





### IGE = Individually Guided Education

Three Basic Concepts Individually Guided Education (IGE) is committed to three basic concepts: Multi-age grouping.

In Manchester, all the schools including the IGE ones have a much more structured set of things for the students to learn. The town's school curriculum is spelled out in detail for each grade through junior high


IGE came to Manchester in the fall of 1971 at the Nathan Hale and Green Schools. It worked despite early confusion and criticism for three years here with about 750 students

The town's school administration, the Board of Education, and the staff at both schools elected to continue using IGE this year and beyond.

The traditional graded classroom with about 25 students all about the same age and one teacher running this self-sufficient unit may not exist in pure form anywhere in Manchester. Each school has tried elements of IGE and other systems to some degree. But IGE may be as far from the traditional classroom as inchester has gone.
