Gift to Bangladesh The Manchester Council on World Hunger has already sent \$800 (80 per cent of the first \$1.-000) given by Manchester to Bangladesh, now suffering one of the worst malnutrition rates in recorded history.

A December survey by a medical team from John Hopkins University indicated that 2,000 children will die in just the district of Rangpur (pop. 130,000), that 1,500 of these deaths will be attributable to malnutrition alone and that one-fourth of the deaths will occur by March 1. The results, said Dr. Frederick Koster, director of the survey. are the worst ever recorded for a rural population.

> In the best of years, people starve to death in Bangladesh. But this year's problem is exacerbated by the 1974 floods - the worst in 20 years - which destroyed crops and left 17 of the nation's 19 districts a waste of muddy waters.

> In the John Hopkins survey, Dr. Koster reported that some of the children were so weak that they had to be carried and were even unable to stand. Oxfam-America, one of the

relief agencies struggling to alleviate the desperate famine conditions, is underwriting two emergency programs in Rangpur. Already involved in a edevelopment program for 180 villages since the war of liberation, Oxfam-America has sent \$10,000 specifically for direct famine relief to help establish five day care centers. Here in tensive care will be available for 500 severely malnourished children and supplementary feeding will be provided for 2,-500 malnourished children.

In addition, training in nutrition and child care will be given on an on-going basis for paramedics already undergoing training under Oxfam-America sponsorship. Selected village women will also be instructed in the care of common diseases as well as in proper nutrition under competent medical supervision. Besides basic nutritional foods, the Oxfam-American funds will provide for

The development concept preferred by Oxfam-America, since it provides for ultimate improvement in the lives of the very poor, is illustrated by a food-for-work grant of \$10,000 which will alleviate critical famine while curtailing damage from periodic flooding which causes famine.

In the Sylhet district of northcentral Bangladesh, where the worst flood in the memory of the oldest villagers not only wiped out this year's rice crop, but covered the villages as well, the people were left with no food until th rice harvest next April. Oxfam-America's grant will provide food-for-work to laborers moving earth to construct dikes, drainage channels, irrigation ditches, embankments, fishery tanks and raise land for market place Silted-in harbors will be deepend, and roads for oxen and foot traffic (there are no cars) will be built between villages for moving produce and for communication.

Tenant farmers and small landholders, as well as the landless population who will be paid for their labor with food, will benefit from the work. Construction will be supervised by the Bengali executive director of the Bangladesh Rural Advancement Committee, which has been cooperating with the villagers in past flood control efforts. Food-for-work will replace the "gruel kitchens" i providing food for these famine The first \$800 contributed in Manchester has gone directly to

DUBLIN (UPI) - The Irish Republican Army Sunday told its gunmen to lay down their weapons at 6 p.m., today halting a campaign to unite Ulster with the Catholic Irish Republic. The cease-fire came as a surprise at the end of a weekend of fierce fighting in which four persons were shot to death in Northern Ireland. The halt in fighting came nearly four weeks after the collapse of a 25-day Christmas cease-fire and raised new hopes for a negotiated settlement to the crisis.

Cosmonauts Return MOSCOW (UPI) - The Soviet Union today reported two osmonauts who returned Sunday from a 30-day space light, were feeling well. The space mission set a Soviet en durance record and instilled confidence in its troubleplagued space program. The official news agency Tass said the spacemen made a near perfect landing 65 miles northwest of Iselinograd in Central Asia.





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

Russian Art To Be Shown In America

MOSCOW (UPI) - Thirty naintings unseen outside Russia since the 18th century will be taken to the United States next May for a six-month cultural exchange, industrialist and art collector Armand Hammer said

Hammer said he arranged the exchange Friday in a meeting with Soviet Culture minister Pyotr N. Demichev. The paintings from the Hermitage museum in Leningrad will be shown at the National Gallery, Washington, D.C., the Knoedler Gallery in New York the Chicago Art Institute and Los Angeles County Museum. A similar number of painings from those museums will e brought to the Soviet Union for showing in Moscow, eningrad, Kiev a Hammer said. He said other American

museums may participate in the exchange, but this has not In addition to the old masters, the Soviets will send 10 paintings from the Russian museum in Leningrad.

Hammer said he also arranged for a separate exhibition of American Western art throughout the Soviet Union of works from the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, Wyoming. The old masters going to the United States were collected by the Empress Catherine the Great and have rarely left the walls of the Winter Palace where the Hermitage museum is now situated.

They include Rembrandt van Rijn's portrait of his wife Saskia, entitled "Flora," a family group by Sir Anthony Van Dyck, a rare landscape called "The Carters" by Peter Paul Rubens, a landscape by Jacon van Ruisdael entitled "The March," "A Visit to Grandmother" by the Le Nain brothers, Jean Baptiste Chardin's "The Washerwoman. Bartolome Murillo's "The Boy with a Dog," Franz Hals' "Por trait of a Man" and a "Pieta" by Paolo Veronesi. Works from the Russian

museum in the Mikhailovsky palace include canvases by Ilya Repin, Dmitri Levitsky and other Russian masters of the 19th century.

It was the second such exchange arranged by Hammer. In 1973, he sent his own private collection here in exchange for 41 impressionist paintings from the Pushkin Gallery in Moscow and the Her-

OBITUARIES Harold Larson on Team Mrs. Arthur A. Roe SOUTH WINDSOR - Mrs. That Discovered Water On the Planet Jupiter

A Manchester native is a member of a four-man team that discovered in early November that there is water on the

Dr. Harold P. Larson, a physicist and astronomer at the University of Arizona, said in an interview over the weekend, it's "absolutely sure," and 100 per cent fact water is available on Jupiter - making it more probable than ever before known there may be life there also.

Larson acknowledged the life there may not be life as we recognize it here. He said it more likely exists in bacterial and microbiological form.

Larson, 37, is the son of Mrs. Laetha Backus of 571 Hartford Rd. Mrs. Backus works in the dietary office at Manchester Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Larson, the former Emma Stephens, also is a Manchester native. She is a chemist. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Stephens, reside at 45 Green Manor Rd. The Larsons reside in Tuscon, Ariz. They have two children - Robyn, 6, and Jonathon, 4.

Larson is a 1956 graduate of Manchester High School. He worked during those school years at the former Kocum's Grocery, when it was at the corner of E. Center and Parker Sts. - now a furniture

He was graduated from Bates College, Lewiston, Maine, and then Purdue University, where he received his master's and doctoral degrees in physics. In 1968 he joined the staff of the French National Center of Scientific Research, as a postdoctoral fellow for the French Governe-

In 1969 he returned to the United States and went on the staff of the University of Arizona.

The four-member team that discovered there is water on Jupiter was aided in its discovery by computers, other technological equipment and a 36-inch telescope. The telescope was trained on the planet from an airplane on two separate eight-hour trips in October flying eight miles above the earth's sur-

Jupiter is about 368 million miles from Earth at its closest point and about 600 million at its furthest. Scientists have computed it would take a motorist 773 years to drive there nonstop at the national speed limit of 55 miles an hour.

Larson said he believes the discovery will have a profound effect on the way man views this world. He said the same gases exist on Jupiter that existed on earth when it was being formed - possibly 41/2 billion years ago - ammonia, methane, hydrogen and helium.

He called them and oxygen "the basic building blocks of life.
