don't care"; while a woman in Los Angeles buying a \$590 tea set admitted "I live for today, this very moment, and the future will take care of itself." (I wonder what her husband would say if his customers took the same attitude. He sells

One businessman remarked, "People suspect this may be their last lavish Christmas." (from Newsweek, 12/16) A Sparse Christmas? By contrast, some who are unemployed

and others who are hard-pressed by both recession and inflation, live without hope saying, "All is lost." Consider this com-

"It is a gloomy moment in the history of our country. Not in the lifetime of most men has there been so much grave and seemed so incalculable as at this time. The domestic economic situation is in chaos. Our dollar is weak throughout the world. Prices are so high as to be utterly

So true? So descriptive? and yet, this was written in Harper's Weekly way back in October of 1857 (Forbes 12/15/74). We have had hard times before — and often a erspective on history helps us to keep our

A Promise and a Demand "Peace on earth?" Some laugh and say,

We need not be afraid because "unto us

is born ... a Savior who is Christ the

Are met in thee tonight.'

"Where is it?" Most of us remember the angel's message to be - "Peace on earth, goodwill toward men." This sounds like an unconditional promise. The newer translations (for example, the RSV.) word the phrase - "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom He is pleased." This does not have the familiar ring or the poetic sound but it reveals a truth not apparent in the older translation. It implies that it is the "men with whom He is pleased" who will find peace - not everyone, and we please Him as we show good-will to others. Peace will come to the world through men of good-

So there comes to us at this season both God's promise and His demand that we share in His work of love. Even though we fail to achieve world peace in our time, each one may find an inner peace which comes only from Him.

A Modern Parable The Christian claims that "God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself." The Incarnation means that God revealed Himself to man in Jesus. For many this is hard to believe. Perhaps this modern parable will make it clearer: It was Christmas Eve and the snow was gently falling. A woman was preparing to leave for a midnight service but her husband refused to go with her saying, "I

can't believe or understand God coming in Jesus. It just doesn't make any sense to me, so you had better go without me." After she had left, the storm grew fiercer. Suddenly there was a thump at the window, then another, and another. Going to investigate he found that some birds had flown against it, seeking refuge from

the driving snow. The man returned to his easy chair bu could not forget the birds out in the cold, Braving the storm he threw some grain onto the snow but it was soon lost beneath the heavy flakes. How could he help them? He went out to the barn, opened the door, and scattered the grain from their frozen perch beside the window to the warmth of the stable. There he left an abundant supp

They still did not move to the shelter which would keep them alive. How could ie tell them? He rushed at them, trying to drive them out of the storm into the refuge. The birds only scattered far and wide into the cold and darkness. "If I was only a bird," he thought, "I



Judge Rules for NFL

NEW YORK (UPI) - What National Football League players lost in collective bargaining last summer they apparently have won in court. Or so it would seem, according to a ruling handed down Friday by U.S. District Judge William T. Sweigert. Sweigert, acting on a request for a summary judgment by former star NFL quarterback Joe Kapp, declared

anxious about the Rozelle Rule, which keeps a player from negotiating freely even after he has played out his contract and has become a free agent. He struck it down out of hand, which means it cannot be argued at a future Kapp signed what he called a three-

year contract for \$600,000 with the New England Patriots covering the 1970-71-72 seasons. However, after playing 11 games with the Pats in 1970, for which he received \$154,000, Rozelle discovered Kapp had not signed a standard player's contract the Pats said Kapp signed a memorandum — and ordered him to do so immediately.

Kapp refused and was banned from further play. He initiated a suit against the NFL and its 26 member teams asking the court to declare the standard players contract illegal and to punish the NFL at least \$20 million worth. That was in 1972 and he later followed up by asking for a summary udgment. In a 28-page summary released Friday, Sweigert supported some of Kapp's contentions but left others open to further trial "unless settled by collective bargaining."

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

Feds Probing Plot to Blow Up Bridges

BOSTON (UPI) - An alleged plot to blow up three Boston bridges to protest courtordered school desegregation has been under investigation for several weeks by federal authorities, it was learned Friday.

Justice 'Department sources n Washington said the plot, which reportedly involved a group of South Boston residents, had targeted for destruction the Mystic-Tobir Bridge, the Meridian St. Bridge and one other access bridge from East Boston. The bridges were kept under surveillance for several days

and a number of suspects were questioned, the sources said. The bridges supposedly selected for destruction are slated to be used in a citywide school desegregation program which U.S. District Judge W. Arthur Garrity is expected t order implemented next fall. Garrity already has ordered partial desegregation of the Boston public school system this year. The current desegregation program in volves the busing of about 18,000 youngsters, mostly in the South Boston section of the city.
