Kissinger Seeking Agreement On Sinai Troop Withdrawal

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Secretary of State Henry Kissinger met with a team of Israeli negotiators today to work out a new troop withdrawal agreement in the Sinai Desert.

Kissinger first shared a 90-minute private breakfast with Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, then the full U.S. and Israeli negotiating teams met for two and a half hours for talks the secretary called "very full and very friendly."

"Our real talks started this morning," Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon said

Discuss Real Problems "We discussed real problems of a possible revival and renewal of the political momentum in the area. I really think that

the talks were very productive." Israeli government sources said the negotiations were conducted in general terms, taking up trends and directions of a possible Egyptian-Israeli disengagement

Kissinger flew to Jerusalem Monday, his task to explore the possibility of reconciling the Israeli insistence on political concessions and the Egyptian desire to get back more of the strategic Sinai Penin-

Kissinger Hopeful

A senior American official said Kissinger hopes to return in March to help conclude the actual agreement, which may lead to full-scale peace talks at Geneva among all parties in the Arab-Israeli dispute.

The Israeli cabinet officially has backed Kissinger's step-by-step approach toward peace but a public opinion poll in the Tel Aviv newspaper Ha'aretz Monday indicated a drop in the secretary's support.

The poll said 25.4 per cent of the Israelis questioned supported Kissinger, compared to 63.8 per cent after the secretary worked out a troop disengagement accord with Syria last year.

The key questions at stake are how far Israel is willing to withdraw in the Sinai Desert and what concessions Egypt is willing to pay for the pullback. Kissinger was scheduled to fly to Egypt

Wednesday to confer with President Anwar Sadat. He was to visit Syria on Thursday before returning for final talks in

A senior U.S. official said Kissinger does not expect to work out an Israeli-Egyptian agreement during the 10-day,

Concessions Wanted Israel wants political concessions, such as a partial lifting of Egypt's state of belligerency and the opening of the Suez Canal to ships carrying Israeli goods, in exchange for troop withdrawals.

Egypt wants Israel to abandon the strategic Mitla and Giddi passes as well as the Abu Rodeis oil fields, all captured by Israel in the 1967 Middle East war.

Farmers Promised **Fuel Cost Rebates**

TOPEKA, Kan. (UPI) - President Ford today announced he has ordered a rebate program to pay farmers for higher energy costs caused by his drive to make America independent of foreign oil producers.

"As long as I am President, the American farmer will receive the fuel he needs to do his job," Ford said in a speech prepared for delivery to a joint session of

the Kansas Legislature. "I will not let American agriculture run

Details Upcoming

"I have instructed the Federal Energy Administrator, Frank Zarb, to design for the agricultural community a rebate program to compensate the farmer for increased energy costs caused by our conservation program. We will be announcing the details of this program within the next few weeks."

The President came to Kansas to seek support for his energy-economy program in America's breadbasket as he campaigned for public backing among energy producers in Houston Monday.

"Unless we start now to achieve energy independence, the American farmer will grow more and more dependent on the foreign oil cartel for the energy products he needs to sow and reap his crops," Ford said. "His costs, his profits and his productivity will all be at the mercy of

Farmers Caught in Trap He said farmers would be trapped between higher energy costs and lower prices for their produce.

Oil Price Freeze To Stay In Effect

Two top officials of the 13-nation alliance of major oil exporters said today they expect petroleum prices to remain frozen for the time being, despite the recent battering of the dollar on world

money markets. Chief Meshach Otokiti Feyide of Nigeria, secretary general of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, said at the cartel's Vienna-Austria headquarters he did not think the price would rise above the current \$10.12 a

Kuwait has proposed tying the dollar to other major currencies because of the decline in the dollar's value. Such a step

could raise the price. "No one can deny that the dollar is falling in value," Feyide said. "But when the OPEC ministers at their Vienna meeting in December agreed to freeze the price of oil until Sept. 30 they took their voluntary decision with the knowledge of what could happen.

"I do not expect they would change this decision without substantial reasons, for example the devaluation of the dollar. "In December the ministers said this is

the price and we won't change it for nine months...they will not change their minds for light and transient reasons."

"Anyway you look at it, that is a no-win proposition for the American farmer,"

He said he recognizes farmers may be concerned about the immediate impact his energy program will have on them - his higher taxes on imported oil will bring higher energy costs to farmers.

There was speculation Ford might announce the release of \$2 billion in federal highway funds to stimulate the economy in an address to a joint session of the Kansas Legislature in Topeka. President Lyndon B. Johnson im-

pounded \$11 billion in highway funds during the late 1960s. Ford has been strongly urged by the nation's governors to release the highway funds. He has said he was actively considering such a move. **Explains Program** Ford conferred with his staff this mor-

ning and later was host at a breakfast session for 65 Southwest newspaper and broadcast executives to explain his antirecession package.

Before attending the breakfast, Ford stopped to shake hands with Leonard C. Ward, 102-year-old Republican who lives in a Houston nursing home and had wired the President that he had liked to meet him. Ward was in a wheelchair.

The President had a long day scheduled. including his address to the Kansas Legislature, a luncheon with 10 Midwestern governors and a news conference at 8 p.m. EST. After the news con-

ference, he will fly back to Washington. The President has been opposed to gasoline rationing, but in an address before the Houston Chamber of Commerce Monday he expressed his opposition in no un-

'Over My Dead Body'

"The facts are, there will be, if we get into gasoline rationing — over my dead body — then we would have 140-some million licensed automobile drivers in the United States and we would have 290-some million gallons of gasoline a day.

"Not many people in this country and very few in Texas," he said, "can go very far in their daily chores or their work on that, about a gallon and three quarters a

Ford wound up his first day in Houston by meeting with five Southwestern governors over dinner for several hours. To a man they all opposed gasoline rationing, a widespread sentiment among most of the governors he has met in his campaign to sell his program.

Mixed Support

But the same governors, including Dolph Briscoe of Texas, opposed the major part of the President's energy program. With exception of Jerry Apodaca of New Mexico, all supported a 60-to-90 day suspension of the imported oil tariff increases. The House voted overwhelmingly for the delay.

The legislation is now before the Senate and Ford has served notice he will lobby among the senators after he returns to Washington tonight to keep the increases off until Congress votes a permanent \$2

Bank President

Nathan G. Agostinelli, former state comptroller and former Manchester mayor, has been named president and chief executive of the Manchester State Bank, effective immediately. The announcement was made today by Andrew Ansaldi Jr., chairman of the bank's board

Agostinelli will replace Joseph Schauster, who has been acting president since Dec. 16 when Edmund A. Parker, president of the bank since it opened in December 1970, resigned.

Schauster will assist Agostinelli for an indefinite period of time, to insure continuity and a smooth transition.

An Incorporator Agostinelli is an incorporator of the Manchester State Bank and was its president during its organization days and chairman of its board of directors until January 1971, when he resigned to assume the post of state comptroller.

He ran for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket in November and lost. Robert H. Steele, who was the Republican candidate for governor, last month was named vice president of the Norwich Savings Society, with the expectation he will be its president in June.

Ansaldi, in announcing the appointment, said, "Mr. Agostinelli is a life-long resident of Manchester and brings a broad base of experience to the bank. In addition to being a former state comptroller and former Manchester mayor, he has served on the State Banking Commission and the State Bonding Commission.

School Board Approves \$13,320,903 Budget

This budget is an increase of \$1,220,903 over the current budget of \$12,100,000 - or a 10 per cent hike. In tax terms, the new budget reflects

about a four-mill increase. Cuts were made in requests for new equipment, supplies and textbooks, said John Yavis, chairman of the personnel and

says the municipality shall provide transportation when 50 per cent or more of the school population are residents of the State of Connecticut. Prior to this year, the law pertained only to school residents



all," and such tender messages as these still prevail: "The heart that has truly loved never forgets." "The fickleness of the women I love is equalled by the constancy of the women who love me," and "It is with true love as it is with ghosts; everyone talks of it, but few have seen it." Early folklore suggested that a young girl should eventually marry the first eligible male she would lay eyes on that day. This gradually evolved into the day which a loved one would make his proposal of marriage. Buy Eggs By Grade

Targets of the effort are two

By State Departmen Buy graded eggs in cartons at store that keeps them in refrigerated cases. Grademarks indicate the quality at the time of grading and if hey have been properly handled since grading, there should be little loss in quality. Grade AA or A eggs are excellent for all purposes, but are especially good for poaching and frying where the appearance of the finishe product is important. Grade B eggs are satisfactory for use in cooked dishes.

Good value is not affected by the grade of the egg since lower grades are as high in nutrients as top grades. The color of the shell doesn't affect the nutritive value or quality of the egg so buy either white or brown eggs, as you please. Eggs are classified by size

according to weight per dozen. dent of quality as large eggs may be of high or low quality and high-quality eggs maybe of any size. Common market sizes of eggs and the minimum weight per dozen are as follows: large, 24 ounces; medium, 21 ounces and small,

In recipe cooking the substitution of one size egg for another often makes little difference in the result. However, in some recipes, as in sponge and angelfood cakes, the proportion of egg to other in gredients is very important For such recipes, it may be necessary to increase the number of eggs if you are using Eggs are generally found

packed with the small end down and it is wise to store them in approximately the same ositions. The air cell (air space between shell membrances) is normally in the large end of the egg. When buying eggs at market lift the box cover to detect any broken eggs with content leaking. A cooking hint: To avoid cracked shells when poiling eggs, pierce the shell at the large end of the egg with a pin or other pointed article so that the cell air can escape during cooking without bursting the shell.
