## Kissinger Says Mission Is 'Still in Business'

DAMASCUS (UPI) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger flew to Syria today from Cairo, saying his talks with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat were "very positive" and his Middle East peace mission was "still in business."

A senior official aboard Kissinger's plane said the secretary's mission was the most difficult so far of all his shuttle-diplomacy tours of the Middle East.

The official said the Egyptians and the Israelis were far apart on terms for a second-stage troop pullout in Sinai but agreement was not hopeless.

Kissinger met with Syrian President Hafez Assad shortly after arriving in Damascus. A high American official said no new negotiations with Syria would be started, but instead the two men would give a broad review of the Middle East situation.

In Cairo, after finishing a meeting with Sadat, Kissinger said before boarding his airliner, "I consider the talks were very positive."

Later, on the plane flying to Damascus, he told newsmen, "We are still in business."

A senior American official said Kissinger will report to Israeli leaders in detail on Sadat's position tonight in Jerusalem, but he said he did not expect any answer from them now.

The official said Kissinger will fly to Jordan Friday and to Saudi Arabia before returning to the Middle East early next month, after the Israelis and the Egyptians have had time to ponder possible compromises.

The senior official said that while Egypt and Israel were far apart on terms of an Israeli pullback in the Sinai Desert, Kissinger would not be returning to the area if he felt the situation was hopeless.

The official also said he believed that both sides would have to sign some agreements, but he refused to speculate on their nature.

In Cairo, Kissinger and Egyptian Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmi signed an \$80 million loan agreement for supplies and equipment and had a 40-minute conference at Tahrir Palace.

## Law May Require DellaFera To Relinquish State Post

HARTFORD, Conn. (UPI) — The chairman of the licensing board for Connecticut nursing home administrators may be ordered to resign because he owns a nursing home in Manchester, UPI learned today.

Francis P. DellaFera, of Manchester, not only sits as chairman of the licensing board while owning the Crestfield Nursing Home, but he is also president of the state association of nursing homes owners.

The state Attorney General's office said it ruled earlier this week on whether DellaFera is in conflict of interest. But DellaFera and the Attorney General's office declined to say which way the ruling went until it is put in writing, perhaps on Friday.

DellaFera said he has never tried to hide his ownership of the nursing home, and added he would resign if he is ruled to be violating the state law that establishes the board's membership.

The meaning of the law is not clear, and at least one other nursing home owner, Samuel Deich of Glastonbury, was a member of the board. Deich, owner of the Salmon Brook Convalescent Home in Glastonbury, resigned from the board last July when his term expired.

Public Act 19, section 42b, says the governor will appoint nine members to the board as follows:

Two from nominees of the Connecticut Association of Extended Health Care Facilities Inc., two from the nominees of the Connecticut Association on Non-Profit Homes and Hospitals for the Aged, one from the nominees of the American College of Nursing, Home Administrators, one from nominees of the Connecticut Hospital Association, one from nominees of the Connecticut State Medical Society, who shall have no financial interest in a licensed chronic and convalescent nursing home, and two who are not associated with any of the above organizations.

A member of the legislature who is also an attorney said the phrase "who shall have no financial interest" applied only to the preceding phrase, the nominee of the Medical Society.

Other lawmakers said, however, its grammar and punctuation showed the phrase applied to all members of the board. Records of legislative action on the bill, passed in 1969, do not shed any further light on its meaning.

DellaFera, who worked on behalf of the bill as president of the Connecticut Association of Extended Care Facilities Inc., said the phrase in question was never meant to prevent nursing home owners from serving on the board.

"The proof is that the governor appointed me," he said. DellaFera was named to the board in 1970 by former Democratic Gov. John N. Dempsey. His term expired July, 1973, but he has not been reelected.

## Old-Fashioned Winter Returns

Wednesday's eight-hour snowstorm dumped 5 to 7 inches of new snow on Manchester (depending on where in town you live) and made believers of many persons who were beginning to doubt weather predictions.

Lulled by a comparatively mild January into the false hope and belief that old-fashioned winters are a thing of the long-ago past and trusting the ground hog when he (or she) didn't see his (or her) shadow Feb. 2 and predicted an early end to winter, most Manchester people have experienced two major snowstorms in eight days. The one eight days ago also dumped about 5 to 7 inches on Manchester, closed schools and some offices and businesses and made driving hazardous.

Wednesday was almost a duplicate, except that schools and some offices and businesses were closed for a different reason—it was Lincoln's Birthday, a local and state holiday. Today, schools again were in session and it was business as usual elsewhere.

Wednesday's storm started at about 10:15 a.m. and, except for a mini-dusting, was over by 6:30 p.m.

A meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Windsor Locks said it was caused by a low pressure coastal system, which grew weaker as it traveled northward. Areas south of Connecticut got 8 to 10 inches and those to the north as little as 3 inches.

"This is one we got right," he said, "only, I wish we had been wrong in our prediction."

He said it looks like pleasant weather until Monday (Sunday night at the earliest), with a warming trend today which will place temperatures in the 30's Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

He said the chance of snow Monday is 30 to 50 per cent, with the disturbance too far away to predict the amount of snow possible.

Manchester Police said there were seven accidents of the fender-bender type as a result of the storm.

Area towns likewise said they experienced some minor accidents.

The state was spared of any major crashes, and there were no casualties reported.

Officials for the Hartford Electric Light Co. and Southern New England Telephone Co. said Wednesday's storm had little, if any, effect on service.

"It was a very quiet storm for us," said Charles Hoffman, manager of HELCO's Manchester office. "Actually, a storm like this one seldom causes problems and, in fact, usually helps us."

He explained that snow like Wednesday's helps cool transformers and makes them operate better.

## Vocational Ed Makes Full Circle at Old School

The basement rooms of the old Trade School on School St., long deserted by the trade school students who have gone to a new and larger building, are once again being used to teach young students a trade.

The vocational educational student training program has come full circle back to the building where it originated.

Administered by the Manchester School Cooperative Occupational Education Program (COEP), students are introduced to their first experience in industry and business.

The purpose of COEP is to provide a student-centered work experience involving cooperation between the school and selected employers of the community.

The program includes both academic and work-oriented instruction in the classroom and on the job.

The general emphasis of the program is to provide occupational education for students who seek careers requiring less than a baccalaureate college degree. The program saves many a future school dropout.

COEP courses include a planned academic program and on-the-job training. The courses are designed primarily to prepare students for successful transition from school to the world of work.

During this week, Connecticut Vocational Education Week, emphasis is being placed on the vocational education program provided to students in the Manchester area.

About 50 eighth and ninth grade students from Bennet and Iling Junior High Schools (25 from each school) are currently enrolled in the second year of a new experience program in the old trade school. Iling students are bused in specially for the program.

Termed an "incentive program," the students learn to write up their own programs. They work on time and cost studies.

They subcontract work from local businesses, one of which is the Empire Tool and Mfg. Co.

"All in all, it is a total learning experience," says Neil Lawrence, director of vocational education.

Most students will apply for the COEP program in high school, says Lawrence, or go on to Cheney Tech.

The student who becomes turned off with increasing academic responsibilities now takes a new look at school. Here is a program which is meaningful to him.

"It has reduced absenteeism unquestionably," says Lawrence.

As the program develops, it may expand to include seventh graders, says Lawrence.

COEP directors' concern is to turn out productive citizens.

"The kids who stay in the community are the average working person; they're

valuable people," says Roberta Walnum, Manchester school career education specialist.

A phase of the vocational education program is to teach students to analyze and evaluate.

"We now need independent thinking in today's world of work," says Mrs. Walnum.

A series of career seminars was instituted in the junior high schools last year. Covering many phases of vocations—specialized and general—the students have heard a veterinarian, a carpenter, an architect, an electrician, a radio an-

nouncer, and others in other fields describe their jobs.

They told the young listeners the merits and disadvantages of their jobs, the training required, the salary that could be expected, and the future possibilities.

Such seminars may help the student to select a vocation in the high school COEP program.

The young students are developing a respect for the working community, says Mrs. Walnum, through exposure to personal accounts of the community's vocations.

Manchester is one of about 60 towns and

cities in the state now having state approved COEP programs. The program here, originally a pilot program, is about five years old.

According to Lawrence, Manchester has the largest approved program in the state and is considered to be outstanding in the field.

Perhaps Manchester's future success may lie in the fact that the school system cares enough about its students to provide a vocational education program sufficient to qualify them to manage the town's businesses and industries.

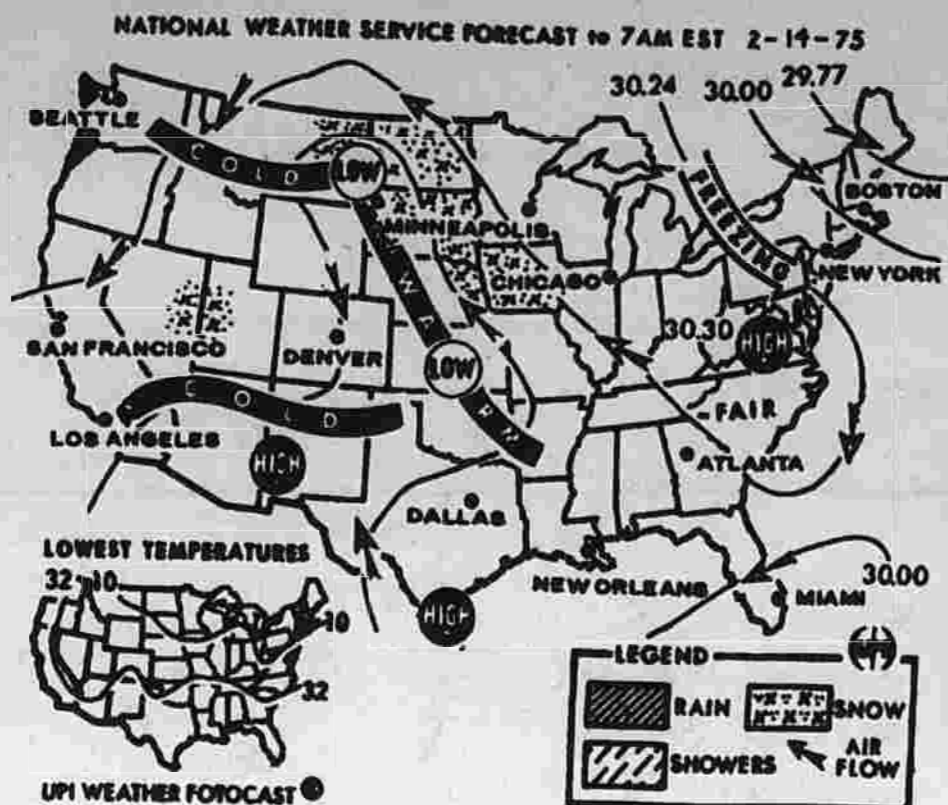

**October Optimism Gone**

October's optimism has now faded into February's fiscal facts. Connecticut faces some form of tax increase for the coming fiscal year despite Gov. Ella Grasso's valiant budget-pruning attempts.

Although she campaigned on a platform that would have the state live within its income, events she has found, like Lincoln did before her, have a way of shaping people rather than people shaping events.

There can be no denying that state revenue estimates have been adversely affected by the economic downturn. There can be no denying that inflation has increased pressure for larger budget requests. And there can be no denying that an state service, once offered, is difficult to trim back or eliminate.

Thus Gov. Grasso, being a political realist, is expected to include in her first budget message to the General Assembly a return to the seven cent state sales tax. This will not raise enough revenue to meet the anticipated deficit but will divert pressure away from a personal income tax for a while at least.

Of more interest right now to us is what she will do to overcome the anticipated deficit in the current budget. It has been reported that serious consideration is being given to short-term borrowing to carry the state through to the next fiscal year.

It is reported also that some Democratic legislators favor early imposition of the one cent sales tax increase instead of July 1 as the governor is expected to suggest. While this also would not meet the anticipated deficit it would minimize it and presumably make it easier to manage either through short-term borrowing or bonding.

We oppose bonding of deficits in principle. We think short-term loans are tolerable only to the extent they would provide the new administration with more time to come up with a long-range program to keep the state running in the black.

We appreciate Gov. Grasso's dilemma. Balancing the state's budget in the face of the recession-caused decline in revenue is no easy task. The choices are few.

The anticipated one-cent sales tax increase is about all the traffic can bear in that department. In light of the Republican sweep of four years ago, deficits cannot be accrued except as a last resort.

The administration is left with only one other possible avenue, the personal income tax, which Gov. Grasso and her party have consistently repudiated.

But as we said, October's optimism has now faded into February's frigid fiscal facts of life.

**Two Important Judicial Rulings**

Two rulings by California judges will place a burden of responsibility on plaintiffs in environmental suits and class action suits, which they have previously not borne. If they are sustained, they will have the result of making it much more difficult, if not virtually impossible, to have such suits considered by the courts.

One of the most far-reaching rulings concerns the San Francisco Airport where Friends of the Earth, an environmentalist group, has sought to halt airport expansion, claiming that the proposed construction had not been accompanied by environmental impact statements.

The U.S. Court of Appeals had issued a conditional injunction halting work on the project and ordered U.S. District Court Judge Robert Schackne to determine if a bond would be required by Friends of the Earth.

The judge ruled that a bond in the amount of \$4.5 million would be required to compensate the airport for any damage which it might sustain from delays in construction caused by the injunction as well as inflationary increases in construction costs, if the decision did not favor the plaintiff.

The judge's ruling, which has been appealed, is a very important one if it is sustained.

Too often in the past environmental groups have been able to go into court, on a shoestring, and obtain injunctions halting work on various projects for alleged environmental reasons, only to have their case thrown out eventually.

However, in the meantime the project has been delayed for many months, or even years with resulting cost increases to sponsoring utilities and/or taxpayers.

A case in point is the nuclear powered generating plant at San

Onore, Calif., which has been delayed and delayed at great cost to the sponsoring utilities.

While expansion was held up in the courts by environmentalists, costs increased and the utilities found that the projects would cost many, many millions more when they were able to resume work.

It was and is possible for the plaintiff's suits to be thrown out of court or disallowed and yet the sponsors, be they utility or governmental, while winning the litigations, found that their costs had gone up astronomically.

Another ruling concerned a "class action" suit brought against Standard Oil Company of California by a school teacher who claimed that she had purchased F-310 gasoline thinking that it would lower air pollution.

When it was found that it did not, she sued Standard in a class action proceeding claiming that the company should make restitution not only to her, but also to all credit card holders of Standard who might have bought the gas.

The California Superior Court Judge ruled that the teacher must notify all of the others involved that they too were a party to the suit. Since there are 700,000 credit card holders this would involve a postal bill of about \$70,000 for the teacher.

There have been class action suit verdicts in which many of those who were awarded claims never had any idea that they were involved in a suit and in some cases they were difficult to find.

While we would not like to see those without great financial ability barred from taking a grievance to court, we think these rulings may prevent the filing of capricious and irresponsible suits in the future.

**'She's A Beautiful Person'**

WASHINGTON — People behave like human beings every day in America, and sometimes they are discovered doing something nice.

One who did something nice is Mrs. Elizabeth Campbell, a grocery clerk, who lives in suburban Oxon Hill, Md. And I suggest it is a bonus for the human race that the nice thing was in aid of a neighbor.

Mrs. Campbell had never met Mrs. Tomison did so, and got a pledge of cooperation. He then phoned the apartment building's resident manager and informed her that Mrs. Campbell wanted to pay Mrs. Braxton's back rent. A detective escorted Mrs. Campbell to the manager's office and the rent was paid. Within moving the family's possessions back into the vacated apartment.

Mrs. Campbell admitted that the \$205 rent payment had all but wiped out her checking account. "But I don't care," she told the Star-News. "I don't know how she can pay me back. If I don't get it back, I just don't get it back."

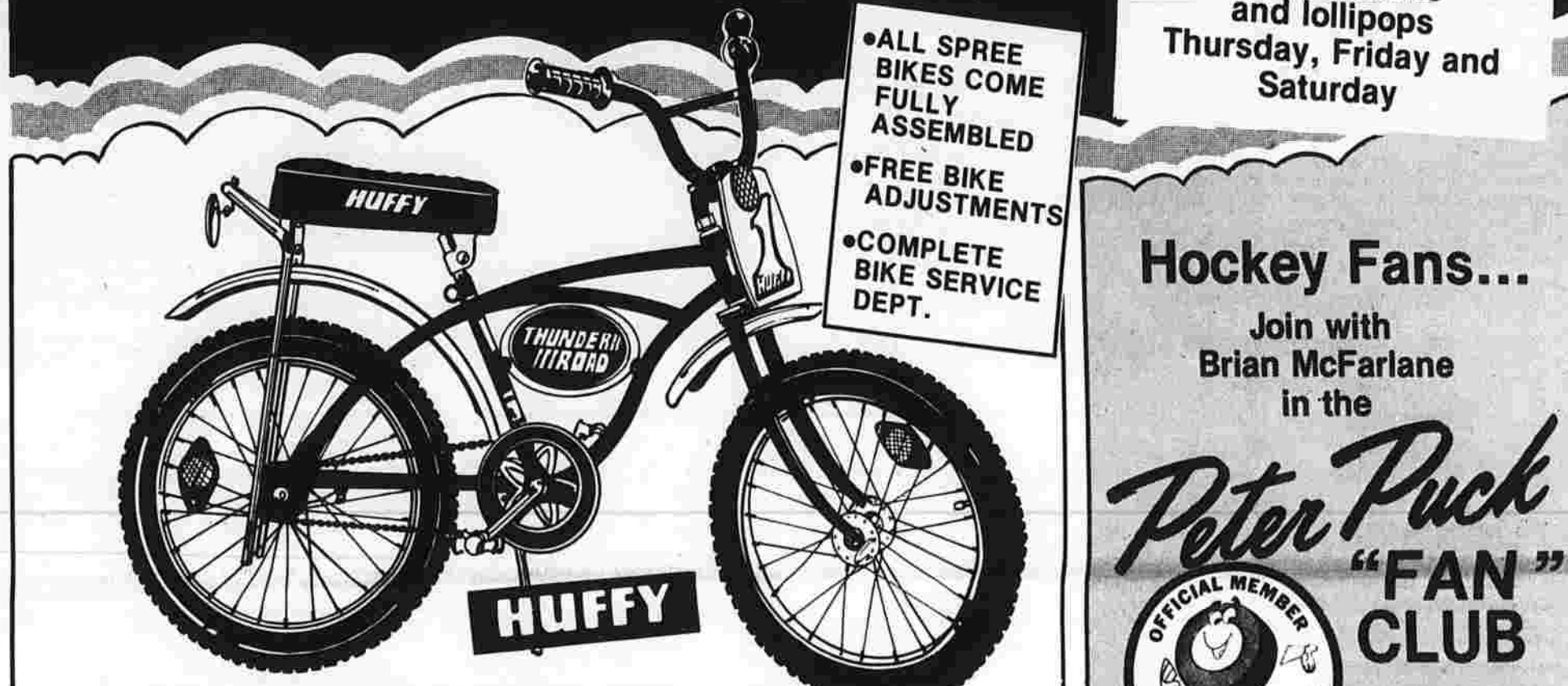

**The Lighter Side**  
**Propounding Pro Forma Profundities**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - You may have read elsewhere that Congress gave up its Lincoln's birthday recess this week because of the urgency of the economic situation.

You may also have heard innuendoes that the cancellation was somewhat apocryphal because neither the House nor Senate planned to do anything anyway.

Let me assure you that insofar as the House is concerned, the latter allegation is a bare canard.

When I arrived at the Capitol Monday and looked at the congressional agenda, I could tell that the House was about to put its members on the spot.

For, according to the calendar, the House was scheduled to hold two "pro forma" sessions this week.

Of all the great national issues that Congress has grappled with over the years, none has demanded as much of its time as the perennial pro forma controversy.

In wartime and in peace, whatever the crisis at hand, both law-giving bodies have devoted countless legislative days to pro forma sessions.

And yet the matter remains unresolved.

Now it has cropped up again at an inopportune moment. In a week when the rest of the country is relaxing in the festive atmosphere of Lincoln's birthday, the House is once more coming to grips with the touchy pro forma question.

You, the average, uninformed citizen, might think it is time to settle this matter once and for all. But as a veteran congressional observer I can tell you it isn't likely to happen soon.

Pro forma is one of those highly emotional issues. Like busing, gun control and raising the tariff on imported swizzle sticks.

In virtually every congressional district there is a powerful, well-organized anti pro forma lobby.

The anti pro forma pressure group is capable of mounting an intensive protest campaign on a moment's notice. Few if any congressmen are so strongly pro forma they would dare offend such a vociferous bloc of constituents.

This explains why the pro forma sessions are so sparsely attended and why they never accomplish anything significant.

I'm not accusing anyone of ducking the issue, but at the pro forma session in the House last Monday you could count the attendance on three hands.

After 10 minutes of routine business, the session adjourned, with no pro forma debate or vote. Another pro forma session was scheduled for Thursday, but I doubt any action will be taken then either.

It is obvious that until more law givers have guts enough to take a firm pro forma stand, this matter will drag on for decades to come.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - We've had a few questions lately about those imitation potato chips on the market.

Says a reader in Kittingning, Pa.:  
"The 'Pringles' potato chip commercials are deceptive and offensive. Their distinctive flavor results not from any degree of greenness, as they claim - but from the difference between a fresh potato that you cut and cook yourself and processed instant, which has lost up to 90 per cent of certain nutrients."

"They do not mention the last fact in any way. The sad thing is that the present ecology-purty-health-minded generation has eaten so much of the processed garbage that they don't even know the difference."  
"We should mention first off that 'Pringles' are not sold yet in all parts of the country. Procter & Gamble tells us they are not being marketed on the West Coast, in New England and in parts of New York and Pennsylvania."

But because the chips are selling very well, they soon may be marketed nationwide. General Mills makes a similar product called 'Chips'.  
P&G says it makes 'Pringles' by cooking and mashing peeled whole potatoes, then removing most of the water. Water is added and the chips are reshaped so they can stack perfectly in containers. The big advantage is that they remain fresh unopened for up to one year, while regular bagged potato chips become stale in less than two months.  
So far as the alleged loss of nutrients mentioned in the above letter, real potato chips are not so nutritious that it would make much difference.  
As for the taste - well the writer has to confess he occasionally has munches 'Pringles' and liked them - not because they tasted like potato chips (they don't) but because they tasted like 'Pringles'. Indeed I would have re-tested my taste for them this very day except that the nearby drug store selling them carries only two brands at-a-time packages (another gripe well up to some day).  
But there is one complaint against 'Pringles' and similar products which should be taken seriously, it is price. You pay up to one-third more for 'Pringles' than for regular potato chips. Check the unit price if your store uses that system.  
P&G would contend the convenience, uniform shape and unbreakability makes the added cost worthwhile. It certainly has been worthwhile for P&G.  
The regular potato chip industry is worried, by some accounts, about its future, when one or two plants can distribute chips nationwide with long shelf lives. The industry even filed suit against 'Pringles' and 'Chips' asking that they be forced to call themselves 'snacks' instead of potato chips, but a court turned them down.  
The result would seem to be that the preprocessed potato chip is here to stay.  
"Pringles," for what it's worth, made the "Terrible Ten" list published recently by the Center for Science in the Public Interest, which is sponsoring "Food Day" April 17.  
It named products which it is urging consumers to avoid either because of the price or content as part of a day of concern about the world food situation. The others on the list are "Wonder Bread," Gerber baby food desserts, "Frute Brute," "Coca-Cola," bacon, sugar, prime grade beef, "Breakfast Squares" and table grapes.

### FROM YOUR NEIGHBOR'S KITCHEN

I am one of the great believers in the value of Vitamin C. Several years ago, I had a cold for more than two months. A friend, who is a district manager for a pharmaceutical company called on the phone one evening.

"Come on up and visit for awhile," he said. "I've got something for you." Frankly, I didn't feel up to it but he insisted. "Throw away anything you're taking and use these instead," he insisted, handing me a glass of water.

"Why, these are only vitamins," I replied. "Yes, and they are exceptionally high Vitamin C." I figured they couldn't hurt and swallowed the pill, taking some samples home with me.

Since then, the pharmaceutical company has a permanent customer. I haven't had a cold since then.

Citrus fruits, of course, are one of our great sources of Vitamin C. We have orange juice in the refrigerator all year round at our house as well as fresh oranges, grapefruit and lemons.

The orange began its life in Burma and southern China. Because our oranges come to us year-round from California plus several other sources from Florida, we somehow think of this fruit as native to America.

California oranges began with two trees in the backyard of Luther and Eliza Tibbets who lived in Riverside, California in 1875. Mrs. Tibbets had a husband who was a member of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington had an experimental stock of twelve trees which they had secured from Bahia, Brazil.

Two trees were sent to Riverside which eventually were the only two left. All the other trees had gone to Florida where they did poorly and died. Oddly enough, the Brazilian grove was wiped out completely by a citrus virus. All trees growing today in California and Arizona stem from the grafting stock taken from the Tibbets' trees.

The lemon is believed to be native of northern India. The Spanish brought the grapefruit to Florida early in the 16th century. Because of its peculiar flavor it was not easily accepted. Most people like to sweeten grapefruit. Try brown sugar instead of white or use honey. How about maple syrup or your favorite jam?

Grapefruit is delicious broiled. Pour some sweet sherry over the grapefruit and put under the broiler until lightly browned around the edges. You can do the same thing with the honey or whatever you like.

Lemons come in handy for anyone who is dieting. Fill with orange sherbet, pour some Grand Marnier or curacao liqueur over. Garnish with vegetables give them a little zip.

Savory Lemon Lamb Shank

4-6 lb shanks  
2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1/2 teaspoon thyme, crushed  
2 tablespoons flour  
3-4 tablespoons fat or salad oil

Preparation: Preheat oven to 350° F. Season shanks with salt and pepper. Brown shanks in fat in large skillet. Add paprika, thyme and flour. Add water to make gravy. Simmer for 2 hours. Serve with mashed potatoes and peas.

Old-Fashioned Apple Pie

1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 cup raisins  
1/2 cup nuts  
1/2 cup applesauce

Preparation: Preheat oven to 350° F. Mix butter and sugar. Beat eggs. Mix flour, raisins, nuts and applesauce. Combine and bake for 45 minutes.

Orange-Prune Pinwheel Cobbler

2 cloves garlic, finely minced  
2 tablespoons freshly grated lemon peel  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice  
4 whole peppercorns  
1 bayleaf, crushed  
1 lemon, cut into wedges  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed orange juice  
1/2 cup honey  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 1/2 cups pitted prunes, snipped into halves  
3 large oranges, peeled, sliced into 1/2" cartwheels  
cinnamon pinwheels (see recipe below)

Preparation: Preheat oven to 350° F. Sauté garlic in butter. Add lemon peel, peppercorns and bayleaf. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add orange juice and honey. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add prunes and oranges. Bake for 1 hour.

Cinnamon Pinwheels

2 1/2 cups biscuit mix  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts  
3/4 cup milk  
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Preparation: Mix biscuit mix, walnuts, milk and butter. Roll into 1/4" thick sheet. Sprinkle with cinnamon and walnuts. Roll up jelly-roll fashion, starting with narrow end. Cut carefully into nine 1" slices.

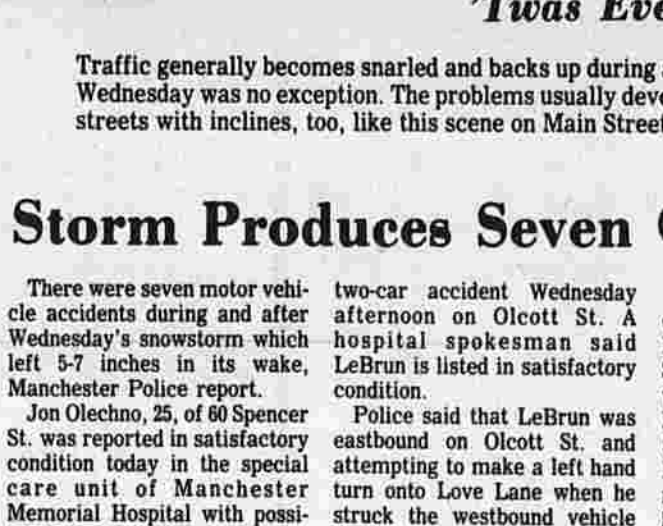

Pilots Can't Assume Radar Assistance

WASHINGTON (UPI) Airline pilots can never count on getting ground radar assistance unless specifically told so and should not assume they are receiving such help, a senior Federal Aviation Administration official said today.
A pilot called the statement "horrible."
Glen D. Tigner, chief of the FAA's operations, said that FAA procedures dictate that a controller's notification to a pilot that radar contact had been established serves to indicate only that radar service might be provided.
Pilots have long assumed otherwise, based on material provided them by the FAA in the Airman's Information Manual.
Tigner's testimony came during the record 12th day of National Transportation Safety Board hearing on the crash of TWA flight 814, which hit a Virginia mountain top on approach to Dulles International Airport Dec. 1. All 92 persons aboard were killed.
The pilot of the doomed jetliner got a landing approach clearance and descended prematurely—thinking the radar controller who gave the clearance meant immediate descent was safe. The plane hit a mountain 23 miles from Dulles.
Tigner, whose division is responsible for preparing air traffic control regulations, made his comments under questioning by TWA attorney Dick Woods.
"The pilot can make only one assumption when he is IFR (flying under instrument flight rules)," Tigner said. "That assumption is that air traffic control will provide him separation from other aircraft—either radar or non-radar."

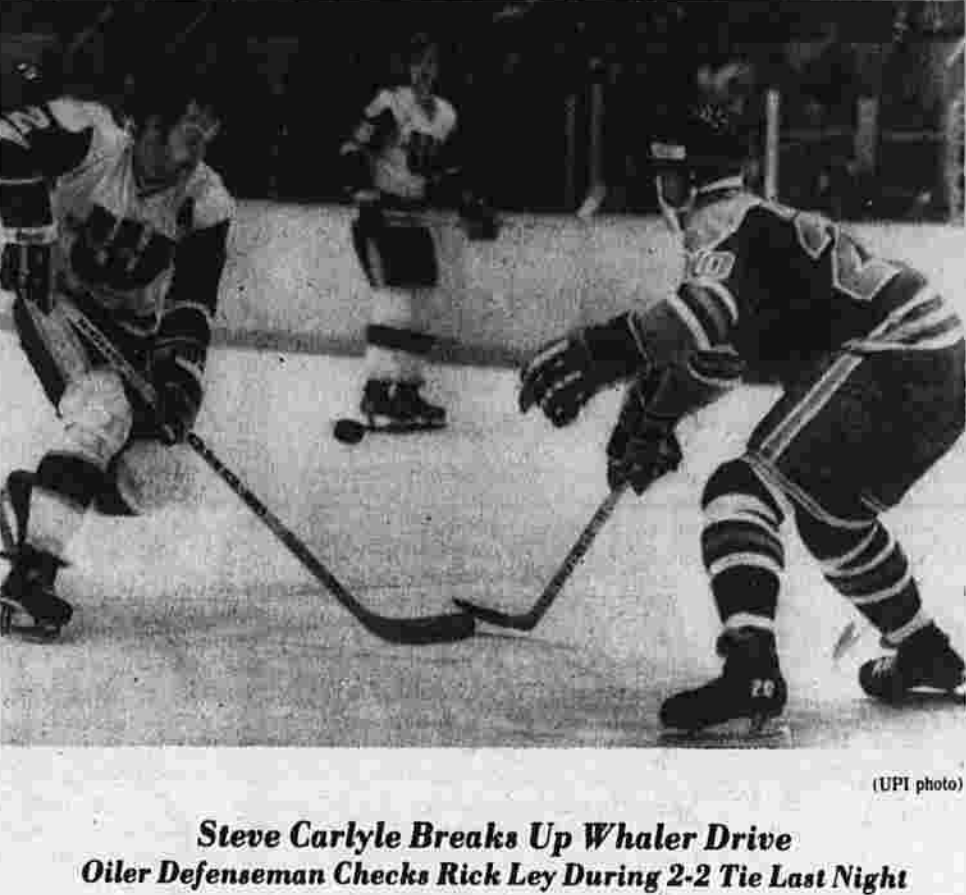

Columbia ranks 67 out of the 169 state municipalities in operating costs for education per pupil, the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council Inc. (CPEC) reports.

The next current operating expenses per pupil was listed at \$1,083.

The figure includes expenditures for administration, instruction, attendance and health services, operation and maintenance of plant and fixed charges. It also includes the net costs to towns for food services and student activities and tuition payments to other towns.

Net current expenses do not include transportation and the amount of tuition received for nonresident pupils.

The CPEC, listing 830 pupils for this town, show the total expenses for education in 1973-74 at \$1,031,162, compared to

\$972,139 for the 1972-73 school year.

The source of funds for education in 1973-74 was 70.8 per cent from local sources, 28.7 from state funds and 0.7 from federal funds.

Columbia ranks higher than surrounding towns but below the statewide average of \$1,147.

# Indonesians Visit Bennet

If students at Bennet Junior High School think they have it tough, they can be thankful they aren't in Indonesia.

Indonesians visited the seventh grade class recently and told their children in their country attend school six days a week from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. with homework.

However, education is not compulsory. Nor is it free. Students pay for their education according to family income.

Visiting the Bennet class were Dr. Louis Chandr and Dr. Nur Adisasmito, psychiatrists from Jakarta and Western Java, respectively. With them were Ahmad Mahdi, from Sumatra and Jacob Soukotta from the Moluccas Islands, both government administrators.

The four men were sent to the United States by the Indonesian government for specialized training in their fields.

Rice is the staple food and is eaten three times a day by Indonesians, they said.

Having a taste for sweets, the visitors said they were not too fond of our American food; it isn't sweet enough.

The ethnic groups in Indonesia have their own mode of dress. Many men, even in Jakarta, wear a sarong as do most women. The visitors said men wear a shirt and trousers for work, but no jacket because of the hot climate.

Indonesia is a republic governed by a president. The people do elect him, but he is selected by a special committee.

# Grasso Budget Message Comes in Gloomy Setting

HARTFORD (UPI) - It's not expected to be a jovial occasion this evening when Gov. Ella T. Grasso delivers her first budget message to the legislature.

Welfare claims are up, spending is down and with it sales tax revenues, prices are up, and cities and towns are crying for more state financial aid when the state would like to give less.

Added to these problems, which must be similar to those of other states, a deficit Mrs. Grasso's advisors estimate at \$67 million, left over from the administration of Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, makes the fiscal picture gloomier.

Having campaigned not only against a state income tax but in favor of a constitutional amendment to prohibit one, Mrs. Grasso, a Democrat, is not expected to urge one on the overwhelmingly Democratic legislature.

She said in a television interview last month she hoped to keep the sales tax under 9 percent. It is currently 6 percent, having been whittled down from a 7 percent high under the Meskill administration.

The new governor is expected to propose the sales tax be jacked back up to 7 percent. She will probably ask also for an increase in the corporation tax and possibly in other state levies.

Possible added revenue raising devices include a broadening of the sales tax, hikes in the gasoline tax and

capital gains tax, and a return to the tax on stock dividends.

In idea Mrs. Grasso might push is an immediate increase in the sales tax, to get a head start in knowing where the deficit, rather than allowing a delay in the effective date until July 1.

Mrs. Grasso will undoubtedly couple tax hike proposals with austerity advice and possibly threats to veto legislation which seeks to go beyond guidelines she will set either tonight or soon after.

If her 1975-76 spending program is under \$1.45 billion, as expected, it will amount to an increase of less than 5 percent over the current fiscal year. If "double digit" inflation is taken into account, a \$1.45 billion budget would represent a marked decrease in state spending in real dollars.

**Ford Takes Plan to Wall Street**

United Press International President Ford was taking his anti-recession program to Wall Street today. Securities analysts held few expectations for new revelation but high hopes he could say something to restore confidence in the economy.

In Detroit, there were words of hope although more layoffs were planned for next week. In Florida and California, reports indicated the worlds of Disney were wonderful. Ford's forum for the latest in a series of speeches on his recovery program is the New

York Society of Security Analysts. He will be the first President ever to speak to the group. Monte Gordon, of the Dreyfus Corp. and vice president of the NYSSA, said he doubted Ford would provide "any unusual statement or surprise, but we

don't know for sure." "I think it is just going to be a plug for his economic and energy proposals," Newton Zinder of E. F. Hutton said Wednesday. What Wall Street would like to hear, Gordon and Zinder said, was that Ford had assurance that Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, was making a strong effort to stimulate the money supply and would cooperate in financing large federal borrowing for anti-recession programs.

stock prices has indicated to some analysts that the recession might bottom out in about six months and that a slow recovery would begin. A note of optimism was sounded Wednesday by Thomas Murphy, chairman of General Motors, who said in Detroit that massive production cutbacks in the auto industry could end by spring with some help from the President and Congress.

**Agency Withdraws Offshore Oil Plans**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Interior Department says it was wrong when it began preliminary steps toward offshore Atlantic oil development. The department called off a meeting with environmentalists and business representatives intended to single out possible drilling sites off the coasts of New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland.

The invitation was published in the Federal Register on Tuesday. In a statement, Interior Secretary Rogers C.B. Morton said "I now find that the call for nominations was premature." The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear oral arguments Feb. 24 about state and U.S. claims to offshore territory.

**Caldor Offers GE Appliance Rebates**

Caldor Inc., the New England discount department store chain, has announced it will give rebates on all General Electric small appliances sold at its 32 stores in Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York, starting today. The Caldor plan is believed to be the first product-rebate program in the country fully funded by a major retailer. It will start 16 days before a nationwide program of rebates

announced last week by General Electric. The Caldor rebate program includes all 35 appliances covered by the GE plan which goes into effect March 1 plus 22 additional GE small appliances not covered in the national program. Caldor will not be reimbursed by GE for the rebates. Caldor said the rebate plan has the two-fold objective: Helping to fight inflation by lowering prices and fighting the recession by stimulating spending.

"We expect these rebates to stimulate sales in the small appliance industry in the same way the auto rebates created a substantial demand for new cars," the firm said. Resulting sales will deplete the manufacturer's inventory and enable GE to rehire some laid-off employees. Under the Caldor plan, rebates will be given immediately in cash at the stores, instead of by mail as in the national plan. The chain has a

small appliance inventory of more than \$3 million and is one of the largest retailers of appliances in New England. The company said rebates of \$2, \$3 and \$5 will be paid off Caldor's regular sales price for the GE appliances. The amount of the rebate will depend on the item. Caldor has added additional personnel in its small appliance department to service the expected increase in business, Mr. Lo Pinto said.

Small appliances on which \$2 rebates will be given include irons, percolators, curling irons, can openers, hand mixers and timers. Caldor said \$3 rebates will be given on superblowers, hairsetters, massagers, mirrors, electric toothbrushes and hairdryers. Included in the \$5 rebate group are the deluxe model T-95-toast-r-oven, standmixers, kettles, griddles, waffle bakers, hairdryers and stylers.

**State Revenue Bonds To Aid Three Firms**

The Connecticut Development Authority has approved \$5.5 million in industrial revenue bond proceeds for three companies planning to build or expand industrial and commercial facilities in the state. The largest amount, \$4,600,000 will finance the purchase of Cerro Wire and Cable Co. of the former Hamilton Standard building on Bradley Park Rd. in East Granby. The financing will also cover the cost of machinery and equipment for manufacture of control, instrumentation, and thermocouple wire and cable. The company's principal Connecticut plant in New Haven is operating at full capacity, and additional orders made expansion necessary, according to company officials. They anticipate employment of some 200 workers at the East Granby facility.

Carrano's Express Inc. will use \$720,000 of industrial revenue bond financing to buy land in Northford Industrial Park and construct a 44,760-square foot warehouse and distribution center. On completion of the project the company's present work force of 61 will be increased by 16. Custom Marine Sales Inc., Old Saybrook, will receive \$245,000 in industrial revenue bond proceeds for construction of a facility to manufacture high pressure valves and hydraulic components for the submarine industry. Employment is expected to increase from 25 to 43. The Development Authority is the financing arm of the state Department of Commerce, and is authorized by the legislature to issue industrial revenue bonds for a variety of business and industrial projects and pollution control.
